Judge E. B. Anderson and family were with us on Sunday morning as a speaker for the \$75,000,000.00 campaign.

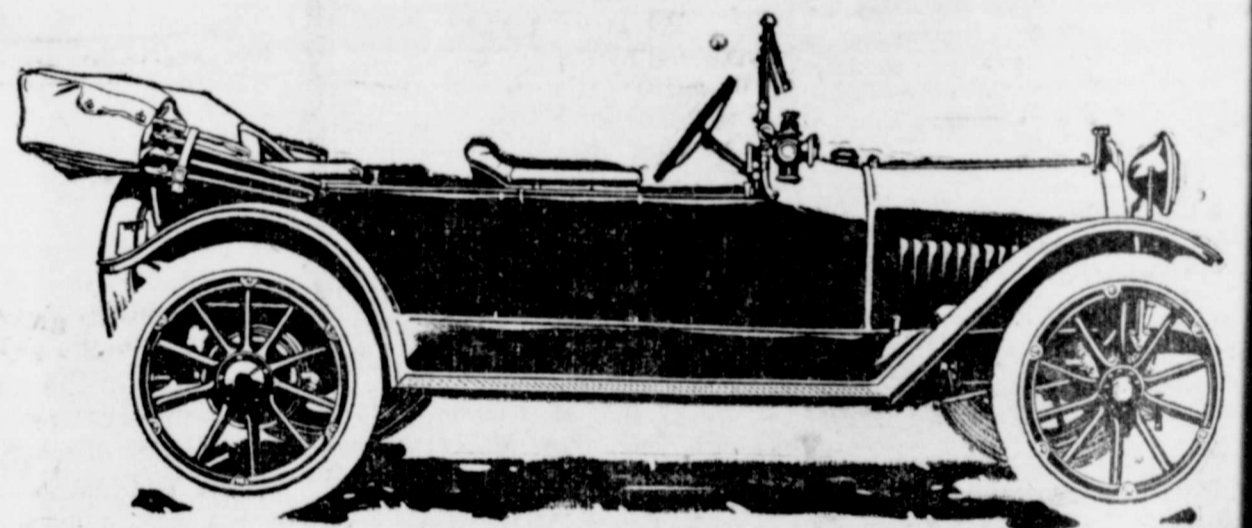
We all enjoyed a singing at Mr. W. A. Daniel's Sunday afternoon.

