Quiet Election Held Tuesday

As usual the general election Tuesday was a quiet affair in Mills county, with an overwhelming majority of the votes cast for the straight Democratic ticket. The same held true of the state as a whole. Only about 652 votes were cast in Mills county. Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel received 594 votes, Boynton, 24; 107 for the amendment, and 153 against. Not a single Communist or Socialist vote was cast in the county.

Bitter contests were staged in many other states. Although the Republicans gained 11 new governors, nearly 80 seats in the lower house of Congress and 8 senators, the Congress still remains overwhelmingly Democratic.

One of the hardest fought races was that for governor in New York state in which the Democratic incumbent, Lehman, defeated Dewey by 70,000 votes out of a total of over five million. In Ohio Robert A. Taft, son of former President W. H. Taft, defeated his Democratic opponent Bulkley. In California the "Thirty Dollars Every Thursday" pension plan was apparently defeated, although one of its supporters, the Democrat Sherman Downey, who defeated the veteran W. G. McAdoo in the primaries, was elected Senator. For the first time in 25 years, California also elected a Democratic governor, C. L. Olson.

Amos I. Sheppard Adjudged Insane

In a special hearing before County Judge R. J. Gerald Monday morning here Amos I. Sheppard, 44, was adjudged insane and was committed to the State Hospital at Austin. Sheriff J. H. Harris has applied for Sheppard's re-commitment to the Veterans Hospital at Waco. Sheppard has been held in the Mills county jail since the morning of November 3 when his 17-year-old daughter, Jessie Mae was shot in the hip with a .12 gauge shotgun at close range in the family home in Big Valley. Witnesses at the hearing were Dr. J. M. Campbell and Dr. J. J. Stephen who had examined the defendant in the jail here, and his wife also testified. The matter of the shooting was not brought up at the hearing.

Jessie Mae was carried to the Sealy Hospital at Santa Anna last week in a critical condition following the shooting. She was given a blood transfusion and is reported to be improving although the full extent of her injury has not yet been determined.

Football District Change

A slight revision has been made in the football district for next year. The proposed revision is tentative only and is subject to protest by any of the schools affected.

Schools that heretofore have been in Class A are now in class AA. Schools that have been in class B are now in class A, and schools that have been in class C are now in class B. There is no provision made for a class C school.

Thus Goldthwaite is now in class A instead of class B. Also the number of the district has been changed from 27-B to 34-A.

Fredricksburg, Brady, and Rochelle have been tentatively added to the district and Lometa has been dropped. However since these assignments are only tentative and are subject to revision it is quite likely some changes will yet be made.

Freezing Weather Arrives Sunday

A stiff norther Sunday morning was followed by icy weather and considerable ice was in evidence Monday and Tuesday mornings. The long-awaited rain failed to arrive, however, in this section. Temperatures of about 29 were recorded Monday.

Armistice Day Is Holiday

Goldthwaite as usual is celebrating Armistice Day with a practically complete suspension of business. Rural carrier and clerks at the Goldthwaite Post Office will observe the holiday for the first time in the 20 years since the Armistice was signed. While it has been a state holiday for years, it was not made a national holiday until the last session of Congress early this year.

The original Armistice Day was recalled at chapel exercises in the Goldthwaite high school Thursday morning when L. B. Porter spoke on the American Legion, and M. Y. Stokes, Jr. on "Armistice Day, Twenty Years After."

At Mullin an interesting community program was planned for Thursday evening.

The ex-service men and members of the American Legion and their families are invited as honor guests to an Armistice Day service which will be held at the Goldthwaite Methodist Church next Sunday night, Nov. 13, at 7:00 P. M. The public generally is invited. A program of special appropriateness is being prepared.

Mills County Teachers Met

The Mills County Teachers Association held its first meeting of the year in the Goldthwaite school auditorium last Tuesday evening. About 60 teachers were present. This is about 80 per cent of the entire teaching force of the county.

During the evening Deputy State Superintendent G. D. Holbrook, who has recently been assigned to this district, gave a constructive discussion of school conditions as they exist at the present time. Judge R. J. Gerald gave the teachers of the rural schools a series of announcements and instructions for the year's work. Supt. A. H. Smith of the Goldthwaite schools, discussed the work of the Texas State Teachers Association and the value of membership in the same. Supt. Tolbert Patterson of Mullin presided over the meeting.

The following officers were elected for the ensuing year: president, Supt. Tolbert Patterson of Mullin; first vice-president, C. A. Womack of Big Valley; second vice-president, G. W. White of Priddy; secretary-treasurer, Mrs. Delton Barnett of Goldthwaite.

The Mills County Teachers Association is a local unit of the Texas State Teachers Association and is fully affiliated with same.

