The attendance at the Dallas Fair is reported to be extra large this year.

The Republican national executive committee will meet in Washington Dec. 6 and 7 to decide upon the place for holding their next national convention.

Burglars in Houston entered two residences in the same section of the city and attempted to murder the occupants, who were awakened by the intruders. In another part of the city on the same night a house that was burglarized was set on fire.

The Sunday law was observed by the saloon keepers in San Antonio last Sunday for the first time in many years. In fact, it is stated that this is the first time saloons have been closed on Sunday since the town was established by the early Spaniards.

A count of the returns from the election on the constitutional amendments has just been completed by the election board at Austin. All of the amendments were defeated and the one proposing to increase the pay of the legislators received less than 10,000 votes, while there were more than 70,000 against it. The next legislature will, no doubt, bring the matter up in another way in an attempt to secure an increase of salary.

Following is the law regarding taking pecans without permission of the owner. "Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Any person who shall, hereafter, gather any pecan nuts upon enclosed land not owned, leased or controlled by him, unless it be made to appear in defense that it was done by the consent of the owner, lessor or person in control, or any person who shall cut, destroy or injure any pecan timber upon lands not his own, unless it be made to appear in defense that it was done with consent of the owner thereof, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not less than five dollars, and not more than three hundred dollars, or by imprisonment in the county jail not more than three months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

MY DEAR SIR:—I am in receipt of your letter of the 17th, together with the results of the election in your Council. I must say that your members have displayed as fine judgment in this matter as you commonly find in the average people. 193 to 141! Better than almost the most sanguine could have expected. Now, I want to tell you that the Lone Star has over 3000 members in it; that when we paid the three death claims named in the card calling for assessment No. 3, that we still had \$725 00 in the treasury—nearly enough to pay another death claim of \$1000 00 and that if the members all pay up on this call for assessment No. 3, we will have enough funds in the treasury of the Lone Star to pay 4 (four) death claims of \$1000.00 each, before we will have to call on the members for another assessment of \$1 00. Now, should one of your members die, the beneficiary of such member will be sure to get \$1000.

That it is going to cost your members a little more than formerly, is to be expected; but when you do have to pay a dollar on an assessment, you will feel that you have some insurance and some protection for your family. Then, too, if you will keep date, you will find that this will be the cheapest \$1000 policy that you have or can get. I know that our supreme president is paying on one \$1000 policy, over \$40 a year, and on another nearly \$40 a year. These are not policies in the Home Circle, but he has a few policies in the Home Circle that are worth \$1000 each, and none of them have ever cost him over \$12 in a single year. He has one in the Lone Star, one in the Comanche, one in the McLennan and one in the DeWitt, either of which is worth \$1000, and most positively he has never had to pay over \$12 a year on either one of them, and so far this year he has not paid \$8 on some of them. The Home Circle is getting better all of the time. The directors of the Supreme Council devote every hour of their time to its betterment and upbuilding, and it is but to be expected that it will improve. Every director is a Christian and loves God and tries to do right, and when business is entrusted to that class of men, you have nothing to fear.

Cemetery Association Dinner.

There have been some objections to the Cemetery association serving dinner to raise money, it being urged that those interested in the organization of the association promised that the public would not be called on to contribute for the work of keeping the cemetery in good condition if the citizens would pay a membership fee of 25 cents per month or a yearly fee of \$1.

Surely those who object to the good women doing this work do not understand the situation or instead of objecting to the work they would lend a hand and would laud those who are doing the work. The first thing to consider is the fact that the membership dues only amount to about half enough to pay the hire of the man who cuts the weeds and clears off the grounds. The only way the work can be kept up is to collect dues for the months that no work is done and thereby create a sinking fund from which the wages of the workman can be drawn when his services are needed.

The ladies are endeavoring to secure funds with which to buy a windmill and tank and to have piping laid through the grounds. If they are willing to do the work it does seem that the community should be willing to give them all the aid needed. When the cemetery association was formed here the weeds and undergrowth had so completely overrun the place that it was "snakey". The association has had so much work done in the cemetery that the grounds will compare favorably with those of any town where a sexton is not regularly employed. The community should appreciate this good work and should contribute liberally for the dinner to be served in town the first day of district court.

