AN APPEAL TO SOUTHERN CHURCHES

"It is my ambition for our Southern States that we shall build here a great civilization that will yet enrich the history of our race," says Dr. Clarence Poe in *The Progressive Farmer*. "What we should yearn for is that our homogeneous Southern people, bound together in a fine group of kindred commonwealths from Virginia to Texas inclusive, shall take the characteristic human qualities of our people as a foundation, and on these qualities build a culture and a tradition whose flowering will bring increased beauty and distinction to all Southern life and increased pride and dignity to every Southern man or woman."

"And now as we again approach the season, which celebrates the birth of the Founder of Christianity, it seems especially fitting that we shall first of all consider what can and should be the genuine religious basis for

this finer Southern civilization. For if we are to build any genuinely beautiful civilization here, I believe it must exemplify the fundamental spirit of Christianity. I believe furthermore that our Southern churches must prepare the way for it by shocking us out of selfishness and individualism and arousing our concern for all the poor, the distressed, the disadvantaged, the uneducated, and underprivileged whether black or white, tenants or landowners, in our Southern States.

"To learn what should be the life of the Christian Church or the Christian individual, we have but to recall that in the Last Judgment the Great Master does not ask us about our sectarian differences nor about our theological dogmas. What He asks us is this: Having received His spirit, He asks what we did to reveal and interpret it to a world that He gloriously calls us to help redeem. He does ask us whether we let our light shine and interpret Him to others in terms of human service. He does

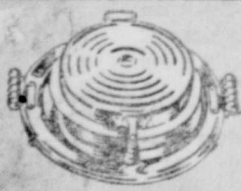

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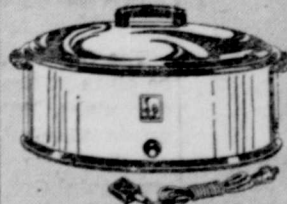

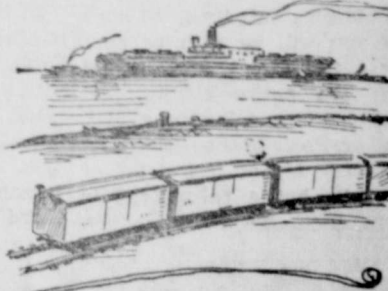

Shimmering Christmas Gifts From the Home Kitchen



HOLIDAY foods and candies from the home kitchen make most acceptable Christmas gifts and they take on an added interest when visible through transparent wrappings and decorations in gay colors. Above are shown some appealing ways to present plum puddings, fruit cakes, candy and cookies with trimmings of Cellophane cellulose film.

The stocking at the left, filled with cookies and toys for a youngster, is cut from clear film and sewn together with bias binding and embroidery cotton. Half-inch stitches of contrasting color should be used. For the plum pudding, shown at the upper left, tango colored wrapping, 1/4" red and silver transparent ribbon, and a holly sprig are used. For the ruffie cut red wrapping 2" wide and twice the circumference of the pudding. Fold in center to 1", pucker into tight gathers along a knitting needle.

Slip a piece of spool wire into the gathers and tie in place. Secure to the wrapping with transparent Scotch Tape about every 2". Below is a basket of cookies made from a 15" square of green film. To simplify the work, call the corners of the square A, B, C and D consecutively. Fold to bring C to A; bring D over half way between A and B, holding in place with the tape. Fold B the same way across to D and secure. Separate A and C and there is the basket. Spread and fold corners under to flatten bottom, put cookies inside, and tie with 1/4" transparent ribbon, folding corners A and C over them.

Wired green ribbon of the film spangled with silver stars, make the handle which is secured with tape. Bring this ribbon down sides of basket, tape it on, tie underneath, and decorate with holly. The fruit cake is wrapped in amber film and trimmed with a fan bow, made by folding a 9" x 30" piece into fine accordion pleats. The pleating is tied at the center with a transparent ribbon bow and ornamented with holly. Spread the ends of the fan and secure with folded tape. Around the cake, tie red and silver transparent ribbon.

HOME PROJECT STORY

The course of study in home-making suggests that each student upon completion of her home project write a story telling of her work.

The following is one of the many interesting stories written in the homemaking II class of Mullin high school:

Home Project Story

My project was planning and preparing ten Saturday dinners. I had a rather hard time in selecting a good color scheme. That is in keeping everything in the menu from being the same color. For example, I would have a menu planned, and when I looked over it everything in the menu would be white. Then I had to replan my menu.

For each menu that I planned I had a work plan and time schedule, which was quite difficult to make.

I am really glad that I took this project, because I have learned how to prepare a meal in a short time, and cut down on the sum spent for food.

