TEXAS COTTON REPORT, FOR AUG. 16-61 PER CT.

Division of Crop Estimates, U. S. Dept. of Agriculture, August 16 Cotton report for Texas:

The condition of the Texas cotton crop on August 16 was estimated at 61 per cent of normal, or 5 points below the condition on Aug. 1. On July 25, 1923, the figure was 66 per cent, but had fallen to 55 per cent on Aug. 25. Since it is unusual for the crop to show a reduction of 10 to 12 points during August, a further used in increasing our seed from points during August, a further the selected bolls to the thousands drop of around 6 points during the remainder of the month is possible without materially lowering the number of bales indicated at this date.

Based upon the 61 per cent condition, a total production of 4,-433,000 bales is forecast for Texas. The U. S. condition is 64.9 per cent and 12,956,000 bales are indieated. The census report shows 148.645 running bales ginned from the crop of 1924 prior to

August 16. T. J. Harrison, who estimates the Mills County crop for the department, sent in this county's percentage as 60, based on an average of three bolls to the stalk and generally small bolls. The condition this year is .06 per cent better than at the same time last year, with ten per cent more as e age. However, a general rain fell on Aug. 26 last year which added many bales to the crop.


