#### GOOD ROADS REDUCE EXPENSE.

If all our roads were in first class condition this enormous expense would be reduced one-half, as the cost of hauling freight over the mud hole and through the sand is 43 cents per ton mile while the cost over improved highway is 23 cents per mile. Good roads reduce expense and distance as well.

A good road turneth away wrath and a permanent highway is a joy forever. There is no influence so uplifting as a good road and no other construction will give as complete satisfaction as that of a well built public highway.

Everybody loves a good road and a good road makes us love everybody. In moral influence it ranks next to the church and it is a great educator in citizenship. It helps to keep the community in a good humor. The improvement of public highways will add more happiness prosperity and morality to a community than any other form of investment. Build roads and be happy.

We, the Mullin Farmers Institute, request and urge the Honorable Commissioners court of Mills county, to make necessary appropriations to carry on the demonstration work in this county for the coming year, as we consider the work a great advantage to the farming interest.

Moved and carried that the Farmers Institute meet at its regular meetings on second Saturdays of each month at 3 o'clock p. m.

Mr. Hill's proposition on the Southern Cotton Corporation proposition was indorsed and Geo. M. Fletcher was indorsed to represent the organization at Mullin.

### EXHIBITS WANTED.

#### Mills County To Be Represented at Dallas Fair.

The committee from the Commercial club has secured space in the agricultural exhibit hall at the Dallas fair and plans to have a fine exhibit there of Mills county products. The space is of regulation size in the hall, being 12 1-2 x 16 feet, which will be ample room for a large and varied exhibit. The cost of the space was \$20, which amount has been forwarded to the fair association.

Now that the matter of making an exhibit has been definitely determined all persons interested in keeping Mills county abreast with the best counties in the state are urged to lend assistance in securing the exhibits. Corn, oats, barley, wheat, wool and other products of the farm, ranch, garden and orchard are wanted. The fair will open Oct. 18 and close Nov. 2 and exhibits will be returned to the owners if desired. All parties who will assist in making exhibits are requested to notify President L. E. Miller at the jewelry store, leave word at the Eagle office or tell any member of the club what articles or products will be furnished, in order that arrangements may be made for receiving and transporting the exhibits to the fair.

The exhibits will be in charge of Mr. J. S. Sealy, who will give his time free of cost in order that the county may be properly represented. He will go to Dallas some time before the opening of the fair in order to place the exhibits and have everything in readiness.

The Eagle believes that Mills county can make an exhibit of which every citizen will be proud. We can prove to the world that we have better and more varied products than the black belt and as fine fruit as comes from the sandy land of eastern Texas, our garden products will surpass those of the irrigated districts of the southwest and we can show as fine wool and mohair as can be exhibited by this or any foreign country, while our pecans are world famed. 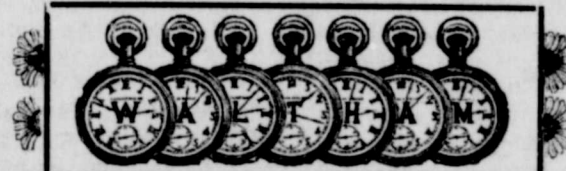

A bill has been introduced in congress requiring all railroads running into the District of Columbia to use only electric trains.

A district judge in Iowa has held that the Webb-Kenyon law which prohibits the shipment of liquor into a prohibition state is void. The question will probably be submitted to the higher courts.

The date for the Dallas fair this year will be Oct. 14 to Nov. 2. Mills county should be represented at this fair this year and the benefits from such representation will be far reaching and lasting.

At a meeting of Santa Fe officials in Galveston Saturday the proposed improvements of the company's property to the extent of \$108,000 was sanctioned. It is hoped that this appropriation includes a new depot for Goldthwaite.

The Mexican rebels claim that they could easily win the war against the assassin government if they could secure the necessary arms and ammunition. The Eagle favors allowing them the full purchasing power in this country in order that we may ascertain the truth of their claim.

Governor Colquitt has evidently decided that it is easier to lead the legislators than to drive them and in an address before both houses this week he complimented them on the amount of work accomplished by the special session and denied having made derogatory remarks about the thirty-third legislature, claiming that it was the former session he had reference to in his speech at the barbecue. A better feeling seems to exist about the capitol since this last speech.

Congressman Bacon of Georgia has very wisely said: "There never was a greater responsibility on a man than now rests on the president of the United States to guard this country against being involved in war on account of Mexico, and I believe that it is the duty of every man, inside and out of congress, who has confidence in the integrity and capacity of the president, to hold up his hands in the effort he is making and to do as little as possible to embarrass him in working out successfully the difficult undertaking."

The ending of the war in southeastern Europe has disclosed much suffering among the refugees and poorer classes. One of the missionaries in Bulgaria has sent an appeal to this country in which he says: "There is great and appealing need among the thousands of refugees who have fled to Bulgaria to escape the ravages of the cruel war prosecuted by Greeks and Turks in Macedonia. Scores of villages and hundreds of homes have been destroyed, and misery, want and dire distress are to be found on all sides. Bulgaria appeals to benevolent Americans for sympathy and material aid."