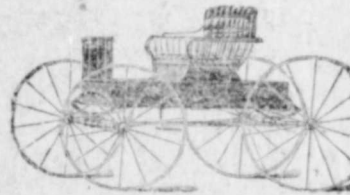

Those who fail to pay the amount before the time named will be subject to five days work on the roads. The money paid will be used to have work done on the road in the precinct where it is paid.

Whit Smith has had the well on the brow of the hill in the eastern suburbs, known as the artesian well, opened and finds that the water comes within 85 feet of the top and believes it will rise up higher when the well is cleaned out. This well is 800 feet deep and there is talk of organizing a stock company to have it made deeper, in hope of securing artesian water.

An Interesting Talk.

Congressman Jas. L. Slayden addressed a fair sized audience in the court house Monday night and his audience appeared to be much interested in the subject discussed. He first spoke of the Philippines and was positive in the opinion that there was not the slightest benefit to be derived from retaining these islands, while there were many disadvantages and dangers to the government in retaining them. He understands the subject thoroughly and gave his hearers a great deal of information that they appreciated. His ideas about the immigration and the race problems were decidedly clear and gave much food for thought. While both of these questions are serious and demand careful handling it is by such discussions as this that the proper solution will be reached. 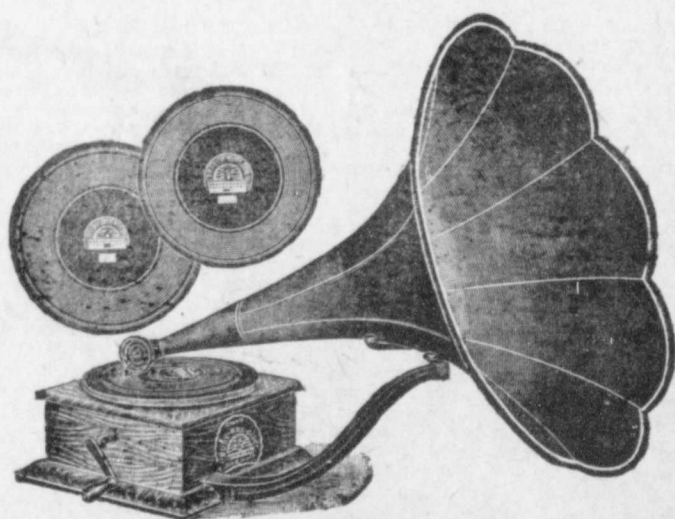

