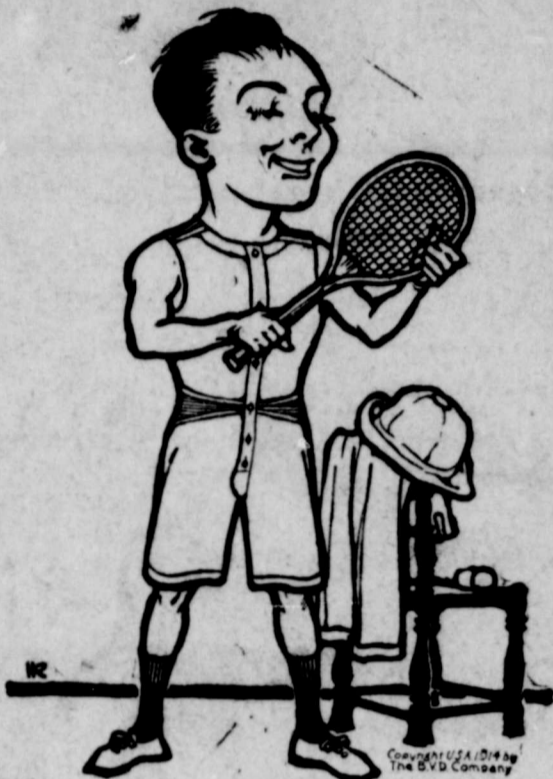
### COMANCHE

The Catholics of America constitute a large proportion of our most patriotic citizenship, and any publication that seeks to array religious prejudice against them to the extent that the Menace has by its inflammatory utterances has no legitimate place in American journalism.—Houston Post.

It is not likely any considerable amount of provisions or other supplies will be contributed by the people of this or any other country while the bloody wars continue all over that land. Governor Ferguson very properly refused a request a few days ago to call on the people of this state for help for the Mexicans, stating that such assistance in the way of provisions would certainly be appropriated by the buccaners and robbers in that country, and would serve to prolong the rebellion against any form of authority.

Prof. A. H. Daniel, superintendent of Mullin school and member of the county board of examiners, came over yesterday to assist with the examination of applicants for teachers certificates.