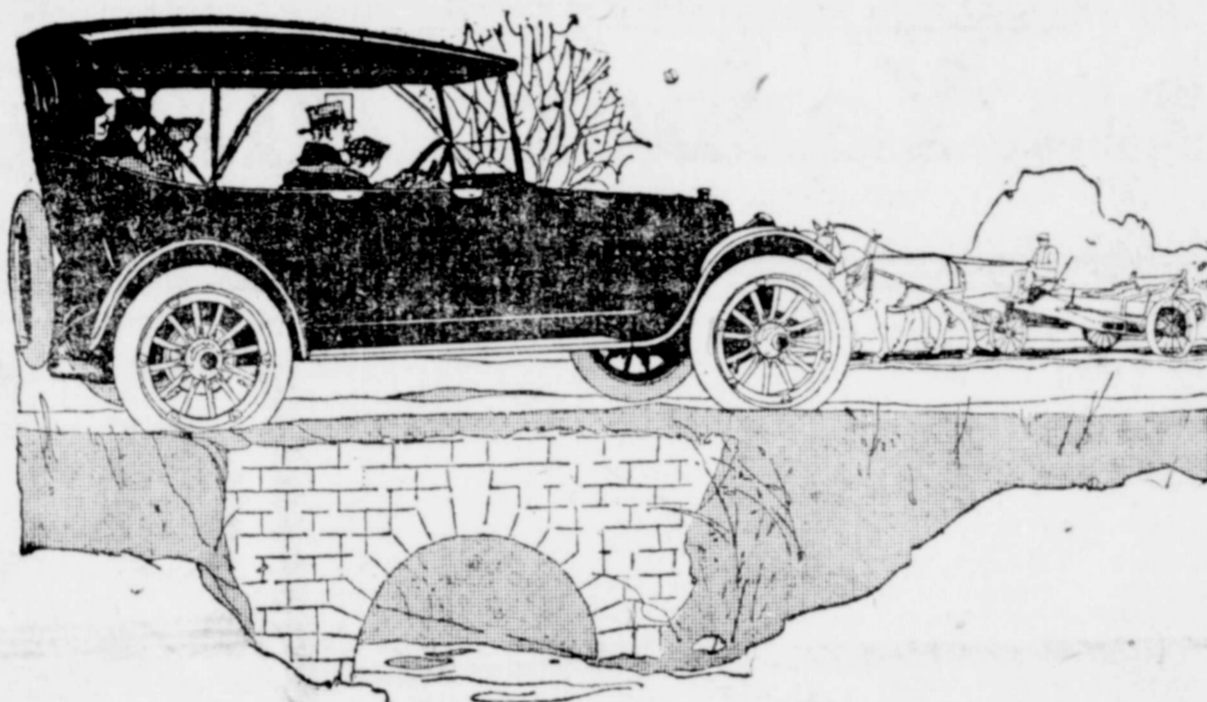

FOOD VALUE OF MILK.

ASTONISHING statistics concerning the food value of milk have been compiled by Doctor Rosenow of Harvard university. The actual food value of one quart of milk he has discovered to be equal to three-quarters of a pound of beef, two pounds of chicken, eight eggs. A glass of milk is equal in value to two large eggs or a large serving of lean meat or two moderate-sized potatoes or five tablespoonfuls of cooked rice or two slices of bread. A meal consisting of a glass of milk and two slices of bread give you the food value you would obtain from four eggs.

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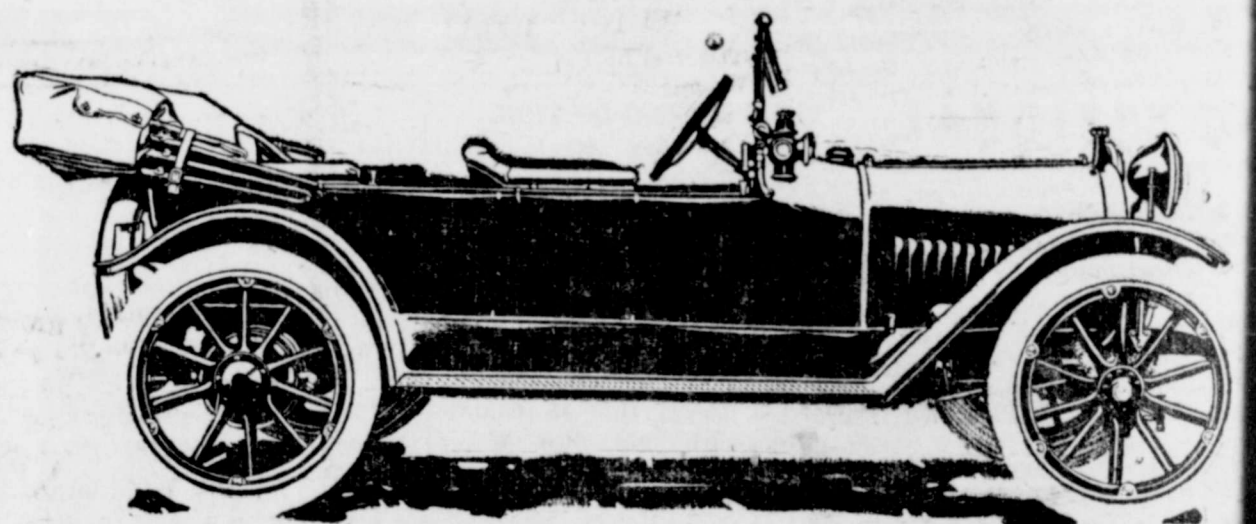

