The following letter was received by Miss Earline Nickols from her cousin.

Hoffman Island N. Y.
Feb. 13, 1919

My Dear Earline:

I received your letter a few days ago dated December 18, 1918, but that is a long time back but I didn't expect to get that for I haven't written in so long, and then I've been travelling around so much. I was transferred off the ship (Lake Pleasant) at Queenstown, Ireland, from there to Brest, France, then to South Wales then to South Hampton, S. W. then back to the good old U. S. A., where I am now. I have been to Paris, France, and London, England, but there are none like the U. S. A.

Well, I won't tell you any more of my travels for you don't know how to sympathize with me, for one minute you think your ship is on a submarine and the next you think it is going to turn over, so far so good let me think a minute. I am going to try to get a furlough some time this summer. I can't tell whether I will get it or not, but I want to come about July or August and spend about a thirty days furlough.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION GIVING THE LEGISLATURE POWER TO GIVE OR LEND, OR AUTHORIZE THE GIVING OR LENDING, OF THE CREDIT OF THE STATE FOR THE PURPOSE OF ASSISTING CITIZENS, HEADS OF FAMILIES, TO ACQUIRE OR IMPROVE THEIR HOMES.

Horse Joint Resolution No. 19. To amend Section 50, Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, to provide that the Legislature shall have power to give or lend, or authorize the giving or lending, of the credit of the State for the purpose of assisting citizens who are heads of families to acquire or improve their homes; authorizing the State to acquire, improve, sell or lease real estate or assist such citizens to acquire or improve their homes upon terms and conditions prescribed by the Legislature; authorizing the Legislature to create such agencies as may be necessary to carry out the purposes of this section; providing that obligations created under this section shall never be taxed; and providing that the Legislature shall have authority to provide a method of securing any deferred payments for lands purchased hereunder, and that such obligations shall be secured in addition to the usual liens by an annual assessment collected as a tax against the land; and providing that the Legislature shall have no power to relieve any person from any obligation entered into under this provision or any statute enacted thereunder; and providing for the classification of lands acquired under this Act, and limiting acreage sold to any one person where lands are classed as agricultural.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Section 50, of Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be so amended that the same will read and hereafter be as follows:

SEC. 50. The Legislature shall have no power to give or lend or to authorize the giving or lending, of the credit of the State in aid of or to any person, association, or corporation, whether municipal or other, or to pledge the credit of the State in any manner whatsoever, for the payment of the liabilities, present or prospective, of any individual, association of individuals, municipal or other corporation, whatsoever, except that the Legislature shall have the power to give or to lend, or to authorize the giving or lending, of the credit of the State for the purpose of assisting native born or naturalized citizens who are heads of families and who will become in good faith, actual occupants, to acquire or improve their homes; and for this purpose the State is authorized to acquire, or improve, sell or lease real estate or assist such citizen to acquire, or improve their homes upon such terms and conditions and in such manner and subject to such limitations as the Legislature may from time to time prescribe. Provided that no land shall be acquired by the State under the terms of this amendment until the said lands are examined and the value of said lands is appraised and ascertained as to its actual value for agricultural purposes, by a commission hereby authorized, composed of the Governor, Attorney General, Land Commissioner, Comptroller of Public Accounts and the State Treasurer; and their reports shall be available to all prospective land purchasers. The Legislature shall have authority to create by law such agencies as may be deemed necessary to effect the purpose of the Act.

Obligations created under this section shall never be taxed, and the Legislature shall have authority to provide a method of securing deferred payments for lands purchased hereunder, and in addition to the usual

liens may secure the same by an annual assessment collected as a tax against the land; provided, however the Legislature shall have no power to relieve any person from any obligation entered into with the State under this provision or any statute enacted hereunder. The terms of this Act shall not apply, or be extended to any person who is not a bona fide resident citizen of the State of Texas and who has not been such citizen at least two years prior to the extension of such aid, nor shall the terms of this Act ever be applied to any lands outside of the State of Texas. Provided further that all land acquired by the State under the provisions of this section for which the State may lend its credit shall be classified as agricultural lands or otherwise, and if classified as agricultural lands, then no more than 200 acres shall be sold to any one person under the provisions herein.