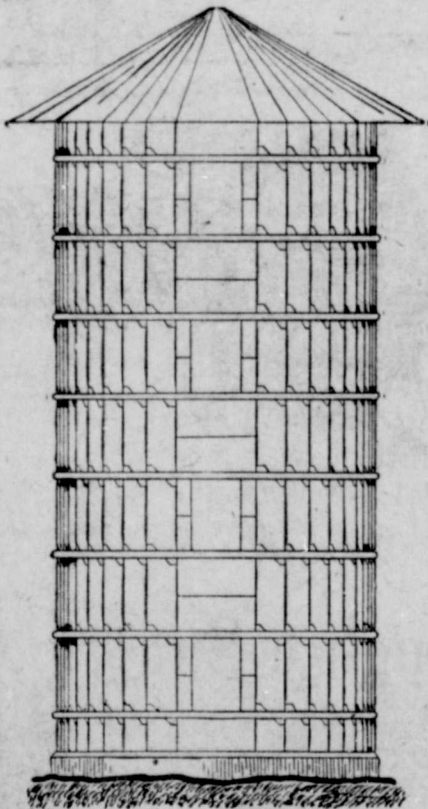

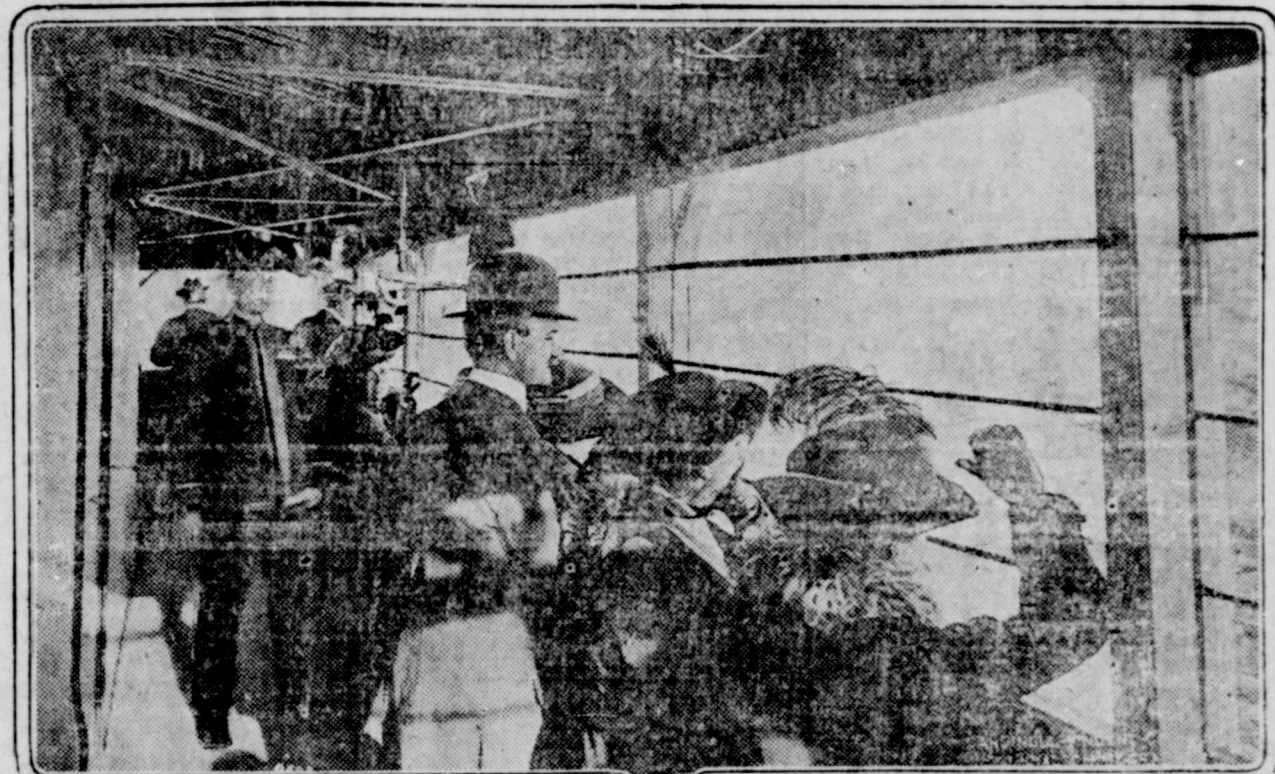

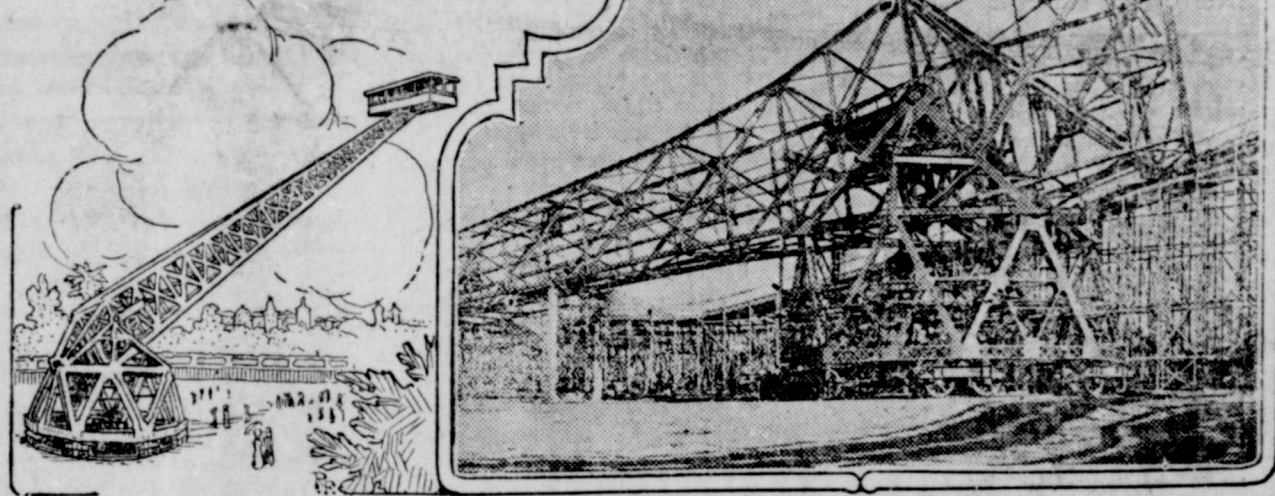

For the seeker of amusement there is opportunity a-plenty in the unique mechanical achievement, the Aeroscope, on "The Zone," at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition. The Aeroscope resembles a giant crane of a novel and intricate design, its steel construction recalling that of the Bascule bridge. At the extremity of the long arm of the crane is a two-story car with a seating capacity for 100 persons and standing room for 20 more. At the short end of the crane is a giant mass of concrete, which serves as a counter-balance for the long arm of the crane. Beneath the car are two great water tanks, which take on water or discharge it as passengers enter or leave the car, thus always preserving the balance to a nicety. When, for example, a man weighing 160 pounds enters the car an amount of water of equal weight is released from the tank, and when the passenger departs 160 pounds of water are automatically discharged into the tank below the car. The car ascends without perceptible motion, and perfect safety and a jarring ride of ten minutes is assured to passengers while enjoying this trip or 265 feet into the clouds, or four feet higher than the Ferris wheel. Two motors control the ascent and descent in conjunction with the counter-balance of the huge car, and when it reaches its extreme height it begins to swing slowly around on the wheels at its base, giving a magnificent view of the exposition, of San Francisco bay and of the city of San Francisco.

Reports say the cotton acreage will be short in almost every section and the planting was extremely late. We have plenty of time to make cotton if the weather conditions are favorable, but there is no assurance of a crop of great proportions.

President Hirsch of the Texas Bankers' association gives assurance that the bankers will give much assistance in making the warehouse system a success. He states that he will appoint a committee of bankers to organize companies to build warehouses.

