

Wind did great damage to the tents and exhibitions outside the main buildings at the San Antonio fair Sunday night.

Reliable authorities state that the financial depression that has been felt in all parts of the country is gradually being relieved and normal conditions will soon prevail.

Governor Campbell has issued his proclamation in conformity with that of the president of the United States, naming Nov. 28 as the day of Thanksgiving.

Attorney General Davidson has brought suit against a large number of flour mills and grain dealers in this state, alleging that there is a combination or trust among them.

As a trust "buster" Attorney General Davidson has no equal. He has the trusts on the run and if future administration follow his policies Texas will be free from the trusts in a few years.

The state treasury has been unable to pay warrants on account of the lack of funds in the vaults. There are immense deposits in state depositories that will be called for by the treasurer in installments to relieve the present embarrassment.

A broken rail on the International railroad near Cross Timbers caused the baggage car and three coaches of the train to leave the track and roll down an embankment. Most of the passengers were asleep at the time. Only one man was seriously hurt.

What is known as the Brownwood Santa Fe extension has started. A load of light steel rails were unloaded where the extension anticipates tapping the main line. A message was received yesterday morning to substitute heavy rails instead of the ones unloaded there. Creosoted ties were carried all yesterday afternoon and placed as far as has been graded.—Texico Trumpet.

That it is possible to manufacture paper from cotton cotton has been demonstrated. The cover of the last issue of the Cotton Journal, published at Atlanta, Ga., being of such stock. It is estimated that 5,000,000 tons of paper could be manufactured from the cotton stalks now going to waste annually in the fields of the South. With common press paper near 50 per pound, there appears to be a fortune, or several of them, for men with enterprise enough to install mills to convert stalks into paper.—Weimar Mercury.

All the cotton mills in Texas are earning a good rate of interest on their investments. As they increase in number, there is certain to be a demand for young men trained to superintend and direct cotton manufacturing concerns. The wisdom of the legislature in providing opportunities for Texas boys to train themselves for their work at home cannot be questioned. Texas will one day be filled with cotton mills backed by Texas capital, and directed and managed by young men who have obtained their technical training at College Station.—College Bulletin.

Dear Sir: Paint goes by gallons. There are useful and useless gallons. Useful paint is lead-zinc-and-oil with dryer and color; useless paint is whitening, china-clay, ground stone, barytes, benzine, or water.

This stuff is put-in, because it is cheap, to stuff-out the paint, to make more gallons to sell; of course, the buyer doesn't suspect, or he wouldn't buy it.

It costs as much to brush-on this useless stuff as lead-zinc-and-oil; but it looks like that and feels like that in the brush; the painter doesn't suspect it. Besides, if the owner is willing, why should the painter object to painting two gallons for one? He is paid by the day; more gallons, more days, more money.

Dear Eagle and Mills County People: Many happy thoughts come to me of Mills county, in the dear old state of Texas, for I was born and raised in Mills county, but I did not appreciate dear old Texas and Mills county people as I do now, for I am far away and will remain for four years. But I hope to return a man—a better man in every way, physically and mentally. I am in the U. S. navy, have been in four months and have been in the Academy here at Norfolk getting training to go on the sea. I am on old Point Comfort near old Fortress Monroe, just across the channel from the Jamestown exposition. We navy boys are allowed a good many privileges in going places. We go to the exposition as ornaments, as it is somewhat of a military exposition. The marines act as guards for the sailors. We have 4 hours duty on the battleship and 8 hours off on shore. We spend our idle time in the library reading or writing or in the gymnasium taking exercise, play tennis or base ball, and in warm weather crowds of us go swimming in the James river.

The navy's uniforms are different from the U. S. infantry or any other branch of the U. S. army's dress. Our summer suits are white linen with a large blue sailor collar, caps on head are white; winter suit navy blue woolen goods. Dress suits at all times are navy blue blouses, sailor collar trimmed in white braid with white and blue caps to match.

There are boys from all parts of United States, Maryland, North and South Carolina, New York, Minnesota, Illinois, Missouri and Texas. We have preaching every Sunday at the navy yard chapel.

The Minnesota, Iowa and Virginia battleships are here getting ready for a cruise to the Phillipine Islands and to San Francisco. I am going on the Christmas cruise around Cape Horn to California; start Dec. 1 and take Christmas dinner in San Francisco. Twenty new recruits arrived from Washington, D. C., this morning. I have not talked with any of them yet, some may be from Texas. I am always glad to see anybody from Texas. A boy that don't expect to obey gets in the wrong place when he joins the navy, but if he behaves well and is obedient to orders he has little trouble with the officers. He will soon learn to be obedient and if you are good to the officers they are good to you. One advantage in the navy you visit all parts of the civilized world, the countries of Europe, Asia and Africa. There is a good deal of red tape about military tactics and it takes a fellow a time before he can see any sense in so many orders and bells, but I have got to be an expert in the use of guns. I am well satisfied now to what I was at first. It is a good place for a boy that likes to rove and be on the go.

Ordinance of Goldthwaite.

