District Court.

The November Term Closed Monday—Jury Failed to agree

District court closed for the term Monday and Judge Robinson and the court stenographer, Mr. Monteith left for their homes in Belton Monday night.

This was one of the lightest dockets the district court has ever had here. During the entire term only two cases were tried by jury and both of these cases were civil suits.

Messrs. Jas. Rall, C. P. Jones and J. B. Renfro were appointed commissioners to select the jurors for the spring term of court.

The case of the Goldthwaite National Bank vs. Harper & Egger, which was under consideration by the jury when the Eagle was put to press last week, was not disposed of as the jury failed to agree and was discharged Saturday afternoon. The case remains on the docket to be disposed of at some future term of the court.

Reduce Cotton Acreage

Suggestion By Secretary Houston And Industrial Congress

Secretary of Agriculture Houston, replying to requests for his Department to take action to reduce the cotton acreage next year, says in effect:

The only help, so far as the Department of Agriculture sees, is to adopt a constructive plan. This plan is to bring home to the farmer the fact that for several years the prices of foodstuffs will be high, and that more of such crops should be grown. Livestock, including beef and dairy cattle, hogs, and poultry should supplement a diversity of profitable food-tuff crops. The business men in the towns and cities must extend the same credit and the landlords make the same equitable arrangements with the farmers for growing other field crops and livestock as were made for cotton production. In doing these things, thinks Secretary Houston, the way out, not only for Texas but for the entire South will be found. It would not be possible to set out more clearly what the Texas Industrial Congress has been preaching for the past five years and what it has been and is endeavoring to bring about than Secretary Houston has done in this letter.—Industrial Congress.

Good Picking.

How To Vote

The ballots for the general election to be held Nov. 3 have been printed this week and are being distributed to the various voting boxes in the county. These ballots are in "blanket" form containing seven columns, six bearing party names and the seventh is a blank throughout. It is important that every voter understand just how to mark his ticket, in order to save time for the election officers in giving instruction. A citizen who desires to vote a straight party ticket should run a line through the other six columns; but if he wishes to vote a "mixed" ticket, that is partly for the nominees of one party and partly for another, or even for persons whose names do not appear on the ballot at all, he must mark out the names of the candidates for whom he does not desire to vote on all tickets; and where he desires to vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot he must write the name in the blank column. As an example, one who does not desire to vote for the Democratic candidate for governor, but wishes to vote the entire Democratic ticket with this exception, must mark out the name in the Democratic column and write the name of the person for whom he desires to vote in the blank column and NOT in the Democratic column. provided, of course, such name does not appear on any of the other party tickets. This rule applies to all other offices the same as to the one cited. Where a party nominee's name is erased and another name is written in the same column the vote for that office does not count.

A fast train on the M. K. & T. railroad was wrecked near Bartlett Monday morning and two firemen and the engineer were killed, while a number of passengers were injured. It is supposed the rain of Sunday caused the track to spread. One car turned completely over and several cars left the track.

The Texas legislature positively refused to adopt a cotton acreage law, the vote in opposition to the measure being almost unanimous. It is stated that Governor Colquitt will call another special session of the legislature immediately after the November election and hope to have the measure adopted by the new law-making body.

Free city delivery of mail was first established in the United States July 1, 1879. Dallas, Galveston and Houston were the first cities in this State to inaugurate this plan. According to data compiled by the Texas Business Men's Association, together with the aid of Federal Postal authorities, there are 49 Texas cities that have free delivery of mail. This feature has been established in 13 of these cities during the past three years.

A report just issued by the United States Geological Survey shows the gypsum production of Texas in 1913 to be 151,090 short tons, valued at \$346,000. The production shows a slight increase over 1912, but the value has decreased about \$10,000. Texas had a large undeveloped gypsum area. The only deposits exploited at present are those in northern Texas. Four plants, three at Acme and one at Hamlin are engaged in the manufacture of gypsum into plaster.

