PRICE CONTROL IN THE OFFING

By GEORGE C. HESTER

One of the dreaded specters of every war is that of run-away prices, the results of which place millons of people in the vise of small or fixed income on the one hand with which to meet the ever mounting living costs on the other. Economists today are watching with wary eyes the rise in price levels as compared with those of World War No. 1. We all remember the silk-shirt area immediately following the first World War that came as a result of the bogus prosperity created by government spending and other factors of a temporary nature.

Looking back over the period we now know that the net results in the long run were tremendously detrimental to both the economy and the morale of this country.

A people learn by experience, however, and the lessons of that war should be valuable guides for us in this one, provided, of course, we heed the danger signals in time.

Here are some of the parallels that indicate present-day trends. Up to the first of July. the present war was twenty-two months old. During that period, wholesale prices in this country have risen about 18 per cent, and are showing definite trends upward. During the first World War, the same price levels rose 20 per cent in the first twenty-two months after war was declared in 1914. It was after that period, however, that prices really began to spiral. By June 1, 1920, the level was 145 per cent above the prewar level

Present day conditions offer both parallels and contrasts to those of 1914-16. In those days the Allied governments were doing most of the purchasing, some of it, of course, with American credits. Today our own government is doing the purchasing, and much of it with borrowed money, resulting in an enormously expanded commercial bank credit, which constitutes a further inflationary tendency.

At the same time the contemplated spending program of our government today far exceeds anything in World War No. 1. Our government actually has planned, for all phases of defense work, a 60 billion dollar defense program. Of this vast amount, only about 7 billions have been spent to date, of the 36 billions already authorized. In short, a 60 billions defense program planned, of which some 36 billions are authorized and under way, with only 7 billions actually spent to date.

The above plan indicates the enormous spending program ahead. It proves without doubt that we are preparing for a long war, and that preparation is on every front-supplies, loans, munitions, planes, ships, tanks, army camps, equipment, far-flung naval bases, factories, power resources and all other lines of production necessary for a total and all-out war.

Nothing like it was ever planned or formulated in the first World War. The 60 billions planned is twice as much as our total expenditures during the first struggle

There are several reasons for the vast scale of preparation. We are opposing a nation that not only controls the economy of all Europe, but one that is actually spending 24 billions each year on the war. This is to be compared with England's annual rate of about 12 billions, and to our own rate which is now about 9 bil-

Another factor is that of war costs, which today tremendously exceed those of 1918. Far more machines are required, and far a dress they had made for me and more supplies per soldier are necessary. Weapons and munitions are far more complex and costly. Many more skilled workers per soldier are required, and skilled labor constitutes over two times the relative costs in the production of aircrafts, trucks and other defense materials now as then.

When we consider that skilled labor in Germany receives from 28 to 32 cents per hour compared to the 75 to 90 cents in America, one of the causes for the extra costs is apparent.

In fact, the 36 billion dollar defense program in America would cost Germany only 15 or 16 billions, the difference due chiefly to lower labor costs plus the use of a force of over 1,000,000 semislave labor imported from conquered countries.

These conditions foretell further price rises and the necessity of artificial price controls if we are to profit by the lessons of the past. Price control, however, is a complicated, difficult and treacherous course of governmental experimentation.

This column next week will discuss other factors involved in such a policy as the issue will, in all probability, be before Congress in the near future

LETTER FROM ENGLAND

At this time adequate rest is of greater importance to all of is the opportunity the body takes to rebuild and repair the tissues impaired in their efficiency by fatigue. In other words, the sum total of our individual physical fitness is measured by the resilency of our faculties to return to normal after a depleting day's work.

The means by which we reknit the ravages of fatigue through rest are several. Complete rest is most easily obtainable by sleep at least eight or more dividual needs.

