### RIGHT TO BE LET ALONE

Somerset Maugham, the distinguished novelist, playwrite, and essayist, recently said this: "If a nation values anything more than freedom, it will lose its freedom; and the irony of it is that if it is comfort or money that it values more, it will lose that too."

There, in a brilliant sentence, is the tragic significance of the world wide movement toward "security' at any price. Nation after nation has surrendered its liberties in return for promises of bread and shelter. And, once the liberties were gone and the tyrants were secure in office, the people found that they had less bread and shelter than before.

The greatest danger in this country is what H. W. Prentis, Junior, has termed, "the present blurring of the lines of responsibility between the three departments of the Federal government." The ultimate result of this policy will be to create that certain destroyer of liberty—a government of men instead of a government of laws. We have gone a long way in that direction now. We have created a monstrous Federal bureaucracy which dominates every business, every folks. region, every life; which is the author of countless confusion and opposed directive and ukases-and which, finally, has seriously undermined the selfreliance and energies of the people.

The late, great Justice Brandeis once said: "The makers of the Constitution.....conferred, as against the government, the right to be let alone, the most comprehenisve of rights and the right most valued by the holidays to the delight of civilized man." For centuries the world struggled toward that goal. Now it is turning back along a road whose end is always slavery and despair. 


