

GRADE CROSSING ELIMINATION

The futility of attempting to reduce grade crossing accidents by eliminating the crossings is disclosed in a recent statement by Harold G. Hoffman, State Commissioner of Motor Vehicles of New Jersey.

According to Mr. Hoffman. we have spent \$180,000,000 in the last three years in eliminating crossings. Despite this, the number of crossings is steadily increasing because of the construction of new highways.

Adequate warning devices, erected either by the railroads or the states, should be at each crossing. Beyond this it is up to the motorist. He knows trains will not stop for him and that he must stop for trains. He must take every precaution, stated in an important decision to the point of getting out of his ear to determine whether or not a train is coming, if necessary.

During the last four years accidents at grade crossings have averaged 5,783 a year, of which 1,272 were caused, not by trains striking automobiles, but by automobiles striking serious accidents to occur at the best protected crossings. In an overwhelming majority of cases, the accidents result from negligence on the part of motorists.

Mr. White had walked around to the other side of the lake, leaving his wife and her pupils in the lake, where she was teaching them to swim. She stepped off into water over her head, from which she failed to extricate herself and drowned. By the time the children broke the news to Mr. White and he arrived on the scene, she had gone down the third time. He tried to locate the body and failed and by the time help came, the body found, she had been dead too long for human aid with the pulmotor to bring her back to life. Thus our family


