Mrs. George Tomlinson of San Saba county was brought here Monday morning to board the train for Temple, where she was to receive treatment in the sanitarium.

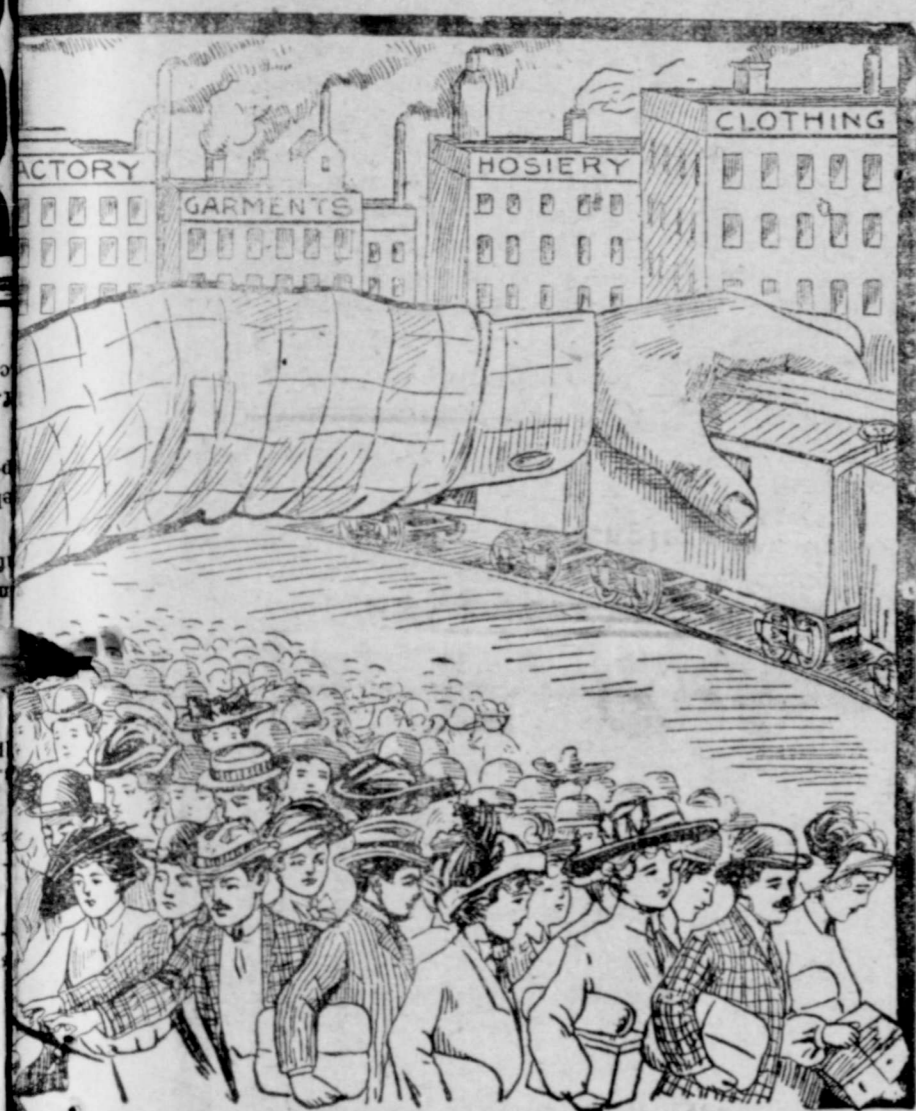

BANKRUPTCY PETITION

B. F. Geeslin Mercantile Co., Turns Over Stock to Referee

The Geeslin Mercantile Co. of this city was thrown into bankruptcy Thursday night by foreign creditors and the store was closed yesterday, preparatory to taking an inventory of the goods and other assets.

The company's failure was caused by poor collections and was the outcome of the low price of cotton causing many of their debtors to fail to pay promptly. The action was a surprise to the friends of the company and it is sincerely hoped that a settlement can be made on a basis that will enable the firm to resume business at an early date.

A schedule of assets and liabilities has not yet been filed, but it is known that the assets far exceed the liabilities and it is hoped the present financial embarrassment of the firm will only be temporary.

The Geeslin company has been engaged in business here for a long time and was universally recognized as one of the strongest firms in this part of the state. This company has done much to make Goldthwaite one of the best cotton markets in the south and has extended accommodations to hundreds of people throughout this section and its permanent retirement from business would be sincerely regretted by their customers as well as their competitors.