CHAPTER XXIV.
An ordinance of the incorporated town of Goldthwaite, Mills county, Texas, prohibiting the disturbance of any theatrical performance or any public gathering, other than meetings for religious worship.
Be it ordained by the town council of the town of Goldthwaite, as incorporated, that any person who shall be guilty of loud talking, laughing, hissing, cat-calling, smoking, throwing paper or other missiles, or any other act or conduct tending to disturb or annoy any spectator at any public gathering of people in the town of Goldthwaite, other than a congregation met for the purpose of religious worship or any spectator or actor or performer in any theater or opera house, or tent, or other place where such performance is being conducted, while such performance is going on, or while the audience or any part thereof are there, or thereabout, assembled, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not less than ten nor more than fifty dollars; and execution for such fine shall issue and in case the same is not paid, then such person shall be imprisoned for not more than ten days, as allowed by law.
And this ordinance shall be in effect immediately after its passage and the publication required by law.
Passed, approved and adopted, this November 4th, 1907, at a regular meeting of the town council of the town of Goldthwaite as incorporated by a unanimous vote; and the rule requiring all ordinances to be read three several times, being unanimously suspended.
And this original ordinance is ordered to be filed in the office of the secretary, and if approved by the Mayor, is to be signed by him, and there kept, as chapter 24 of the ordinances of Goldthwaite, and shall be published in the Goldthwaite Eagle, and thereafter be in effect.
Which ordinance, passed as aforesaid, was filed with the secretary, and by me examined and approved, and ordered filed and kept as chapter 24.

A Better Seed Bed.

Every farmer understands the soil conditions necessary for a successful truck patch or garden, which are in the main as follows, to-wit: Deep breaking (plowing)—soil thoroughly pulverized—plenty of humus, vegetable mould or barn yard manure, and good drainage. These conditions are just as essential for profitable field crops as for the garden.

The deep breaking for field crops should be done in the fall, and should not be less than eight inches deep—ultimately the progressive Southern farmer will try to average ten to twelve inches.

The objection is urged that to turn up so much poor soil at once will ruin the land. It is not proposed to turn it up till it has been aired a few years. The way is to use a common turning plow run at the usual depth; then in the same furrow run a second plow, a trifle narrower, just behind the first plow, using another mule or span of mules. If the first plow cuts four inches deep, the second should cut four more, making eight in all. If the land will permit, cross plow four inches deep thirty days later; then harrow. In dry sections the harrow should always follow the plow. Of course, cross plowing is not admissible where ridge cultivation must be followed.

A better method than the double plowing above described is to use a sub-soil plow or a disc plow, as neither of these implements throw any sub-soil to the surface. The disc plow is more economical, because it does the surface and sub-soil stirring with one implement.

The air penetrates as deep as we plow. The deeper we plow the more plant food is prepared by the action of the air and more moisture is carried in the soil to withstand drouths. Deep fall plowing then is a great aid in breaking up the compounds of the soil, in preparing plant food, in storing moisture and in warming the soil for early planting. Where there is winter frost, deep plowing increases its effect on the soil.

A thoroughly pulverized seed bed is a long way towards a good crop. On heavy soils the roller and disc harrow are almost indispensable to crush the clods and pulverize the soil. If this is done four or five inches deep, so that the young plant can get a good start, with reasonable after care the crop is assured. A clod is like unplowed land—it holds little moisture and yields scarcely any plant food. The best of seed has little chance in a poorly prepared seed bed. A finely pulverized soil aids germination, increases the amount of plant food available, stores more moisture and is more readily penetrated by the air and the rays of the sun. Even granite rock, if thoroughly pulverized, will support vegetation.

A third requisite of good preparation of the soil is to have plenty of vegetable matter in it. This is generally secured by turning under cowpeas, or green crops of any kind, or using leaf mould or barn-yard manure. Vegetable matter makes a soil porous, friable easily work, resistant of drouths. This vegetable matter, called humus, absorbs and retains the food prepared in the soil by the action of air and heat, and gives it off to the plants as required. It warms the soil, adding frequently several degrees of heat and it facilitates the condensation of moisture from the atmosphere in dry periods. More vegetable mat-

ter is especially important where the texture of the soil is so fine as to prevent the free circulation of water, and water stands upon the surface or in the soil so long that it is an injury to plants.

One of the most essential requirements for success in the production of field crops is drainage. Our soils are mainly of a close texture and require plenty of open ditches to carry off the surface water and the surplus soil water. Frequently the plant food is vitiated and the soil kept cold and closed to the action of the air by the standing water in it. Whenever a freshly dug post hole readily fills with water until it stands within six inches or even a foot of the surface, there is too much water in the soil. Field ditches for drainage should not be less than two feet deep, and should have a good outlet.

Drainage facilitates early planting and in a large measure determines its success by removing the surplus water and allowing the sun's rays to warm the soil. Write in capital letters where you can see it every day the following:

1. Deep Fall plowing, properly done;
2. Soil thoroughly pulverized;
3. Abundance of vegetable mould; and
4. Complete drainage of tilled fields, lie at the foundation of better crop yields.


