EDWARD GEESLIN ACCEPTS POSITION WITH THE CITY OF BRADY

As a surprise to his many friends and with a feeling of regret and personal loss was the announcement that Edward Geeslin had accepted a position as manager of the municipal light and power plant at Brady and that he left the early part of this week.

When Edward Geeslin left Goldthwaite possibly the city's most progressive man left us. Liberal with his donations to every worthy cause; always in the front in matters of a civic, religious or educational significance, he gave freely of his time and worked unceasingly for the public good. In a business way Mr. Geeslin probably pioneered more businesses than any other man in Goldthwaite, taking lines not represented and adding an industry to the town.

He has for many years been manager and part owner of the local light and power company and the bottling works. He built these businesses from very small beginnings to investments of thousands of dollars.

B. F. Geeslin has sold his grain business to Joe Edwards and he and Dale Geeslin will have charge of the plant here. It is reported that a public utilities company and others are trying to buy the plant here, however, B. F. Geeslin stated that no sale had been made.

Mrs. Geeslin and the children have not yet gone to Brady, but will leave in the near future. Goldthwaite will miss Mr. and Mrs. Geeslin and will hope that they will decide to return to us.

The mechanical department of the light plant hereafter will be under the direction of Dale Geeslin who is an electrical engineer of experience, and well qualified to keep the plant in top-top shape.

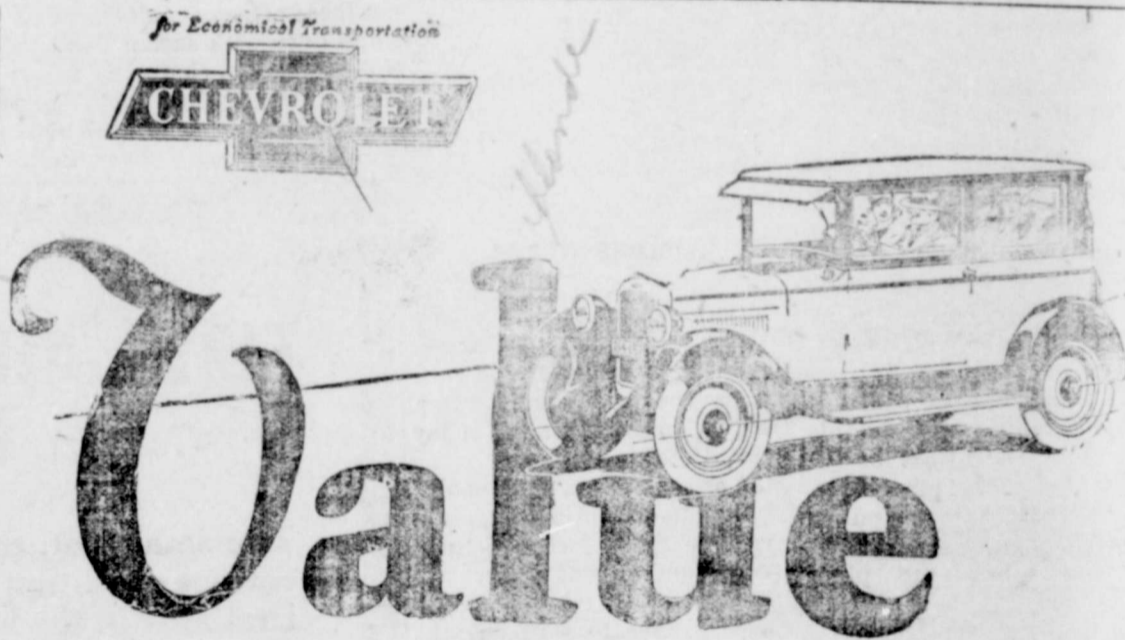

SUNDAY, OCTOBER 16, 1927

ELIJAH IN NABOTH'S VINEYARD

GOLDEN TEXT — Be sure your sin will find you out. Numbers 32: 23.

Lesson Setting and Survey

Perhaps a half dozen years have elapsed since the thrilling event on Mount Carmel. Retired from public life, Elijah is at work in the schools of the prophets. Ahab is yet to reign four years. The fiery, domineering queen Jezebel is still the power behind the throne. The city of Samaria is the metropolis and the Capital of the Ten Tribes. Northward twenty-five miles among the spurs of Mount Gilboa nestles the city of Jezreel, the favorite royal residence which has been called the "Windsor of Israel." Adjoining the palace grounds is the vineyard of Naboth, evidently one of the 7,000 who had not bowed the knee to Baal. For good reason he refuses to sell to the king. But the queen conspires to get him out of the way so that the vineyard could revert to the crown. No sooner, however, does the king take possession than lightning of justice fall upon him in the electric words of Elijah.

