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MAKING GOOD

In the interscholastic meet of Runnels county, held at Winters a few days ago three former Goldthwaite boys took a prominent part and all reflected credit upon their early training and proved themselves to be of good ability.

The Winters Enterprise in reporting the meet says:

At the close of the declamation the debate was held. The subject discussed was, 'Resolved, That a Constitutional Tax of 1 Mill on each dollar's Valuation Shall Be Levied for the Support of Higher Institutions of Learning in Texas, and subsequent Appropriations by the Legislature for this Purpose Shall be Done Away With.' The affirmative side of the debate was taken by Russell Lacy and Ulmer Byrd of Mazeland, and the negative by Finch McCasland and Cleve Quinn of Winters. The Winters boys were awarded the decision.

The athletic events were held Saturday afternoon. Principal A. M. Street was in charge of these, and he proved himself a master in this work by the excellent and systematic way in which the contests were carried out.

William Skaggs was also awarded a prize in one of the athletic contests.

Goldthwaite is proud of the good record the boys have made and will expect them to continue to advance.

GOOD ROAD WORK

The Eagle editor visited the place where Commissioner Griffin was having some excellent road work done on the bridge road in Big Valley the first of the week and was delighted with the improvements being made. The sand bed at the Brooks farm was being clayed over and transformed into one of the best parts of the road. This sand bed has been a terror to travelers ever since the road was opened and Commissioner Griffin and the Commercial club are certainly entitled to the gratitude of everybody for the good and much needed work.

COMMERCIAL CLUB

Street Fair Planned—Good Road Work—Other Matters.

The Commercial club met Tuesday night in regular semi-monthly session and there was a good attendance.

The road committee reported progress on the "Brooks sand bed" in Big Valley. Commissioner Griffin had a force of men and teams at work on the road and was making good progress. Work on the Browns Creek crossing had been delayed in order that the committee might hear from one of the land owners relative to changing the road at the crossing.

The fair committee reported the sentiment of the business men and citizens generally to be against attempting to have a fair in connection with the reunion, but favorable to a street fair at a later date. The board of directors was given charge of the street fair proposition with instructions to proceed with the formulation of plans as rapidly as possible.

J. C. Street was appointed to ascertain the plan on which a Carnegie library would be installed in the city.

The invitation of Commissioner Schwartz of Hamilton county to attend a picnic and good roads meeting near Star Friday was accepted with thanks and all members who could attend the gathering were requested to do so.

Capt. I. T. Moorland was present from Pleasant Grove and addressed the club on the condition of the Pleasant Grove road and gave assurance of the hearty co-operation of the people of his community in the good roads movement.

Messrs. C. L. Stephens and T. T. Nickols, representing the letter carriers association of McCullough, Lampasas, San Saba and Mills counties extended an invitation to the Club and the citizens generally to attend the semi-annual meeting of their association on May 30, at the Lunsford bridge on the Colorado river.

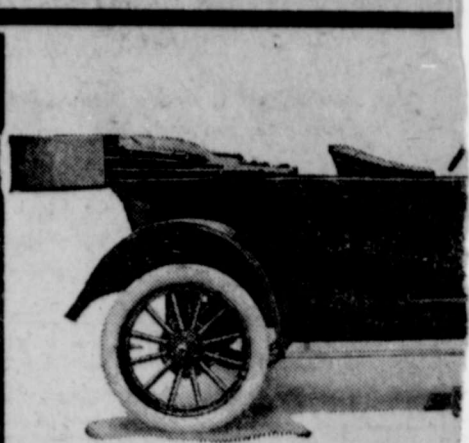

FOR BETTER TRADE RELATIONS

In his visit to the various South-American republics Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo and party are meeting representative business men of those countries and learning how we may cultivate closer trade relations. Since the European war trade has been greatly interrupted between points in Europe and South America. It is now believed that trade can be increased between this country and South America if we as a people will do our part in meeting the conditions necessary.

One important consideration is merchant ships. With most of the transportation facilities closed on account of war we as a nation should not be slow in giving the proper encouragement to American-owned vessels to advance our own trade. The ship purchase bill is pending in congress and should be passed without unnecessary delay.

