

Certainly it is a time when merchants can sel more goods than they would sell in the ordinary run of business because of the gathering of the people in the town to meet with those with whom they can exchange property. At such times they ordinarily need to buy supplies, but the primary object of a trade: day is to bring the people together in order that they may make deals of mutual benefit. Every progressive town benefits by providing the people a trades day at least one day in each month.