SEC. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State of Texas at an election to be held throughout the State on the 24th day of May, A. D. 1919, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendment to Section 50, Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing that the Legislature shall have power to give or lend or authorize the giving or lending of the credit of the State for the purpose of assisting citizens who are heads of families to acquire or improve their homes," and all those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the amendment to Section 50, Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing that the Legislature shall have power to give or lend or authorize the giving or lending of the credit of the State for the purpose of assisting citizens who are heads of families to acquire or improve their homes."

SEC. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

SEC. 4. That the sum of \$5000.00, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

When the wiping out of the Soissons salient becomes a mere incident in the growing list of German victories that might have been there will probably be no more item better remembered by men who were wounded while on that little job than the item of lemonade.

One division in particular will thank the Salvation Army with pockets open for the carload of juicy yellow Italian fruit that happened to be near enough to Soissons and to Chateau-Thierry wounded available in the thick of things.

The Salvation Army had been looking forward to hot weather, drive or no drive, and they were getting ready to substitute real lemonade, with rinds and everything for the old reliable chocolate or the doubtful pinard. The water supply was none too good, and when a man is hit he wants something to drink as soon as he can get to it.

So when the doughboys and the artillery and the Signal Corps began sending representatives back to visit the dressing stations the Salvation Army came to the fore with those Italian lemons, beancoup sugar and barrels of clean, cold water, which they brought up on a Ford delivery truck. Every Yank who got within range of that lemon threw away his cigarette and made a dive for his tin cup.

The doctors say that at a good many who couldn't walk, and who couldn't make a dive for their share, are going to live and go back to the States because they got a drink that killed their fever. Lemonade is a lifesaver in most. Lemons are needed it would seem in a life-saver in a particular lot of men, and this particular surgeon had some good tricks for another.

Another thing that was imported for use in the emergency was mosquito netting. When the need for protection against fleas was apparent at the evacuation hospitals and in dressing stations the Salvation Army sent to Paris and got all they could.

Then, too, the doughnut batteries more than scored on this latest strategic retreat of Fritz. Two little Salvation lassies fed twenty-eight lost, hungry doughboys in a bunch less than six hours after first starting their refreshment station. Battle smoke could not blot out the cheerful smell of frying, nor could the drive away the allure of theunctuous sinker.

A measure is before the legislature providing for an income tax in Texas as a means of increasing the state's revenue.

One of the German long range guns, which shelled Paris at a distance of 76 miles, has been delivered to General Foch and will be on exhibition in Paris.

The campaign to induce a reduction of cotton acreage is being waged heroically, and with some show of success. The real results of the campaign can not be known until it is too late to plant cotton.

The condition of Premier Clemenceau, who was wounded by an assassin in Paris some days ago, is reported to be satisfactory, yet the fear is expressed by those who know of the seriousness of his wounds that they may yet prove fatal.

The war department and post-office department have combined in an effort to prevent frauds being perpetrated upon relatives of soldiers by unprincipled individuals who telegraph or telephone for money in the soldier's name.

There is now an understanding that the regular session of the legislature will adjourn March 21 and a special session will be called to convene June 16. Under this arrangement the solons will only have to work one week for \$2 per day, the \$5 per day period expiring March 14.

Ambassador Francis has returned from Russia for a conference with the president and the state department. He says peace in Europe is impossible with conditions as at present in Russia and that if peace is negotiated with bolsheviki rule in Russia the victory of the war, or a good part of it will have been gained by Germany.

President Wilson reached Boston Sunday night on his return from the peace conference in France. He is confident of the success of the plan of a league of nations and world wide, lasting peace. After a week's stay, Mr. Wilson will return to France to resume his part in the conference.