The Southwest is interested in closer trade relations with Latin America. Farmers need their markets. Since cotton is not to require so much of our attention we will have more time for other crops, some of which need new markets. The manufactured products from the farm and factory need new outlets, and if there are markets in the republics south of us we want them.—Exchange.

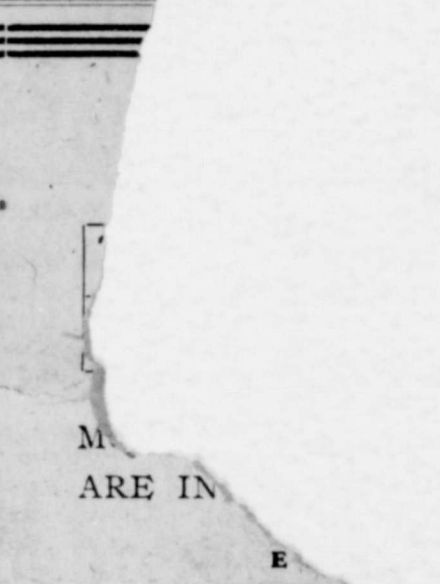

President Wilson has forwarded to the German government a demand which amounts to an ultimatum demanding that the submarine policy of that government be at once changed and that assurance be given such change. It is generally expected that the German government will not accede to the demand and the event of a refusal the President announces that diplomatic relations will be at once severed. This act will not itself be a declaration of war but is likely to be followed by such a declaration in a very short time. An answer to the President's note is expected by the early part of the coming week.

The Roosevelt-Barnes libel suit in New York is attracting much attention from the press and public at this time.

Administration officials in Washington say the income tax will bring into the public treasury considerably more than \$80,000,000 for the fiscal year.

Now comes "Uncle Pete" Radford and says the farmers and gin men want the permanent warehouse law to remain as it is and want to give it a thorough trial. He claims to know what he is talking about and to be in touch with those whom he names.

Patrons of the moving picture shows learned with regret of the death of John Bunny the "funny" man who has caused many hours of pleasure for them. He died of Bright's disease at his home in Brooklyn, N. Y., the early part of this week.

At a conference of bishops and other representatives of the Methodist Episcopal church in Chicago this week plans were inaugurated for securing a ten million dollar endowment fund to provide pensions for aged Methodist preachers or their widows and orphans.

The Texas legislature was convened in extra session Thursday to pass an appropriation bill and amend the Robertson insurance law. Governor Ferguson may bring other matters to the attention of the solons before an adjournment is had, but so far no other subjects are being considered.

Some more of the fruit of importing negro labor has matured in Runnels county. A young lady school teacher was assaulted by a negro in the Valley creek community Monday night. Her screams frightened the negro away and hundreds of men at once commenced a search for the brute.

Reports from the European war are so conflicting that it is very evident that none of the writers or reporters know much if anything of the real conditions and the progress of the armies. From each of the countries involved come reports of great progress and victories each day.

A man for whose murder another citizen of Taylor county had been indicted made his appearance at his home in Abilene this week. A badly mutilated body had been found in a creek near his home and a neighbor with whom he had quarreled was accused of having murdered him and now there is a mystery concerning the body discovered.

The cotton market reached ten cents middling basis at most of the interior points during the past week. Most of the cotton has already passed from the possession of the growers and there was not much benefit derived by them from the increased price, but it is feared that the cotton acreage throughout the country will be largely increased as a result of the improved market quotations.

Home industry and Texas for Texas clubs are being organized in many of the towns and villages in this state. The idea is a good one and the more local pride engendered and the more determination there is to patronize local dealers and local people in preference to foreigners the greater will be the prosperity of the people.

Floods did great damage in many places last Friday, Saturday and Sunday. The greatest loss of life was at Austin, where the number of drowned probably reached forty, while only seventeen bodies were recovered. In a number of counties there was great loss in the way of crops destroyed, bridges and culverts washed away and roads and farms injured. South and Central Texas suffered most altho no section of the state was exempt from the damages of the floods.

