## CONTROLLING THE COTTON FLEA

**How to Get Sulphur and How to Apply It to Infected Cotton**  
The cotton flea, or cotton hopper, is injuring cotton more extensively this season than ever before. This statement is issued as an aid to efforts now being made to disseminate information as to the best methods of controlling the insect and to direct attention to readily available sources of sulphur, which material is recommended by authorities for controlling the insect.

### Habits of Flea

It is known the cotton flea feeds and breeds on wild plants in the early spring. When the wild plants mature and die, the flea moves to the cotton plant. They are particularly injurious to the small, newly formed squares. Under heavy infestation the cotton plant thus damaged, shoots up to unusual height as is the case when boll weevils remove the fruit.

Concerning the appearance of the flea this year, the U. S. Department of Agriculture from its Delta Laboratory at Tallulah, La., said in a circular letter of June 26 Weather conditions this spring throughout the cotton belt were favorable for the growth of certain weed plants on which the cotton hopper feeds and breeds. These weeds are principally horse-mint, eroton and evening primrose, upon which hoppers have been found in large numbers. Certain of these weeds have reached maturity and are dying out and as a result hoppers are transferring to cotton, in many localities, in great numbers.

### Control Method

Practically no experiment work has been done to control the cotton flea. Thus far the results justify only the use of flour of sulphur or refined sulphur. Arsenical poisons have not proven satisfactory.

Authorities are recommending that 6 to 8 pounds of sulphur be applied per acre, the application to be repeated every four or five days until the damage ceases. All applications should be made in the morning while the dew is still on the cotton.

Where the boll weevil is also present, the sulphur can be mixed with calcium arsenate on a half and half basis, but the amount of dust then put out should be twice in bulk that used for either insect.

Sulphur may be applied with any dusting machine used for boll weevil control work, and in the absence of a dusting machine it can be put on with a dust bag.

### Sources of Sulphur

Fertilizer manufacturers who make sulphuric acid use sulphur and usually have a stock on hand or can readily obtain a supply. The local fertilizer dealer should therefore, be able to meet local demands.

Insecticide manufacturers and their dealers also are in position to make quick deliveries.

### Co-operation

Wherever the cotton flea is widespread, farmers should cooperate and get a local dealer to order by carload. This would doubtless result in a saving and should insure prompt shipping and delivery.

Manufacturers, bankers and others should assist the farmers wherever possible to get sulphur and to supply them with information as to its proper use in controlling this insect.

The hopper is a very small insect, usually greenish in color, but sometimes rather yellowish or grayish, but easily seen with the naked eye, when present in large

numbers in a cotton field. The adults will readily appear like small white gnats, darting among the plants when they are disturbed. Before developing wings the hoppers are small green bugs, reminding one somewhat of plant lice. They remain on the plant and may often be discovered with their beaks inserted in small squares from which they extract the sap.

It is thought that the hoppers are damaging the crop in Mills county. Farmers are requested to keep close watch for the pest and report findings to the County Agent.

**PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 9.**

A resolution proposing an amendment to Art. 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas by changing Section 3, eliminating the provision authorizing the Legislature to create special districts and making an appropriation therefor.

**Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:**

Section 1. That Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution be so changed as to read as follows: (creating new Section.)

"Section 3. One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State Occupation taxes and poll tax of one dollar on every inhabitant of the State, between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools; and in addition thereto, there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount not to exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred (\$100.00) dollars valuation, as with the available school fund arising from all other sources, will be sufficient to maintain and support the public schools of this State for a period of not less than six months in each year; and it shall be the duty of the State Board of Education to set aside a sufficient amount out of the said tax to provide free text books for the use of children attending the public free schools of this State; provided, however, that should the limit of taxation herein named be insufficient the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the State and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts by general laws; and all such school districts may embrace parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts and for the management and control of the public school or schools of such districts, whether such districts are composed of territory wholly within a county or in parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school districts heretofore formed or hereafter formed,

for the further maintenance of public free schools, and for the erection and equipment of school buildings therein; provided that a majority of the qualified property tax paying voters of the district voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax not to exceed in any one year one (1.00) dollar on the hundred dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the limitation upon the amount of the school district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts, nor to independent or common school districts created by general or special law."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1926, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "For the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provision which authorizes the Legislature to create special school districts," and all those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "Against the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provision which authorizes the Legislature to create special school districts."

Section 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Section 4. That the sum of two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

**PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION**

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 7.**

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Section 33 and Section 40 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas so as to permit officers of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States to hold public office in Texas.

**Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:**

Section 1. That Section 33 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"The accounting officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States; except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States."

Section 2. That Section 40 Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"No person shall hold or exercise, at the same time, more than one civil office of emolument, except that of Justice of the Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, Officer of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, unless otherwise specially provided herein. Provided, that nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to prohibit an officer, or enlisted man of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve,

or an officer in the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, or an enlisted man in the Organized Reserves of the United States from holding in conjunction with such office, or any other office, or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States.

Section 3. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday in November, A. D. 1926, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"For the Constitutional amendment permitting officers and enlisted men of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, and officers of the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States and enlisted men of the Organized Reserves of the United States to hold other offices or positions of honor, trust or profit under this State or the United States," and

"Against the Constitutional amendment permitting officers and enlisted men of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, and officers of the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, and enlisted men of the Organized Reserves of the United States, to hold other offices or positions of honor, trust or profit under this State or the United States."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 4. The Governor shall issue the necessary Proclamation for said election, and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law.

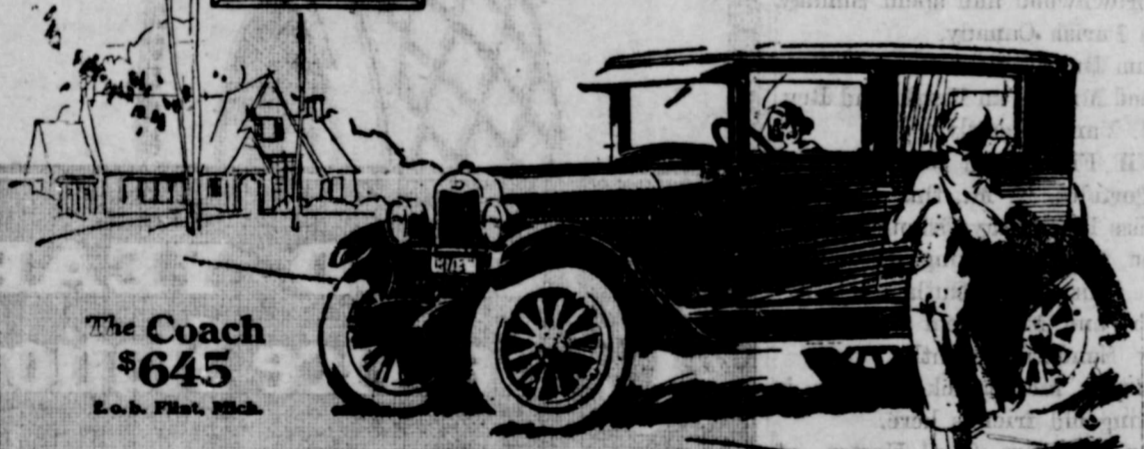

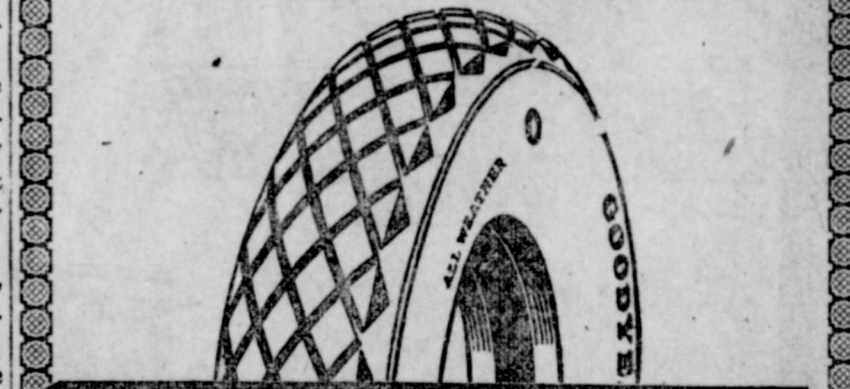

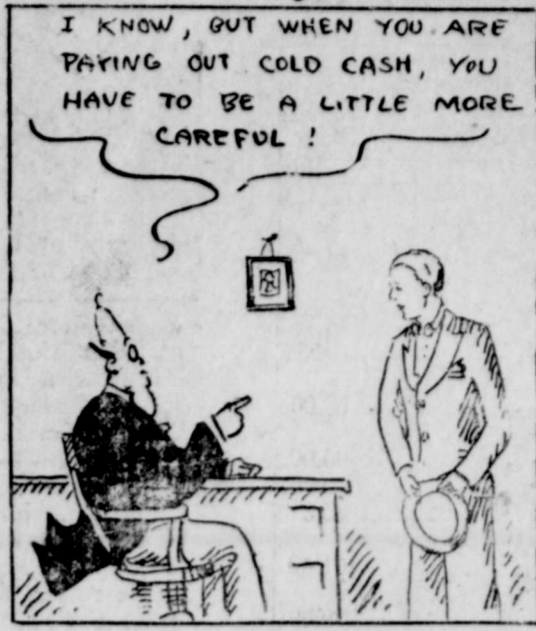

## TO MR. SAM SAY

More Push and More Push

I can hardly permit the sayings of Sam Say to pass without another say of my own pointing out to Sam that his say also brings him into deep water, even deeper, according to my yardstick than what he accused me of jumping into.

Sam says: "I would point out as a first thing, that religious denominations, as I know them, encourage scientific investigation."

Please give historical references Sam. No doubt this is true because you say so, but the great masses of the people have never read such a declaration in history; hence, that declaration is, as it comes from your pencil, a dogmatic assertion. I dislike dogma quite as much as you dislike theories and hypothesis.

You demand truth, not theory and hypothesis. Now, Sam, is there any other road to truth save those of theory and hypothesis, reasonable conclusions and conjectures? You seem so hostile to these means of reaching the truth that I fancy you will resent truth brought to you over these, the only roads by which truth has ever been brought into argument; that great fund of truth that science has accumulated. When you declare blocked and condemned every road by which truth may reach the human mind, then you stalk off from this point and arrogantly demand that we bring you truth, not conjectures, theories and hypothesis. Conjectures, hypothesis, theories and reasonable conclusions have always been, and are yet, the forerunners of truths, just as much as John the Baptist was the forerunner of Christ.