In compliance with the request of the federated women's clubs the deans of twenty one colleges of America, in convention in Chicago this week, recorded their protest against the sent apparel designed for girls' summer wear. An appeal is to be made to the clothing designers to change the models and increase the amount of apparel for summer use.

If the country is not frightened into condemning the constitution for the League of Nations by the oratorical demonstrations of Senator Poindexter and Representative Fess, it will prove that its nerves are proof against the intimidations of ghosts. These statesmen left none of them unmobilized. With strong-pinioned imagination they explored the cosmos of possibility and materialized before the gaze of the country the ghost of every danger that they could corral. The Chinese Exclusion Act, the Monroe Doctrine, protectionism, all were shown to be menaced, while with more or less subtlety, laborers were warned to beware of their liberties, and Irishmen bidden to be on guard against the freedom of Ireland. All these dire evils are to be let loose on the world by the creation of the League of Nations; that is, they are if these statesmen are credible seers of consequence. Happily there is little reason to believe that the country will be much impressed by such extravagance of speech and such puerilities of argument.—Dallas News.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION PROVIDING FOR AND RELATING TO EQUAL SUFFRAGE.

Senate Joint Resolution No. 7. Proposing to amend Section 2, Article 6, of the Constitution of the State of Texas so that it shall hereafter, in substance, provide that every person, male or female, subject to no constitutional disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years, and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and who shall reside in this State one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which he offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residence; declaring that the electors living in any unorganized county may vote at any election precinct in the county to which such county is attached for judicial purposes; providing that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before he or she shall offer to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that poll tax has been paid before the first day of February next preceding such election; declaring that if said voter shall have lost or misplaced such tax receipt, he or she shall be entitled to vote, upon making affidavit that such tax receipt has been lost, which affidavit must be in writing and left with the judge of the election. And declaring that all laws now on the statutes relating to qualified voters and governing and regulating elections shall apply to male and female voters alike; and all laws relating to elections shall remain in full force and affect until changed or modified by the Legislature, and declaring that this amendment to the constitution shall be self-enacting.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1- That Section 2, of Article 6, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so that hereafter said section shall read as follows, to-wit:

SECTION 2- Every person, male or female, subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years, and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and who shall have resided in this State one year next preceding an election, and the last six months within the district or county in which he offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; and all electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residence; provided that electors living in any unorganized county may vote at any election precinct in the county to which such county is attached for judicial purposes; and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before he or she offers to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing such poll tax paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt he or she shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. All laws now on the statutes of this State regulating and relating to qualified voters in both primary and general elections shall apply to and govern both male and female voters, and shall be in effect until such statutes are changed or amended by the Legislature. And this amendment to the Con-

stitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation.

SEC. 3- The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the vote of the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held for such purpose on the fourth Saturday in May, A. D. 1919, the same being the twenty fourth day of said month; at said election, the votes shall be placed on an official ballot which shall have printed, or written, thereon the words, "For the amendment to Section 2, Article 6, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing qualifications for male and female voters," and also the words, "Against the amendment to Section 2, Article 6, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing qualifications for male and female voters." All voters favoring this proposed constitutional amendment shall erase the words, "Against the amendment to Section 2, Article 6, of the Constitution of the State of Texas," and those opposing it shall erase the words, "For the amendment to Section 2, Article 6, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing qualifications for male and female voters." All voters favoring this proposed constitutional amendment shall erase the words, "Against the amendment to Section 2, Article 6, of the Constitution of the State of Texas," and those opposing it shall erase the words, "For the amendment to Section 2, Article 6, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing qualifications for male and female voters." All ballots cast, as above provided, shall be counted as cast for or against a proposed amendment, and if a majority shall be for the amendment it shall be declared adopted; if a majority of the votes cast shall be against the amendment, said amendment shall be lost. All provisions of the general election laws, as amended and enforced at the time said election is held, shall govern in all respects as to the qualifications of the electors, the method of holding such elections, and in all other respects so far as such election laws can be made applicable.

