

FARM RELIEF DECREASING

The government's benefit payments to the farmers in September amounted to only \$6,000,000 this year as compared with \$57,-800,000 last year, according to the Alexander Hamilton Institute. This curtailment, however, was more than offset by the gain in receipts from the marketing of farm products. The farmers' total income in September consequently amounted to \$760,000,000 as against \$705,000,000 a year ago, an increase of 7.8 per cent.

Benefit payments in the first nine months also showed a conaderable decrease from a year ago. This year, they amounted to \$210,000,000 as against \$407,000,000 last year. However, as was the case in September, the decline in benefit payments was more than offset by the increase in receipts from marketings. Total farm income in the first nine months amounted to \$5,434,000,000 this year as compared with \$4,830,000,000 last year, a gain of 12.5 per