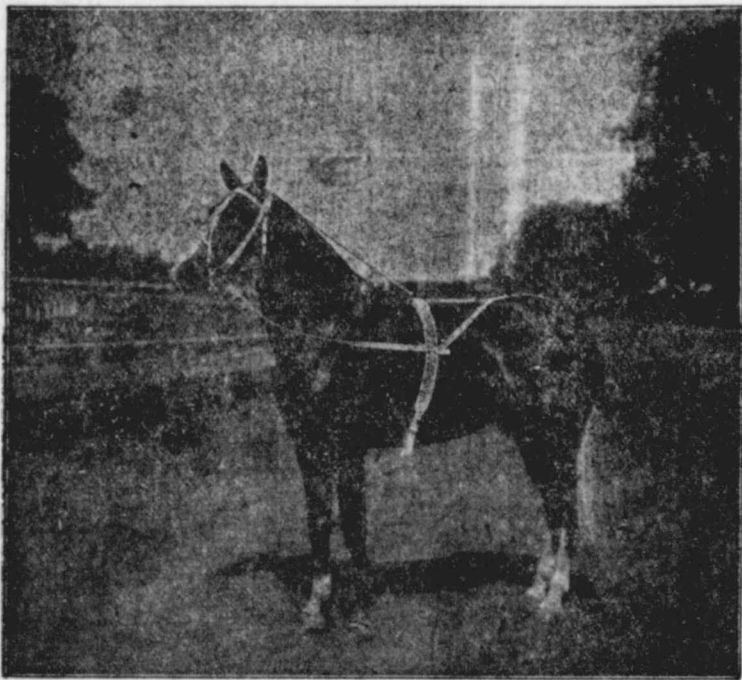

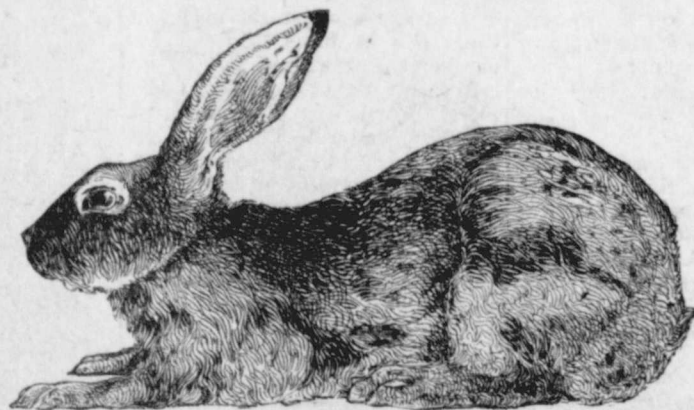

The Purposes Central Texas Fair

The Brownwood Fifty Thousand Club, and various other business organizations in the central part of the state have joined in promoting what is known as the Central Texas Fair, to be held at Brownwood, Texas, five days, Nov. 5th to 9th.

It is the purpose of this fair to advertise and develop this section of the state and to bring about the united efforts of the people in this section of the state, to advertise and improve our live stock interests and to establish a reputation and home market for the fine stock now being raised here, and the live stock department will be a great feature, this the first year of the fair. A large number of stock have already been entered.

Brownwood's Part.

In the recognition of the honor of being the home of the Central Texas Fair, the Brownwood Fifty Thousand Club has undertaken in an elaborate and expensive way to furnish high class entertainments and amusements for all who may attend the fair. And in taking the first important step they chose as general manager one of their members who is a strong believer in proper amusement for the people. And in accepting this appointment Mr. Hurlbut did so with the distinct understanding that the facilities should be placed in his hands by the business men of Brownwood that would enable him to start the Central Texas Fair on a basis that would make it one of the greatest fairs of the state; and to provide a class of amusements and entertainments for the people that would surpass anything undertaken by any fair in the state. One that would be a credit to the state at large as well as to the Central Texas Fair district. And in accordance with this agreement Mr. Hurlbut has spared neither expense or time and has secured the best attractions from the leading state fairs of the country.

The people will be shown the first practical exhibit and operation of an Air Ship that has ever been witnessed in the state. This machine will come from the Alabama State Fair of Birmingham, Ala., to Brownwood.

Another leading attraction will be the Ostrich races that will be run each day. The celebrated racing Ostrich Fleetfoot will go in half mile heats, best two in three against trotting or pacing horses. This attraction comes from one of the Eastern fairs to Dallas and from the Dallas fair to Brownwood. The management secured this attraction over both Austin and Houston.

One of the first attractions to be secured was Joe Joker, the horse that paces mile heats without rider or driver at a high rate of speed, and goes against a horse with a record of 2.14 1/2. Joe Joker has made his mile in 2.17 in the last few days.

Probably the strongest attraction of the entire fair and the strongest ever seen at any fair will be the feats of daring performed from balloons. A different program will be put on every day and such feats as were never before undertaken will thrill and please the people.

A lady and gentleman will make the ascension to gether, making separate leaps with separate parachutes from the same balloon. A cannon will be fired at the height of hundreds of feet, the aeronaut making his drop after lighting the fuse to the cannon. The lady will also give a septentine dance while descending from the clouds in parachute.

The St. Louis papers are now filled with write-ups in regard to the great balloon races to be made in that city, making that one feature alone a great event. A great balloon race will be only one of the many features to be witnessed at the Central Texas Fair.

Every one will be made to laugh at the antics of the clown bicyclist, Cloyd Harrison. This performance will be put on each day.

Other exciting features will be the Automobile races of two miles on a circle tract. Half mile races between automobile and running horses. Half mile races with lady

riders and relay races by lady riders.

All these attractions the editor is informed, will be put on by the Brownwood business men and will all be seen for the one admission at the gate. There will also be a large number of other attractions usually seen at a large fair.

Another very pleasant feature will be the amusements provided by the enterprising men of Brownwood for their friends at night. The celebrated 4th Regiment band will give one hours concert to be followed by a magnificent fireworks display given from a balloon hundreds of feet in the air. The band will also render two concerts daily at the fair grounds.