Immediately following the program and election of officers of the Mills County Teachers Association the teachers of the county went into the matter of organizing the University Interscholastic League (county meet) in the county.

The following directors were elected in this organization: Director General, Supt. A. H. Smith; director of debate, Supt. Tolbert Patterson; director of extemporaneous speech, John Patterson; director of athletics, S. E. Cloninger; director of declamation, G. W. White; director of essay writing, Hollis Blackwell; director of spelling, W. Y. Scott. These together with directors of music memory, picture memory, choral singing and arithmetic, who are appointed by the director general, make up the executive committee of the county organization.

The teachers accepted an invitation to hold the county meet in Goldthwaite.

President Cuts Book Postage

By a special order of President Franklin D. Roosevelt, the rate of postage on printed books has been set at a flat 1½c per pound in the United States irrespective of distance. The chief effect of the new rate is to lower considerably the postage on books mailed for long distances. For example the postage on 10 lbs. of books from New York to Goldthwaite is now only 15c as compared with the regular parcel post rate of 95c. To Dallas the rate is now 15c as compared with 18c.

The purpose of the rate cut, which will be on trial until July 1, 1939, is to encourage reading and reduce the delivered cost of new books. It is also expected to increase the volume of mail during the Silver Jubilee of Parcel Post this month.

New Presiding Elder For Methodists

Rev. H. G. Cook of Paducah, Ky., and Presiding Elder John Horton of the Llano District have effected a mutual transfer effective January 1. Each of the preachers thus returns to his native state.

Rev. Horton has made an excellent Presiding Elder for this district and the Methodists regret to lose him. A hearty welcome awaits Rev. Cook, a graduate of Southwestern University, who has numerous friends in this section of the state.

Crowd on Trades Day Despite Weather

Near freezing temperatures Monday failed to daunt a goodly crowd of Trades Day shoppers who were on hand for the various attractions offered on that day. If the weather had been better, it is believed that a record-breaking crowd would have been on hand.

Army Horses Sought Here

Information has been received here that U. S. Army officers will be here on Nov. 24 to purchase cavalry mounts and artillery horses for the Army. The buyers are very particular in what they buy, but Mills county has established a reputation in the Army for good horses, and for the past year has provided a large number.

Turkey Market Jumps to 15c

Wednesday afternoon the turkey market jumped to 15c and is expected to last through Saturday. It opened at 13c.

Although the number of birds is considerably less than last year, D. D. Tate estimates that as many pounds will be marketed here this year as before. The quality is the best in the last five or six years.

Deer Season To Open Nov. 16

Deer season in Texas will open Nov. 16, and reports have already been made by game wardens that hunters are preparing ramps for the annual hunt for the wild bucks. The State Game Department has reported that hunting leases in the Central Texas hill country, the favorite haunt of the big game of the Southwest, are going rapidly. The season for both white and black tail deer ends Dec. 31, except for a closing date of Nov. 30 on the black tail species west of the Pecos River.

Of an estimated total of 30,000 bucks taken throughout the 1937 season, the game department has reported that 1,602 were taken on hunting preserves in Mason, 1,331 in Gillespie, 1,202 in Kerr, 938 in Comal and 665 in Llano counties.

The Central Texas hill country is badly in need of rain to put both the deer and turkey in top condition for the opening of the season.—Ex.

Texas Game Laws Posted By State

Migratory waterfowl become legal game Nov. 15 and deer and wild turkey Nov. 16.

The men who man the blinds may shoot at ducks and geese for 45 days, 15 days more than last year because of increasing supplies, while those in quest of deer and turkey may hunt legally through Dec. 31.

Ducks and geese, their numbers increasing by virtue of a widespread rehabilitation program, offer more sport to hunters this year.

The bag limit remains at 10, but possession limit has been doubled to 20 in the aggregate. Canvasbacks, redheads, buffleheads or ruddy ducks become legal game this year. Three each or an aggregate of three birds of different species may be taken. Bag limit on geese and brant is five in the aggregate of all kinds and the possession limit 10 of all kinds.

Not more than two days' bag limit of ducks and geese may be transported in one calendar week.

Use of live decoys is barred and a three-shell limit for repeating or automatic shotguns, in effect the last three years, is continued.

Deer and turkey laws remain unchanged, but the game department warns hunters to familiarize themselves with special laws in various counties.

The bag limit on deer is two a season, except mule deer, only one of which may be taken west of the Pecos.

Three turkeys is the season's limit.

Thrilling Stories Relayed to Convention

DALLAS, Nov. 10.—Thrilling stories of close calls from Japanese bombs—such as those recently escaped at Wuchow, China, by Dr. Robert E. Beddoe of Dallas—were relayed from war-torn mission fields in the Orient to the Baptist General Convention of Texas here this week.

