

Aid U. S. By Using Old Flashlights In Blackouts, Urges Henderson

MILLIONS of flashlights, now lying around in American homes, can be put to work in the event of blackouts, thus relieving the drain which the purchase of new lights would place on critical metals and plastics, according to Leon Henderson, Director of the Division of Civilian Supply, Office of Production Management.

Disturbed by reports that thousands of Americans are trying to-buy new flashlights, Mr. Hender-son has obtained a survey which shows that a large majority of families need not fear being with-out illumination in the event of blackouts.

blackouts.

Seventy per cent of families in the United States, the survey discloses, now have one or more flashlights. Forty per cent of families have flashlights which are in perfect condition, ready for service at a moment's notice. Another 23 per cent have lights which can be made usable merely by the purchase of fresh batteries. Seven per cent of all families have inoperative flashlights, many of which need only minor repairs in order to give excellent service.

LESSON TEXT-Luke 3:1-6, 15-17, 21,

No. "A man clothed in soft rai-ment?" No. "A prophet? Yea, I say unto you, and more than a prophet. For this is he, of whom it is written, Behold, I send my mes-senger before thy face. . . Verily I say unto you, Among them that are born of women there hath not risen a greater than John the Baptist." ch was the testimony of Jesus (Matt. 11:7-11) about the man who in our lesson of today bears his tesimony concerning Jesus.

I. John: the Preacher of Repent-

ance (vv. 1-3). The times in which a man lives will often make or break him. If times are dark and difficult most men submit to the burden of the day without protest or effort. But not so with John. In spite of the | State Depart largest revenue measure in the state's history enacted by the last legislature, the General Fund is running nearly ten millions in arcars annually. In the face of such a deficit, the state's revenues will decline ten or twelve million dollars this year due chiefly to the elimination of car sales and the falling gasoline taxes. This means that tremendous pressure will be exerted to enact another fifteen or twenty million dollar tax bill the next session which meets next year.

There is but one alternative. That is a hard-boiled and realistic determination to stop the rising tide of public expenditures in this state. But there must be a program. Merely opposing more taxes has proven its failure time and time again in this state. Essential services should not be crippled. That program must be constructive, far-reaching, and backed with an array of facts.

We must not levy any more state taxes during this critical period. It is not a matter of how much money we would like to able, seven types of defense work spend. It is a matter of cold and inescapable necessity that we live within present income, even if we have to apply the principle of priority to the public till.

Beyond this the program should offer a plan to modernize and streamline our obsolete state and local governments to the end that business methods of efficiency can be applied. This has been too long delayed. Our state today is conducting its services through a hundredpocket spending system operated by a hodgepodge of diffused and disjointed agencies with accounting, purchasing, and other methods that violate every principle of efficiency and sensible transaction of business. Several years ago Governor Byrd re-organized the government of Virginia. As a result the state treasury today has a \$9.000,000 surplus. Nebraska, Minnesota, and in uniform. other states have similar records. But they faced the facts and got the job done instead of following the easiest course by heaping on more taxes as we have done in Texas.

We must now face the issue. The time is ripe. It will mean savings of untold millions for the taxpayers in the long and difficult years ahead. There is no other way out.

Appeal To Local Farmers to Uphold **Quality of Crops**

Farmers of Mills County have been appealed to to help along the nation's war effort by eliminating food waste and by producing only farm crops of unquestioned quality.

The appeal comes from H. C. Darger, coordinator of the National Cream Quality Program, Chicago

Mr. Darger is immediately concerned with the waste involved in that portion of cream produced on farms which, be cause of a low standard of cleanliness or care in production or handling or perhaps infrequent marketing, is found on delivery to the creamery to be unfit for manufacturing into butter under the stringent federal food law regulations. Cream thus rejected represents a serious loss to the nation's nutrition as well as to the farmer's pocketbook. Some timely words of caution on two problems pertaining to the production of cream at this season were issued by Mr. Darger. Do not keep cream on the farm too long even in cold weather, he states. If held too long, it is likely to develop old, rancid flavors. A cave or cellar may be of the right temperature for holding the cream, but if musty it will likely spoil the delicate flavor. Cooking odors and stored vegetables also affect the flavor and cause the resulting butter to be marked down in grade. Freezing is a second hazard to be guarded against. Froz en cream does not make highgrade butter; the freezing changes the cream so that it result in mealy, oily, undesirable butter. Cream is best kept in clean odor-proof place, in temperature above freezing, and must be protected from freezing on the haul to market.
