Clean-Up & Paint-Up

Let's Clean Up and Beautify Goldthwaite

Following its usual custom, the Eagle this week begins its annual Clean-up, Paint-Up and Build Campaign. Backed by the public-spirited citizens of the town, the Mayor, the President of the Chamber of Commerce, the Ladies Clubs and the State Department of Health, the Eagle believes that this year will be a banner one in beautifying the city. The low mortality rate, the fact that very little, if any, typhoid fever ever attacks our citizens, can be directly attributed to the efforts made by the residents each Spring in removing the winter's accumulation of rubbish and the painting and disinfecting of the homes and out-buildings. Fly-screens play an important part in the health of the community and every householder should carefully look to the screening of his windows and doors BEFORE the fly season begins.

The clearing of the streets and alleys, vacant lots, and yards of all rubbish, dead weeds, etc., will almost eliminate the breeding places of the deadly mosquitoes and flies and the painting and disinfecting of them will absolutely remove it. All stagnant water should be drained if possible, and if not possible kerosene should be poured into it regularly.

The Mayor has very courteously offered the services of the city trash wagons in removing the rubbish if it is piled in convenient places, and every citizen should take advantage of it.

ELECTION NOTICE.

Notice is hereby given that on the first Tuesday in April, the same being the first day of April, 1924, a city election will be held in the City of Goldthwaite for the purpose of electing a Mayor, three Aldermen, a Tax Assessor and Collector, a City Secretary and Attorney, and a City Treasurer.

The Development of Our Railway Net in Texas

Railroad Building After 1870.

The second source of State aid consisted of land grants. Beginning with 1852 there was a brief period of special land grants to railroads. By the terms of these acts, when a company had completed 5 miles or more of road it might receive 8 sections of land for every mile of road that had been finished. In 1854, a law was passed providing that whenever a company had completed 35 miles of road acceptably, it should be entitled to receive 16 sections of land for each mile of road completed. This act was continued in force until 1869. Under it 40 new companies were chartered, but only nine built sufficient mileage to obtain land from the State. The statute also provided that the roads should sell the land within a given period of time. Before 1860 the Harrisburg line sold 588,800 acres, donated to it by the State, for an average price of 18c per acre, or for the sum total of \$106,800.

The Civil War checked railway construction and not until 1870 was it resumed to any appreciable extent. That year 128 miles were built. In 1880, 653 miles were built. 1881 was the banner year of railroad construction in Texas, there being laid 1,669 miles. 1882 saw 1,096 miles completed. The next best year was 1887 with 946 miles. In the year 1891, Texas had 8,000 miles of railroad. That is to say, within a period of 20 years there had been constructed in Texas more than 8,000 miles of road. The most of this was built ahead of the traffic, much of it into the frontier, even in advance of population.

Let us now inquire how this vast performance was accomplished in a new country and so sparsely settled as was Texas from 1870 till 1890. The sources of aid were much the same as before the Civil War, but differing in some respects. Individual gifts continued to be negligible, as compared with the sum total, and were important in defraying preliminary expenses. Stock subscriptions were perhaps less important than before the Civil War, because of the difficulty of paying for the stock. There was no longer slave labor which could be exchanged for such stock. City and county bonds were a fairly important source of revenue. The following were some of the issues for the benefit of railroad construction:

April 30, 1873, Tyler voted \$50,000 of bonds for the benefit of the Houston & Great Northern.
Feb. 12, 1874, Sherman voted \$84,300 in bonds for the benefit of the Texas & Pacific.
April 24, 1874, Dallas voted \$100,000 of bonds for the benefit of the Texas & Pacific.
June 6, 1876, Waxahachie voted \$64,000 of bonds for the benefit of the

Houston & Texas Central.
In 1872, Smith County voted \$200,000 of bonds for the benefit of the Houston and Great Northern.
In 1875, Galveston County voted \$500,000 of bonds for the benefit of the Santa Fe.
It is doubtful if as much as \$1,500,000 was secured in this way before a Legislature passed a law forbidding use of municipal credit for the benefit of railway construction.