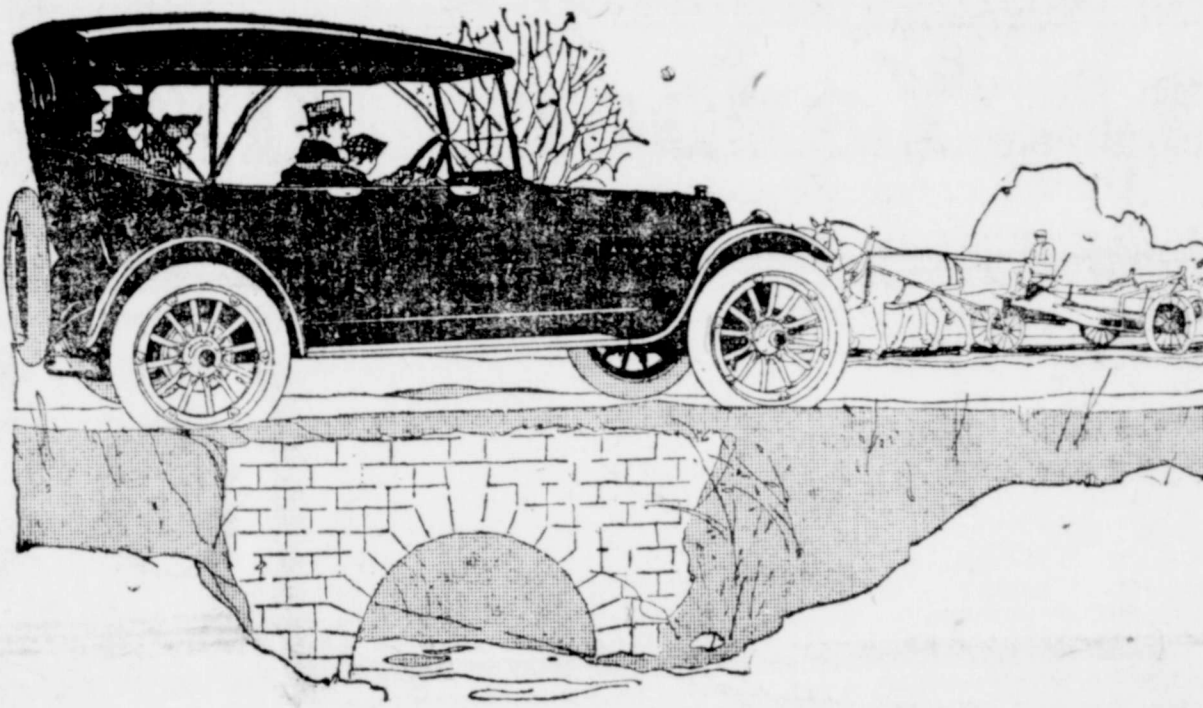

FOOD VALUE OF MILK.

ASTOUNDING statistics concerning the food value of milk have been compiled by Doctor Rosenow of Harvard university. The actual food value of one quart of milk he has discovered to be equal to three-quarters of a pound of beef, two pounds of chicken, eight eggs. A glass of milk is equal in value to two large eggs or a large serving of lean meat or two moderate-sized potatoes or five tablespoonfuls of cooked rice or two slices of bread. A meal consisting of a glass of milk and two slices of bread give you the food value you would obtain from four eggs.

TELLS OF SOUTHERN ALASKA

Report of United States Geological Survey Deals With Region Little Known.

The region about the headwaters of Copper, Matanuska and Susitna rivers, in southern Alaska, though more accessible than many parts of Alaska that are much better known, had not been fully covered by government surveys until a few years ago, when a party from the United States geological survey, department of the interior, examined and mapped the unsurveyed areas in that region. There has been but little productive mining in that region, and its geology does not encourage the hope that much placer gold will be found there, but gold lodes may yet be discovered at some places. The region will be made accessible by the government railroad to the Matanuska coal field, and systematic prospecting for placer gold or lodes may perhaps be warranted.

A report on the region, by Theodore Chapin, geologist, has been published by the United States geological survey as Bulletin 668, under the title, "The Nelchina-Susitna Region, Alaska." The report sketches the geography and geology of the region and contains topographic and geologic maps covering about 10,000 square miles as well as half-tone views, and includes brief notes on the work done on gold placers.