If I were to choose this project again I would plan to prepare the meal in a shorter length of time. I would select all of the groceries myself and I would make a budget to follow, and in that I would keep the total amount spent for food. I would use leftovers in many different ways to cut down on the sum spent for food. With leftover bread I could make puddings, dressings, and scalloped dishes.

I complete my project November 30.

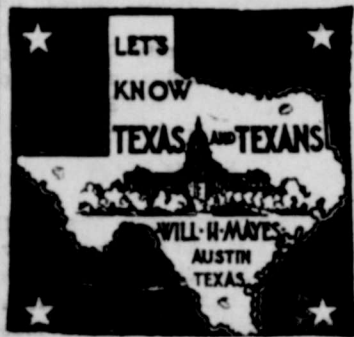

To the Sheriff or any Constable of Mills County, Greeting:

You are hereby commanded to summon Perry Salling by making publication of this citation once in each week for four successive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in your County, to appear at the next regular term of the District Court of Mills County, to be holden at the Court House thereof, in Goldthwaite, TEXAS, on the first Monday in January A. D. 1937, the same being the 4th day of January A. D. 1936 then and there to answer a petition filed in said Court on the 20 day of November A. D. 1936, in a suit, numbered on the docket of said Court No. 2507 within Mrs. Frieda Salling is Plaintiff, wherein Perry Salling is defendant, said petition alleging: That the Plaintiff Mrs. Frieda Salling was, on the second day of July A. D. 1934 married to the defendant Perry Salling in Refugio county, Texas. That by reason of the fraud and misrepresentations perpetrated by the Defendant herein and hereinafter set forth the said marriage was void or at least voidable at law. Plaintiff alleges that at the time of her said marriage she was a minor of the age of sixteen, and that defendant procured the said marriage without the consent of her parents, and the said defendant obtained from the County Clerk of Refugio County, Texas a marriage license upon his representation and affidavit, which was false, that the said Plaintiff was eighteen years of age. That said marriage ceremony was performed and that thereafter the plaintiff upon learning of the false affidavit of the defendant immediately separated herself from the said defendant. She alleges that her consent was not freely given to the said marriage and that such conduct of the defendant in falsely swearing to procure the marriage license was so cruel, outrageous and insupportable in its nature that upon learning of the same she could no longer live with the defendant and thereupon separated herself from him. She further alleges that after her said marriage to the defendant she learned that he had been married before and that he then had a living wife, and that this fact was not made known to her until after said marriage with the defendant, and that had she known this fact she would never have married the said defendant. The Plaintiff asks for a judgment annulling her said marriage with the defendant, but if the court should find that the marriage contract is valid then that she have judgment dissolving the marriage contract between plaintiff and defendant and that she, the plaintiff, be restored to her maiden name.

The inference in such annulments, complained Mrs. Shelton, is that the deputy county clerk had violated a moral obligation by issuing licenses to intoxicated persons.

A deputy clerk is kept on duty at night for the convenience of couples who want marriage licenses. When Mrs. Shelton's late husband, then county clerk, inaugurated the system he gave strict orders to the deputy assigned to night duty that he was not to issue licenses to drunk persons.

The county clerk pointed out that the deputy often has no way of determining whether a couple are intoxicated. She also said it is simple for soberer friends of a drunken couple to obtain licenses for them.

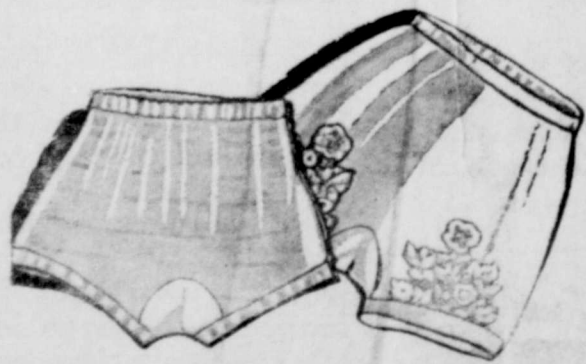
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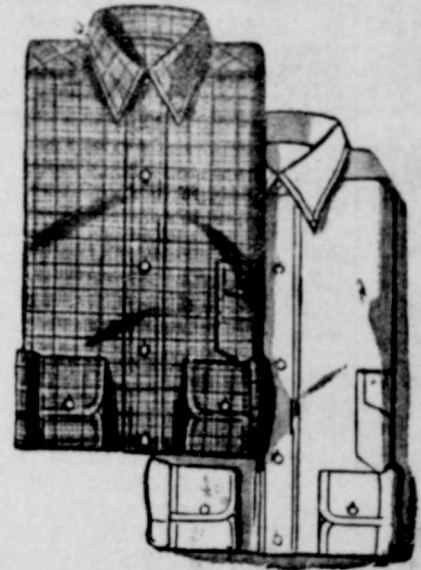
