Youths on Way to Hours After Theft

Jim Morgan, Brownwood, and Billy Jack Johnson, Yoakum were convicted as delinquent juveniles in the Brown County court Wednesday and transferred to the Gatesville reformatory that afternoon, following their arrest by Sheriff Jack Hallmark on a charge of automobile theft. A 1937 Dodge sedan belonging to E. B. Tongate, farmer southwest of Brownwood, was stolen Tuesday afternoon, and found by the Sheriff between Lometa and Lampasas. The two boys were arrested while walking toward Lampasas.

Mr. Tongate had given the two boys a lift Tuesday, and after they left the car turned into his pasture and was burning prickly, pears for cattle feed. The loss of the car was dicovered later and a description of the boys given to the sheriff's office. The car had been driven along the highway east of Lometa where it was turned over and badly damaged. After the wreck the boys left the machine and started walking toward Lampasas, where they were overtaken by the sheriff and placed under arrest,

They were in the reformatory in less than 24 hours after the car was stolen. - Brownwood Bulletin.

#### FARM INCOME SLUMPS

The department of Agriculture expects that, when the figure for December is available, it will show that total farm income for that month amounted to \$696,000,000. This means that the annual farm income in 1937 amounted to \$8,500,000,000, or \$500,-000,000 less than the amount forecasted by the Department of Agriculture last month. This helps to explain the sharp slump in industrial activity during the latter part of 1937, according to the Alexander Hamilton Institute. Industrial activity early in the year was keyed up to a rate which required the support of even more inflation than that indicated by last summer's prospect of a \$9,000,000 farm income in 1937.

No further proof is needed of the fact that until the farmers of America are assured reasonable prosperity, the nation as a whole cannot enjoy it.

If the farmer was allowed to buy what he needs in the open market, it would not take long for him to get even, and the country as a whole would soon prosper. As it is the farmer must take the world price for his cotton and corn, but must pay a heavy duty in addition to the real cost of the clothes he wears the farm implements he uses and even the sugar in his coffee.





Have we any protection against | if the Court finds that the agent acts unauthorized by our Constitution?

Under our Constitution, "we the people" are supreme. We are the principal and we create the Congress and make it our agent with power to act within the limitations we enumerate in our charter, but with no power to go beyond those limits. In addition we specifically prohibit it from certain acts.

Under these conditions, what recourse do "we the people" have if the Congress, as our agent, exceeds the limits we specify or enacts legislation which we specifically prohibit? If left to itself to determine such a case, the Congress naturally would approve its own acts. It would not pass an act and disapprove it. Thus the agent would authorize what the principal prohibits -

To prevent this, "we the people," in our Constitution, provide the simple means commonly provided where the principal challenges the acts of his agent in court. The court -in the case of our Constitution, a federal court and finally the Supreme Court-tries the case by hearing both sides. If the Court finds the agent's act in accordance with the agent's power, the act is upheld. But

Compare the corruption of politics in Pennsylvania and Tilinios with that of Texas, and the effect of the unrestricted vote is at once evident. If the right to participate in the election of officers who will make and enforce the laws under which he must live is not worth \$1.75 to any man, that man's vote is not worth recording at election time.

It is true that corrupt interests have been known to provide the money for poll tax payments in order to control the vote. When they do so, they run the risk of detection and prosecution, the risk of being double crossed by the voter when election time rolls around, and the risk of the voter moving away or otherwise losing his right to vote at the time and place the interest needs him. And it is an expensive as well as risky business. For while \$1.75 is not much for one man to pay, that much per head for enough supine voters to affect an election is so expensive as usually to be prohibitive. If these interests will go to such lengths to win elections now, what would and could they do