A TRIBUTE TO MOTHERS

Editor Eagle

As I write these lines my mind goes back to childhood days of long ago, where I spent some of the happiest days of my life with father and mother. My mother was born near Atlanta, Ga., where she was reared and educated until she was eighteen years of age, when my grand parents moved with her to Carroll county, Mississippi, where she was married to my father, E. B. Harper, in November, 1847, where they resided for about six years, moving to Texas in 1853, when I was about four years old, and settled on the San Marcos river, Caldwell county, 50 miles from Austin. On account of drouth and disastrous inroads of grasshoppers they were forced to leave there and moved to east Texas and settled on the Trinity river 30 miles north from Huntsville, where we lived until the outbreak of the civil war. There we suffered many inconveniences and hardships caused by the war. Myself and sister Fannie who now resides at Brownwood, were all that were old enough to be of any assistance to mother in the way of making a living, for father's time was about all taken during the four years of war. It was there that I, though a boy, learned to make the home-spun dress which has ever since been a relic to every lover of our dear old South land. My father did not go into service at the front in battle, but was assessor and collector at home, where he found many opportunities of assisting helpless women and children whose husbands and fathers were at the front, and from whom he received many tokens of appreciation for the little assistance it had been his privilege to render them.

As those days come fresh in my memory, I am made to think of my mother and the cheerful patience with which she bore the unavoidable cares and struggles that fell to her. There were but few schools for us children, but around mother's knee we learned to read, and the help she gave us then and the impressions made by her have lingered all these years and will ever be sweet and precious in my memory.

My father and mother never gathered very much of this world's goods, neither did a mother's dreams come true with all of her boys, but it does my heart good to feel that the seeds she has sown have not been fruitless. Let me say a word to parents just here. Believe in your child. Trust him. Teach him the better way and give him to understand that you are depending on him. These principles with faith and an unselfish love and confidence will save the boy. I believe in my heart and write it down here now as a deep conviction of my soul that the pure and unselfish love of a good, wise and affectionate mother is a safe and sufficient guide for the raising of a boy or a girl.

If you will again pardon personal reference to myself, I must say that I loved my mother dearly and how I wish that I could once more feel her tender arms about my neck and I could kiss her sweet face as I used to do, but she has gone. Her and father sleep side by side at Dresden, Texas, and their spirits have gone to be with their Lord.

I was raised on a farm and love a farm life. I look with profound sorrow upon the breaking up of a country home, because it is the foundation of this government and the landmark of our safety. I love the country mother—we believe she is the heroine of our modern civilization. I would not take a flower from the noble women of our cities, but simply speak of the country mothers because I know them best. Shall I say just here that the hand of a country mother has rocked the cradle of the greatest heroes and noblest leaders the world has ever known.

I hope that I will not be misunderstood as I have tried to place a woman where she ought to be, for I have no patience with the theory that a woman should go to the ballot box or dabble in politics, for I believe her station in the home is too sacred to be hindered by political aspirations in the sense that many writers and would-be leaders are trying to place her. House Joint Resolution No. 1.

A joint resolution proposing an amendment to Section 2, of Article 6, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a provision authorizing a qualified voter to vote for State Officers, or on any proposition submitted to the voters of this State in a precinct other than the precinct of his residence under certain conditions, and making an appropriation therefor.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 2, of Article 6, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Sec. 2. Every male person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years, and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and who shall have resided in this State one year next preceding an election, and the last six months within the district or county in which he offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector, and every male person of foreign birth, subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have become a citizen of the United States in accordance with the Federal naturalization laws, and shall have resided in this State one year next preceding such election and the last six months in the county in which he offers to vote, shall also be deemed a qualified elector; and all electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residence; provided, that electors living in any unorganized county may vote at any election precinct in the county to which such county is attached for judicial purposes; and providing further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before he offers to vote at any election in this State, and holds a receipt showing his poll tax paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or, if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. If any qualified voter in this state shall have personally paid his poll tax in the county and precinct of his residence, or secured an exemption certificate showing that he is exempt from paying a poll tax, he shall be permitted to vote in the county in which he may be on election day on any proposition, which may have been submitted to the voters of the entire State, and for any office to be filled by the voters of the entire State; also for members of either branch of the Legislature and Congress and judicial officials; provided, no voter shall vote for members of either branch of the Legislature, Congress, or judicial officials outside of the legislature, congressional or judicial district of such voter's residence, and nothing here in shall permit a voter to vote at any place other than his residence, if he be within the county of his residence on election day. Any person offering to vote in any county other than the county of his residence shall deliver to the election managers his poll tax receipt or exemption certificate, who shall retain same until the following day and then mail same to the person depositing same to any address he may name; and in addition to depositing the poll tax receipt or exemption certificate, such person so offering to vote shall make an affidavit:

(1) That he is absent from home, and it will be impossible for him to return to the precinct of his residence in time to vote; (2) that he has not voted at any other election precinct on that day, and will not offer to vote at any other precinct in this State; (3) that he personally paid his poll tax within the time provided by law, or personally secured the certificate of his exemption from the payment of a poll tax.

