Employees of railroads are organizing in various labor organizations to protest against the excessive and trucks being allowed freedom in transportation of passengers and freight while the employees of the afternoon busses and trucks are organizing to spread propaganda for their lines. All of this is but an indication that much legislation is to be sought regarding transportation companies and facilities.

Sounding a confident note on world peace, but at the same time warning that Western civilization could not withstand a new war, Frank B. Kellogg, whose efforts toward world peace resulted in the Kellogg-Briand pact, has received the Nobel peace prize for 1929. In acknowledging the award Mr. Kellogg asserted there was no indication of war in the world, but rather the prospect was for continued peace. "General unrest," he said, "is a natural expression of hard times everywhere, but there has been no war and we should be thankful to take it as a good omen that peace prevails today on earth."

Though blind, three Texas students are making an all A record. Miss Tina Lou Wallace, a graduate of the Texas School for the Blind, is attending the university as a protégé of the Austin Lions club. She is a Junior and plans to teach Spanish at a junior college. Miss Nell Hines of Austin also is a graduate of the Texas School for the Blind. She is a four student majoring in Greek, and plans to teach. Miss Sammie Kirkpatrick was graduated from Arlington High school as valedictorian. She wrote a prize winning paper on Greek Mythology and won several medals in interscholastic league debates. She plans to write fiction.

While taxes mount higher and higher and public expenses continue to grow, there is ever a tendency to vote more extravagantly, as was the case in the recent constitutional amendment election. State Treasurer Hatcher has just issued a statement regarding his annual report to the governor and the figures are somewhat startling. Briefly summarized the report shows total receipts in all funds for the year amounting to the sum of \$110,075,667, 19 million dollars more than the amount collected for the previous year; total receipts for the six years 1925 to 1930 inclusive, \$515,926,971; Disbursements \$114,846,673; 23 million dollars more than for 1929.

Hundreds of acres of West Texas lands were planted to sorghum following the rains after the summer drought was broken and the crop is developing and some of them are being put on the market at remunerative prices. In this connection, a sorghum exhibit will be put on at Wichita Falls at the same time of the winter poultry show. It is remarkable how sometimes a farmer comes thru about ten years ago when the corn crop was badly damaged by hot weather, the cotton crop was short and things were not going good on the farm, a farmer living five miles east of Sherman, planted an acre of sorghum and two acres of sorghum, sowing the latter broadcast and the result was that he had plenty of feed for his stock for the winter and his neighbors paid his taxes and his grocery bill for the same period.—Sherman Democrat.

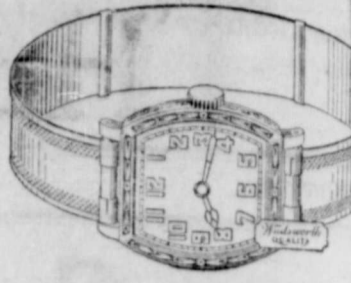

STARVING BOLL WEEVIL

The following recommendations to clean up the boll weevil have been issued by R. R. Reppert, extension entomologist of Texas A. & M. College.

1. Weevils that develop late in the fall are most likely to live until spring.
2. Weevil becomes inactive about the time of the first killing frost.
3. While in the inactive winter state the weevil can live for several months without food.
4. Weevil infestation starts from the few weevils that pass the winter.
5. Boll weevils breed only in green squares and bolls.
6. Boll weevils eat green cotton only.
7. Killing cotton growth early removes the food of the

weevil. If the growth of cotton is killed as early as two weeks before frosts, practically all weevils will starve before going into winter quarters.

8. Killing cotton growth early also prevents new weevils breeding, thereby, permitting only the older ones to enter winter quarters. Very few have enough strength to live until spring.
9. Destroy all cotton growth as soon as picking is complete.
10. Kill the plan by setting a plow shallow and turning the stalks out, or by some equally effective means. Merely chopping or clipping the stalks will not answer for the stumps will throw out new growth ideal for

weevil food.

11. Do not burn crop refuse on the fields, Texas farms need this material returned to the soil in the form of humus.
12. Your clean-up will help your neighbor just as his clean up will help you. You can't succeed without your neighbor. Profitable control demands community-wide co-operation.

**TRAIN VS. AIRPLANE**

Train travel between New  
York and Chicago in 14 hours,  
on a schedule requiring speeds  
as high as 90 miles an hour, is  
predicted within five or six  
years by a Pennsylvania rail-  
road official. This unprece-  
dented speed will be made pos-  
sible by electrification of the  
line for the entire distance, it  
is said, and will cut about six  
hours from the fastest present  
schedules.

Already some eastern divi-  
sions of the road are being pre-  
pared for the use of electric lo-  
comotives, and this form of mo-  
tive power is being actually  
adopted or seriously considered  
by a number of lines.

One reason for seeking in-  
creased speed is seen in the  
competition of air transport  
lines, which are taking from  
the railroads an increasing vol-  
ume of passenger traffic.