SEC. 4- The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for such election and have same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

SEC. 5- The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated, to defray the expenses

EVERYBODY IS NOW FIGURING INCOME TAX

In Order to Be Helpful to Public, Internal Revenue Bureau Has Every Available Officer in Field.

SEVERE PENALTIES IF YOU DELAY BEYOND MARCH 15

With the due date for income taxes only a few weeks away, the collection of this far-reaching tax on 1918 incomes has started off with a bang. Everybody is figuring income tax.

Payments and sworn statements of income must reach Internal Revenue offices on or before March 15, and there are severe penalties for delinquency.

Residents of Texas are required to make their returns and pay their taxes to Alexander S. Walker, Collector of Internal Revenue, Austin, Tex., or to deputy collectors who are now doing free advisory work on income tax.

"Pay your income tax by March 15," is the slogan of the Internal Revenue Bureau, which has sent every available officer into the field to help the public to understand the requirements and to prepare the returns.

Who Must Make Return.

It is estimated that many thousands of single and married persons in this section of the United States who have never before made annual returns are required to do so this year.

Income tax returns must be made between now and March 15 by persons who come under the following classifications:

Any unmarried person whose 1918 net income was \$1,000 or over. Widows and widowers, divorcees and married persons who are living apart from their husbands or wives, are for the purposes of the Income Tax classed as unmarried.

Any married person living with wife or husband whose 1918 net income was \$2,000 or over. The income of both husband and wife must be considered, together with the earnings of minor children, if any.

Revenue Bureau Offers Aid.

Each person in the United States who is in either of these classifications must get busy at once if penalties are to be avoided. He should secure a blank Form 1040 A for reporting net income up to \$5,000, or Form 1040 if his net income exceeded that amount. Forms are being distributed by collectors and their deputies, also by banks. By following the instructions on the forms a correct return can be prepared at home. If a person needs advice or aid, the Deputy Collectors in the field will furnish this without charge.

The new Revenue law places the income tax duty on citizens and residents. The Internal Revenue Bureau is sending its men to work right with the public to get the tax and the returns in. With active co-operation, every tax due March 15 will be paid and every return required by law will be in the Revenue offices on time.

Exemptions Allowed.

A single person is allowed a personal exemption of \$1,000. If he is supporting in his household relatives who are dependent upon him, he may claim the status of the head of a family who has the same exemption as if married.

A married person, who lives with wife or husband, is allowed a personal exemption of \$2,000. The head of a family is entitled to claim a similar personal exemption.

An additional exemption of \$200 is allowed for each person under eighteen or incapable of self support, who was dependent upon and received his chief support from the taxpayer.

A husband and wife living together are entitled to but one personal exemption of \$2,000. If they make separate returns, the exemption may be claimed by either or divided.

Accuracy Required.

Absolute accuracy is necessary in making up income figures. Any person who is working for wages should find out exactly how much he received during the whole year 1918. Fees, bank interest, bond interest, dividends, rents received, and all other items must be reported correctly. Mere guesses are not accepted, for they are unjust alike to the taxpayer and the Government, and defeat the proper administration of the law.

SALVATION ARMY PROVIDED FOR THEM

(Dallas Times-Herald)

Huge preparations for making a happy Christmas for our boys overseas were made by the Salvationists. Shipped from the headquarters of the army were gigantic crates containing all manner of festive articles, calculated to turn the four hundred huts of the Army in France into sparkling colorful holiday centers. For the huts in which the soldiers in the camps are entertained the army sent over only the Christmas tree trimmings.

"The boys will get their own trees," said Brigadier Weite. "They may not be pine trees, but they can be depended on to get something to put the trimmings on."

For the sick boys in the hospitals the Army sent over a thousand little Christmas trees which fold up and pack neatly and are light enough to rest on the end of an invalid's cot without being a burden. The patriotic dolls to go on the big trees in huts or hospitals will afterwards be distributed to the French children. They are dressed in white, trimmed with red, white and blue ribbons and wear the American flag proudly displayed over their hearts.