Sec. 3. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the fourth Saturday in July, 1915, the same being the twenty-fourth day of July, 1915, and the Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election,

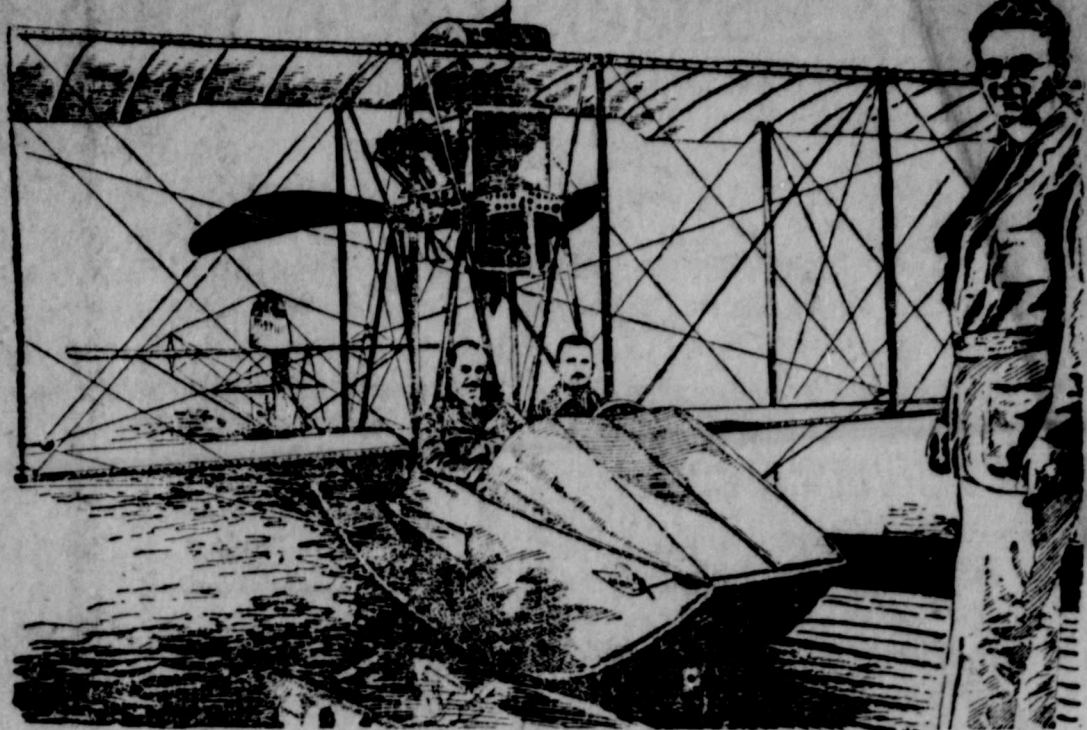
and to have same published, as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. Those favoring the amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "For amendment to Section 2, of Article 6, of the Constitution, authorizing qualified voters to vote in precincts other than the precinct of their residence under certain conditions." Those opposing the amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against amendment to Section 2, of Article 6, of the Constitution, authorizing qualified voters to vote in precincts other than the precinct of their residence under certain conditions."

Sec. 4. No legislation shall be necessary to put into effect this article of the Constitution, but when adopted same shall be self-enacting.

Sec. 5. The sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to defray the expenses of such proclamation, publication and election.