The reply of Germany to the demand of President Wilson was decidedly disappointing to the president and his advisers and it is admitted on all sides that this country is in great danger of becoming involved in the European conflict. The countries that are at war are seeking every advantage possible and they need to do so and it is no small wonder that some of them are endeavoring to induce this country to "get in the game."

The pastor of the First Methodist church at Temple, Rev. Hubert Knickerbocker, commenced the work of raising \$45,000 last Sunday morning to clear the debt on his church. He opened the subscription list with a contribution of 1,000 silver dollars, which he poured from a sack onto the table before his congregation. Notwithstanding the service was in the church and the service was a solemn one the audience cheered mightily when the pastor produced the coin.

The announcement of Dr. S. P. Brooks, president of Baylor University of Waco, that he will be a candidate for the United States senate in next year's contest is made. With so many candidates in the race the chances of Senator Culberson for reelection are greatly increased. The senator is supposed to be in very bad health and is seldom in his seat in the senate except about election time every six years, when his health improves materially, but he has a great many supporters just the same and must be reckoned with by those who aspire to fill the position.

The Standard editor is frequently called upon to call public attention to some one's neglect of duty—and the Standard respectfully declines the honor. We are always glad to commend anyone for the faithful performance of their duty, or for especially noteworthy work, but fault-finding has no place in our columns. Too often a man has the best reasons in the world for his apparent neglectfulness or non-performance of supposed duties, and we would merely be laying ourselves open to criticism and censure by our action. Any time any citizen conceives it our duty to register public complaint, we will first delegate that citizen as a committee of one to personally interview the aggrieved party—and perhaps our aggrieved citizen will then decide he has not so much ground for complaint as he first thought.—Brady Standard.

