BUY CHRISTMAS SEALS

In the first mail following the distribution of the Christmas Seals released at Thanksgiving, more than \$100 of the day's returns to state headquarters of the Texas Tuberculosis Association came from doctors, according to the executive secretary of the association.

"Doctor's know first-hand," said the secretary, "of the tragedy caused by tuberculosis. Few people realize how much doctors give, without thought of monetary remuneration, in the way of professional service to the tuberculous poor. For this reason we are doubly grateful for their generous contributions to the Christmas Seal sale which finances the campaign for the prevention of tuberculosis."

Proceeds from this year's seal sale will be used by the state and local tuberculosis associations in a concerted effort to reach more people between the ages of 15 and 45 with those methods of diagnosis prevention and cure which have reduced the death rate from tuberculosis more than two-thirds in the past 30 years.

It has been pointed out that in spite of this reduction in the general death rate tuberculosis is still the highest cause of death among people in this age group.

You are hereby commanded to summon Perry Salling by making publication of this citation once in each week for four successive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in your County, to appear at the next regular term of the District Court of Mills County, to be holden at the Court House thereof, in Goldthwaite, Texas, on the first Monday in January A. D. 1937, the same being the 4th day of January A. D. 1936 then and there to answer a petition filed in said Court on the 20 day of November A. D. 1936, in a suit, numbered on the docket of said Court No. 2507 within Mrs. Frieda Salling is Plaintiff, wherein Perry Salling is defendant, said petition alleging: That the Plaintiff Mrs. Frieda Salling was, on the second day of July A. D. 1934 married to the defendant Perry Salling in Refugio county, Texas. That by reason of the fraud and misrepresentations perpetrated by the Defendant herein and hereinafter set forth the said marriage was void or at least voidable at law. Plaintiff alleges that at the time of her said marriage she was a minor of the age of sixteen, and that defendant procured the said marriage without the consent of her parents, and the said defendant obtained from the County Clerk of Refugio County, Texas a marriage license upon his representation and affidavit, which was false, that the said Plaintiff was eighteen years of age. That said marriage ceremony was performed and that thereafter the plaintiff upon learning of the false affidavit of the defendant immediately separated herself from the said defendant. She alleges that her consent was not freely given to the said marriage and that such conduct of the defendant in falsely swearing to procure the marriage license was so cruel, outrageous and insupportable in its nature that upon learning of the same she could no longer live with the defendant and thereupon separated herself from him. She further alleges that after her said marriage to the defendant she learned that he had been married before and that he then had a living wife, and that this fact was not made known to her until after said marriage with the defendant, and that had she known this fact she would never had married the said defendant. The Plaintiff asks for a judgment annulling her said marriage with the defendant, but if the court should find that the marriage contract is valid then that she have judgment dissolving the marriage contract between plaintiff and defendant and that she, the plaintiff, be restored to her maiden name.

BIRTH CERTIFICATE IMPORTANT RECORD

Austin, Dec. 10.—"The registration of a person's birth forms a legal record that is frequently the most important document in that individual's life," said Dr. W. A. Davis, State Registrar, Bureau of Vital Statistics.

"With the passing of the laws relative to Old Age Assistance and Unemployment Insurance, many citizens will be called upon to produce their birth certificate to prove identity and eligibility for pensions," he said, "and many difficulties are being encountered because of the death of relatives and friends who were in attendance at the birth. The State Board of Health has provided for the registration of unregistered births, giving the information necessary under these new laws. Blank forms are furnished by the Bureau of Vital Statistics, State Department of Health.

"The parents of the child born more than sixty years ago did not have the same opportunity to protect their child's rights by having the birth recorded, as the parents of a baby born in this Centennial Year in Texas.

"Each parent in Texas should be able to say that his child's birth has been recorded in the State Bureau of Vital Statistics. A properly prepared and filed birth certificate is sure to be necessary to your child at some

next Sunday and bring someone with you.


"The State law provides where a physician, midwife or other person was in attendance upon a birth, it shall be the duty of such person to file a certificate of birth in accordance with the laws herein. The law further that where the stated persons were not present or other aware of the fact to make known such fact to the local registrar within 10 days after the birth. "A properly recorded birth certificate is the legal record establishing the fact that you are a citizen of the United States entitled to protection of rights under the laws of our country."

Regardless of the personal interest of the owner or the editor of the paper, the readers should have the truth and only the truth—presented in such a manner as would leave them in a position to choose for themselves that which they consider best from a public standpoint.

A newspaper, or an editor or reporter, has no fundamental rights which an ordinary citizen does not have. It has the rights among others to know facts of public importance. . . . if the newspaper is withholding some facts in favor of a special interest, then it would change its title from a "newspaper" to a "trade journal," whether it be a journal for the interest of a hot-dog stand or an undertaking establishment or a slot machine industry or a church.



A HOMECRAFT CHRISTMAS TREE

CHRISTMAS will be here before we know it and now is the time to begin work on the lovely, glittering and colorful table ornaments that appear in new styles every holiday season. Here are directions for creating a modern Christmas tree, with lounce-like branches made from transparent drinking straws of Cellophane cellulose film, tipped with colored sealing wax. The effect is very striking and anyone with a liking for homecrafts will enjoy the work.

Now cut a 4 1/2" circle of cardboard. Bend the 2" wires of trunk to make it stand. Secure each wire to circle with gummed tape. Drop hot wax on circle and smooth with hot palette knife.



For the tree trunk, cut a 3/4" dowel stick 17" in length. Then cut four 9" lengths of #15 wire for a stand. Hold the four wires evenly around one end of dowel, allowing 2" of each wire to extend beyond it. Wind tightly together with spool wire. Cover stick with 1" strip of white crepe paper leaving the 2" of the wires free. To give the tree a gray red top, heat a palette knife over flame and cut two pieces of wax 1" in length; heat aside of each piece and stick them together; heat end and stick it to dowel, shaping to a point with heated knife. Apply more wax where needed.