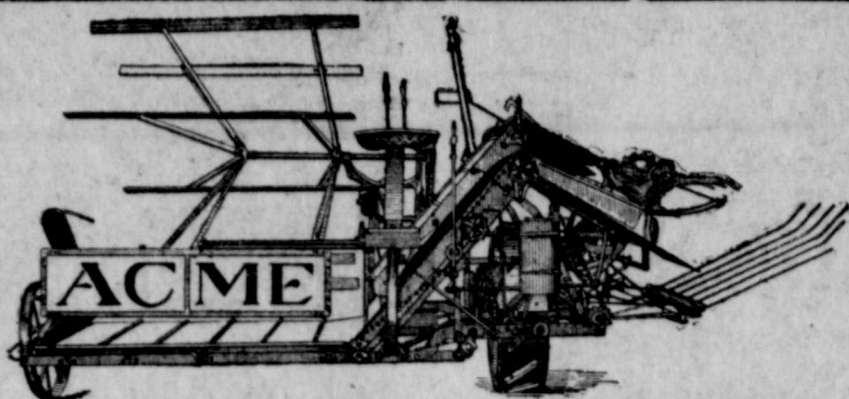

House Joint Resolution No. 9.

A joint resolution to amend Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto Section 3b, authorizing the Legislature to provide by law for the creation of a student's loan fund in each county in connection with the public schools thereof.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as section 3b, which shall read and be as follows, to-wit:

Sec. 3b. The Commissioners' Court of each county in this State shall have the power, and is hereby authorized, when a majority of the qualified voters of such county shall vote to create such fund, to create a fund to be known as a "Students' Loan Fund," for the purpose of enabling students of the public free schools of said county to borrow money to be used in their education for the purpose of graduating from the county public schools and after graduation to continue their education in any higher State institution of learning, such fund to be created and administered by the Commissioners' Court of each county as may be provided by law.

Sec. 2. And the Legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within such county for the purpose of raising said students' loan fund, said tax not to exceed in any one year twenty cents (20c) on the one hundred dollars (\$100.00) valuation of the property subject to taxation in each county; provided, that a majority of the qualified tax paying voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax. Provided, that if the tax is adopted, after it has been enforced for two years, an election may be held, on the order of the commissioners' court to determine whether or not said tax shall be repealed; and provided, further, that it shall be the duty of the Commissioners' Court to order such election upon a petition so to do by twenty-five per cent of the qualified tax paying voters of the county.

Sec. 3. The Legislature shall pass the necessary laws carrying into effect this provision of the Constitution.

Sec. 4. That the above and foregoing proposed amendment shall be duly published once a week for four weeks, commencing at least three (3) months before a special election to be held for the purpose of voting upon such proposed amendment, on the fourth Saturday in July, 1915, in one weekly newspaper of each county in the State of Texas, in which

such newspaper may be published. And the Governor shall, and he is hereby directed, to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this proposed amendment to the qualified electors for members of the Legislature. At such election all persons favoring such amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words "For the amendment to Section 3 of Article 7 of the Constitution, adding thereto Section 3b, authorizing the Commissioners' Court to create a Students' Loan Fund," and those opposed thereto shall have written or printed on their ballots the words, "Against the Amendment to Section 3 of Article 7 of the Constitution, adding thereto Section 3b, authorizing the Commissioners' Court to create a Students' Loan Fund."

Senate Joint Resolution No. 3

A proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Article 5, Section 2 of the Constitution of said State, so as to provide that the Supreme Court of this State shall consist of a Chief Justice and four Associate Justices, describe their qualifications, tenure of office and compensation.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 2, of Article 5, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 3. The Supreme Court shall consist of Chief Justice and four Associate Justices, any three of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of three judges shall be necessary to the decision of a case. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be at the time of his election a citizen of the United States,

and of this State, and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty years and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a Judge of a Court, or such lawyer and judge together, at least seven years. Said Chief Justice and Associate Justices shall be elected by the qualified voters of the State at a general election, shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified and shall each receive an annual salary of five thousand dollars until otherwise provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for said officers; and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the State. The Judges of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their term of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

Immediately after the adoption of this amendment the Governor of this State shall call an election for the purpose of electing two Associate Justices of the Supreme Court, one of whom shall, when elected, hold said office for four years and one of whom, when elected, shall hold said office for six years, and the question of which of them shall hold for four years and which of them hold for six years shall be determined by lot, as now provided by law.

Sec. 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation, ordering an election to determine whether or not said Constitution amendments will be adopted, and have the same published, as required by the Constitution and the laws of this State. Said election shall be held on the fourth Saturday in July, 1915, and the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00), or so much thereof as necessary, is hereby appropriated from any fund in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of printing said proclamation and of holding said election.