Physical relaxation (rest) is of value to us also. The change from every day labor and worry through participation in sports, games, hobbies, and the like is a recognized principle of good get in some sort of physical exercise daily-a brisk walk, if we lack the opportunity for more active sports

Medical and public health authorities also recognize the need for mental relaxation, apart from physical sports or games which keep the mind keyed to a high pitch. Even when a person's physical apparatus is completely relaxed (resting) the mind may still be plagued with problems and be un-relaxed.

So mental relaxation, valuable as it is, is more evasive than physical relaxation. The simplest form of relaxation is 'wakeful rest" whereby the individual gets his mind completely away from himself and lets his mind "idle" by following something not of his personal creation or thought. It is thus possible to rest mentally and physically if the mind is entertained rather than exercised. Numerous diversions are available to us which offer inexpensive opportunities for "wakeful rest."

If we give thought to budgeting time each day so that our work quota is supplemented by physical and mental relaxation and adequate sleep, we will keep our health at par and increase made in Scotland. NEW WILDLIFE BILLS ENACTED INTO LAW

Legislature set a record for longevity by being in session 171 days, it established a record of introducing almost one wildlife bill per day. In all, 141 bills dealing directly or indirectly with wildlife in Texas were introduced. Of those bills, 105 were enacted into law, the largest number ever passed by any Texas Legislature.

Only eight of the 105 new wildlife measures are general in nature, applying to the entire state. All the rest are local laws, some applying to one county, some to several. Many of the local laws extended the life of old laws about to expire. All in all, most of them were protective in purpose.

One of the outstanding local laws passed was one which could foreshadow legislative policy in the matter of game regulation. The law in question grants the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission the power to fix open and closed seasons, determine bag limits, and in other ways husband the fish resources of the huge Possum Kingdom Lake in Palo Pinto, Stephens and Young Counties.

Getting More Wear From Your Hosiery

Warm, sunshiny days prevail after many rains. It is getting dry fast, and many are wishing for another rain.

Are you "hard on stockings?" Perhaps it is because you haven't paid enough attention to the buying of what in these days of shorter skirts has been called "the most important third of your costume." Manufacturers have made great strides in recent years in improving their machinery and methods, and you can expect better service from your stockings than before. But, as in the case of many other products, some cooperation is expected from you, both in buying stockings that meet your individual needs, and in caring for them properly.



You may, for example, like the feeling of snugly gartered hose. Yet you know that this often causes runs when you are active. In this case hose with a lastex band knitted in above the knee may prove your salvation. The lastex band stretches, and alleviates strains that otherwise might cause threads to break and run.

Buying stockings with a highly-twisted thread construction also increases resistance to runs caused by snags, gives greater resiliency, clinging fit, and beauty that lasts longer. "Nonrun" constructions are good, too. In these a broken snag will travel only to the nearest locked stitch. Instead of a run you have only a small hole which is easily mended. Latex-impregnated stockings—an invisible, new finish magically, and are very comfortable to wear.

To get that perfect fit, that is so necessary to your sense of being well dressed, buy stockings that are proportioned to your legs. Hosiery is being manufactured today which not only gives you your correct foot size and leg length, but also considers correct leg circumference. It allows for measurements at thigh, knee, calf, and instep. Ask for proportioned hose, and you'll have less worries about bagginess, wrinkling, undue strain, and tightness in the wrong places.

Keep on buying a brand that experience has shown you is satisfactory. This may seem like superfluous advice, but surprisingly enough a recent survey shows that 72 percent of women did not know what brands they were wearing! Hit-and-miss buying can only produce hit-and-miss results. Do a little investigating. Find out what brand best fits your requirements, note its name and adopt it for your own. Some brands carry informative labels that will help you discover hidden qualities. Don't neglect to read such labels, and keep them, if they offer special information on care.

Thanks to research carried on by the U. S. Bureau of Home Economics, under the direction of Ruth O'Brien, many improvements and new styles have been originated in cotton hosiery. If you haven't looked into cotton hosiery lately, you are in for ga agreeable surprise. They are no longer ill-fitting, drab-colored and unstylishly thick, but smooth, lustrous and sheer and high-twisted.
