

make plans for the three counties to co-operate in speeding up federal highway construction in this section, J. R. Key of Lampasas said here Wednesday, Mr. Loy has recently conferred with the highway commission in Austin on a plan to relocate the Lampasas-Austin road to run via Bertram, reducing the mileage 16 miles. This highway will be connected with Brownwood by new hard-surface road to run through Lometa and Goldthwaite, if the necessary right of way can be secured from Lam-

pasas to this city.

Such a road would draw considerable traffic from Abilene, and other points to the north and west of here, that now goes by way of Mason and Johnson City. Although no contracts have been let in Texas recently on federal aided highways, the commission has stated that such lettings will begin shortly. As soon as Mills county can secure a clear title to the right of way through Mullin, highway 7 will be ready to advertise for bids, highway officials state. Continuation of this paving to Lometa over highway 74A would place Mills county on an important federal thoroughfare.

Then there has been the publication of the names of prominent men who were on the "Morgan list" and were offered stocks at prices below the market price. Only the most ignorant could be surprised at this information. It is a practice of all investment houses, and is fundamentally no more dishonest than that of a grocer selling one customer sugar for a few cents less than another. That prominent men in responsible positions of public trust should accept such favors redounds more to their discredit than to the kank's

The last sensation was the extent to which the Morgan partners influenced the conduct of American industrial affairs through their directorships in countless corporations. This was all common knowledge long ago. There is nothing secret about the names of any corporation's directors, and the extent to which the house of Morgan was represented on the boards of many leaders of American industry has been the subject of much comment long before this investigation was initiated.

There have been innumerable petty details of the Morgan banking business which have been brought out in Washington, and some major matters, such as its volume of deposits and loans, have been made public for the first time. From a strictly banking standpoint, however, all such disclosures have added to the reputation of the house of Morgan for practicing sound, conservative banking.

In one respect the public has been agreeably surprised: Ever zince the stock market debacle of 1929, there have been rumors that J. P. Morgan & Co. were making immense profits on the bear side of stock market operations. The investigation has proved these allegations to be false. Morgan, like thousands of other investors, took huge losses on the stock exchange, and his short sales are conspicuous by their absence from the trading transactions made mablic

This paper holds no brief for the house of Morgan. If any Blegal operations had been developed by the investigation so far, we should have no hesitancy in pointing them out. If any good would be expected from the inquisition and its glare of publicity, we should like to declare them. But the most that we can say is that the very failure of the investigators to uncover anything rotten is reassuring. Whether it is for the public interest for any bank or group of financiers to wield as much power as do the Morgan partners is beside the point. That is an issue to be decided separately and on its merits and in conjunction with a consideration

## THE VOICE OF THE SOUTHWEST

One of the most significant indications of the growing appregiation of the Southwest's autochthonic culture is the widespread secognition that has been accorded the SOUTHWEST REVIEW. This stimulating quarterly had its origin in the "Texas Review," which was founded at the University of Texas in 1915. Southern Methodist University took the publication in charge in 1924, and three years later Professor John H. McGinnis was made its editor.

The selection of Professor McGinnis was decidedly fortunate. Although not a native of the Southwest, he has a knowledge of Southwestern history and literature exceeded by few of her native mons. Twenty-five years ago he came to Texas as a youthful Eng-Ish instructor, but crowded into a few preceding years were a variety of experiences in America and in Europe that prepared him keenly to appreciate the lore of the Southwest and its peculiar cultural heritage.

He is best known to the general reader as the editor of the Sunday book page in the Dallas News. 