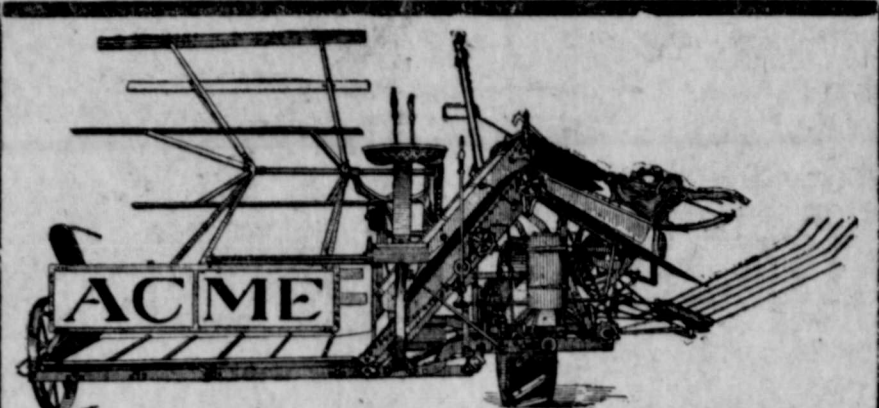

House Joint Resolution No. 9.

A joint resolution to amend Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto Section 3b, authorizing the Legislature to provide by law for the creation of a student's loan fund in each county in connection with the public schools thereof.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as section 3b, which shall read and be as follows, to-wit:

Sec. 3b. The Commissioners' Court of each county in this State shall have the power, and is hereby authorized, when a majority of the qualified voters of such county shall vote to create such fund, to create a fund to be known as a "Students' Loan Fund," for the purpose of enabling students of the public free schools of said county to borrow money to be used in their education for the purpose of graduating from the county public schools and after graduation to continue their education in any higher State institution of learning, such fund to be created and administered by the Commissioners' Court of each county as may be provided by law.

Sec. 2. And the Legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within such county for the purpose of raising said students' loan fund, said tax not to exceed in any one year twenty cents (20c) on the one hundred dollars (\$100.00) valuation of the property subject to taxation in each county; provided, that a majority of the qualified tax paying voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax. Provided, that if the tax is adopted, after it has been enforced for two years, an election may be held, on the order of the commissioners' court to determine whether or not said tax shall be repealed; and provided, further, that it shall be the duty of the Commissioners' Court to order such election upon a petition so to do by twenty-five per cent of the qualified tax paying voters of the county.

Sec. 3. The Legislature shall pass the necessary laws carrying into effect this provision of the Constitution.

Sec. 4. That the above and foregoing proposed amendment shall be duly published once a week for four weeks, commencing at least three (3) months before a special election to be held for the purpose of voting upon such proposed amendment, on the fourth Saturday in July, 1915, in one weekly newspaper of each county in the State of Texas, in which

such newspaper may be published. And the Governor shall, and he is hereby directed, to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this proposed amendment to the qualified electors for members of the Legislature. At such election all persons favoring such amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words "For the amendment to Section 3 of Article 7 of the Constitution, adding thereto Section 3b, authorizing the Commissioners' Court to create a Students' Loan Fund," and those opposed thereto shall have written or printed on their ballots the words, "Against the Amendment to Section 3 of Article 7 of the Constitution, adding thereto Section 3b, authorizing the Commissioners' Court to create a Students' Loan Fund."

Sec. 5. That \$5,000.00, or as much thereof as may be necessary be and the same is hereby appropriated out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of advertising and holding the election provided for above.

Senate Joint Resolution No. 18

A Joint Resolution proposing and sub-
mitting to a vote of the people of
Texas an amendment to Section 52
of Article 3 of the Constitution,
authorizing the issuance of bonds
for public improvements, and levy-
ing of a tax to pay the interest
and sinking fund on same, and for
maintenance.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of
the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 52, of
Article 3, of the Constitution of the
State of Texas be amended so as
hereafter to read as follows, to-wit:

