### COLEMAN TELLS METHOD OF KILLING MESQUITES

Thousands of dollars will be made by Coleman county ranchmen who will, sooner or later, follow the pioneering of T. J. Allen, local insurance agent, ranchman and farmer.

Ranchmen have long known that mesquite trees have been sapping the ground, that the grass around such trees was not good for sheep and cattle. Time has passed on with ranchmen doing little to remedy the situation. But Mr. Allen, progressive citizen he is, decided to do something and found that F. W. Alexander of Albany, prominent ranchman, had met some success in killing mesquite trees by spraying kerosene on them at a certain time of the year.

Howard Kingsbery, Santa Anna, member of the State Soil Conservation committee, was impressed with the work Mr. Allen has done and it is his belief that every rancher in West Texas will have to follow it in the future just as farmers are now terracing their farms to protect them.

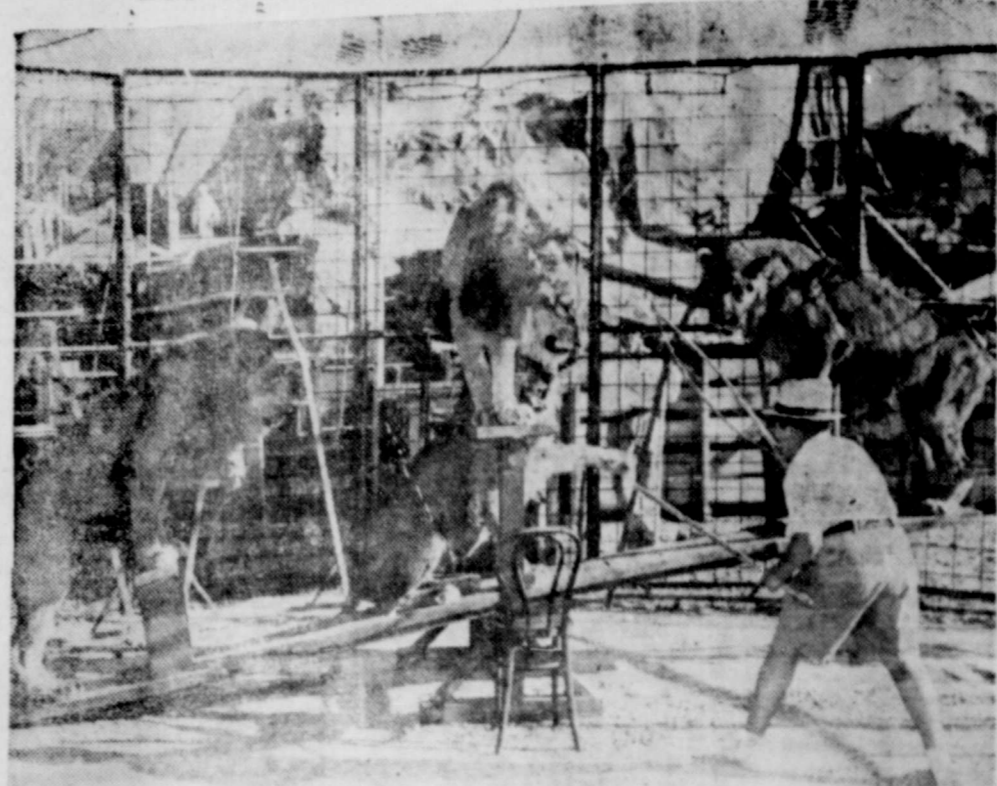
Mr. Allen states the cost of killing the trees is approximately \$3.40 per acre when kerosene is used, and that method was used first by Mr. Alexander. In a recent article along that line Mr. Alexander said: "The use of kerosene is the most economical method of destroying the mesquite timber on pasture land. If this method is used the work should be done in the spring season, preferably in the month of May, but any time from April 15 to July 1 is good. To do this work in the fall and winter seasons is not very effective, and in some of our demonstrations it was a complete failure."

"The tree should be sprayed from the ground up 24 inches to 30 inches, all around the body of the tree, and it should be thoroughly saturated with kerosene until it is soaked and allowed to run down on the ground using about one gallon of kerosene to eight or ten mesquites averaging five inches in diameter. To count the trees is the best method of knowing if you are using sufficient amount of kerosene. If the tree forks near the ground and has two prongs, count that as two trees. If it has five prongs, count each as a separate tree. The kerosene should be applied under pressure and driven well into every crack on the bark of the tree, holding the spray nozzle about three inches from the tree.

"The best sprayer we have found for spraying trees is a four gallon compressed air sprayer, which may be purchased from any leading hardware store.

Both Mr. Allen and Mr. Kingsbery predict that the kerosene spraying method will be in general use in West Texas within the next few years.—Coleman Democrat-Voice.

### SENATOR CONNALLY URGES SENATE TO AID FARMERS

Washington, D. C.—In a successful effort to aid farmers who have Federal Land Bank loans Senator Tom Connally on the floor of the Senate pleaded for the lowering of the interest rate on commissioners' loans from 5 to 4 per cent, and the continuation of the present 3 1/2 per cent interest rate on regular loans.

Upon the insistence of the junior senator from Texas, the senate rejected the amendment of the Senate Banking and Currency Committee, which would have stricken out the reduction of interest rates on commissioners' loans.

"We have been through a very critical period in the United States in the way of holding on to land during this depression," Senator Connally told the senate. "Commissioners' loans are instrumentalities that were devised to help the man who had a farm and was trying to pay for it by giving him further increase of loan. Many of these farmers will pay out. They are on the land, they are working, digging, they are trying to get out, and they are not on relief rolls in town. If we can give a billion and a quarter dollars to people to do nothing, I do not see how the government will suffer much by giving \$40,000,000 in the form of reduced interest rates to people who are at work establishing homes and increasing the value of those homes.