The flesh colored dolls, which also were for the soldiers' Christmas trees, although festive in form, are serious, hard working cakes of soap in reality, and after the holiday will take their places as sanitary aids to the kits of the infantrymen. As for the quacking ducks—well they will become the property of French children along with the patriotic dolls, although by that time they probably will be a little hoarse from too frequent exercise of the quack.

As yet the Salvation Army has seen no lessening of its service overseas and more women workers are constantly going over. Now that our forces are being rapidly shifted in France and England, so that large numbers of the men can be gradually sent home, there is more need than ever for the ministrations of the Salvation Army. The workers of the Army shift quarters as the troops are moved from one point to another, and when the military contingents make a new camp there are Salvation lassies ready to tender their much appreciated hospitality. Not only the famous doughnuts, but pies as well, and hot coffee, chocolate and other particularly cheering and palatable evidences of their never flagging interest in the welfare of the American soldier are distributed by the Army lassies at all points to which our troops are shifted.—New York Herald.

OIL DEVELOPMENTS.

Senate Joint Resolution No. 13.

A resolution to amend Section 5 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as follows: Strike out the words "Four Thousand," found in the third line of Section 5, and insert in lieu thereof the words "Ten Thousand" and, adding after the word "furniture" the words, "and this clause shall be self-enacting," and making an appropriation to pay necessary expenses here of.

Be it Resolved, by the Legislature of the State of Texas: SECTION 1. That Section No 5 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as hereafter to read as follows:

SECTION 5. ARTICLE IV. Governor's Salary and Mansion.—He shall at stated times receive as compensation for his service an annual salary of ten thousand dollars, and no more, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture, and this clause shall be self-enacting.

SEC. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the fourth Saturday in May A. D. 1919, same being the twenty-fourth day of May, A. D. 1919, and the Governor of this State is hereby directed to make the necessary proclamation for said election and to have the same duly published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. Said election shall be held under and in accordance with the general election laws of the State and the official ballot shall have printed or written thereon in plain letters the words, "OFFICIAL BALLOT," and also the words, "For the amendment to Section 5 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas in regard to the salary of the Governor of the State of Texas," and also the words, "Against the amendment to Section 5 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas in regard to the salary of the Governor of the State of Texas."

All voters favoring such amendment shall erase, by making a mark through the words, "Against the amendment to Section 5 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas in regard to the salary of the Governor of the State of Texas," and all voters opposing such amendment shall erase by making a mark through the words "For the amendment to Section 5 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas in regard to the salary of the Governor of the State of Texas." If a majority of votes cast shall be "For the amendment to Section 5 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas in regard to the salary of the Governor of the State of Texas," said amendment shall be declared adopted. If a majority of the votes cast shall be "Against the amendment to Section 5 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas in regard to the salary of the Governor of the State of Texas," said amendment shall be lost and shall be so declared.

Sec. 3. There is hereby appropriated out of the funds in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000 00), or so much thereof as may be necessary to cover the necessary expenses attached to the pro-

Proposed Amendment To The State Constitution Prohibiting The Manufacture And Sale Of Intoxicating Liquors.