For a good while it has been  
known that train speeds could  
be materially increased by elec-  
trification, but heretofore the  
cost of equipment necessary to  
make the change has been a de-  
terrering factor.

bribed for His grace, and that  
salvation could be had for a  
substantial contribution.

It is barely possible that too  
few churches feel the pinch of  
poverty. It may be that the  
Holy Ghost flees out the back  
door when too much money en-  
ters at the front.

Jesus Christ preached His  
sermons from the mountain  
tops or in the lowly places—  
it seemed to matter little. His  
gospel of love and faith, and  
hope and charity: not a gospel  
of bigger, better church build-  
ing. The Church of Jesus Christ  
was founded upon sacrifice,  
perpetuated through sacrifice.  
Unquestionably, sacrifice is of  
the essence of Christianity and  
the passport into His kingdom.

In an age when thousands of  
His children are hungry, we  
imagine He who founded the  
Church would be better pleased  
with modest church buildings,  
from which are distributed  
food and clothing, than with  
magnificent structures where-  
in the congregations sing  
praises to God in luxury and  
ease, whilst the destitute shiver  
outside in the cold.—Editorial

### FATAL ACCIDENT AT BRADY

Brady, Texas, Dec. 15.—While guests seated at a banquet table watched with horror, Monroe Boyd, 38, chief electrician of the Brady Municipal Water and Light Works, was electrocuted with wires he had arranged for an "electric chair" demonstration as part of the program.

More than 20 guests, including employes of the plant and their wives, witnessed the accident, which came just before the scheduled climax of the entertainment program.

Boyd was holding two ends of wire, attached to a 2300-volt current and was demonstrating stunts in electrical lighting when the insulation burned from one of the wires and the current entered his body. Previously he had wired a chair in the room and promised guests he would explain in detail the operation of the prison instrument used to execute criminals.

Guests at the downtown hotel room were thrown in a panic by the mishap. Help was summoned and crews worked for five hours administering artificial respiration without success. His hands were burned badly.

Boyd is survived by his widow and three children.

**IRRIGATED FARMS**

If irrigation were the rule instead of the exception our surplus would be tragically superfluous. Yet we observe our own great government, actively aided and abetted by the great white father at Washington, lending its cash and credit to a program of desert reclamation, which means the taking in of what is now waste and unneeded ground to make competition for the established farms. An enormous irrigation project, called Boulder Dam, is under way at a favorable point on the Colorado river, with Federal money appropriated to pay for it. This dam will reserve enough water to bring a heavy tonnage of competition for rainfall farms. Four states which have never had much agriculture, and never needed much, are to be stimulated into crop production. There never was such an injustice foisted upon the farming regions already in being as this gigantic reclamation project is destined to become. If it were accomplished through the energies and risks of private citizens, there would be no point to a criticism of it. If men should wish to hazard their money in such a venture, this free country would bid them go ahead and do their best. But to take the taxes of the whole people, or lend the credit of the people's government to an enterprise which will benefit the few at the expense of the many is beyond all defense. How Congress could ever have been induced to grant this subvention to an irrigation scheme which will eventually depreciate the value of every unirrigated farm is beyond all guessing. — State Press in Dallas News.

Amazing how, during the years, pineapple pie has become in favor many of the favorites. It won enthusiasm with pie-fanciers in popularity, and has steadily in popularity.

Delicious fruit lends itself well for use in tarts, which are both more than the covered and made more decorative with a golden meringue, or cream, the fruit showing a face, pineapple pies are appetizing. Three well-recipes follow.

**APPLE MERINGUE PIE:** Beat each hot water and add from crushed Hawaiian pineapple. Bring to the boiling and add slowly 3 tablespoons and 1/2 cup sugar which well mixed together. 3 minutes stirring constantly. Remove from fire and add 1/2 cup lemon juice, 1/2 cup crushed Hawaiian pineapple, and 2

beaten egg yolks. Pour into a pastry-lined pie-dish and bake until pastry is well browned. Remove from the oven, cool slightly and cover with a meringue made from 2 stiffly beaten egg whites and 2 tablespoons powdered sugar. Brown the meringue in the oven.

**RICH PINEAPPLE TARTS:** Add 1/4 cup sugar and 1 tablespoon butter to 1 cup crushed Hawaiian pineapple which has been carefully drained. Cook slowly for 8 or 10 minutes, stirring frequently. Pour into small pastry shells that have been baked but not allowed to brown. Bake until a film forms over the fruit, or about 10 minutes. Serve cold. These tarts look prettier if red cherries are mixed with the pineapple.

**COVERED PINEAPPLE PIE:** Heat 1 1/2 cups of syrup drained from crushed Hawaiian pineapple, and into it pour the following mixture: 1/2 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons cornstarch, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon. Stir constantly and boil 5 minutes. Add 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 1/2 cup seedless raisins, and 1/2 cup well-drained crushed Hawaiian pineapple. Pour into pastry-lined pie pan, cover with top layer of pastry and put into a hot oven. After 10 minutes reduce the heat. Bake 1 1/2 hours.
