Holly Lore

The Holly of Holme (Ilex Aquifolium) derives its name from the Anglo-Saxon Holegn, while another ancient designation, Hulver, r as Chaucer wrote it, Hulfure, has been taken from the old Norse, Hulfr. From the use made of its branches in decorating churches at Christmas time, the monks, by an easy corruption, pestowed on the Holly the designation of the Holy-tree. The disciples of Zoroaster, or fire worshippers, believe that the Hollytree casts no shadow, and both in Persia and India they employ an infusion of its leaves for several purposes connected with their ligious observances. They also s prinkled the face of a newly-born child with water impregnated with Holly bark. Pliny states that if the Holly, or Hulver-tree be planted about the house, it will keep away all malign spells and enchantments, and defend the lousehold from lightning. The custom of decorating houses and churches with Holly at Christmas is probably derived from the Roman, who were wont to send boughs to their friends during the festival of Saturnalia, which occurred about the same eriod, and the Oaks then being bare of leaves, the priests obliged the people to bring in boughs of Holly and evergreens.

> "With the passing of the laws relative to Old Age Assistance and Unemployment Insurance, many citizens will be called upon to produce their birth certificte to prove identity and eligibility for pensions," he said, "and many difficulies are being encountered because of the death of relatives and friends who were in attendance at the birth. The State Board of Health has provided for the registration of unregistered births, giving the information necessary under these new laws. Blank forms are furnished by the Bereau of Vital Statistics. State Department of Health.

PROBLEMS FOR BUENOS AIRES

The announcement of President Roosevelt's visit to the Buenes Aires Conference has done much to add prestige to this meeting and, as a consequence, it is expected to have great economic and political significance.

The problems to be tackled at the Conference are manifold. They embrace such questions as the establishment of effective machinery to settle boundary disputes. The Leticia incident and the Chaco war have clearly demonstrated that the existing devices for settling such disputes are ineffective and that a workable arbitration procedure is an urgent need. In the past, the settlement of such disagreements through recourse to arms has proven to be extremely costly and the peaceful solution of future disputes is both necessary and desirable.

The economic questions that will be taken up are perhaps of greater immediate importance. It is expected that considerable thought will be given to currency problems and to inter-American trade. Lack of foreign exchange has forced a number of South American countries to impose rigid foreign exchange restrictions, thereby hindering their international trade. Also, the position of some of the South American central banks is rather weak since these various banks hold a great amount of government abligations and have very little gold reserve to back their currencies. Therefore, the need of effecting currency reform and of strengthening the central banks are two of the foremost problems that confront these nations

Various plans have been proposed for their solution. A suggestion has been made to establish an international banking in- formed at Washington-on-thestitution similar to the Bank of International Settlements in Basle. The advocates of this proposal have insisted that the League of Nations Bank for International Settlements are primarily European institutions and that they were not established to aid the countries in the Western Hemisphere. Obviously, such an institution would have to secure necessary capital primarily from the United States. The fact that the existence of more than \$11,000,000,000 of gold is held in the United States and that the United States Treasury has \$1,300,000,000 of gold in the Stabilization Fund are viewed as indications that the United States might be willing to aid in the establishment of such an institution. Moreover, the Johnson Act will not be a barrier since none of the Latin American countries are indebted to the United

The question of inter-American trade will also be an important topic of discussion at the Conference. With the growth of the policy of economic self-sufficiency in Europe, several of the South American countries fear that they may, in the nat distant future, ruffer a considerable decline in their European markets This is particularly true of those nations which are producers of foodstuffs such as wheat, corn, and livestock products. Heretofore, in the face of inadequate transportation facilities, the total volume of trade among the various Latin American countries has been relatively small and the South American countries have had their established markets in Europe and in the United States In this connection, suggestions have been made for the establishment of mutually satisfactory treaties among the various coun-The climate of the Latin American countries is diversified and the resources of many of them complement one another. It is felt that if satisfactory tariff agreements could be arranged, if the transportation facilities could be improved, and particularly if institutions were created to finance the inter-Latin American trade, great progress along these lines could be achieved

The "provisional" government was that created by the San Felipe consultation of 1835, at which Henry Smith was made provisional governor; the "ad interim" government was that Brazos in March, 1836, with David G. Burnet, president. San Felipe was the capital of the 'provisional" government; Washington-on-the-Brazos, Harris burg, Galveston, Camp San Jacinto and Velasco, in the order named, were temportary capitals of the "ad interim" government.