In enumerating the reasons why the United States should be favored with a considerable measure of prosperity before the year is out, an important one has been reduced to tangible terms of dollars by those who deal in statistics. This is represented by the American money that will not be spent by tourists in Europe this summer. Careful and conservative estimates place the amount expended for first and second class steamship accommodations in each of the recent years at \$25,000,000, and these figures quite justify the further calculations that Americans have been in the habit of spending annually something like \$150,000,000 more in travel, luxurious living and purchases in Europe. As a direct result of the war this large amount is to be kept on this side of the Atlantic this year. Neither the democratic administration nor its opponents can claim credit for this important conservation of the country's wealth.—The Washington Herald.

## ONE OF THE BIG FARM LEAKS

When enumerating the various leaks in the shape of money paid out as expense on the farm, few if any give proper consideration to one of the big leaks—the useless damage to machinery and implements. And yet in many cases this is a very considerable item of expense, although one which is inexcusable on a farm where such machinery is necessary. It is a rather poor commentary on the sagacity, foresight and management of a farmer to sit with him in his home and look out across his field or garden and see a plow, cultivator, reaper, or even threshing machine standing out in the weather—hundreds, perhaps thousands of dollars worth of machinery being damaged materially for no other reason than that its owner simply left it right where he used it last; and this is no uncommon sight. No man would think of leaving any of his household goods out in the weather, and yet these farming implements and machines are just as susceptible to damage as household goods. In fact, unless it were particularly costly furniture it is likely that the damage would be greater. Speaking of this inexcusable carelessness, the Banker-Farmer, published in Champaign, Ill., says, "the lack of care given to farm machinery is conceded by every one to be a crying fault of the average farmer. One-fifth of the farm machinery of the country is annually junked." That paper goes on to remark that the average farmer discards his machinery when it is but half worn out by use, the other half of the wear and tear being caused by exposure to the weather. The Banker-Farmer further says: "A photographer set out to take some pictures of neglected farm machinery. He lived in a fertile section where farmers are well to do. Within the radius of a mile, rusting under the snows and rains, he found farm machinery that had cost \$2,250. Rust rhymes with bust. The old saying, 'It isn't the trust, it's the rust,' is still true. This carelessness helps to explain the small net income from many farms. Better credit facilities will not help the farmer if he persists in letting his machinery rust. When he houses it he is beginning to reduce interest charges as well as save the capital required to replace rusted-out machinery."

No better time nor investment can be made by any farmer than that put into shelters for his machinery and implements, as well as for his stock and poultry.—Dallas News.