It is quite a common sight in Texas to see farmers drive to the harvest fields in automobiles. It takes a solemn sum of money to buy an automobile and it takes good roads, as well as gasoline to run them. A joy ride in the harvest fields of this State is one of the most exhilarating experiences that is available on this continent and one that would charm a tourist and convince a homeseeker. A speedway lined with growing crops and blooded stock is a landscape that one seldom tours in a lifetime. In mapping out automobile routes the Texas harvest fields should be given prominent position. Why not a "See Rural Texas First" campaign?—Commercial Secretaries.

An effective and serviceable parcels post is no longer merely a favorite subject for magazine discussion and high school debates; it is now a national institution and a practical accomplished fact. No exact data has yet been compiled relating to the working of the parcels post in Texas, but from estimates compiled by the postal authorities at Washington, based on the business handled at representative offices in this State, it is evident that during the fiscal year 1912 approximately 10,000,000 packages were mailed in Texas on which the postage amounts to nearly a million dollars. The parcels post has served to bring the rural producer and urban consumer closer together and has greatly helped to solve the high living cost problem in Texas. It is performing the functions of the middleman without his exorbitant profit.—Commercial Secretaries.

FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORTS

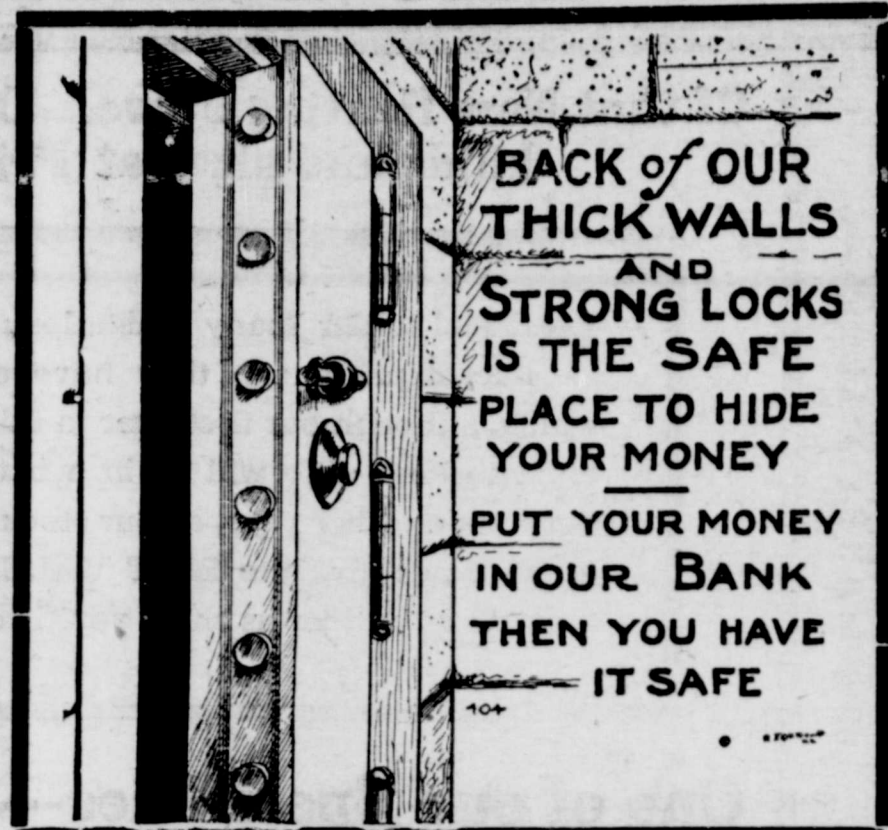
Finds Mills County's Affairs in Good Shape—No Shortage or Other Complaints

The finance committee appointed by Judge Robinson at the spring term of district court to make an examination of the county's affairs reported to the November term of court and the report is now on file in the district clerk's office, where it can be inspected by any person interested.