Lesson Text and Outline

I. THE PETULANCE OF AHAB.
5 But Jezebel his wife came to him and said unto him, Why is thy spirit so sad, that thou earnest no bread? 6 And he said unto her, Because I spake unto Naboth the Jezreelite, and

said unto him, Give me thy vineyard for money; or else, if it please thee, I will give thee another vineyard for it; and he answered and said, I will not give thee my vineyard. 7 And Jezebel his wife said unto him, Dost thou not govern the kingdom of Israel? arise, and eat bread, and let thy heart be merry: I will give thee the vineyard of Naboth the Jezreelite.

II. THE PLOT OF JEZEBEL.
8 So she wrote letters in Ahab's name, and sealed them with his seal, and sent the letters unto the elders and to nobles that were in his city, and hat dwelt with Naboth. 9 And she wrote in the letters, saying, Proclaim a fast, and set Naboth on high among the people: 10 and two men, base fellows, before him, and let them bear witness against him, and let them curse God and the king. And then carry him out, and stone him to death.

III. THE PROPHECY OF ELIJAH.
16 And it came to pass, when Ahab heard that Naboth was dead, that Ahab rose up to go down, to the vineyard of Naboth the Jezreelite, to take possession of it.

17 And the word of Jehovah came to Elijah the Tishbite, saying, 18 Arise, go down to meet Ahab king of Israel, who dwelleth in Samaria: behold, he is in the vineyard of Naboth whither he has gone to take possession of it. 19 And thou shalt speak unto him, saying, Thus saith Jehovah, Hast thou killed, and also taken possession? And thou shalt speak unto him, saying, Thus saith Jehovah, in the place where dogs licked the blood of Naboth shall dogs lick thy blood, even

thine. 20. And Ahab said to Elijah, Hast thou found me, O mine enemy? And he answered, I have found thee, because thou hast sold thyself to do which is evil in the sight of Jehovah.

Notes Analytical and Expository

1. **COVETOUSNESS** inspired the petulance of Ahab. He coveted the vineyard of Naboth. He was willing to buy or exchange for it, but Naboth on religious grounds refused to sell. This made the king sullen, angry and despondent. Childishly he threw himself upon the bed and refused to eat. Finding him stretched out upon the couch, the queen inquired the cause of the sadness. The weak king told the story of his greedy proposal and of Naboth's honest refusal. Thereupon with cutting irony Jezebel asked him if he really were monarch in Israel or in vehement confirmation urged him to assert the royal prerogative. She then bade him rise, be

cheerful and eat, adding that without cost she would secure the coveted vineyard.

2. **CRIME** was conceived in the plot of Jezebel. In the king's name and under his seal she wrote letters to the elders and chief men of Jezreel, bidding them to proclaim a fast as if some great calamity were overhanging the city for their sins. The crime she planned must have the show of religious sanctionsanction. She also ordered that Naboth be arraigned before the people and falsely accused by two reckless fellows as a blasphemer of God and a traitor to the king. Her final instructions were that Naboth should then be taken out of the city and with his sons stoned to death. Afterwards, according to law, the vineyard would be the property of the king. The authorities at Jezreel were submissive tools in the hands of Jezebel and her wicked orders were carried out.

3. **CONDEMNATION** was pronounced in the prophecy of Elijah. Hearing of the death of Naboth, Ahab made the journey from Samaria to Jezreel to take possession of the ill-gotten vineyard, perhaps enjoying it clusters and planning improvements, the dauntless Elijah, whom he had not seen in five or six years, and whom he may have thought dead, appeared suddenly before the king in obedience to divine command. Ahab shrieked: "Hast thou found me, O mine enemy?" Elijah sternly responded "I have found thee!" And then he spoke to him his doom. He declared that the dogs should lick Ahab's blood in the very spot where they had licked the blood of Naboth.



A watch ticks 5 times per second, 300 times per minute, 18000 times per hour, and 432,000 times per day. The tick is caused by the impact of the escape wheel tooth against the pallet jewels. Some high grade watches are under construction for approximately a year and require more than 3500 operations to complete them. Approximately eighty five per cent of the cost of a high grade watch is labor. Your watch should be cleaned and oiled at least every eighteen months to give the best results. If your watch misses one tick every hour, it will lose approximately 33 seconds a week. Your watch should be wound at regular time and always wind it fully up. If you should ever get your watch wet, open the case and immerse the entire watch in kerosene oil or gasoline. This will prevent the watch from rusting and save the loss of your watch. If your watch fails to tick and perform its duty as it should take it to a reliable watchmaker that has a reputation of knowing his business, and as a reliable workman and then you will get dependable service and your watch will be put in perfect order for time keeping and will last many years.