"There was no military objective of any sort within half a mile of our property," he wrote to the Foreign Mission Board.

"On the flat roof of the west wing of the hospital was (and still is) an American flag painted in brilliant colors—measuring 13 feet by about 18 feet. The sky was clear and the flag was clearly visible.

"The hospital building stood the attack very well. The pitched roof over the fifth floor center was demolished. One bomb hit almost in the direct center of the building within 100 feet of the large American flag. There was a direct hit on the pump house and so we have no water—about \$10,000 worth of drugs were destroyed.

"The three of us, the Writer, Mrs. Beddoe, and Dr. Wm. L. Wallace of Tennessee—are remaining here."

Not a patient was killed and not a member of the staff was injured. About 80 wounded were brought into the hospital soon after the bombing.

Texas Baptists, because so many of their friends are on the mission fields and because of their large contributions to this work, are particularly interested in foreign missions and this phase of their activity was emphasized during sessions of the convention held at the meeting of the Woman's Missionary Union preceding it.

Next Monday the annual Red Cross membership campaign will begin in Mills county according to Mayor H. G. Bodkin, Mills county chairman.

Having had first hand proof of the value of the Red Cross service to people in need, Mills county folks will not need to be urged to join for another year.

The Red Cross campaign is sponsored by the Self Culture Club. Mrs. J. H. Saylor is chairman of the membership committee which consists of Mrs. J. C. Evans, Miss Dera Humphries, and Mrs. Jim Weatherly.

REA Construction Waits on 54 Men

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 10.—REA has allotted \$286,000 for a rural electrification project to build about 350 miles of line to serve 867 customers in Coryell, Mills, Hamilton, Comanche and Lampasas counties. Out of this allotment \$24,000 will be used to defray certain expenses connected with the initial operations of the project which cannot be covered by the construction loan.

Before the funds in this allotment can be released for construction purposes it will be necessary for at least 54 of the prospective members adjacent to the proposed lines to become members of the cooperative and sign for service.

The cooperative has been advised of the allotment and supplied with instructions for getting the lines under construction. The money will be available as details are completed.

Construction of these lines will provide nearly 74,000 man hours of employment in direct labor alone.

A schedule for legal and engineering steps will be sent to the project in the immediate future. Strict adherence to this schedule, which is set up to assist in the orderly and efficient handling of the work, will shorten the time before these Texas farmers can begin using electricity.

As construction progresses and the operating stage approaches, new problems will come up. In addition to furnishing funds, REA wants to be helpful in every way possible. The Division of Operations Supervision is ready to assist with these operating problems and to act as a clearing house for information as the Legal and Engineering Divisions do during the construction period.

The normal progress schedule for REA projects has been established on the basis of average conditions. Local conditions beyond the control of anyone after cause delays. One of the most frequent causes of delays is the difficulty in securing rights-of-way—NO REA FUNDS MAY BE USED TO PAY FOR RIGHTS-OF-WAY. Additional Texas grants have been announced as follows:

\$186,000 to build about 242 miles of line to serve 467 customers in Brown, Concho, McCulloch and San Saba counties. The project previously has been allotted \$100,000 to build 106 miles of line to serve 300 customers in the above mentioned and Coleman and Mason counties.

\$46,000 to build about 52 miles of line to serve 140 customers in McLennan county. The project previously has been allotted \$308,000 to build 340 miles of line to serve 936 customers in the above mentioned and Bell, Basque, Falls and Coryell counties.







President Wilson's plan of a League of Nations that was to police the world was repudiated by the Republicans in the United States Senate, and he died broken-hearted. The United States was left on the sidelines holding the bag of repudiated war debts.

Japan seized Manchoukuo. The League of Nations shook its finger and said, "Naughty, naughty."

Italy grabbed Ethiopia. The League of Nations stamped its foot and imposed sanctions. Italy thumbed its nose and went ahead.

Germany seized the Ruhr, rebuilt her army and navy and prepared for war as no other nation has ever done.

England, alarmed at last, began to re-arm. So did France. Uncle Sam refused even to let his CCC boys drill or learn to shoot a gun. Japan sank the Panay, its American flag flying.

This year Germany was ready to go. Austria went first, and the world stood still. Czechoslovakia came next, its independence solemnly guaranteed by France and England. England asked the United States if we would back her in a war. We couldn't say. England backed down. France backed down. Russia growled but didn't move. And Germany moved in and took the best of Czechoslovakia for herself and sliced off tasty hunks for Hungary and Poland.

Japan has finished gobbling up China and has put up the sign, "White Men, Clear Out of Asia and Keep Out."

