INTERESTING HISTORY FROM OLD LOCAL PAPER

On a quiet Sunday afternoon, May 13th, 1894, J. M. Jones of Hanna Valley neighborhood, visited at the bachelor home of Jeff Young. On departing he borrowed a paper promising to return it on Tuesday. He returned the paper on Tuesday just as he said he would, but it happened to be Tuesday, August 15th, 1923.

Now Mr. Young appreciates his good friend's kindness and believing that Mr. Jones has established a new record in long sustained good intentions has sent me the paper by hand of Omer Weatherby with the request that the matters hereinbefore mentioned be duly chronicled and made of public record.

The paper in question was published Wednesday, May 9th, 1894, and is a copy of the "Mills County Advocate, Vol. 4, No. 1." J. D. Hall, president, J. F. Grubbs, editor and proprietor.

Mr. Jones, in the thirty years he kept the paper, took good care of it and from its columns some early history can be gleaned. The first thing on local news page is the solemn injunction, "Join the Hay Makers." What the Hay Makers were, probably no one now living is able or willing to tell.

That there were sports in those days is evidenced by this item: "One of our fishermen is on the Concho fishing on a wager with a San Angelo sportsman. The following telegram has just been received:

"San Angelo, Tex., May 5, 1894.
19 Collect

"P. H. Clements,
Goldthwaite.

"Have met the enemy and he is mine. Ten fish, six turtles, five snakes and an eel.

"J. B. Ferguson."

Ferguson still lives to fish and tell about it. He attained fame also when he blew into town with the first automobile, a one story, one seat, one lung affair.

An ad informs the public that one Randolph wants 12000 eggs. He does not give his name nor his place of business, so we are left to guess who Randolph was and is and what he wanted with so many eggs. To aid you in your guessing it may not be amiss to say that the 18th Amendment had not then been passed and that a drink or a food or something called "eggnog" was much in favor, and that hosts entertained their guests with a game called "eggnog" before forty-two was discovered.

COLORADO PECAN GROWERS ORGANIZE.

The pecan growers of the Colorado River and its tributaries went into permanent organization here last Saturday. L. B. Burnham was elected president, Lige Miller, vice president, and W. P. Weaver, secretary. A pool was signed of over 100,000 pounds and a sales committee appointed to market the pool at Goldthwaite. The pool will likely reach 150,000. The association will co-operate with County Agent W. P. Weaver in getting together an exhibit this fall and in a campaign for pecan improvement next spring.

These growers represent the best orchards in Texas and will offer a pool of superior nuts. The business men of Goldthwaite offer any assistance needed to make this pool a success.

SHORT FALL WOOL IS QUOTED AT 25c POUND

San Angelo, Aug. 29.—Short fall wool of four to six months' growth is being contracted in Texas at 25 cents a pound—no more than the equivalent of the more than the equivalent of the cost of production, which, in some cases is 5 cents a pound higher; fall mohair is bringing 32½ cents a pound and kid hair 65 cents.

These are reasons being given by J. M. Lea of Del Rio, buyer for Draper & Co., Boston, why the sheep and goat raisers of Texas should not shear their flocks and herds until the first of the foreign sales are held early in September. These sales across the water are accepted as the barometer of the American market. If good prices are paid and remain steady for a week, it will indicate that fall prices for short wool and mohair in the United States will be good. Sufficient time for shearing will then remain, Mr. Lea pointed out.

Of Texas' spring wool crop of an estimated 17 million pounds, over 1½ million pounds of unsold wool have been consigned to the eastern market centers and manufacturers are reported to have on hand raw materials sufficient for six to eight months. Until this is used up, there can be no renewal of wool and mohair buying on a big scale, unless the demand for goods should pick up more than is expected, he pointed out. Buyers consider it likely that prices on the longer mohair and fall wool will later show some increase, but not enough to justify shearing.



THE S. S. LEVIATHAN.

The S. S. Leviathan is the largest passenger ship on the seas. A few interesting points about this wonderful ship:

She is 950 feet long, 184 feet high and can average better than 23 knots per hour. She has a gross registered tonnage of 59,956.65. She can accommodate 3,042 passengers. Just think of some town of 3,000 or more people and imagine the whole town on a trip aboard this monster passenger ship. In refitting this wonderful ship 20,000 yards of carpet were used, 3,000 yards of Oriental rugs; there are 15,000 electric lamps, 500 miles of electric wiring, and 600 telephones. Over 60,000 pieces of silverware make up the silver service, 50,000 of flat ware and 10,000 of hollow ware. It's hard to visualize a line of silverware over seven miles long, but that of the Leviathan would reach that distance with pieces to spare. If this silverware was extended in the air it would reach in height 37 times as high as the Eiffel Tower, and about seventy times the height of the Washington monument, and almost nine thousand feet higher than Mount Everest, the highest point known on the globe. 