The Brownwood race track has been put in fine condition. The purses are liberal and fast time may be expected.

One striking feature of the Central Texas Fair is that there will be no stops. Something doing all the time from the time the gate is opened in the morning until they close at night, and from 7 to 10 o'clock at night in town.

Still another feature that is striking attention all over the country is the coursing event or Jack Rabbit chases by grey hounds. Rabbits are being trained for this purpose and it is expected that some fifty racing grey hounds will participate in this event.

Everybody should prepare to attend the fair at Brownwood and have the time of their life.

What People Should Do.

In as much as the Central Texas Fair is intended to benefit this entire section of the state and as the business men of Brownwood are spending thousands of dollars in providing a class of amusements that will far surpass any fairs or circuses to be held in the state, it will be well for the people to reserve their patronage for this institution, especially as there will be thousands of dollars given in premiums and purses that will be distributed among the people from the various counties in the district and be kept at home. This fair is a good thing for Central Texas district for it will keep the money at home while a circus, if generally patronized will take large sums of money out when it is needed at home.

At the Central Texas Fair the people will see better attractions and have a better time and at the same time do themselves and the country good. Let us all wait and patronize the fair.

Governor Campbell will deliver the opening address on Nov. 5th, and the fair management have designated this as farmers day. One of the strongest programs of the fair will be put on at this time and it is hoped that all farmers organizations will come out in force. Special excursion trains will be put on all railroads for that day at very low rates running on a convenient schedule, and returning at night giving every one an opportunity to enjoy everything to be seen at the fair and the special entertainment in town at night before the train leaves. Full schedule of these excursions will be found in another part of this issue.

Fraternal Day.

All the Fraternal orders represented in Brownwood are inviting the members of the different secret orders in the Central Texas Fair District to visit the Brownwood fair on Thursday, Nov. 7th. The fair management will designate this Fraternal Day. The different orders have invited Rev. John Powers to deliver an address on Fraternalism at 11 o'clock on that day and every effort will be made both by the fraternal orders and the fair management to give every one attending the time of their life.

The Central Texas Fair management, we are informed, had intended to have an address delivered each day of the fair at 11 o'clock by some prominent speaker. So many attractions, however, have been booked that they find that this will be impossible and there will, therefore, be three addresses. The Governor's address on Tuesday, Nov. 5th, Rev. Powers, Thursday, Nov. 7th, and as Saturday Nov. 9th, has been designated

as school and college day, a prominent speaker will deliver an address to the students at 11 o'clock. On Wednesday and Friday the entire time will be taken up with the general fair program.

For the Convenience of the People.

The Central Texas Fair management has arranged for free camping grounds near the fair grounds for those who may wish to come. Hitching ground has also been provided inside the grounds for the day without extra charge. Feed for stock on exhibition and for others will be sold on the ground, at 10 per cent above city prices. This does not bar any one from bringing their own feed.

The fair management has arranged to have meals served on the grounds at 25 cents so that no exorbitant prices can be charged.

Sow Grain.

This section of the state never had a better season for sowing rain. And as feed is very scarce and high the pasturage alone will pay for putting in the crop. Conditions insure a good price for next season if a crop is made. Should it be a failure the ground can be planted in cotton in the spring. Therefore every farmer who has not already done so should put in some grain. As we have already stated conditions were never more favorable for good returns.

Farmers' Day.

The opening day of the Central Texas Fair at Brownwood, has been designated by the fair management as Farmers' Day. Governor Campbell will deliver the address on this day and as it is his first visit to this section of the state special excursion trains will be run from every direction.

Since metal figures in the operation the canvas might indeed be said to be canned. There is no reason why paintings kept in this manner in a vacuum should not endure indefinitely.

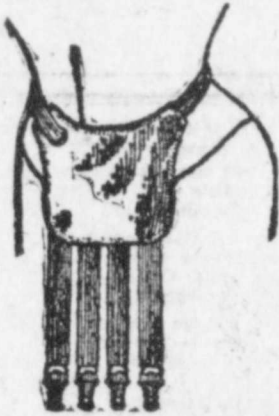
