COTTON CROP BEGINNING TO COME IN; GRADE FAIR: PRICES ARE GRADUALLY INCREASING

in Texas in the period from 4940 to that it is the aim of the Dallas Victory gan to come in. During the week quite This week the 1920 cotton crop bea few bales have been ginned and sold here and it is thought that many will be brought in today.

The grade of cotton this year, it is thought, will be better than last year's, although some of it is damaged by boll weevil stings.

The price is steadily increasing now. Some of the buyers Thursday paid as high as 27.50 for s'rict middling as compared with 25.25 a week ago. There is no way to judge whether is will keep this up or not, but reports for several organizations started for the purpose of preventing the speculators from forcing the price down, indicate that the prices will be favorable

It appears that the erop was not damaged as badly as was thought a week or two ago. The dry hot weather of the last two weeks has materially benefited the cotton over the county. Should this weather hold, a great deal more cotton will be made. Estima'es of cotton men indicate that a crop of about 60 per cent of normal will be made this year. Last year approximately 7,500 ales of cotton were weighed here. But, last year hundreds of bales were carried to other points on account of the condition of the roads. Now our roads are ill passable and most of them are as good as will be found at other points. Should we get only cotton from the same sources as last year, something like five or six thousand bales should be brought here. However, many peowhose preference is for Goldthwaite will come here this year-they couldn't get here last year-and our cotton crop

With a good market and the farmers all in pretty good condition, old Mills will soon be on the boom again.

Austin, Texas, Sept. 13 .- All men and women in Texas who are otherwise qualified to vote may participate in the general election to be held Nov. 2 without payment of poll tax, according to

Male inhabitants are still fiable for the payment of a poll tax, the opinion said, but failure to pay the same will not disqualify a man from voting who is otherwise a qualified voter. The opinion said that the suffrage amendment is now recognized by the federal government as part of the constitution of the United States and that all states ere prohibited from exercising discrimination against citizens who desire to vote by reason of or on account of sex.

BOMB EXPLOSION OCCURS IN WALL STREET THURSDAY

New York, Sept. 17 .- An explosion, upposed to have been caused by a huge comb loaded with T. N. T. and reinforeed with iron strips, occurred in Wall street at noon Thursday, killing 24 persons and wounding 200. The front and sides of the Morgan building were demolished and the total property loss is estimated at \$1,000,000.

A former high official of New York's police department, who refused to be quoted, at 1:30 o'clock this afternoon after an investigation of the scene of the explosion at the J. P. Morgan offices, declared it was the result of a conspiracy, says a special to the Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

"The explosion was caused by a time bomb in a wagon load of nitroglycerin set to go off at exactly 12 o'clock," he declared. This wagonload of explosive was purposely set off directely in front of the Morgan offices."

Chicago, Sept. 16 .- Allen O. Myer, chief investigator in New York for the W. J. Burns National Detective Agency, declared here today the explosion that wrecked the banking offices of J. P. Morgan & Co. in New York was the opening outrage of a contemplated reign of terror the country over. Myer. also declared the "Reds" have promulgated an intrigue to tie up every railroad and every steel mill in the country before "snow falls."

Tokio, Sept. 16 .- According to semiofficial dispatches reaching Tokio, conerete plans for Bolshevizing the world have been perfected in Moscow, and agents shortly will be detailed to America ,Japan, China and Asia generally for the campaign. 

About 180,000 acres of the black land belt within a range of 40 miles of Corpus was in cotton this year and they think produced. This will be quite an in crease over any previous year. The es timate is 60 per cent increase for Nueces county. Over 20,000 laborers have been in this section from other lo borhood of the gins, waiting their turn. There are about 700,000 acres of tillable land in this belt and only about 30 per cent of it in cultivation. Land prices range from \$50.00 to \$175.00 per acre. Location and improvements figure in