COTTON RECEIPTS

The receipts at the public yard up to yesterday afternoon were 5673, against 2791 on the same date last year. At the Farmers Union yard the receipts up to yesterday afternoon were 3540, against 3704 up to the same time last year.

WAR REVENUE TAXES

Collector of Internal Revenue, A. S. Walker calls attention to the requirements of the recently enacted Emergency Revenue Law, commonly called War Revenue Act.

Beginning with the month of November, special taxes are imposed on the following occupations: Dealers in tobacco, cigars, cigarettes, snuff, etc. (when annual sales exceed \$200) bankers, brokers of all kinds, commission merchants, theatre, proprietors, circus proprietors, and proprietors of bowling alleys, pool and billiard rooms. To avoid 50 per cent penalty, these taxes must be paid to the collector of Internal Revenue before the close of business on November 31. The first tax period is that from Nov. 1st, 1914 to June 30th 1915 and the tax to be paid at this time is 2.3 of the tax for a full year. The tax to be paid by dealers in tobacco, cigars, etc., is \$3.20 for the remaining eight months of the fiscal year.

All persons liable to the above special taxes should immediately write the collector at Austin for blank application, Form 11a, and after this form has been received it should be properly executed and forwarded to the collector by return mail, accompanied by Austin exchange or postal money order for the amount of the tax. If application blank is not received promptly, remittance to cover the tax should be mailed to reach the collector before the close of business on November 30. The 50 per cent penalty will apply to all remittances received after that date.

Banker's returns will be made in duplicate on Form 457. The tax should be remitted at the time of filing report, which must be rendered during November.

All perfumes, cosmetics, etc., and chewing gum sold at retail after November 30th must have the proper revenue stamp attached. A stamp tax is also imposed on notes, deeds, bonds, insurance policies (not including life insurance), powers of attorney, and other documents on and after December 1st.

Supplies of stamps to be attached to documents and articles may

be obtained from the collector at Austin or from the deputy collectors at El Paso and Dallas. Orders for documentary stamps should be made on Form 427, and on Form 427A for perfumery, cosmetics, chewing gum, etc.

A copy of the law giving schedule of documents and articles taxed will be furnished on request.

CONDITIONS IMPROVING

There is no denying the fact that the financial and business conditions of the country in general and Mills county in particular have been much improved in the last few weeks. The only real trouble that ever did exist was the scare among the people over imaginary difficulties, but this has now subsided to a considerable extent and everything is moving along smoothly and people are in good spirit, and hopeful of increased prosperity for the future.

The increase of the price of cotton has been of some benefit to the people of this section and the further fact that Goldthwaite merchants are giving immense values in all lines of merchandise has been no small factor in bringing about the improved conditions. Had cotton commanded a better price the immense reductions made on merchandise the people were compelled to buy would not likely have been made, hence the amount received for a bale of cotton at the present price will buy so much more merchandise than it would formerly, the cotton grower can not be badly damaged by the reduction in the cotton price, when the relative value of the goods he has to buy is considered.

Since 1875, when the first American silo was built by Dr. Manley Miles, this method of preserving forage for livestock has been generally adopted. Although the department of agriculture has frequently called attention to the danger of carbon dioxide gas accumulating in silos under certain conditions, no fatalities have been reported heretofore. On the morning of September 19 four workmen on the farm of the Athens (Ohio) State hospital, ascended the ladder on the outside of a silo to an open door about twelve feet from the top and jumped down one after another onto the silage, the top of which was about six feet below the door. About five minutes after two other workmen following them found them unconscious. Although a large force of workmen were immediately summoned and the bodies of the four men removed at once through a lower door, the physicians of the hos-

A MYSTERIOUS CASE

Prominent Citizen of San Angelo Drowned in River.

San Angelo, Texas, Nov. 18.—W.

A. Guthrie, vice president and manager of the San Angelo Water, Power and Light company, was found drowned in the Concho river a short distance from the city this afternoon at about 4 o'clock. His feet and his left hand were tied together with a rope, his right hand and arm being left free. He was discovered by a boy who had been out hunting on the river and the condition of the body indicated that it had been in the water but a comparatively short time when Sheriff Hawley Allen and others arrived at the place of the tragedy.

Mr. Guthrie had been seen by friends this morning, walking toward the power plant which is on the river some distance from where his death occurred. His death is a mystery.

There were no signs of a struggle about the banks of the river where the corpse was found, and no marks of violence upon the body. An inquest was held by J. A. Branch, justice of the peace, but his verdict has not yet been rendered.

