#### NEIGHBORING NEWS.

##### Items Culled From the Leading Local Papers.

###### BROWNWOOD.

Will P. Wise left last Saturday for Bisbee, Arizona, where he will engage in newspaper work.

Jasper Counts, well known all over this county died Wednesday night and was buried Thursday at the Clear Creek cemetery seven miles from town.

Sunday afternoon at the home of Rev. G. B. Cross the marriage ceremony of Charlie Murphy and Mrs. Mollie George occurred.

The Brown county singing convention will meet at Mountain View about four miles north of Brownwood Saturday and Sunday, October 5th and 6th.

A deal was closed yesterday, which when confirmed by the bank directors, transfers the building now occupied by the Citizens' National Bank to Rev. J. S. Chapman, consideration \$7,500. The building was bought by Mr. Chapman merely as an investment.

R. W. Smith who lives fourteen miles north of Brownwood near Holder was in the city today and sold four bales of cotton for twelve cents a pound. Mr. Smith says he has one hundred acres in cotton and will make fully fifty bales or half a bale the acre.

Secretary Kirkpatrick of the Fifty Thousand Club returned this morning from Austin having secured a definite promise

from Governor Tom Campbell that he will open the big Central Texas Fair at Brownwood Tuesday, November 5.

A deal was closed Thursday whereby A. H. Leaves of San Angelo takes over the Palace hotel, constructed by H. D. Ratliff, and the rooming house in the same block belonging to Mrs. Whitfield. The consideration according to the parties concerned is around \$30,000.—Bulletin.

###### COMANCHE

There had been weighed by both of the cotton yards this year up to Friday morning 2,066 bales.

J. J. McCartney has sold his farm about 5 miles east of Comanche and will move to Taylor county in about a month.

Capt. Farrar and wife left for Goldthwaite Thursday evening on a visit.

Married at the home of the bride, Sunday at 4 o'clock, J. T. Guthrie, and Miss Minnie McNeel, a few miles south of town.

C. C. Rollins of Newburg brought to market Tuesday his first, last and only bale of cotton he will gather from 25 acres this year. Last year he raised 99 bales from 135 acres and of this crop 20 bales were picked since January.

Mrs. Judson Hensler died last Sunday at her sister's home near Hico while on her way to her mother's in Coryell county. She had been sick some time and thought the change would benefit her health.

Three young men of Gustine were arrested this week on a

charge of burglarizing Watson Bros. store last Sunday night. All of them have given bond and waived an examining trial. The case will be taken up at the October term of court.

The voters of Comanche county are to be congratulated upon the good judgment they have manifested in approving, at the election Saturday, the project of issuing bonds in liberal amount for the purpose of improving the public highways of the county.—Chief.

###### HAMILTON.

D. Landow and F. M. Graves are preparing to install a new concrete blockmaking machine for making large concrete building blocks.

Commodious railroad stock pens will this week be established at Carlton, by the Stephenville, North and South Texas Railroad.

Raymond Wilkes of Houston, who has been appointed Station Master at this place, for the new S. N. & S. T. railway spent a few days here last week. Mr. Wilkes was for quite a number of years identified with the business people of Hamilton, all of whom will be glad to welcome him back.

Postmaster E. R. Williams is in receipt of information from Superintendent of Railway Mail Service Gaines of Fort Worth, that the matter of railway mail service over the new Stephenville, North & South Texas railroad now under construction from Stephenville to Hamilton, is receiving attention and that the change will be made as early as

possible. This change will remove Hamilton from the records as a star route and place us on the map as a railroad station.—Rustler.