The report can be obtained free of charge from the director of the United States geological survey at Washington.

REASON FOR STRIKES

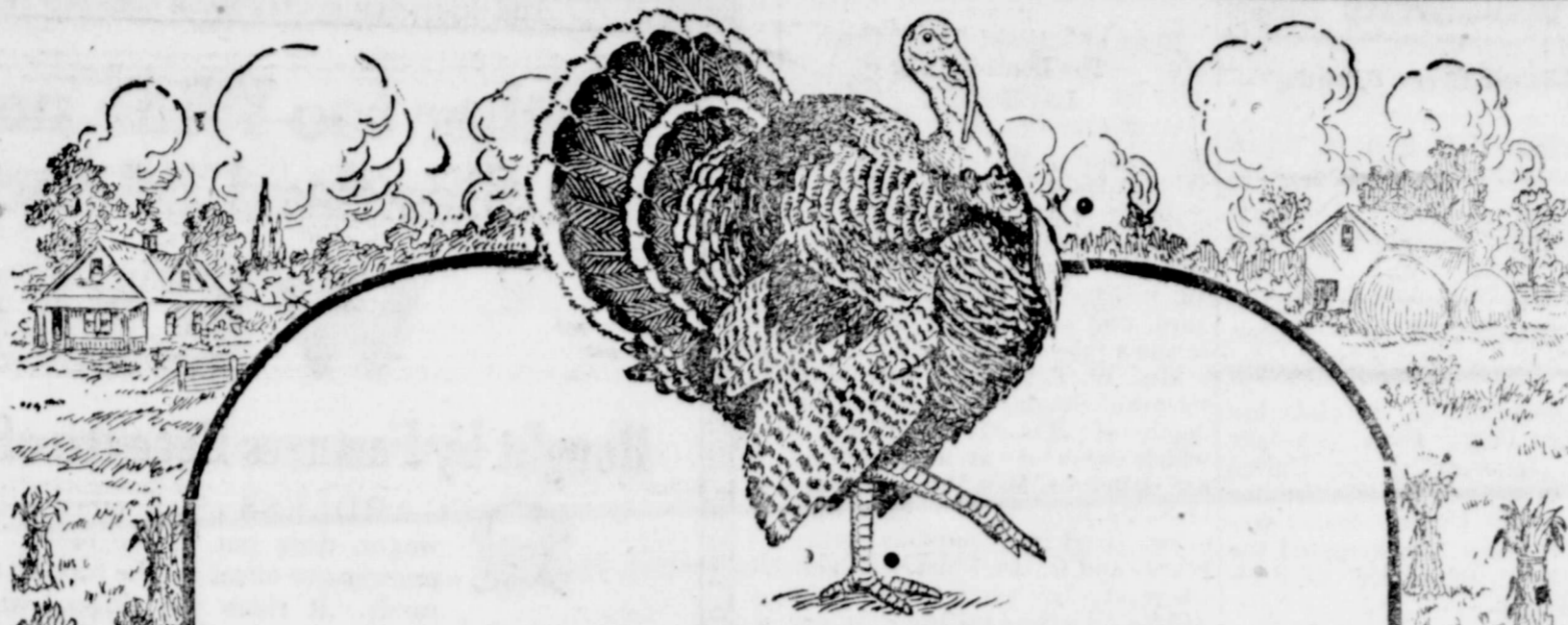

The governor of Virginia has appointed Carter Glass, secretary of the treasury of the United States, to succeed the late Senator Martin in the United States senate. Mr. Glass has accepted the appointment, by advice of President Wilson.

A revenue officer of San Antonio is decidedly pessimistic regarding the enforcement of the prohibition laws. He gave out an interview this week in which he said he believed there were ten thousand bootleggers and three hundred whiskey stills in Texas.

A large number of ladies of Chicago have petitioned congress to relieve them from the unjust discrimination in the matter of luxury tax on corsets. They say in their petition that the aforesaid article of feminine wearing apparel should be under the head of necessities rather than luxuries.

