A meeting of the Mills County Aluminum Collection Committee was held in the Commissioners' afternoon for the purpose of studying regulations for the aluminum drive.

The following dates are suggested as a schedule to be followed all over the United States: July 14 to 21-Local chairmen organize their committees and publicize the drive.

July 21 to 24 Get word around to people to have aluminum

July 25. 26, 27-Gather alumifrom house to house and bring to central storage designated by local chairman.

July 29-Local chairman notify his County Commissioner where to pick up aluminum. July 30-All aluminum brought to storage in Goldthwaite by

county and city trucks. It is very important that every householder and business in the county be given an opportunity to contribute whatever scrap aluminum they have to spare.

All persons are requested to offer their services to their local chairman in making the drive. This may seem unimportant to some people, but remember there is a national emergency and there is a serious shortage of aluminum. Your scrap is needed, however small it might be.

It is hoped next week, all over the nation, to collect enough scrap aluminum to build 2,000 airplanes for Uncle Sam's defense effort.

# ORGANIZES TUESDAY NIGHT

### WPA STREET AND ROAD IMPROVEMENT IN COUNTY FINISHED

The WPA projects covering in the City of Mullin and Precinct No. 3 was completed on July 3, according to John C. Stilley, WPA district director division of operations.

City of Mullin and Mills County the Boys of 1918 and organized Commissioners' Court, began in November, 1940, and has employed an average of 44 workers with an average monthly payroll of \$1,467 00.

One mile of new county road was built under this project, including three concrete structures. In the City of Mullin there are 35 blocks to have a caliche top, including two concrete structures and 16 boxes, 2x1x30 Other Improvements

Sponsored by the City of Mullin and Mills County, the WPA road and street improvement in Mills County was completed on July 3, according to John C. Stilley, WPA district director division of operations.

Operating since November, 1940, this project has employed an average of 40 wrokers with an average monthly payroll of \$1,600. WPA furnished \$13,203 and the sponsors \$4,846.81 of the amount spend on this work.

Work included grading, lowtype surfacing, and construction of drainage structure on streets in the City of Mullin and on The Baptist Revival which has South Mulin and Goldthwaite

#### LEGISLATIVE HANDICAPS

By GEORGE C. HESTER

Swearing at our State Legislature has become one of the public habits of the day. The body is damned for what it does, as well as for what it does not do. Other organs of government often try to shift the blame for their own failures and weaknesses to the Legislature. In this respect the body frequently is made the victim of unscrupulous tactics in the sordid game of politics.

Last week this column pointed out some of the heavy handicaps under which a legislative body labors. The growing complexity of its work due to the tremendous variety of problems, the endless pressure of economic interests, the insatiable and growing demands for public funds, the lack of adequate means to secure necessary information, all tend to impose almost insuperable handicaps upon the conscientious legislator who seriously endeavors to serve in that capacity.

Some of these handicaps can be remedied and others cannot. The complexity of this task will mount. Nor will there ever be any substitute for brains and ability. The average citizen, for example, should begin to realize the real importance of the State Legislature. This is the body that formulates the public policy under which six million Texans must live. It spends, or authorizes the spending of, over \$220,000,000 annually. The results of its work in finance, regulation, and the promotion of our welfare, run the whole gamet of modern life. Measured by results, it is the most important organ in state government, and the positions in it should be such as to command the best talent and ability among

There are several insuperable handicaps, however, that must be alleviated. The very importance of this body is all the more reason why we should examine this central powerhouse of state government and provide whatever changes and remedies as will better enable the body to perform its difficult tasks and regain the confidence of the people, which at present is at a pretty low ebb.

One of the many handicaps that besets the average legislator is his ability to secure accurate and adequate information so necessary in modern legislation. Committee hearings are confusing, often a bit ludicrous. At best they are limited largely to that type of legislation which directly affects certain groups or group interests, and usually fail in giving either an adequate appraisal of the measure, or the informtion by which the legislator can formulate his own decision. The great problems that affect the people generally, on the other hand, such as that of getting an adequate return for the taxpayers' dollar by improving government services, are rarely given any attention.

Let us take the paramount problem of public spending as an illustration.

On this important subject, the legislator in reality hears only one side of the subject. This side is presented by those who are doing the spending. The vast amount of data and information is largely to prove one case—that of the needs of increased expenditures and more funds. The whole loose and irresponsible ng system of our state has degenerated into what is little more than a grand scramble for public monies and log-rolling; at his naval course in the Harvard coalitions against the public treasury. One chamber, for example, | business school all week, but unless in about thirty minutes' time, added over \$4,000,000 by amendments to an appropriation bill, which procedure, of course, could not have had the adequate information as to actual needs, and as a result, was largely a "hit or miss" affair.