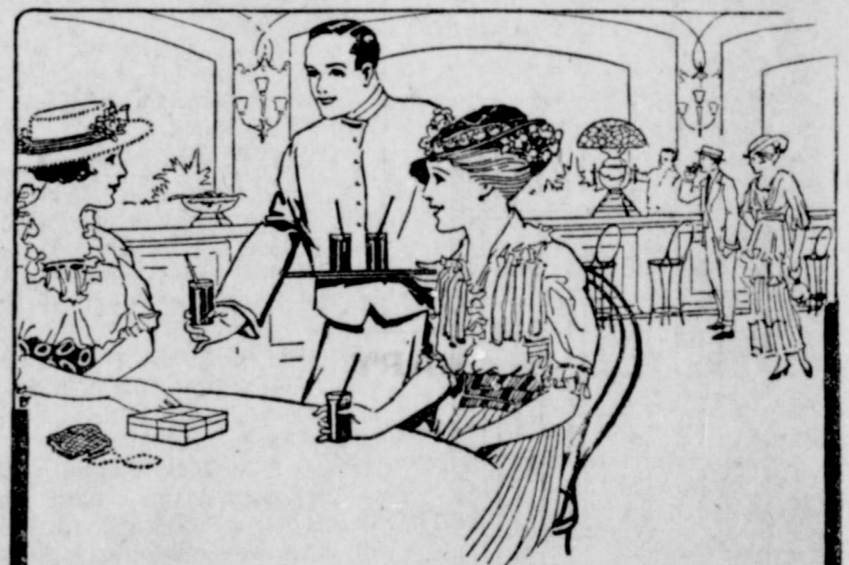
## THE TRENT STATE BANK

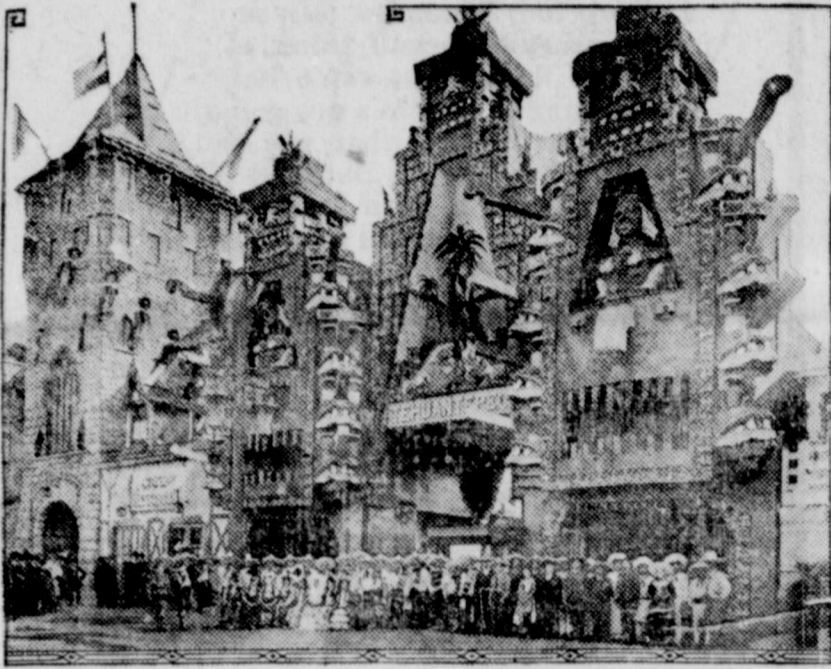

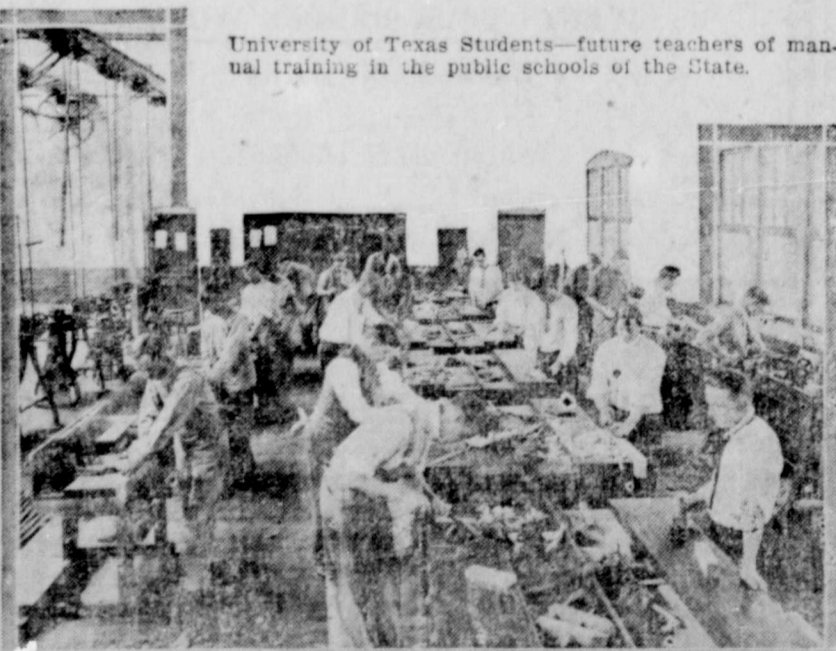
THE CHEAPEST EATING-HOUSE IN TEXAS



Here's a line of boys who are working their way through the University of Texas, by cleaning up tables and serving in the University Cafeteria. Manager Venzey, at the extreme left, is not a student.

Nearly sixty per cent of the student body of this great educational institution is either in whole or in part self-supporting, thus emphasizing the dependence of the poor student upon state-supported institutions of higher education. Meals here average but twelve cents each, and many students get their board here on the University campus for \$8.00 per month, the average is about \$11.00 per month. Rooms in University Hall nearby are obtained at from \$1.50 to \$3.00 per month, although there are not sufficient rooms to supply the demand at these prices. Not a cent is made by the management of the cafeteria—when it is discovered that a surplus is accumulating, the price of food is cut down. Here is actually board at cost. Besides furnishing cheap meals to over four hundred students per day, a half a dozen or more students are enabled to earn their board cleaning up tables, and otherwise serving the management.

MANUAL TRAINING AT STATE UNIVERSITY



University of Texas Students—future teachers of manual training in the public schools of the State.

