DIPHTHERIA CAN

Payment of automobile and truck license in the county is running about equal with last crease in the payment of poll year and by the last day of this way license plates will have been issued as last year. There were 536 of the tags issued up to yesterday and there is still time to issue a great many more. There were 1507 issued in the county for 1933 and doubtless more cars and trucks are in operation in the county now. Up to Wednesday night there had been just eleven fewer license issued than on the same date last year.

It has been stated that the legislature will be called in special session Monday and that some important changes will be made in the requirements for highway and poll tax receipt, but these changes are not likely and the safest thing to do is to pay the poll tax and secure the highway license.

WORK MAY CEASE

It is reported from Washing ton that there is a probability of the CWA ceasing to exist as such an organization on May 1. ister through the NRS office. The report says that a request will be made by the administration for an appropriation of \$350,000,000 to continue the CWA until that date and for \$500,000,00 for relief expenditure in the next fiscal year.

President Roosevelt feels that part of the \$500,000,000 would be used after May 1 to provide jobs through the CWA method, although the CWA as such will be abandoned. Adjustment of the bly would allay most of the dissatisfaction developing in congress against separation of CWA workers from the public pay roll.
