American dollars dropped to 92 cents in Europe Wednesday. nd the prices of all commodities in America jumped upward to correspond. President Rooscvelt, by banning gold exports from this country, removed support from the dollar in foreign countries and left it to seek its own level on the basis of foreign trade. This is the same effect that the Canadian dollar felt when England went off the gold standard in 1931. Canadian dollars are still worth only 85 American cents, however.

Cotton Goes Up.

But as the dollar goes down, commodity prices go up. Cotton rose over \$2 Wednesday and \$2 more yesterday. Wheat jumped traded in on the exchanges. Stacks rose from one to ten a share in the biggest trading day in recent months.



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THE SCHOOL TAX ELECTION

By a majority of 13 votes, the \$1 school tax has been retained in the Goldthwaite independent school district. The pre-election managem, though short, was bitter. Old wounds were opened and new ones made. But the principles involved are not weighty enough to cause irreparable damage. Most of the charges on both sides were too extravagant.

No one seriously believes that those who supported the \$1 tax really desire to injure financially the larger tax payers. Nor can believe that those who fought for the reduced tax have any sesire to close the schools. The natural thing for everyone is to see his side of the case clearly and to distort the position of the other side. Now both sides have had their say, so let's call a moraterium.

The school board has a difficult task ahead of it even with the higher tax retained. There is not enough money to pay the teachers' school vouchers on time this year. Next year there will be still less money available.

The EAGLE believes that if the trustees will take the public into their confidence and explain the difficulties confronting the school, the people will all rally to their support and co-operate in supporting the cause of education.

The margin of 13 votes is too narrow to admit of any rejoicing by the opponents of the reduction. It is at best only a suspended sentence. If the school authorities attack their problems with determination and energy and enforce every reasonable economy there will be no encouragement given to another attempt to lowe the tax. On the other hand any indication of carelessness, of inefficiency or extravagance will certainly turn the present narrow margin of victory into defeat at another election.

In one of the largest cities in Texas there is a young man wh has distinguished himself the past two years by heading the 'Get Out the Vote " campaign which urged voters all over the state to pay their poll taxes and vote.

So well known did he become through this activity that he had no crouble in being elected a school trustee for his independent school district, one of the largest in the state. Upon his election he | & ssued a grandiloquent statement thanking the voters for supporting hiw and assuring them that he was accepting the responsibility as one which no loyal citizen should shirk, and so on.

Now the truth has leaked out that this loyal citizen, who for two years has been urging others to pay their poll taxes and ge out and vote, does not have a poll tax receipt himself. By some queer oversight in the law, trustees of independent school districts. no matter how large or small, are not, like common school district trustees, specifically required to be qualified electors. This man accordingly, will hold his position as school trustee.

His noble and unselfish interest in the schools did not extend to the point where he was willing to part with \$1.75 for a poll tax of which \$1 would have gone to the schools in which he professes so much interest.

San Jacinto Day

Ninety-seven years ago today panic gripped the white settlers of Texas. Except for the handful of fighting men commanded by Sam Houston, every man and woman who could move was fleeing pell mell from Texas. Their fears were well founded. Only six weeks earlier the Alamo had fallen, and the flower of Texas manhood ad perished to a man in its courageous defense. After that came he bloody massacre at Goliad, and the merciless Santa Anna oasted of what he would do to the gringos as he marched his veteran army on to Harrisburg.

For weeks Sam Houston had retreated before the Mexican dicator until Santa Anna, puffed up by his massacres of the two other Texas detachments, grew scornful and careless.

Finding the Texas capital had been hastily removed from Harsburg to Galveston Island, he marched down Buffalo Bayou in hat direction and pitched his camp on the level prairie where muddy San Jacinto rolls into the bayou. This was Sam Housn's opportunity. Now in the rear of the Mexicans, he followed hem up and camped only a stone's throw from them on the bayou bank. Next morning, the 21st of April, neither side made a move. Houston held a council of war. His force was outnumbered more man two to one, most of his officers opposed his plan of attack. But attack he did, and while the Mexicans were dozing in their ents that drowsy spring afternoon, the Texans sprang upon them. Remember Goliad, remember the Alamo," they shouted, and their theers, above the rattle of muskets and the boom of the "Twin Sisters," struck terror into the hearts of the butchers of Fannin nd Travis. The Mexicans fled, but more than 600 died that day, nd soon more than 700 prisoners, including Santa Anna himself, and been taken.

In the state capitol at Austin hangs W. H. Huddle's famous ainting from which the drawing on this page was made. General Sam Houston, though sorely wounded, is shown receiving the restfallen Santa Anna. On that April day in 1836, the sun of Mexco sank beyond the Rio Grande, never to rise again over Texas.