The report is complimentary to our county and its officers and while some questions are made as to unimportant records, the report commends the officers and states that every thing was found to be accurate and in proper form.

As to the cost of the new court house, furniture, fixtures, walks, etc. the following figures are furnished by the finance committee, which are known to be correct: Court house cost, including extras, \$63,372.69; architect, \$3,500.93; wood furniture, \$8,381; metal furniture, \$23,962; sidewalks, work on jail, etc., \$1,622.99; making a total for building, furniture, sidewalks, etc., \$83,942.61.

GAME SEASON

Synopsis of the Law Regulating the Killing of Deer, Birds, Etc.

The hunters who violate the game law are subject to severe penalties and it is well to be careful of the provisions of the law:

Duck season opened October 15 and closes Feb. 1.

Deer Season Opens November 1, closes January 1. Limit, three bucks for season. Unlawful to kill does and fawns.

Turkey Season opens December 1 and closes April 1. Limit, three turkeys for season.

Quail and Doves Season opens November 1 and closes February 1. Limit 25 birds in one day.

Prairie Chicken Season is closed absolutely until 1917.

Rabbits, possums, coons and bears are not protected. Squirrel protected in only two counties—Liberty and Montgomery.

You may ship or transport to your home such game as you have lawfully killed by making proper affidavit.

You must not buy or sell any wild game or game birds of any kind.

You may kill hawks, crows, buzzards, owls, English sparrows, rice birds and blackbirds at any time.

You must not hunt game or game birds at night with lantern, hunting lamp or any other light.

A resident license is required of party shooting in county outside of the one adjoining that which he lives in. Amount of license \$1.75.

License is good only from September 1 to September 1 the following year.

Nonresident, unless a bona fide inhabitant and resident citizen of this state for six months past, must take out a non-resident license, \$15 per season.

Three days consecutive kill of ducks, 25 per day, total 75 ducks, may be shipped or transported on train when party killing same accompanies shipment and has made the required affidavit during the season, October 15 to February 1.

Possession at any time of the year during which game birds are protected shall be prima facie evidence of the guilt of the person in possession thereof.

A day's bag must not contain more than 25 birds, either mixed or of one kind.

The duck season which opened on the 15th at sunrise allows only the shooting of water fowl which does not include jack snipe.

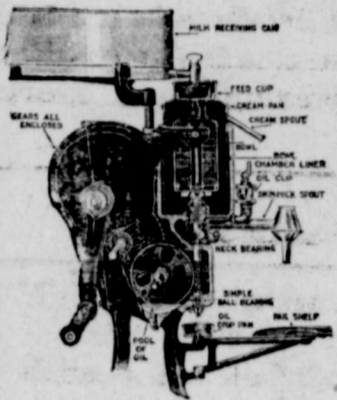

Any state can well afford to abandon saloons on the ground of expense. I noted in 1910 that Bell county grand jury during one session returned 168 indictments while in Collin county with a larger population and no saloons, after the grand jury investigated for two weeks found only two indictments.

This is one example of many hundreds showing the high taxation necessary to care for the business created by the saloons.

The liquor interest proposes to care for itself even at the downfall of good and necessary institutions. Of late we are having some long drawn out expenses over proposed legislation which if it could be enacted, would be out of harmony with our state constitution. I wonder when we will repent sufficiently to throw off saloon rule?

No one ever heard a good and sufficient reason for the existence of a saloon. Saying nothing of expenses to the state the first objection is on the ground of immorality which is produced by the saloon. When one cares not for the moral atmosphere in his country he cares little for the rights of others and nothing for a permanent civilization.

Many of us have failed to draw others to right views because we have indulged in harshly censuring others of opposite views. It has always been hurtful to disregard the feelings of others. As a result of unkind and sometimes untrue statements many are against prohibition and not especially in favor of saloons. The most guilty and thoughtless can be helped by kind consideration.

It is noteworthy that no one can be a friend to liquor interests and at the same time serve his country to the best and highest end.