The Eagle believes the government official who had the affront to send out to the press the information that he had employed an expert to prepare copy for the "dead head" advertising asked and expected by his department is about the limit. The Eagle, like many other papers, has determined upon a pay or no publication policy for space grafters.

Many of the coal miners have returned to work, realizing as did their brethren of the steel workers union that their unreasonable demands would not be met and that the public sympathy was with their employers. Time was when these organizations could say what must be done and it was done, but indications are that a brighter day has dawned for the 88 per cent of the population outside of the unions, who have so long submitted to the unjust demands of the 12 per cent in the unions.

The Eagle receives frequent communications from persons discussing the cotton market and the cotton situation, most of such communications being devoted to urging the farmers to hold cotton for a better price. The Eagle has not been able to give space to these articles for the good and sufficient reason that we have no desire to be a party to giving or offering advice to people who are as capable of attending to their business as we are to look after our affairs. Besides this, if cotton should go down instead of increasing in value we would at least be blameable for endeavoring to induce men to hold their cotton when they could secure around forty cents for it. Plainly, the Eagle does not know whether it is advisable to sell or to hold.

Ontario has a farmer-laborer government for the first time in its history. And it is the first non-political administration to have charge of the affairs of the province. A locomotive engineer is minister of mines; a broom maker is minister of health and labor; a practical farmer is minister of education; a lecturer at the Ontario Agricultural college is minister of agriculture; a practical farmer is minister of lands and forests; a stock farmer and former school teacher is minister of the treasury; a practical farmer is minister of public work; an inveterate foe and fighter of liquor and gambling is attorney general, and a practical farmer and military man who saw service over sea, is minister of military affairs. Ontario is the most conservative of all the provinces of Canada. But the Conservative and Liberal parties were almost wiped out of existence at the recent election.—Fort Worth Record.

FOOD FOR THE HUNGRY

It seems that consumers in cities are at last beginning to realize that prospects for food crops to sustain our rapidly growing urban population are by no means as bright as normal living requires. The difficulties of getting labor together with the disagreeable weather have made planting fall crops a gigantic task.

It now seems that the wheat acreage will be reduced considerably, how much, no one at this time can tell. There is much cotton in fields of the Southwest to be picked; corn has not yet been gathered in some fields; sweet potatoes are rotting in the fields because of bad weather; peanut harvest is at hand.

How are farmers to prepare land and to sow fall grain crops when their 1919 crops are not harvested and help cannot be secured at any price? And what encouragement will there be to plant large acreage of row crops next spring?

The burden still remains upon farmers. Industrial classes in cities are much concerned over what their living cost, but they have offered no help to farmers, nor have they proposed any plan to produce more manufactured articles farmers must buy to decrease expenses in farming. There is still food from the abundance produced during the war and since the armistice was signed. But the supply in future is unknown. It would seem that capital and labor might think of the future food supply as well as their own selfish controversies.—Farm and Ranch.

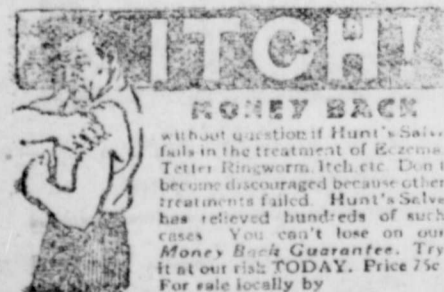

SKEPTICAL OF NEW METAL

Experts Slow to Believe Reports of Wonderful Discovery of Alloy Long Looked For.

A metal lighter than any yet known, and as strong as or stronger than steel, has for years been the dream of many, and every now and then rumors are circulated to the effect that at last it has been discovered, says the Scientific American. President Wilson states that he will make no move to rescind war-time prohibition and other laws effective for the duration of the war but will await the formal declaration of peace.

Seldom a day passes without notice thru the daily paper of the advance in price of some necessity. Just where the end is to be reached we cannot tell, but surely there must come an end, for it is doubtful now if the business people are "coming out whole," while the wage earners are having to pay most of their income for necessities.