It has been suggested that the matter of redistricting Texas into congressional, senatorial, representative and judicial districts be taken out of the hands of the legislature and placed in the hands of a commission of some kind, which would have to be created by an amendment to the constitution of Texas. There is no doubt that something should be done in this regard, because the people of Texas are certainly getting tired of so much partisan foolishness being enacted under the dome of the capitol. As long as this or that representative wants to go to congress just that long will he endeavor to manipulate redistricting the state in his favor. This very thing has prevented Texas from being redistricted for four years and the probabilities are that we will have to go after and elect congressmen at large for an indefinite period of time because of such foolishness.—Brenham Banner.

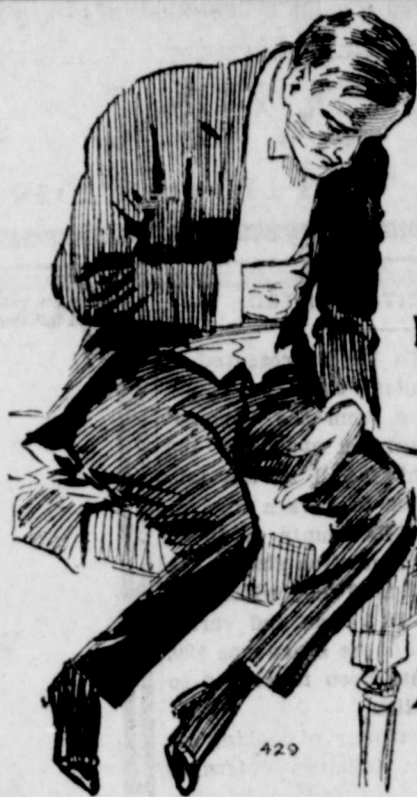

### COMMISSIONERS COURT.

The court has been in regular quarterly session this week and has had a great amount of business before it.

The county tax rate was fixed at 50 cents on the \$100 valuation, the funds to be divided as follows: General fund 15c; court house fund, 20c; road and bridge fund, 15c.

Levies were made for special tax for school purposes in the following: Merrell creek district, 50c; Ebony district, 45c. Hanna Valley, 40c. Washboard, 35c. Live Oak, 30c. North Brown, Pompey Creek, Trigger Mountain, Mount Olive, 25c. Williams ranch, Evans, Cold Springs, Pompey Creek, Nabors Creek, Rye Valley, Kelly, Cryer, Pickens, Center, Liberty, Fisher, 20c. Mount Pleasant, Bull Springs, Pleasant Grove, Antelope Gap, Smith, Head, Fairview, 15c. Blanket Springs, Center City, Big Valley, Bryant, 10c.

An election was ordered in Goldthwaite school district for Aug. 30 to determine whether or not a pool hall shall be allowed to operate in the district.

Returns from special elections in Pompey Mountain and Merrell creek school districts were examined and found to be favorable to the special tax.

The official bond of L.W. Wigley as constable of Mullin precinct was approved.

Report of a jury of view on a road in the northern portion of the county to intersect the Priddy and Zephyr road was received and damages to the amount of \$160.50 allowed. This road was petitioned for by L.B. McCormick and others and runs a distance of three miles.

The name of the old Priddy school district was changed to Bismarck district and the new district formed in that community was named Priddy.

Petition by Dr. Lowrie and others for a street through Hearne addition from Dr. Lowrie's home south to the San Saba road was granted.

Accounts for current expenses were allowed and the account of the Gordon Jones Construction Co. for \$1023.50 for the sidewalks around the court yard was ordered paid.

A stock law election was ordered in the new Priddy school district and the Becker Mountain district to be held Sept. 27.

The court decided to dispense with the services of the demonstration farmer after his present contract expires, which will be about Nov. 1.

Assignment of the rooms in the new court house for the various offices were made by the court.

Petition of R. Hohertz and others for a road in the Priddy community was granted and a jury of view appointed.

Commissioner Swindle was authorized to superintend the erection of the 80-foot span steel bridge across Blanket creek, at the Williams crossing, in the neighborhood of the Driskill ranch. The material for the bridge was reported to be on the ground.

The matter of replacing the hitching posts around the court house was under consideration by the court yesterday. It was the prevalent idea at that time that the chain would only reach from the west entrance around the south and to the entrance on the east and it is likely the hitching posts and chain will be replaced to that extent.

The public well at the southwest corner of the court yard was completed Thursday. It is 94 feet deep and is thought to afford an abundance of water. This well was secured with funds raised by the ladies of the Self Culture club and is much better than the old one that was covered over at the north side of the square.