THE SECOND OF FOUR ARTICLES

FRRIEND and fellow-singer in the opera with Caruso, the greatest of all tenors, revealed the other day a little trick of this great artist to get the utmost of beauty out of his notes. Fundamentally, he had to have the organ to work with, of course, and the technic to manipulate it, but he then brought psychology to his aid. Whenever he took one of those deep inhalations before uttering his note, he always carried in his mind the idea and picture of a wonderfully beautiful rose held in his hand—a great, full-bodied and luscious rose—whose fragrance he was inhaling. Thus, the beauty of the rose, through his imagination, was translated into sound.

In which there is perfectly sound beauty-theory which may be applied in many ways. A man died in New York a few weeks ago, quite famous in his line. He was an artist, and his work may be seen in many important public galleries. Nature had endowed him with the most grotesque features that were perhaps ever put on a human being. He had jowls like the dew-laps of a bloodhound; a nose like the claw of a boiled lobster in size, shape and color; ears that were like nothing but huge oysters, and he was as bald as an apple. Yet another artist, in speaking of him one day, said, "I think he's the most beautiful man, probably,

American born, and more beautiful, because of the charm of her expression than because of regularity of features.

in the world." Note that he did not say "handsome," because there's a vast difference between real beauty and what we call "handsome."

Why did this artist think this of the man with the face that made one think of crustaceans and bivalves? Because this man had a soul so beautiful that he found his Heaven right here and took every one with whom he came into contact right into it with him. Nobody ever saw the grotesque features, or, if they did, they associated them with the real beauty that looked out from behind them, through the kindness of the eyes and in the deeply graven lines expressive of a life-time of human sympathy and understanding. He was often sought by his fellow-artists when they wanted to create a face portraying true beauty of character and soul, and he has been preserved in marble and bronze.

There's a famous European artist in this country at the present time who is here to paint the most beautiful women he can find in America. As yet he has not selected a single one of "the ten most famous beauties" as a model. "I don't want to paint dolls," he has said. "I want to paint women with real souls and character."

Also, there's a famous beauty who is what we used to call "a show girl," and the term is absolutely descriptive. Her features are undoubtedly perfect,

and there is no doubt that she is as beautiful as is claimed. Yet her face is a mask, animated only because she carries it around with her. What may lie behind it is unknown, not that it is inscrutable, but that it tells nothing of character. It is simply sculptured beauty in line and contour, worked in flesh instead of in marble or clay. Compare it with that of another, also an actress, who has never been featured as a great beauty but upon whom the eye can rest with real pleasure. Ruth Shepley's face may not be perfect from the point of view of line and contour, and regularity of feature,

more, and, because she was known to be generous, she carried the burdens of many others as well—but because she made it a rule of her life not to admit worry and care and discontent into the scheme of her existence.

She often told her friends and lecture audiences how every day of her life she made it a practice to say "Good morning to God," by which she meant that instead of tumbling lazily out of bed with a frown she always went at once to an open window and gave her thanks to God for all good things. So she filled her mind with good thoughts instead of peevish ones with which to start the day, and also her lungs with the cleanest air that was available. So she chose colors with which to surround herself which were in harmony with her inner being, and carried out this plan consistently, even to the color of her toilet soaps and the corresponding scent.

Which opens up a little thought of what used to be considered as "occult," but which now is known to be a part of the real scheme of things. A physician in a large southern city, who may not want his name used because his thought is very far from being "orthodox," recently wrote to a prominent firm of unresponsive soap manufacturers suggesting to them that they bring out a toilet soap which should have different colors and odors to be used by people according to the color of their birth month, the color to be that of the best of the month and the color to be that of the corresponding flower.

"For," he wrote, in urging his suggestion as a positive aid to health, "the flower modelled on the side will be the symbol of the clean living we are to follow, for the flower is conceived in pure, passionless love and stretches its origin back to the fount of life."

He went even further and suggested that every child born into the world should be surrounded from its beginning with its proper color in all the little intimacies of life with which it first comes into contact in order to create a harmonious existence. "It should be taught to use a soap," he said, "which is colored and faintly scented in harmony with its being."

