



A SPLENDID MONUMENT

Dr. John Power, beloved Episcopal minister and educator of Expwnwood, died peacefully at his home there on Monday of last week. He was 91 at the time of his death and had reached the mature age of 58 before he moved to Brownwood in 1904. Speak-Eng of his impressive record, the Brownwood Banner says:

Dr. Power was the oldest minister in Brownwood the oldest college professor in the United States; the oldest newspaper columnist in Texas; the first Scoutmaster in Central West Texas. He was an organizer of the first commercial club in Brownwood and of the first charity organization here. He was a member of the first pastor's association in Brown County, formed soon after he came here to become rector of St. John's Episcopal Church in 1904.

Truly such a record is a greater monument than any that could be hewn from marble or fashioned from bronze. In the commisse of his long and active life, the Parson (as he was affec-Amonately known because for more than 30 years he had written a newspaper column under that head for the Brownwood Bulleten each Saturday) had touched and benefitted thousands of lives. His religion and his philosophy were positive and consaructive. He radiated good sense, good taste and good fellow-This section of Texas is poorer for his passing.



A POSSIBLE CAUSE OF DECLINE

Increases and Decreases from 1932 to 1936



The above chart, compiled by the National Committee for Religion and Welfare Recovery, is a thought-provoking presentation of facts which leads the Committee to ask: "May not these decreases in benevolences-as compared with increases in luxuries-account for the religious and moral decline that has been indicated in other sets of statistics and charts assembled by the Committee?"

For in spite of an increase of more than 61% in our national income for 1936 over that of 1932, and with a cumulative increase of \$48,718,000,000 since 1932, the American public actually gave 30% less to churches, 29% less to general benevolences, 24% less to Community Chests, and 18% less to colleges in 1936 than was given from the smaller incomes of 1932. On the other hand, expenditures for jewel ry, theatres, cigarettes, automobiles, army and navy, whisky, radio and beer increased from 25% to 31%



SOCIAL SECURITY BOARD TO PAY CLAIMS DUE

AUSTIN, Oct. 23, 1937.—It was announced today by Jesse C. Carter, acting manager of the Austin office of the Social Security Board, that there are doubtless many individuals in the Austin area who are now entitled to lump-sum payments, but who have not filed claims because they are not familiar

There are two kinds of lumpsum payments: (1) To persons who have become 65 since Jan. 1, 1937; (2) to nearest of kin or estates of deceased workers. Each kind amounts to 3 1-3 per cent of the wages received from covered employment between Jan 1, 1937, and attainment of age 65 or death.

Carter explained that if a claim is made on attaining age 65, the claimant should give his name, account number, address and the number of employers for whom he has worked since Dec. 31, 1936.