For lower lounce, cut four packages of drinking straws to 6" length. Tip one end of each straw with sealing wax. When straws are all tipped, hold them around tree trunk with the tipped ends pointing downwards 2" from the base and the center of bunch. Wind spool wire twice around untipped ends 1" down, pull very tightly and twist. The straws will then spring out. Use two packages for each remaining lounce. The second lounce is cut 5 1/2"; the third 5". Tip with wax and secure to tree trunk in same manner as first one, about 2 1/2" apart. The top lounce is cut 4 1/2" and tipped at both ends. Secure to tree with the tips meeting the wax point at the tree top.

The two insets at the bottom show the method of tying the first lounce and how it will look when the straws spring out from the dowel.

PROBLEMS FOR BUENOS AIRES


The announcement of President Roosevelt's visit to the Buenos Aires Conference has done much to add prestige to this meeting and, as a consequence, it is expected to have great economic and political significance.

The problems to be tackled at the Conference are manifold. They embrace such questions as the establishment of effective machinery to settle boundary disputes. The Leticia incident and the Chaco war have clearly demonstrated that the existing devices for settling such disputes are ineffective and that a workable arbitration procedure is an urgent need. In the past, the settlement of such disagreements through recourse to arms has proven to be extremely costly and the peaceful solution of future disputes is both necessary and desirable.

The economic questions that will be taken up are perhaps of greater immediate importance. It is expected that considerable thought will be given to currency problems and to inter-American trade. Lack of foreign exchange has forced a number of South American countries to impose rigid foreign exchange restrictions, thereby hindering their international trade. Also, the position of some of the South American central banks is rather weak since these various banks hold a great amount of government obligations and have very little gold reserve to back their currencies. Therefore, the need of effecting currency reform and of strengthening the central banks are two of the foremost problems that confront these nations.

Various plans have been proposed for their solution. A suggestion has been made to establish an international banking institution similar to the Bank of International Settlements in Basle. The advocates of this proposal have insisted that the League of Nations Bank for International Settlements are primarily European institutions and that they were not established to aid the countries in the Western Hemisphere. Obviously, such an institution would have to secure necessary capital primarily from the United States. The fact that the existence of more than \$11,000,000,000 of gold is held in the United States and that the United States Treasury has \$1,800,000,000 of gold in the Stabilization Fund are viewed as indications that the United States might be willing to aid in the establishment of such an institution. Moreover, the Johnson Act will not be a barrier since none of the Latin American countries are indebted to the United States Government.

The question of inter-American trade will also be an important topic of discussion at the Conference. With the growth of the policy of economic self-sufficiency in Europe, several of the South American countries fear that they may, in the not distant future, suffer a considerable decline in their European markets. This is particularly true of those nations which are producers of foodstuffs such as wheat, corn, and livestock products. Heretofore, in the face of inadequate transportation facilities, the total volume of trade among the various Latin American countries has been relatively small and the South American countries have had their established markets in Europe and in the United States. In this connection, suggestions have been made for the establishment of mutually satisfactory treaties among the various countries, as well as for the improvement of transportation facilities. The climate of the Latin American countries is diversified and the resources of many of them complement one another. It is felt that if satisfactory tariff agreements could be arranged, if the transportation facilities could be improved, and particularly if institutions were created to finance the inter-Latin American trade great progress along these lines could be achieved.

Q. If a person has a state license may he fish or hunt on private property in Texas? L. H.

A. Not unless he has permission from the owner, if the land is enclosed.

Q. How long must a person have resided in Texas to secure a "resident" hunting or fishing license? L. H.

A. He must be a bona fide resident of the state for at least six months immediately preceding application for a license.

Q. Are separate licenses required for hunting and fishing in Texas? L. H.

A. Yes.

Q. What is understood by the "provisional" and the "ad interim" governments of Texas and what were the capitals of each? W. P. N.

A. The "provisional" government was that created by the San Felipe consultation of 1835, at which Henry Smith was made provisional governor; the "ad interim" government was that formed at Washington-on-the-Brazos in March, 1836, with David G. Burnet, president. San Felipe was the capital of the "provisional" government; Washington-on-the-Brazos, Harrisburg, Galveston, Camp San Jacinto and Velasco, in the order named, were temporary capitals of the "ad interim" government.

Q. Who was Felix Huston? B. L.

A. He came to Texas from Mississippi soon after the Battle of San Jacinto and was appointed commander in chief of the army of the republic in the first administration of President Sam Houston. He soon antagonized President Houston by his plans to take the Texas army into Mexico to replenish the empty Texas treasury. During his temporary absence from the army, President Houston thwarted his plans by furloughing all but 600 of the army and scattering the remainder along the Texas coast, and soon after appointed Albert

Mr. Bonser had lived in Comanche for more than twenty years. He was a licensed exhorter in the Methodist church and took a great interest in the Masonic and I.O.O.F. Lodges. When a young man he was a member of the legislature in Michigan.

The following letter from W. P. Weaver, Mills county farm dem-

onstrator agent, who has never lost his love for Comanche county, is self-explanatory. Mr. Weaver at one time was head of the Sidney school:

"Being a collector of relics, I was greatly interested in the communication from Mack Matthews, sr., in your last issue. I visited the scene of the mammoth skeleton find and saw Mr. Matthews, Mr. Straley and others excavating and taking out the bones. I recall that the tusks and bones were in a show window on the north side of the square for some time.

"Matthews moves that the old court house be moved to Lake Eanes.