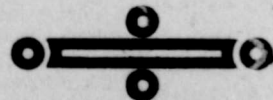

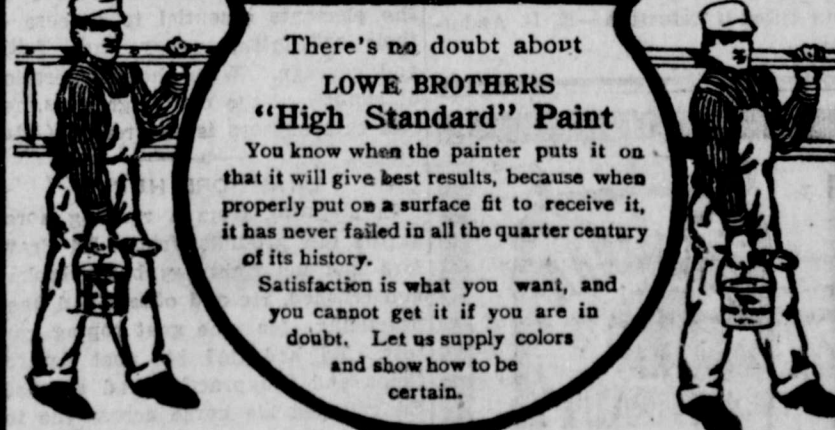

### FIRST BALE.

#### Goldthwaite Cotton Market Opens. A Liberal Premium.

The first bale of 1913 cotton brought to this market arrived Thursday morning and was sold to L. O. Hicks & Son for \$11.50 per hundred. The cotton was brought in by Mr. T. J. Laughlin of Antelope Gap, was ginned by J. E. Greathouse's gin, weighed 610 pounds and was placed in the Farmers Union cotton yard.

A. E. Evans, tax assessor, circulated a subscription list among the business men and secured \$29.75 for Mr. Laughlin. This amount included the ginning, which was donated by Mr. Greathouse.

The cotton and seed together with the premium netted Mr. Laughlin \$110.05, which was a little better than the first bale last year netted the grower.

Mr. Laughlin brought in the first bale in 1908.

#### Last Year.

The first bale was brought in last year on August 8 by S. C. Hawes of the Center community. It was ginned by Walter Fairman, weighed 584 pounds and sold to S. P. Sullivan for \$13.20. A. E. Evans circulated a subscription list and secured \$25.75, which made the bale net the grower \$109.45.

### CITY DEPOSITORY.

First bales of cotton are reported from many Texas towns and the price runs from 11 to 15 cents, which indicates what the market is going to be the coming season.

The legislature of New York voted to impeach Governor Sulzer, after an all-night session, notwithstanding the governor's wife confessed the entire blame for the speculation and other acts for which the governor was accused.

The secretary of the treasury has announced that he will distribute funds to the banks throughout the country to assist in moving the cotton crop. Five million dollars is the Texas pro rata of the amount to be placed in the banks. This doesn't look like a crop failure is expected in this country.

The state scholastic apportionment has been placed at \$7 per capita, which is 15 cents more than last year but it will not be of nearly so much benefit to the schools, since the pupils from 17 to 21 years of age are not included in the apportionment, although they receive free tuition.

Officers and detectives have failed to locate the murderer of Miss Florence Brown, who was killed in Dallas several weeks ago and claim now that they have been unable to even locate a clew upon which to work. Several theories have been advanced and a number of supposed clews have been run down, but nothing has been found. It now appears that the murderer will make good his escape.

Japan's statement that Felix Diaz will not be received as a special representative, but as a private citizen, is pleasing to the American people, for there is no doubt that the traitorous Felix is enroute for Japan with the hope of making trouble for the United States because this government refuses to recognize or respect the administration of a man who secured his bloody throne by treachery and murder.

The action of President Huerta in declaring he would not accept mediation by the United States or interference in Mexico's affairs by this government made him mighty strong with his followers and perhaps some who had not heretofore espoused his cause, but when the time came for him to treat President Wilson's representative with respect or offer insult to this nation his white liver asserted itself and he figuratively "swallowed his words." The big greaser is nothing better than an assassin and an assassin is always a coward.

The information comes from Washington that Senator Culberson is very ill at some isolated point in Connecticut. He has been unable to attend a session of the senate in a long time and it is feared he will not be there to vote on the tariff bill. Without his vote the Democrats stand a good chance to lose. Reports have frequently been sent out that Senator Culberson will not be a candidate to succeed himself, but this report has never been confirmed by him or any one authorized to speak for him.

The Bell county commissioners court declined to order a prohibition election in precincts Nos. 1, 2, 5 and 7 in that county, although a large petition was presented in favor of the election. A combination of precincts had been made and it was claimed that this combination was unjust, in that some of the "dry" precincts, known to have a good majority in favor of prohibition, had been joined with the precincts known to oppose prohibition, the plan being to overbalance the anti vote in the "wet" precincts with the prohibition votes in the "dry" territory.

Governor Sulzer of New York has gotten himself in a "hot pot" politically and perhaps several other ways. He claims that some of the political leaders are attempting to ruin him because they can not use him, but this statement is not substantiated by the facts so far developed. The misuse of the campaign funds subscribed for the benefit of his party's campaign and other misdeeds charged to him cannot be excused, if they are true, simply because some of the party leaders dislike him. Perhaps his conduct has caused them to expose him. At any rate, he stands in a good way to lose his political standing and his office.