Now, Sam, here is where you jumped into deep water: Give us a comprehensive definition of truth, also tell us how to get it to you after you have blockaded and condemned all the roads by which we may bring it in. Wade out of this water, or swim out if it is too deep to wade and rescue the rest of us and we will guarantee you a hero medal.

To quote you further: "Everywhere the church is saying to the scientist, 'Go on, my friend, go right on. The more truth you find the better for all of us.'" You say the churches everywhere are saying this. Sam, there are many churches. Name me ten, five, yes, name one, and it will suffice to raise the presumption that probably there should be a suspicion of truth attached to your declaration. Otherwise, you are likely to be judged completely void of that virtue, truth, you demand others to bring you.

Now, Sam, you entirely missed the aim in your good friend's article. I made no effort to establish the origin of man according to the evolution theory. The only effort I made was to point out how man was created from the dust of the earth, and what thought the writer of Genesis intended to convey, according to my very limited power of reasoning.

First, I never have been satisfied with what I must call a dogma: namely that God made man from literal dust. In the first place, the language can hardly be adjudged to convey such a meaning when analyzed closely. "To create" means "to construct from apparently nothing", at least, nothing visible to our ordinary senses. Now, if man was constructed of the dust of the earth, he was not created at all, but was built from something previously created. So the assertion that he was created from literal dust would appear bad or false; first, for the reason above stated, and second, because it puts the Creator in the class with human mechanic or artist using hands in building or constructing the objects of his will, just like man does. Yet, the text is absolutely true. Man does come from the dust of the earth; is created from the dust of the earth, and not built out of literal dust. There is a difference between creating a thing and building a thing out of a product already created. Creating is an act of God. Constructing an object from stuff already created, is not creating, but building.

Again, the creation of man, modern man, can be traced through all its processes by the ordinary high school pupil from a germ the size of an ordinary pin head to the full-grown and nature body. But without that sustenance and that nourishment which comes from the dust of the earth, the ordinary school boy knows that the germ at the beginning cannot be developed. So

all of man, even the germ through which the species are perpetuated, come from the dust of the earth, to use the language of the text.

The Lord didn't say to Adam alone, "Dust thou art," but to the whole species of mankind. Adam was flesh and blood as we are, we are created from dust of earth for therein we know, is round that nourishment which makes the body grow. We are not created out of the rocks, and the gravel, but out of the nourishment that is concealed therein and is only brought forth through those agencies the Creator set in operation for that purpose. If God has the power to create man today from the dust of the earth, and He has, for He is doing it, He also had the power in Adam's day. If He were able to continue the reproduction of the species for thousands of years, then He was also able to produce a menas sustains mankind. He was not for bringing in the first species, which is properly believed to be Adam, and also produce his female mate and plant in the two the seed of perpetuation.