The soundest beauty philosophy was once expressed in a bill-board advertisement, which is no longer to be seen, advertising a condensed milk and showed a beautiful pastoral scene with cows grazing placidly in the foreground. It bore the line: — milk, from contented cows.

Which expressed a perfectly well-thought to the mind will have this known psychological fact, that the attitude of the mind is reflected in the physical well-being. Anger in a mother has been known so to poison the milk for a nursing child that it died. If the admission of discordant thoughts to the mind will have this physical effect, is it to be wondered at that the thinking of unbecoming thoughts will be registered on the beautiful face? And is it really true that the constant holding of beautiful thoughts will produce beauty?

Pyorrhea Weakens Entire System; It Can Be Cured

In studying the effects of pyorrhea on the general system, it is well to bear in mind that the human body is like a highly complex machine, and that if one part breaks down and is unable to carry out its ordained function, sooner or later it will impair the working of the whole system. Let us take the various parts of the body commonly affected:

1. Digestive System.—The mouth being the entrance to the alimentary canal and by means of the teeth, tongue and salivary glands preparing the food for digestion, it follows that, if the teeth and gums are so tender, owing to an attack of pyorrhea, these parts are unable to function. The result is that the food passes into the stomach in an unprepared state, together with the pus which has been formed in the affected gums. In time dyspepsia is produced and later may lead to a dilation of the stomach, with its attendant miseries. Appendicitis is very often concurrent with pyorrhea and it is quite possible that in many cases it is caused by disordered digestion.

2. Joints, Muscles, Tendons and Ligaments.—These important anatomical structures are so frequently involved and the causes of their affection traced to tissues around the teeth, periodontal disease, that an examination of the mouth in such cases should take first place. It is hardly necessary to labour the point by pointing out how frequently sufferers from rheumatoid arthritis and muscular rheumatism have been entirely cured by removal of the disease in the gums and teeth.

3. Skin.—The skin of the face may be spotted with pustules. Small ulcers appear on the lips and occasionally painful fissures at the angle of the mouth. These are probably the result of direct infection from the affected gums.

4. Blood.—The change in the composition of the blood, when the white corpuscles are increased and the haemoglobin index is reduced, is known as anaemia and is due to the absorption of the toxins produced in the mouth. A more serious form called pernicious anaemia has been noted in cases of long standing toxic absorption. When the bacteria have entered the blood stream the condition is known as septicaemia and is extremely grave.

5. The Nervous System.—This takes the form of neuritis and the nerves commonly affected are those in the back of the head, neck, jaws and arms. Headaches are frequent with a general feeling of depression. Pain in the eyes with impaired vision has been noted in many cases and the condition cured by attention to the mouth.

BAPTIST MISSIONS GREATLY EXTENDED

THE WORK ON FOREIGN FIELDS SHOWS LARGE EXPANSION FROM FORWARD MOVEMENT

NEW COUNTRIES ENTERED

Southern Forces Now Have Missionary Fields on Every Side of Globe With Audience of 900,000,000.



DR. J. F. LOVE, Sec. Foreign Mission Board

Indicating the extent to which the foreign mission work of the Southern Baptist Convention has been set forward by the larger proceeds that have come to it from the Baptist 75 Million Campaign, Dr. J. F. Love, secretary of the Foreign Mission Board, reports that since 1919, when the Campaign was projected, the following increases in the work of that board have been made: Number of foreign missionaries on the field has increased from 328 to 549, number of native workers from 627 to 2,820, number of churches from 505 to 891, number of church members from 49,659 to 103,328, number of self-supporting churches from 143 to 211, number of baptisms per year from 5,635 to 12,611, number of Sunday schools from 760 to 1,447, number of Sunday school pupils from 36,115 to 67,407, number of day schools from 512 to 796, number of pupils in day schools from 15,722 to 32,789, and contributions per year from \$173,372 to \$437,568.

Baptisms Gain Rapidly
Nearly as many persons have been baptized by the missionaries on the foreign fields since the Campaign began as had been baptized during all the seventy-five years of missionary operations prior to the inception of this movement, Dr. Love reports. This does not include Russia, where more than one million members have come into the Baptist churches in recent years. Nearly one-fourth as many persons were baptized on the foreign fields last year as there were members, all told, on the foreign fields when the Campaign began.