The great handicap which bars progress in vocational education in Texas today is lack of properly trained teachers. The University of Texas is doing a great work in turning out hundreds of highly trained teachers each year who take their life positions in the public schools.

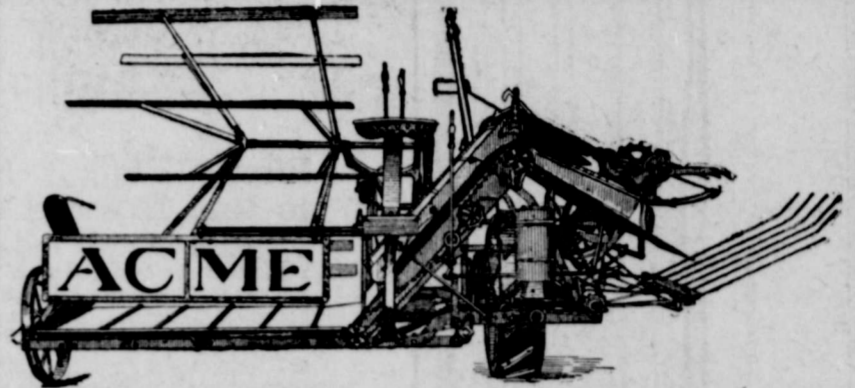

**PUBLIC SCHOOL LOCALS**

The school board is pleased to announce a letter from Thos. E. Fletcher, University visitor of schools, stating that the Goldthwaite High school has been granted 12 1/2 units of affiliation with the University. This permits our graduates to enter any school in Texas without examination.

Mr. J. T. Reid of Howard Payne college has been employed to teach in the school next year. Mr. Reid is a graduate of H. P. C. and has been teaching in the academy this year.

The summer school will open Monday, June 7. This is intended for pupils from the first to seventh grade inclusive, who have failed in not more than two subjects to have an opportunity to make up their grade. The sessions will be held in the high school building from 8:00 a. m. to 12:30 p. m. A tuition of \$3.00 for the six weeks will be charged.

The scholastic census is about completed. The initial count shows a net enrollment of 358. This is a gain of twelve over last year.

The superintendent's annual report shows a net enrollment of 420 for the term just closed. It will be noted that this is 74 more than the scholastic population of last year or 118 per cent of the scholastic enrollment. The enrollment for the state runs from 65 per cent of the scholastic population.

An examination is being held for teachers. A large number of applicants are taking the examinations.