MILLS COUNTY GETS SOME GOOD NATIONAL PUBLICITY

Under the heading, "A Good Place To Live," the following article appeared in the last issue of "The Earth," the Santa Fe's national paper, read most extensively by prospective homeseekers all over America:

"Mills County is located in the geographical center of the State of Texas. Goldthwait, the county seat, is a live city of nearly 2,000 population and it has a Chamber of Commerce which is actively co-operating with the farmers and stockmen. Eighty per cent of the farmers of Mills County own their own farms, and the soil is well adapted to cotton, corn, oats, wheat, maize, and all kinds of fruit. Melons of the best kind are grown there. Poultry raising is a big industry in Mills County and dairying is coming to the front. Bee culture is also profitable. The climate is ideal and contagion is little known. Mills county has a fine system of consolidated rural schools that compare favorably with the best in the state. Goldthwait has two strong banks, recent statements showing combined capital of \$175,000 and deposits of \$708,907. The people of Mills County are happy and prosperous, showing that it is a good place in which to live."

SUPPLEMENTARY NOTES CONCERNING THE GOLDTHWAITE FAMILY IN U. S.

A sequel to the interesting article contributed by Mr. Clements might further interest our readers in the antecedents of the Goldthwaite history in Massachusetts, my native state.

Throughout New England in general the name is frequently encountered in the commercial activities and professional spheres. A former pupil of mine in the public schools of Rutland, Mass. Mrs. Esther (Goldthwaite) Lovering, furnished me the following data from a long genealogical list:

Samuel Goldthwaite was born in Salem, Mass., March 5, 1668; married Mary Thomas in 1696. Was an inkeeper and farmer and farmer. A brother Ezekiel is mentioned and these two eventually settled in 1714 in what is now known as Winchester, Mass. Goldthwaite Brook divided the land of these two brothers.

An extensive family perpetuated the name, and at the Revolutionary period, nearly a century later, the many descendants are active participants.

Viz: — Timothy Goldthwaite, born in Stoughton, Mass., in 1762, died in 1827. Enlisted in Col. Crane's Regiment and served throughout entire war, was clerk to his father, who was captain of the regiment. Later served in war of 1812. Moved to Augusta, Maine, about 1800, where he was the owner of several hundred acres of land (possibly grants from government owing to military service), where three of his sons had later homesteads.

Many later descendants appear on the list, who radiated over various parts of New England and Canada; though in the latter case boundary disputes seems to have caused all the Yankee Goldthwaites to evacuate British territory.

My informant states that it is a tradition held with much proof that all descendants of the Goldthwaite name in the United States originated there in New England during the Colonial period prior to the French and Indian War (1763.)

Any further contribution on the article, I trust, will some time appear in the Eagle from the Southern branch.



FIRES AS AN INDEX TO INDUSTRIAL CONDITIONS



A NEW index of business conditions, especially in certain industries, has been discovered. When there is a marked increase in the number of fires in the establishments of a given industry, it will be found that business in that industry is in bad condition. This assertion is made by Frank R. Morgaridge, who directs the work of the Committee on Incendiarism and Arson of the National Board of Fire Underwriters and is probably the leading authority in the world on the subject.

years that when business is good, fires decrease and when business is bad, fires increase, he said.

"The figures are there to prove the conclusion. You cannot deny the obvious fact which they prove. Moral hazard is something which cannot be measured, but it must be reckoned with, and it behooves us all to work together toward suppression of this crime."

The committee is working with local authorities in all parts of the country to assist them in investigating cases of incendiarism. In a number of cities, the Police Departments have organized special Arson Squads; Detroit, St. Louis, Dallas and Norfolk being notable examples. Influenced by the large number of incendiary fires in New York City, its District Attorney has created a special department for the investigation and prosecution of this class of crime, appointing an Assistant District Attorney for this special purpose.

Mr. Morgaridge ascribes the existence of moral hazard in fire insurance to the general break-down of morals in the past few years, pointing out that never before were failures from dishonesty, robberies and all sorts of crime so prevalent. Insurance companies, he says, are doing everything they can to minimize insurance of suspicious risks.

In addition to three fat yearlings that were slaughtered for the occasion, pies, cakes, chicken, and other good things were spread Thursday and Friday on a long table shaded by a brush arbor. Even the most timid old maid had the privilege of eating plenty, and bashful preachers ate until their sides hurt. Nobody went away from Center Point hungry. Many people that were

not Baptists brought dinner, and helped entertain. Our hats are off to the Center Point community. We meet next year with Center City. The session ended with a good old time hand shaking.





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