At the time the Campaign began Southern Baptists were operating only in Mexico, Brazil, Argentina, Chile, Uruguay, China, Japan, Africa and Italy. As a result of the larger proceeds made available from the Campaign the board has been enabled to enter the new fields of Spain, Jugoslavia, Hungary, Roumania, and Russia in Europe, and Palestine and Siberia in Asia. This gives to Southern Baptists a total missionary audience of 900,000,000, or more than one-half the total population of the globe.

Older Fields Re-Enforced
But of more significance than the entry into these new fields is the re-

Reinforcement that has come to the work in the older fields, in the estimation of the officials of the Foreign Mission Board. This reinforcement consists not only in sending out many new workers but providing larger equipment in the way of church houses, mission residences, schools, hospitals, orphanages, publishing houses and the like. Summarizing the growth that has come in the forces on the older fields since the Campaign began the following results are pointed out:

Number of churches, 76% increase; number of church members, 108% increase; number of church buildings, 45% increase; number of schools, 55% increase; number of pupils, 108% increase; number of residences for missionaries, 94% increase; number of foreign missionaries, 63% increase; number of native missionaries, 264% increase; number of hospital buildings, 21% increase; number of treatments given, 61% increase; number of hospital beds, 104% increase.

Much Remains To Be Done
With all the increases that have come in the foreign mission work only a portion of the program that was contemplated for foreign missions as a result of the Campaign has been accomplished as yet. It is in the hope of completing this program through more effectively equipping the work and workers on both the older fields and the new ones that the representatives of the Foreign Mission Board are cooperating with those of the 75 Million Campaign in an effort to complete the payments of all subscriptions to this movement at this time.

timated at 600,000, to introduce
efficiency into the homes of
the United States, where fully
one-third of the home women of
the country do their own work.
American homes more at
to promote the physical
development of Amer-
ican children by improving their
home environment, to stimulate
judicious purchasing for home im-
provement, and to mobilize com-
munity pride for a common object
—pride of home.
Better Homes week will take
place from May 11 to May 15,
when hundreds of communities
throughout the nation will foster
the public education in the funda-
mentals of home-making by Bet-
ter Homes demonstrations. Com-
munities in every state in the
Union have already signified their
intention of taking part in these
demonstrations, the purpose of
which is to sow seeds which will
reap a harvest of better homes
throughout the United States. Ap-
proximately 1000 such demonstra-
tions were held 1923, and it is ex-
pected that the number will be
greatly increased this year.
"I commend participation in
Better Homes demonstrations and
in the other work of the move-
ment," President Coolidge said in
a recent letter to Secretary Hoover.