Section 52. The Legislature shall
have no power to authorize any coun-
ty, city, town or other political cor-
poration or subdivision of the State,
to lend its credit or to grant public
money or thing of value in aid of, or
to, any individual, association or cor-
poration whatsoever, or to become
a stockholder in such corporation, as-
sociation or company, provided, how-
ever, that under legislative provision
any county, any political subdivision
of a county, or any defined district
now or hereafter to be described
and defined within the State of Texas
and which may or may not include
towns, villages, or municipal corpora-
tions, upon a vote of two-thirds ma-
jority of the resident property tax
payers voting thereon who are qual-
ified electors of such district or terri-
tory to be affected thereby, in addi-
tion to all other debts may issue
bonds or otherwise lend its credit
in any amount not to exceed one-
fourth of the assessed valuation of
the real property of such district or
territory; except that the total bond-
ed indebtedness of any city or town
shall never exceed the limits impos-
ed by other provisions of this consti-
tution; and levy and collect such
taxes to pay the interest thereon and
provide a sinking fund for the redem-
ption thereof as the Legislature
may authorize, and in such manner
as it may authorize the same, for
the following purposes, to-wit:

(a) The improvement of rivers,
creeks and streams to prevent over-
flows, and to permit of navigation
thereof, or irrigation therefrom, or in
aid of such purposes.

(b) The construction and mainte-
nance of pools, lakes, reservoirs, dams,
canals and waterways for the pur-
poses of irrigation, drainage or nav-
igation, or in aid thereof.

(c) The construction, maintenance
and operation of macadamized, grav-
eled or paved roads and turnpikes,
or in aid thereof.

Provided, however, that under leg-
islative enactment any defined district
now or hereafter to be described and
defined within the State of Texas,
which may be formed for the purpose
of reclaiming and improving over-
flowed and swamp lands in this State
and maintaining the improvements
thereof, may, upon vote of two-
thirds majority of the resident prop-
erty tax payers voting thereon who
are qualified electors of such district
or territory, in addition to all other
debts, issue bonds or otherwise lend
its credit in any amount not to ex-
ceed fifty per cent of the assessed
valuation of the real property in such
district or territory.

Provided, further, that where a
county, district or other political
subdivision has issued bonds for im-
provements for the purposes named
in this Section, the Legislature may
authorize the levy and collection of
taxes for the maintenance of such
improvements, not to exceed fifty
cents on the hundred dollars valua-
tion in any one year.

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment
of Section 52 of Article 3, of the
Constitution of Texas, shall be sub-
mitted to the qualified electors of this
State for its adoption or rejection,
at a special election hereby ordered
for the Fourth Saturday in July, A.
D. 1915, the same being the 24th day
of said month. All voters on this
proposed amendment at said election
who favor its adoption shall have
printed or written on their ballots the
following: "For amendment of Sec-
tion 52 of Article 3, of the Constitu-
tion, authorizing the issuance of bonds
for levee, drainage, road and other
public improvements, and for taxes
thereof," those voting against its
adoption shall have printed or writ-
ten on their ballots the following:
"Against the amendment of Section
52 of Article 3 of the Constitution,
authorizing the issuance of bonds for
levee, drainage, road and other im-
provements, and for taxes therefor."

FROM LAMESA, DAWSON COUNTY TEXAS

Dear Editor and Mills County People: Will give you all a few dots from this part of the state. I landed in Lamesa on Feb. 1st and my wife came three weeks later. We are both well pleased. This is a fine country. Lamesa is the county seat of Dawson county, has a population of about six or seven hundred and is rapidly growing. Since I came out here there have been eight new residences and one garage built and several more contemplate building in the near future. It looks as though it will not be but a few years until Lamesa will be a city.

There is a great deal of freighting from this place to Seminole in Gaines county which is about 45 miles west of Lamesa, also to Lavington and Knowles, N. M., which are about 100 miles west of this place.

We have had plenty of rain, in fact so much that the farmers haven't gotten to do much farming, but are beginning to get busy, while some still have cotton in the field. We have two gins here—one is still running.

I will give you people in Mills county an idea of what Dawson county is: Up to April 12 the Lamesa Gin Co. had received 2160 bales of cotton, the Dawson county gin had ginned 3500 bales, besides at least 100 bales were shipped out in bolls. This does not include the gins at Lon and Odonnell, just across the line in Lynn county. They receive a great deal of Dawson county's cotton. Dawson county's 1914 cotton crop has already passed the 6,000 bales mark.