American Consul Jenkins, who was recently reported to have been kidnapped by bandits in Mexico and released upon the payment of \$150,000 as ransom, has been arrested by Mexican authorities, who claim he was a party to a scheme to extort funds from the United States to secure his release. Jenkins denies the charge and it is reasonably certain that the Mexicans are simply endeavoring to evade responsibility for the former outrage by perpetrating this one.

The peace treaty and League of Nations agreement are dead for the present, as far as the United States senate is concerned and the future of the agreements is yet to be determined. The senate failed to ratify the treaty and its attendant document at the special session which ended Wednesday night and it is left to the discretion of President Wilson whether or not he will submit the questions for consideration by the next senate. A resolution introduced at the closing session to declare peace was carried over to the regular term, which convenes next month.

Australia, especially New South Wales, is suffering the most devastating drouth since white men have resided in that country, according to a Skiney dispatch to the Daily Mail. Stocks and crops have been destroyed and it is doubtful whether there will be enough seed wheat for next season's sowing. Hundreds and perhaps thousands of settlers have been ruined. Northwestern New South Wales is described as a desert, stripped of everything green. Paddocks are littered with the skeletons of cattle, and even rabbits are dying in vast numbers.

Methodists Save Belgian and Serbian Orphans

Southern Church Buys Homes in Brussels and Belgrade and Supports Serbian Refugees in England.

Nashville, Tenn.—The Centenary Commission of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, will specialize in caring for the children of Belgium, Serbia and other stricken countries of Europe, according to an announcement made by Dr. W. B. Beauchamp, the director-general. Dr. Beauchamp and a Church Commission have just returned from Europe.

For this purpose a large home, formerly a famous boys' school, has been purchased at Uccle, a suburb of Brussels. Several hundred children can be accommodated in this building, and the Methodists will assume entire responsibility for them and their future.

Another home has been bought at Belgrade, Serbia, and here the underfed orphans of the Southern Slavs will be given medical attention and cared for. A staff of women physicians secured from Scotland, will be in charge of this home.

Still another orphanage has been taken over at Faversham, England. This home already contains more than a hundred Serbian children, orphaned refugees who were taken from their homes during the Austrian invasion.

Plight of Children Deplorable. "One can scarcely imagine the plight of the Belgian and Serbian children," declared Dr. Beauchamp. "The mines of Northern France have been flooded or filled with concrete by the Germans, and thousands of children will literally freeze to death this winter."

"I have seen them living in the old trenches and dug-outs left by the enemy, with little to eat save what is gathered from the passers-by."

Relief stations will be established as quickly as workers can be obtained and supplies sent. These will be at Brussels, Ypres, St. Quentin, Montdidier, Belgrade and other centers.

The Centenary Commission is seeking for two young physicians, eight nurses, a dozen women social workers, and a number of superintendents and directors to reinforce the relief staff. These will be sent abroad at once.

The Church has a fund of \$5,000,000 for this purpose. It is a part of the \$53,000,000 fund which was raised in the recent Centenary Drive.

Christians Invade The Holy Land

Southern Methodists Send First Workers to Palestine for Bible and Literature Distribution.

(Special Correspondence) Nashville, Tenn.—The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, has the distinction of being the first Christian denomination to send workers to Palestine since the free regime inaugurated under the occupancy of General Allenby.

The Centenary European Commission of the Church, headed by Bishop James Atkins and Dr. W. B. Beauchamp, have already dispatched five colporteurs to the Holy Land. These will be followed by five more in the next few weeks.

These workers will establish no stations, but will follow the early Methodist custom of itinerating over the country distributing Bibles, tracts and Christian literature.

This literature will be printed in the native dialects, and will be secured through an arrangement with the Nile Press in Egypt.

Under the rule of the Turk such a movement would have been prohibited, but under Allenby there is perfect freedom of religions. The action of the Southern Methodists is the beginning of a vast scheme of missionary activity which will be carried on in the Holy Land.