Germany stronger, closer knit, more powerful in every way than she was in 1914 is choosing what to grab next. Will it be the Ukraine in Russia? Will it be her old colonies in Africa? Or will it be Brazil, Colombia, even Mexico? Hitler will take what is easiest to get. If he comes to America, what nations will come to our aid? France, England? Probably not, for Germany has the airfleets to blast their cities—London and Paris—into smoking ruins like Canton and Madrid.

AMERICA MUST RE-ARM!

Twenty years after the close of the War to end Wars and more soldiers are in the field fighting or ready to fight than ever before.

Twenty years have passed and hatreds and prejudices have flamed as never before in the history of the world.

Twenty years have gone and the law of the jungle is back in force.

This lesson stands out: Without firing a shot, Germany has regained more territory than she lost, more men and more resources. She was able to do this because England and France had stood still, and when the crisis came the odds were against them.

When the crisis comes to America, we must be prepared. We must have our arms. We are not living in a world at peace. It is still only an Armistice.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Lesson for November 13

THE SACREDNESS OF HUMAN LIFE

LESSON TEXT—Exodus 20:13; Matt. 5:21-26, 38-42. GOLDEN TEXT—Thou shalt not kill.—Exodus 20:13. Whosoever hateth his brother is a murderer.—1 John 3:15.

The sanctity of human life finds its foundation in the fact that God created man in His own likeness and image. Because that is true man has any right to take the life of another for any cause except a direct command of God. Only by the orderly process of law for the protection of society and in accordance with the Word of God may there be any such action by man toward man. Both of these truths are declared in Scripture in God's covenant with Noah (Gen. 9:5, 6), which was made possibly a thousand years before the Ten Commandments were given to Moses.

Life is held rather cheaply in our day. Nations count their boys and girls as only so much "war material." Life is destroyed on the highway, in the shop, or in the home. Let us declare again the solemn command of God, "Thou shalt not kill."

I. The Prohibition of Murder (Exod. 20:13).

The word "kill" in this commandment is one which means a violent and unauthorized taking of life, and is therefore more properly translated "murder." Not all killing is murder. A man may kill another entirely accidentally, or he may be the duly constituted legal officer carrying out the law of the land in taking the life of one who has forfeited his right to live because he has slain another. There is also the right of self-defense, be it individual or collective. But these are the only exceptions; let us not attempt to justify any other.

Murder is too prevalent in our land. In 1936 there were 13,242 outright killings—a murder every 40 minutes. The head of the United States secret service estimates that there are 200,000 persons at large in our land who "have murder in their hearts and who will take human life before they die." Also in 1938 there were 37,800 deaths in automobile accidents. Some of these were by unavoidable accidents, but many were really murder because the one responsible drove with defective brakes, dangerous tires, or while he was intoxicated. Add to these the deaths in industry caused by failure to provide proper safeguards or healthy working conditions, and by the exploitation of child labor, and we say again, that we should cry aloud, "Thou shalt do no murder."

II. The Cause of Murder (Matt. 5:21, 22).

The Sermon on the Mount, from which the rest of our lesson is taken, while it "describes the character of the citizens of the earthly kingdom which the Messiah came to set up" and "assumes a class of people already saved, regenerated, and in fellowship with their King" (James M. Gray), does provide fundamental principles for the guidance of the Christian.

In this matter of murder, Jesus cuts right through the outward aspects of the matter and points out that an angry hatred in the heart is the root of all murder. If we hate, we have murder in our hearts. Circumstances may hinder its fulfillment, but the danger is always there until we remove the cause. Just being angry—calling our brother "Raca" (the modern equivalent of which is "nobody there"), and calling him "thou fool," which classifies him as "morally worthless"—these are the three dreadful downward steps to murder. And they begin in anger. May God help those of us who have strong feelings that we may not yield them to the devil in such anger against our brother!

III. The Prevention of Murder (Matt. 5:23-26, 33-42).

Prevention with God means more than putting up a barrier to keep us from killing. He deals with the heart, and thus puts the whole life right. It is not even a question of how we may feel against our brother. If he has sinned against us we are to do all we can to win him. He may be unreasonable, grasping, and unfair. However, the spirit that will win him is not that of retaliation or sullen submission to the inevitable, but rather a free and willing going even beyond what is required.

The full interpretation of this passage is not possible in our limited space. It is clear from other scriptures that it does not mean that wicked and unscrupulous men are to be permitted to defraud and destroy God's people. At the same time, we must not explain away the heart of our Lord's interpretation of this great commandment. Let us seek His grace that we may, like Him, silence by our loving deeds and words even the bitter gainsayers of the gospel.
