enue is due to be levied upon in the name of the state. If those

test against the obnoxious tax on tea were to come alive again.

free has so many taxes that no one but an expert can keep track
of all of them.
Congress has been fighting over the sales tax for many months
-in fact, ever since Wiliam Randolph Hearst took a party of con-
gressmen over to Canada last year to see how easy the sales tax
was working there. Mr. Hearst no doobit favors a sales tax as a
means of giving relief to big income taxpayers. Most politicians

that is imported into the United States from abroad, and with taxes