Mr. Guthrie had lived in San Angelo for twenty-five or thirty years and was one of the most prominent business men of this city.

He has been manager of the Water Light and Power company for several years and prior to his connection with that company was associated with J. G. Murphy in the publication of the San Angelo Standard.

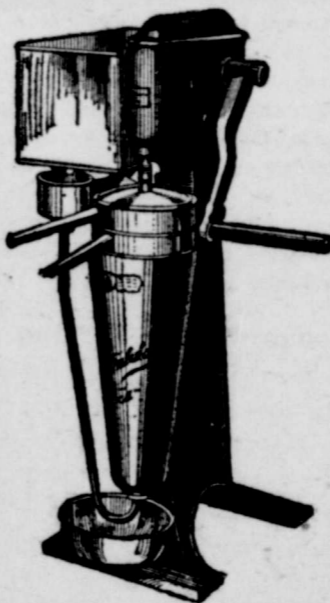

President Wilson and Governor Colquitt have both issued proclamations designating next Thursday, Nov. 26, as Thanksgiving day.

The Baptist state convention is in session in Abilene. It is said there are more than two thousand delegates and visitors in attendance upon the convention.

The Southern Pacific grain elevator was burned in Galveston Tuesday. It contained eight hundred thousand bushels of wheat and the loss is more than a million dollars.

The United States government will retain several millions of dollars collected as customs at Vera Cruz until a stable government is assured for that country, when the money will be delivered to the Mexican government.

President Mezes of the State University having resigned the dean of the faculty, Prof. Battle, has been made president of the institution temporarily. It is whispered in well informed circles that the regents expect to make Governor Colquitt president of the University at the expiration of his term as governor.

Governor Ferguson is believed to have in mind some important penitentiary reforms, among them a plan to make the penitentiary a place of punishment for criminals rather than a place to retain men for a time who are convicted of crime. Mr. Ferguson and incoming lieutenant governor, Mr. Hobby, have been making an inspection of the penitentiaries and penitentiary affairs this week.

The cotton crop in some of the western counties is larger than ever known before and farmers in some sections do not expect to be able to gather all of their crop. Some of the highland farms have produced a bale and a half to the acre and many of them report a bale to the acre. When the seasons are regular and rain comes in reasonable quantities there is no better farming country than the western part of Texas.

One hundred and thirty-one ships were added to the American merchant marine in October through transfers from foreign registry and construction of new vessels in the United States, according to an announcement made by the bureau of navigation. The thirty-one foreign vessels transferred to American registry aggregate 98,608 gross tons. Most of them were built in the British Isles.

In the next few years the Monroe Doctrine is likely to be challenged as it never has been before. If this government is to enforce the doctrine and to prevent the establishing of foreign military and naval bases in the New World, it must be prepared to do something more than say, "Oh, please don't do that." If it is so prepared it won't have to do anything more than say, "Please." If it isn't so prepared it must be ready to see the Monroe Doctrine flouted, and to get the retort, "What are you going to do about it?"—Kansas City Star.

This has been the week for peace proposition in Mexico and if the indications will continue until this statement is put in type it looks more like a final agreement between the warring factions in the blood-drenched republic than any previous effort. Gen. Carranza agrees to turn the governmental affairs over to Euillio Gutierrez, who was selected by the peace conference, provided Gen. Villa will join him in the movement for peace and agree for both of them to leave Mexico. Villa agreed with the convention to comply with the request and if they were not both Mexicans their statements could be accepted with a good deal more confidence than they are accepted. However, it may be that they will abandon the war for a time at least and give the country time to elect another president before heading another revolution.