Whether He operated His scheme according to the theory of evolution, I do not know or attempt to say. However, I am sure He had the power to do so if He willed.

Now, Sam, you say that all fear that science will dig up a truth that will hurt the church has long ago passed, and the church says, get it, Mr. Scientist, bring all the truth you can, we want it all. I will say both to you and to the religious organizations: You know or you say you know, that the only roads we have found to truth are reasonable conjectures, hypothesis, reasonable conclusions, etc. If you don't teach the rising generation to develop truth by these routes, they will not be able to bring any more truths to augment that splendid supply that the tireless scientist has gleaned from the great mass of rubbish he has thrashed out.

Of course, you have forgotten the Scopes trial conducted at Dayton, Tennessee, only last summer, in which no less a churchman than William Jennings Bryan volunteered to come clear from Florida to Tennessee to aid in presenting a science teacher for teaching a theory, which at the most, could only upset a religious dogma.

Now in conclusion, let me state a truth that I have gleaned from observation and reading and that is, that the priesthood and clergy have universally pushed to the background theories, hypothesis, reasonable conclusions and conjectures that threatened religious dogma.

I take it for granted that religious truth has nothing to fear from any other truth in existence or that may ever be brought to light. It is the halo of all truths and no true Christian fears that it can be either exterminated or wounded by such impotent factors as false theories, lame hypothesis or crippled conjectures.

Throw open the door to all investigation, all theories, all reasonable conjectures. If they succeed in bringing truth, religion will profit much more than it will lose by reason of their error or the explosion of religious dogma.

Religious dogma is the seed of intolerance, the nourishment of infidelity, the fruit of narrowness, the mainspring to persecution. Why push back theories you know nothing about, theories you pronounce error without any investigation for the purpose only of saving religious dogma?

The plan of creation is laid bare in all nature, with all species of creatures in existence, and God is still the motive power in the whole system. His creatures, those who are sufficiently intellectual and industrious, are endeavoring to bring in more truth. Why condemn or persecute those who would rescue more gems from the fountain of truth, because you fancy they have brought forth an error? We must pit both our religion and our judgment of mundane things against error.

Give a reason for the hope that is within you," not a dogma.

**PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION**

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10.**

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution providing for taxation of school lands owned by counties.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended by adding after Section 6 thereof 6a, which shall read as follows:

Section 6a. All agriculture or grazing school land mentioned in Section 6 of this Article owned by any county shall be subject to taxation except for State purposes to the same extent as lands privately owned.

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1926, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon "For the Constitutional amendment providing for taxation of all agriculture or grazing school land owned by any county, to the same extent as land privately owned" and "Against the Constitutional amendment providing for taxation of all agriculture or grazing school land owned by any county to the same extent as land privately owned."

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of the proper appropriation made by law.

**PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION**

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 9.**

A Joint Resolution relating to the amending of Article 16, Section 58, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners, providing for the supervision and management of the Prison System, under such laws as may be provided for by the Legislature.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 16, Section 58, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 58. The Legislature shall have full power and authority to provide by law for the management and control of the Prison System of Texas; and to this end shall have power and authority to place the Prison System under the supervision, management and control of such trained and experienced officer, or officers, as the Legislature may from time to time provide for by law.

Section 2. The above Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a general election to be held November 3, 1926, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words "For the amendment of Article 16, Section 58, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners." And all those opposing said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words "Against the amendment of Article 16, Section 58, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners."

Section 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by law.

Section 4. The sum of \$5,000.00 or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the funds in the Treasury of the State, and not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

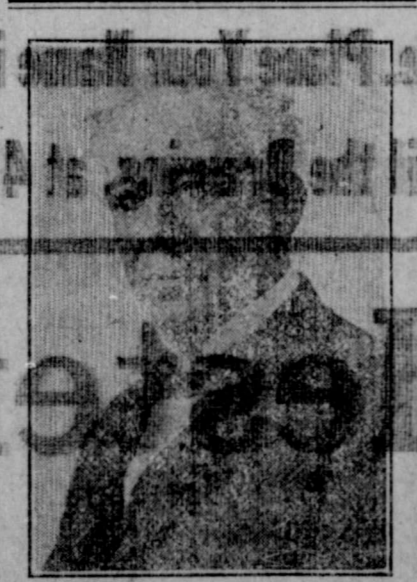
