W. L. BURKS ANNOUNCES FOR PUBLIC WEIGHER OF PRECINCTS 1, 3 AND 4

W. L. Burks, the present incumbent, this week authorized the Eagle to announce his candidacy for re-election to the office of public weigher, Precincts Nos. 1, 2 and 4, subject to the action of the Democratic primary in July.

Mr. Burks needs no introduction to the people of Mills County, he having been connected with his present position for many years and having always discharged the duties of the office to the entire satisfaction of his constituents.

Mr. Burks, while he does not contemplate any opposition in his race, takes this method of thanking his friends for their favors in the past and soliciting their continued support and votes.

WORLD'S NEWS IN BRIEF.

Oil Inquiry.—The government oil investigation has cost the U. S. thus far over \$100,000, members of the public lands committee have estimated. The highest item was the payment of \$16,000, exclusive of expenses, to the two geologists who went to Teapot Dome and made a report on drainage conditions to the committee.

Investigation.—An investigation into the fitness of George B. Christian, secretary to the late President Harding, to serve as a member of the federal trade commission, was launched in Washington last Saturday before the Senate interstate commerce commission.

Drilling Stopped.—Cessation of drilling operations in the Teapot Dome and the Elks Hill naval reserve and the possibility of the state of California being drawn into the oil controversy to defend patents held by the Standard Oil Company were outstanding developments last Saturday in the oil scandal of the far west.

Recount Ballots.—A recount of the ballots cast in the Texas Senatorial election of 1922, was started Monday afternoon in Washington by the senate elections committee, as a preliminary step to public hearings on the contest to unseat Senator Earle B. Mayfield, democrat, of Texas. Ballot boxes are opened in the presence of Mayfield's counsel, attorneys for George E. B. Peddy, the contestant, and senate officials.

Relations.—Norwegian diplomatic recognition of the existing soviet government of Russia was officially announced the first of the week.

Boll Weevils.—A New Orleans dispatch says confirmation of reports that the cold weather had killed many boll weevil was had last week in a conference between the government experiment station expert and Clarence Ousley, director of the National Boll Weevil Control Association.

ESTIMATED WEALTH OF THE STATE OF TEXAS

Washington, D. C., Feb. 21.—The Department of Commerce announces, for the State of Texas, its preliminary estimate of the value, December 31, 1922 of the principal forms of wealth, the total amounting to \$9,850,896,000, as compared with \$6,298,246,000 in 1912, an increase of 56.4 per cent. Per capital values increased from \$1,541 to \$2,010, or 30.4 per cent.

All classes of property increased in value from 1912 to 1922, except live stock, which decreased from \$394,904,000 to \$327,807,000, or 17.0 per cent. The estimated value of taxed real property and improvements increased from \$3,300,397,000 to \$5,564,437,000, or 68.6 per cent; exempt real property from \$307,667,000 to \$398,169,000, or 29.4 per cent; farm implements and machinery from \$62,123,000 to \$105,892,000, or 70.5 per cent; manufacturing machinery, tools, and implements from \$109,869,000 to \$208,339,000, or 89.6 per cent; and railroads and their equipment from \$519,764,000 to \$640,968,000, or 23.3 per cent. Value of motor vehicles in Texas for 1922 was estimated at \$189,731,000.

REV. LEE DOING NICELY AFTER OPERATION; REGULAR SERVICES SUNDAY