"The land banks will have to

absorb some of the reduction for this period of extension; but it is justified aid, it is sound aid, given to people who are trying to build homesteads and trying to pay for them, and who are out in the hot sun at work."

The senate passed the bill extending and reducing the interest rates to borrowers from the Federal Land Bank; the house had previously passed the bill.

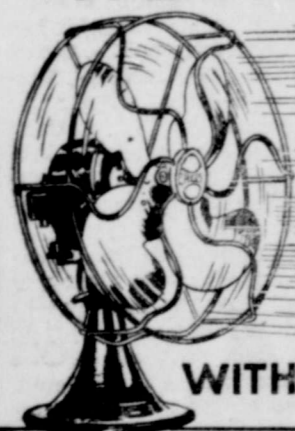

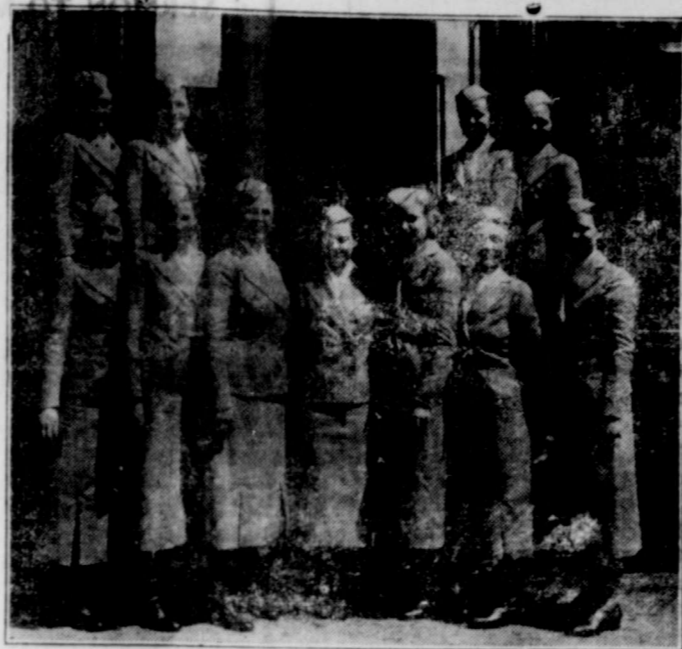
**LIVESTOCK SHIPMENTS**

Austin.—The May record of shipments of livestock from Texas to the Fort Worth stockyards and interstate points showed an unusually sharp year to year increase, according to the Bureau of Business Research at the University of Texas. Reports of the railroad shipping agents of the state and of Fort Worth Stock Yards Company to the bureau show that rail and truck shipments to these points totaled 11,154 cars against 5,913 during May last year, an increase of more than 88 per cent. Aggregate shipments for the year to date were 38,113 cars, an increase of 31 per cent over the corresponding period last year.

The sharpest increase occurred in forwardings of sheep. Shipments of these animals during May totaled 2,133 cars compared with 778 cars during May last year, an increase of more than 174 per cent. Cattle shipments also increased substantially—7,530 cars against 4,057 cars a year ago or a gain of more than 85 per cent. The increase

**GOVERNMENT OBSERVATIONS FROM THE STATE OBSERVER**

Commercial failures in Texas during May almost reached the vanishing point, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research announced last week.

There were only eight failures during the month against 17 the preceding month and 18 in May 1936—decreases of 52.9 per cent and 50 per cent respectively, according to reports from Dun and Bradstreet, Inc. The decline in liabilities for the month amounted to only \$23,000, a decline of 93.7 per cent from April and 81 per cent from May last year. Average liability per failure was only \$3,000 against \$21,000 the preceding month and \$8,000 the corresponding month last year.

The injured feelings of Senator Eph Davis of Brownwood were soothed when the Senate adopted a resolution of confidence and approbation in his behalf. The Senate also turned an official frown upon Rep. Baily Ragsdale of Crockett, a detractor of Sen. Davis. Ragsdale, ac-

ording to the Senate, had dissipated letters to farmers, charging that Sen. Davis was responsible for the failure of proper soil conservation legislation in the regular session. This was branded as a misstatement and charged up to politics. Several of Sen. Davis' contemporaries in the Senate denounced the letters as an unfair attack. The Brownwood senator was praised for his untiring efforts in behalf of the right kind of soil legislation. The resolution of confidence was adopted unanimously.

**NEW RACKET BEING WORKED ON HIGHWAYS**

Women motorists were warned to look out for an "obliging" motorist who has figured out a new way to get money without working for it. The warning came from Capt. E. W. Mayr, head of the Houston detachment of the state highway patrol. "Two Houston women on the way to Dallas a few days ago were flagged down by a man and woman in another car," said Mayr. "The man drove up beside them and shouted that the women's car was on fire." The women stopped the car and the man rushed over and threw up the hood, they told Mayr.

The man looked under the hood and said, "My God, it's a good thing you stopped when you did," continued Mayr. "He told them it was a fire coming from the distributor cap and the whole car would have been enveloped in flames in another half-mile. The women knew nothing about machinery and accepted his word for it. The man suggested that he leave his wife with them while he drove back to the nearest town and get another distributor cap. When he returned, he had the cap in a box on which was marked \$14.75. The women paid him that amount and he obligingly put the new cap on the distributor for them. "When they came back to Houston, the women told their husbands and learned then that the regular price for the cap was 75 cents.—Houston Chronicle.