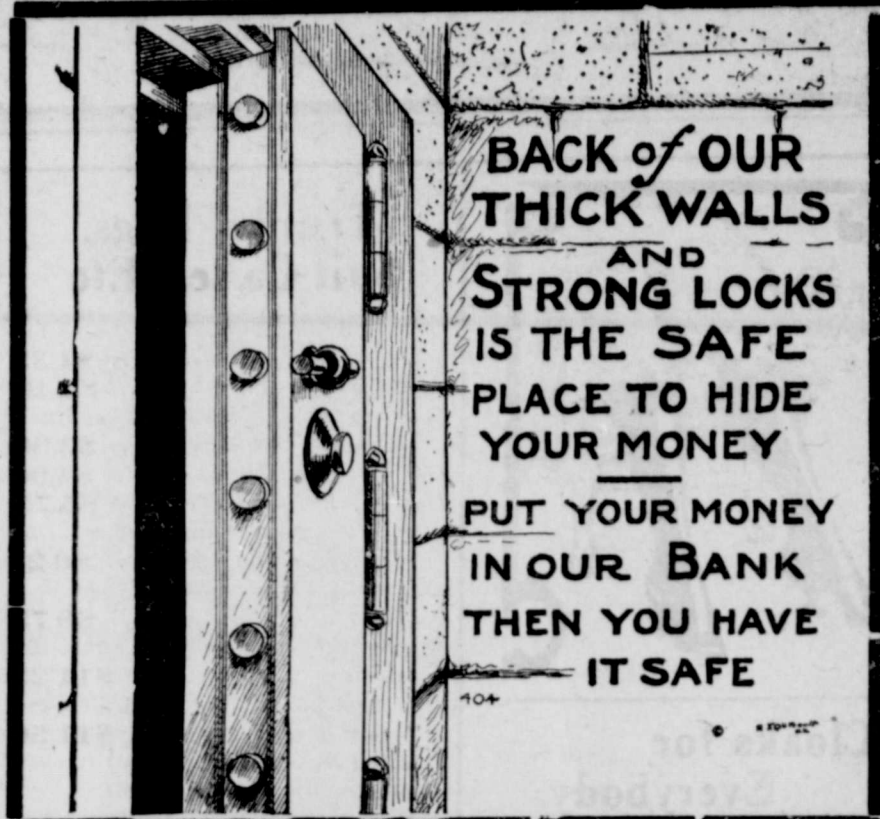

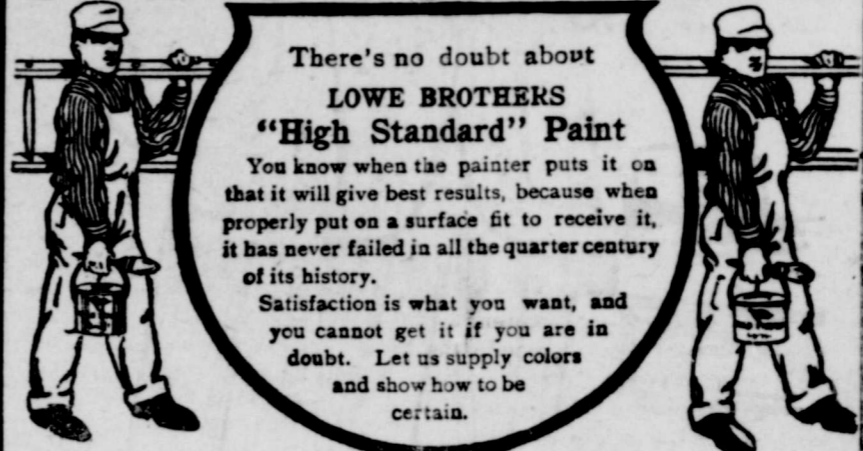

Some cynic has said that honesty is less of a virtue than a habit. Possibly there is a modicum of truth in that saying, but not so much as in the contrary asseveration that dishonesty is as much a habit as a vice. It is certainly true that a child habituated to dishonesty often becomes a dishonest man and stays dishonest even though he realizes that honesty would be more profitable. There is an element of sport or excitement in dishonesty that appeals to some temperaments, just as there is a placidity in honesty that appeals to other temperaments. The kind of life one wishes to live is perhaps the largest influence on the way he does live. If he chooses to live by his wits and find his associates among those who live similarly he could not be contented with living by his labor and finding companionship among those who live likewise. Nor could those who live by their labor be satisfied with living by their wits. The crook's idea is that everybody would be crooked if everybody were as smart as he, whereas the truth is that everybody isn't a crook because nearly everybody has too much sense to be one. Some of the smoothest of criminals are almost childishly simple in the matter of imagination. They imagine themselves so much superior to the police that police can't catch them, when the fact is that the police have so much more sense than the criminal that only an early death secures him immunity from temporal retribution. The price the criminal pays on the other shore for the crimes committed on this one is impossible to determine but it is at least plausible to suppose that somewhere some time every wrong is righted and every wrong doer penalized.—State Press in Dallas News.

This is consistent if local option is the supreme prohibition method. If local option is right make it sure enough effective.

Really the greatest and most frequent political knocking is done by those who are not willing to bear the burdens required to make the best conditions. In fact we were all born ignorant and some of us never strive to get above our youthful ignorance. No one has a right to be reproachful in his criticism, but it is the duty of every one to put forth a helpful hand in matters of public concern and to stand by institutions set for bettering mankind.