Now no such practice can continue indefinitely in any system of enlightened government. A modern and adequate budgetary system would give our Legislature the complete information necessary, would show the actual needs, and in addition, would supply a working fiscal program for the two-year period. Moreover it would co-ordinate the scattered and delapidated spending system now operating from a hundred spending pockets, into a sensible, responsible program of fiscal operation aimed at giving the best services for the taxpayers' dollar in place of the present biennial grand scramble where the chief aim of each group is to get the hog's share of public money.

Texas needs a real budgetary system. It is this or bankruptcy sooner or later.

#### State Department Health Notes

If your work is such that it causes excessive perspiration, add a pinch of ordinary table salt to each drink of water you take to help prevent heat cramps. This is advised by Dr. George W. Cox, State Health officer, to prevent a possible increase in the number of heat victims as the Texas thermometer hits 95 degrees and above.

Laborers, mechanics, farmers and white collar workers whose work causes them to sweat profusely, are in danger of having their body salt content become deficient with resulting heat cramps or heat fag. Salt is a prominent constituent of sweat; the body may lose as high as 40 to 50 grams of salt during hot days.

In industry, a method of preventing heat cramps is to take a tablet of pure salt or mixture of salt and dextrose with each drink of water. Workmen whose duties require muscular exertion should be especially careful to add more than the usual amount of salt to what they eat and drink.

Salt deficiency may be prevented by taking salt in various ways. Where prepared tablets are not available, table salt may be added to each drink of water. Milk is a source of salt and will help make up for the deficiency caused by sweating. Alcoholic drinks should be avoided.

Heat cramp is characterized by pains (cramps) in the abdominal region, headache, and appointed not to be able to wait to in severe cases, by nausea and vomiting. The body temperature remains about normal, likewise the pulse rate; body salt losses occur without the knowledge of the individual until there is a deficiency; then the abdominal muscles begin to cramp.

#### THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE CHURCH REGARDING BEVERAGE ALCOHOL

LESSON TEXT-I Corinthians 5:9-13; Titus 2:1-8.

GOLDEN TEXT—Ye are the salt of the earth —Matthew 5:13.

The church has a grave responsibility regarding alcoholic beverages, but in recent years it has largely failed to meet it with intelligence and enthusiasm. Let us never forget that the first business of the Christian and of the church is to preach the gospel, winning men to Christ. It is not our calling to attempt by social or economic methods to right the wrongs of this world. Nor is ours a "social gospel" with the emphasis on "social." But have we forgotten that it is a gospel with serious social implications and responsibilities?

The man, and the church, who follows Christ should be vitally concerned about every influence in American life which is destructive to character, and right at the top of that list stands alcohol. To meet this gigantic (and growing) problem effectively the church must be

I. Separated From Sin (I Cor. A church living in careless world-

liness has no testimony against the sin round about it. In fact, its influence is definitely on the wrong side. The Christian is to be in the world, but not of it. He must live with the sinners, but he must never by word or deed, or even by his presence in the wrong place, seem to condone their sin nor fellowship with them in it.

Here we have one of the horrible weaknesses of our day. Men and women who profess to follow Christ (whether they really do, only He can judge) indulge in a social glass wine, or sip a cocktail "for the sake of courtesy," or attend gatherings which are obviously Christian or anti-Christian. If there is to be effective dealing with any problem—with the liquor problem—we must have separated Christian living.

#### II. Cleansed of Wicked Persons (I Cor. 5:11-13).

Even a "man that is called a brother" (v. 11) may not be one at all, but may be a "wicked person" (v. 13). We are not able to judge any man's spiritual experience. His relationship to God is a matter between him and God, but if. in his life, he shows himself persistently to be on the side of wickedness, it is the duty of the church to have him "put away from among" them (v. 13).

We can only judge a man by his actions, but we are required to do that for the sake of the purity of the church and the effectiveness of its teaching. This is not to be done in self-righteousness, but in humility and with the constant effort to restore such a one (Gal. 6:1). But "This has so cut off the world it should be done. We are woefully weak in the matter of church discipline, and it shows in the inability of the church to do valiant service for God and country.

III. Intelligent in Doctrine (Titus

#### IV. Consistent in Life (Titus 2: 1-8, esp. 2, 5, 7).

It is what we are that speaks so loudly that folk do not pay any attention to what we say. This pas sage clearly states the fact that both young and old, both men and women -yes, even the preacher (v. 7)-are to present before the world the unteaching of a consistent

Read the exhortations of these verses again with great care and apply them first to your own life, and then to your own church. What great Christian graces we have Note that again and again there is the admonition to tem-perance. No user of intoxicants can be sober, temperate, discreet, chaste, sound in faith, and so on.

The writer of these notes is convinced that the only consistent posi-tion for the Christian (individually or in the church) to take regarding alcoholic beverages is that of total abstinence for himself and the legal elimination of temptation from

It consisted of an army press, which printed one six-colmn page at a time, 50 pounds of 10-point body type. and 8 fonts of ad type, from 8 pt. to 36 pt.
