

The commissioners court of Mills county, in conformity with a number of other counties in the state, has gone to the trouble and expense to notify delinquent taxpayers of the heavy expense and-penalty they will incur by a failure to pay arrearages before the end of this month. This notice was published in the Eagle some weeks ago and gave in detail the interest and penalty on the deferred payment. There is no room for discussion or class distinction in this matter. Every property owner should contribute his share to the support of the government Already there is a requirement that one due a poll tax must pay before being allowed to vote. This is a wise and just provision, for one who takes part in the selection of officers and in regulating the governmental affairs should pay something to the support of that government. If he is not possessed of taxable property, then he is required to make a small contribution to the school fund anyway. 