House Joint Resolution No. 1

A resolution proposing to amend the Constitution of the State of Texas, by amending Article 16, Section 20 thereof by striking out and repealing said section and substituting in lieu thereof a new Section 20, prohibiting the manufacture, sale, barter or exchange in the State of Texas of spirituous, vinous or malt liquors or medicated bitters capable of producing intoxication, or any other intoxicant whatever, except for medicinal, mechanical, scientific or sacramental purposes, and providing that the Legislature shall enact laws to enforce this section; providing that until the Legislature shall prescribe other or different regulations on the subject the sale of spirituous, vinous or malt liquors or medicated bitters, capable of producing intoxication, or any other intoxicant whatever, for medicinal purposes shall be made only in cases of actual sickness and then only upon prescription of a regular practicing physician, subject to certain regulations with reference to the same; providing that this amendment shall be self-operative, and until the Legislature shall provide other or different penalties, the violation of any part of this constitutional provision shall be deemed a felony punishable by confinement in the penitentiary for a term of years specified, without the benefit of any law providing for suspended sentence; conferring authority upon the District Court and judges thereof, under their equity powers, to issue upon suit of the Attorney General injunction against infractions or threatened infractions of any part of this constitutional provision; providing that without affecting the provisions herein, intoxicating liquors are declared to be subject to the general police power of this State; declaring that the Legislature shall have power to pass any additional prohibitory laws in aid thereof which it may deem advisable; fixing the time for the election for the adoption or rejection of said proposed constitutional amendment and prescribing certain rules and regulations with reference to the same; declaring that the provisions of the General Election Law shall govern in all respects as to qualification of electors and method of holding the election and in all other respects where applicable; directing proclamation for the election and making certain provisions for the election and ballots thereof and method of voting; prescribing certain duties for the Governor of the State; and making an appropriation to carry out this resolution.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1- That Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by striking out and repealing Section 20 thereof and substituting in lieu of said Section 20 the following:

SEC. 20- (a) The manufacture, sale, barter and exchange in the State of Texas, of spirituous, vinous or malt liquors or medicated bitters capable of producing intoxication, or any other intoxicant whatever except for medicinal, mechanical, scientific or sacramental purposes, are each and all hereby prohibited.

The Legislature shall enact laws to enforce this section.

(b) Until the Legislature shall prescribe other or different regulations on the subject, the sale of spirituous, vinous, or malt liquors, or medicated bitters, capable of producing intoxication, or any other intoxi-

cant whatever, for medicinal purposes shall be made only in cases of actual sickness, and then only upon the prescription of a regular practicing physician, subject to the regulations applicable to sales under prescriptions prohibited in territory by virtue of Article 598, Chapter 7, Title 11, of the Penal Code of the State of Texas.

(c) This amendment is self-operative, and until the Legislature shall prescribe other or different penalties, any person, acting for himself or in behalf of another, or in behalf of any partnership, corporation or association of persons, who shall after the adoption of this amendment, violate any part of this constitutional provision shall be deemed guilty of a felony, and shall, upon conviction in a prosecution commenced, carried on and concluded in the manner prescribed by law in cases of felonies, be punished by confinement in the penitentiary for a period of time not less than one year nor more than five years, without the benefit of any law providing for suspended sentence. And the district courts and the judges thereof, under their equity powers, shall have authority to issue upon suit of the Attorney General, injunctions against infractions or threatened infractions of any part of this constitutional provision.

(d) Without affecting the provisions herein, intoxicating liquors are declared to be subject to the general police power of the State; and the Legislature shall have the power to pass any additional prohibitory laws, or laws in aid thereof, which it may deem advisable.

(e) Liability for violating any liquor laws in force at the time of the adoption of this amendment shall not be affected by this amendment, and all remedies, civil and criminal, for such violations shall be preserved.

SEC. 2- The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the fourth Saturday in May, being the twenty-fourth day thereof, A. D. 1919. At said election, the vote shall be by official ballot, which shall have printed or written at the top thereof in plain letters the words, "Official Ballot." Said ballot shall have also written or printed thereon the words, "For Prohibition," and the words "Against Prohibition."

All voters favoring said proposed amendment shall erase the words "Against Prohibition" by making a mark through the same and those opposing it shall erase the words, "For Prohibition," by making a mark through the same.

If a majority of the votes cast at said election shall be "For Prohibition," said amendment shall be declared adopted. If a majority of the votes shall be "Against Prohibition," said amendment shall be lost, and so declared.

All the provisions of the General Election Laws as amended and in force at the time said election is held shall govern in all respects as to the qualifications of the electors, the method of holding such election, and all other respects, so far as such election laws can be made applicable.

SEC. 3- The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

SEC. 4- The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated, to defray the expenses of such proclamation and election.