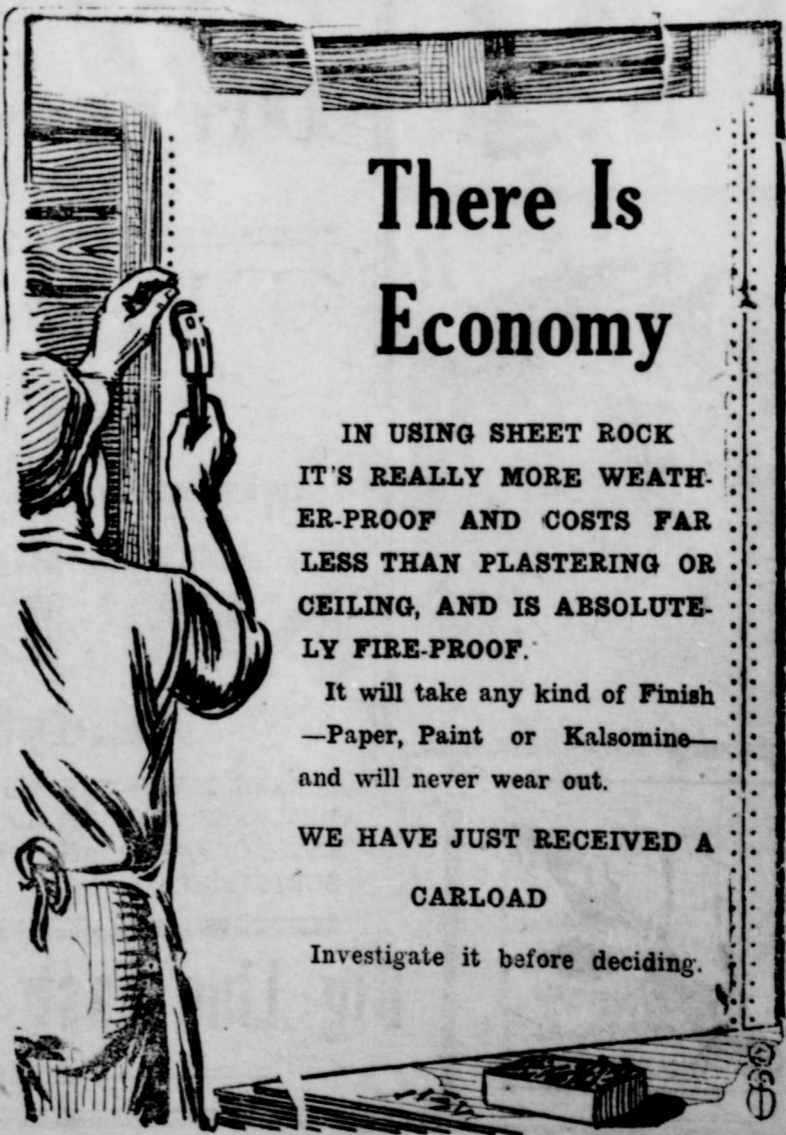

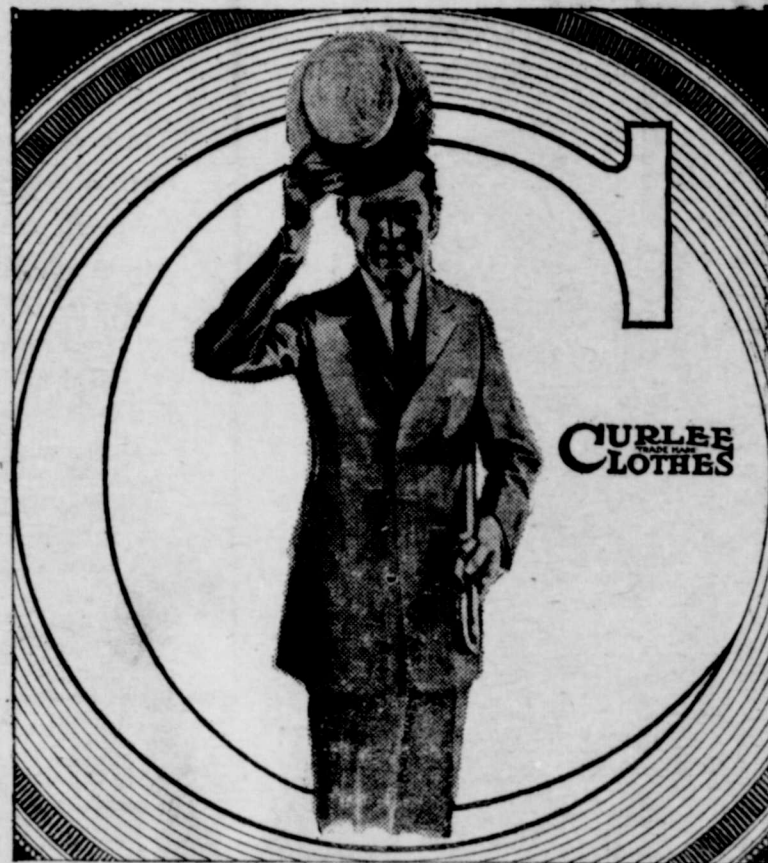

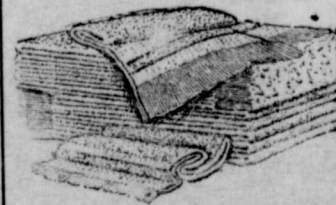