Since Sept. 15, 1914, there have been 1135 cars of stuff shipped out from here, such as corn, cotton seed, maize, cane seed and stock. At least 100 cars of this amount was corn. Dawson county only has a population of about 3500 and not over 300 actual farmers in the county. Feed shipments still continue. Since April 12 there have been 70 car loads of cattle shipped out that I know of.

Up to April 12 our public weigher had weighed 5737 bales of cotton and 7000 loads of feed and cotton seed. Our annual rainfall is 20 inches.

Dear Editor, we receive the Eagle every week and could hardly do without it. We enjoy reading it very much. I meet with Mills county people most every day. There are a good many of them here.

House Joint Resolution No. 4.

A joint resolution of the Legislature of the State of Texas proposing and submitting to a vote of the people of Texas an amendment to section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution, authorizing the levy and collection of a special road tax not to exceed fifty cents on the one hundred dollars of valuation of property in any county, subdivision or subdivisions, or defined district thereof, when same has been authorized by a majority of the qualified electors voting at an election held for that purpose, and making an appropriation for carrying out the provisions of this resolution.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows, to-wit:

Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools shall never exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy more than twenty-five cents for city or county purposes, and not exceeding fifteen cents for roads and bridges, and not exceeding fifteen cents to pay jurors, on the one hundred dollar valuation, except for the payment of debts incurred prior to the adoption of the amendment, September 25, 1883, and for the erection of public buildings, streets, sewers, water works and other permanent improvements, not to exceed one dollar on the one hundred dollars valuation in any one year, and except as is in this Constitution otherwise provided; and the Legislature may also authorize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further building and maintenance of the public roads; provided, that a majority of the qualified property tax paying voters of the county or of any political subdivision or subdivisions of the county, or of any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within any county, who has been assessed a property tax and paid said tax for the next year prior to the time he offers to vote, voting at an election held for that purpose, shall vote such tax, not to exceed fifty cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of property subject to taxation in such county, political subdivision or subdivisions, or described or defined district. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws.

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution of Texas shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this state for adoption or rejection at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in the month of July, 1915. All voters on this proposed amendment at said election who favor its adoption shall have printed or written on their ballots the following: "For amendment to Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution, authorizing the levy and collection of a special road tax not to exceed fifty cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of property in any county, subdivision or subdivisions, or defined district thereof, when same has been authorized by a majority of the qualified electors at an election held for that purpose." Those voting against its adoption shall have written or printed on their ballots the following: "Against the amendment to Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution, authorizing the levy and collection of a special road tax not to exceed fifty cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of property in any county, subdivision or subdivisions, or defined district thereof, when same has been authorized by a majority of the qualified electors at an election held for that purpose."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue his necessary proclamation ordering this election, and have same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The sum of five thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury not otherwise ap-

propriated to defray the expenses of publishing and proclamation and printing of tickets and necessary blanks to use in said election.

SCALP BOUNTY

In regard to the New Bounty Law, now in force in Mills county Texas:

The bounty law now in force provides for the payment of a bounty of \$2.00 on each wolf, \$1.00 on each wild cat, and 5 cents on each jack rabbit, killed in Mills county. The scalp must include both ears of such animal and be presented to the Commissioners' Court by the person or persons, having killed said animal in person, who will be required to make an affidavit stating when and where he killed such animal or animals, the kind, and that affiant himself killed said animal. A single affidavit may be made for a number of animals of the same or different kinds. The Commissioners' Court will only receive such scalps at the regular terms which convene on the second Monday in February, May, August and November, of each year. W. B. 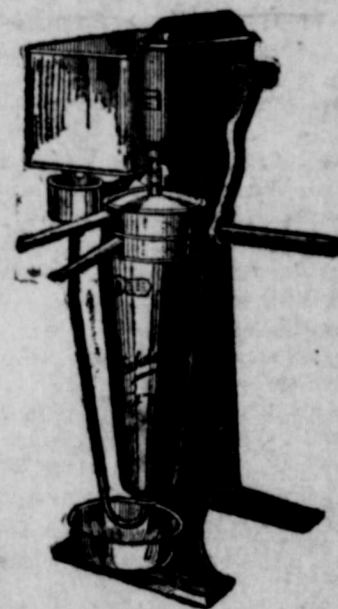