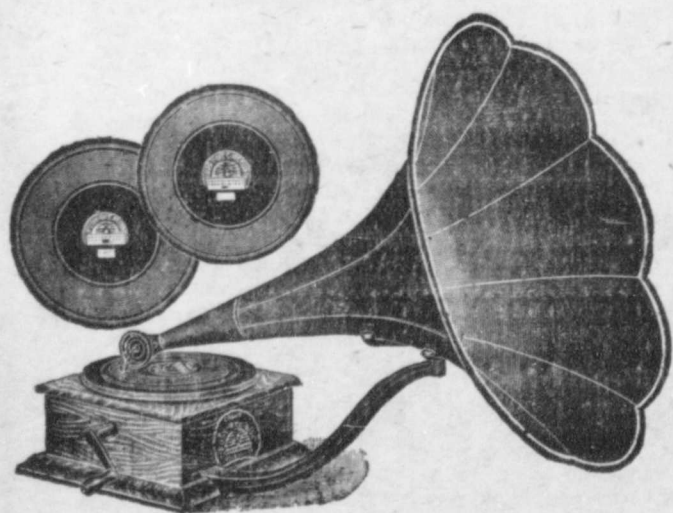

A two million dollar lumber company has been organized in Louisiana. This is, in fact, the merging of several lumber companies into one company.

A movement has been inaugurated by the people of Greenville for building an interurban road from that place to Wolf City and Bonham.

Judge V. L. Brooks of the twenty-sixth district, has resigned to engage in the practice of law in Austin. He has been district judge in Travis and Williamson counties for five years.

In a difficulty at Tatum, a small place near Henderson, last Saturday afternoon, Buck Henby, cashier of the bank, was killed and several people were wounded.

It is announced that the Socialist will establish a weekly newspaper at Texarkana to be devoted to the interests of the Socialists of Texas, Arkansas and Oklahoma.

The people of Gatesville and Waco have applied to the Cotton Belt for a daily passenger train to be operated between the two towns. This together with the through trains gives them two trains each day.

A meeting of attorneys general of twenty-two states has been held in St. Louis this week to discuss anti-trust litigation. Assistant Attorney General Lightfoot of Texas has taken a prominent part in the meeting.

A passenger train on the Frisco road was wrecked near Rolla, Mo., Sunday and the train took fire and was burned. Two of the railroad men were cremated and a number of passengers were injured.

A long distance record for naval wireless telegraphy was made when the armored cruiser Pennsylvania in San Francisco Bay took a wireless message from Savannah, Ga., a distance of more than 2,400 miles. The message is said to have been received without a break.

The new liquor law of Tennessee, which goes into effect that state Nov. 1, has been declared constitutional by the supreme court of that state. This statute was enacted by the Tennessee legislature last spring and makes mandatory the abolition of the saloon in all cities of 100,000 inhabitants or less, hereafter incorporated. After Nov. 1 saloons will exist in Tennessee only in Memphis, Nashville, Chattanooga and LaFollette.

D. A. Robinson, who served as postmaster at Dallas for three years, notwithstanding his appointment was never confirmed by the senate of the United States, resigned Tuesday and Sloan Simpson was appointed by the bondsmen to fill the place temporarily and was recommended for a permanent appointment by President Roosevelt. It has always been a custom to allow the United States senator to select the postmaster in his home town from among the members of the political party in charge of the national government. President Roosevelt ignored this custom, but the senate persisted in refusing to confirm his appointee and this resignation is a result.

A despatch from Wheeling, W. Va., dated Monday says: "Relatives of Mrs. Fred Hatzell, the young wife of a farmer living near Huntington, were bemoaning her death a few minutes before the minister arrived to conduct the last rites when she suddenly sat up and climbed out of the coffin. There was a rush of mourners for the open air, windows being used as exits. The minister swooned when a pale-faced woman over whose body he had been called to conduct service met him at the door. The family were too poor to have a physician and the woman fell into a swoon, in which state she remained four days. Her husband believed her to be dead and sent for the undertaker. He prepared her for the interment without discovering that life lingered in the body."

A report sent out from College Station says: The Missouri Experiment Station has been experimenting with a crop that seems to surpass any claims that the most enthusiastic seed catalogue could possibly make. This new crop is supposed to be of East Indian origin and is called vigna catjang, which is said to be a typical Hindoo name, meaning "fat of the land." In co-operation with some 300 farmers in Missouri the station found 227 of them agreeing that it makes as much hay in eighty days as red clover will produce in fifteen months. They were nearly unanimous in pronouncing it better hay than clover, and most of them declared it nearly if not quite equal to alfalfa in feeding value.
