PROCLAMATION By The GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF TEXAS To All to Whom These

Presents Shall Come:

WHEREAS, a vacancy now exists in the membership of the House of Representatives of this State, occasioned by the resignation, on January 13, 1949, of the Honorable J. R. Eanes, State Representative from the One Hundred and Fourth Representative District, comprising Comanche and Mills Counties, Texas.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, BEAU-FORD H. JESTER, Governor of Texas, under the authority vested in me by the Constitution and statutes of the State of Texas, and particularly pursuant to Article 16, Section 27, Constitution of Texas, and Article 2953a, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, do hereby order an election and issue a writ of election directing that a special election be held in the One Hundred and Fourth Representative District of Texas on the 10th day of February, 1949, for the purpose of electing a State Representative for the One Hundred and Fourth Representative District, comprising the counties aforesaid, to serve out the unexpired term of the Honorable J. R. Eanes, resigned.

A copy of this order or writ will be mailed immediately to the County Judges of Comanche and Mills Counties, Texas, and all appropriate writs will issue and all proper proceedings will be followed to the end that said election may be held and its results proclaimed in

When Abe Lincoln came to Washington for his first inauguration seven states had left the Union and the newly-elected President came into an unfriendly city. Washington, after all, is South of the Mason-Dixon Line. They say three-fourths of the capital residents regarded Lincoln as an enemy.

Euroute to Washington from Illinois, he was induced to change his schedule in order to avoid assassination. He slipped into town at 6:00 a. m.

In this Inaugurational atmosphere he rode up Pennsylvania Avenue in a carriage surrounded by soldiers. Sharp-shooters on housetops trained their rifles on the main street below.

It was thus that the "backwoodsman" rode to the Capital to swear to preserve the Union. Rough weather has played

havoc with many inaugural pageants and imperiled the health of many Presidents. Indeed, one President lost his life as a result of exposure during the inauguration. William Henry Harrison, oldest man ever to become President, died of pneumonia attributed in large part to the rigors of the swearing-in ceremonies.

Harrison, the 68 year old warrior of Tippecanoe, hatless and

without an overcoat, mounted a white horse and rode him triumphantly from the White House to the Capitol on a wintry day. He spoke for an hour facing a raw wind, then stood in a receiving line all afternoon and polished off the day by attending three inauguration balls. He died exactly one month later.

But the worst inaugural weather in history greeted William H. Taft. an elderly taxidriver recalled it to me the oth-

It was a whirling blizzard, he recalled, featured by flares of lightning, rain, sleet, heavy snowfall and a whirling wind. Telephone and telegraph lines were down, and Washington was

Cover and bake in a moderate oven (350 F) for 30 minutes, remove cover and bake 30 minutes longer, or until tender and browned.

## No Greater Prophet

Lesson for January 23, 1949 "OF ALL the characters in his-

tory, which one do you admire most?" We know how Jesus He had a great array of personages from whom to make his selection. But he took as the Great Man of all time, up to his own generation, no heroic figure from

the past, no king, general, scholar or prophet. The greatest man, for Jesus -or at least one so great that he could think of none greater-was one of his own contemporaries, a cousin of his who was in jail at the

time when Jesus said of him, "Among those born of women none is greater than John." Known to us as John the Baptist, that is, John the Baptizer, we seldom realize either his greatness or the close connection between his life and that of Jesus.

## John of the Jordan

WE DO not know how much Jesus himself owed to John. We do know that John was the man who first called the public's attention to Jesus. John it was who gave some of Jesus' most important disciples their first training; John who introduced to Jesus, and turned over to him, some of his own followers. It may be significant too that Jesus' first preaching was identical with that of John (compare Matthew 3:2 and 4:17).

Some Christian scholars have gone so far as to suppose that it was John's preaching that from Nazareth to leave his shop and begin his great work as

Whether this is so or not, we do know that it was the baptizing by John which led to the baptism of the turning-point between Jesus' stormy public career. It is quite clear that if there had been no John the Baptizer, the story of Jesus would have been very different from what it actually was.

## Only a Voice

OHN'S own picture of himself is not a picture at all. When they asked him to say what he was, and half-expected him to declare that was the Messiah, the longlooked for King. John said only, "I am the voice of one crying in the

John, so far as we know, never accepted dinner invitations, he was never under the roof of any friend, and he had no roof of his own. People even called him demon-possessed, he was so far removed from ordi nary life.

But Jesus was always in people's homes. That is one reason why the greatness of John fades before the greatness of Jesus, for a Voice makes a poor companion. Jesus had the human sympathy that John lacked, and John well knew this "He must increase, but I must de crease," he said.






## **PASTOR OF 42** YEARS AGO DIES

Rev. J. S. Bowles III died at is home in Fort Worth, December 29, and was laid to rest in he Garden of Memories Park, Fort Worth, Texas, after a long illness. Rev. Bowles came from Missouri as pastor to the Methodist Church in Goldthwaite in 1906 and served the charge three years. After his retirement he returned to this city and lived five years as he had a host of friends among the church

He was born in Ripley, Virinia (now konwn as West Virginia) in 1861 to Rev. M. V. Bowles and Mary Rayburn Bowas the Old Man Eloquent of the West Virginia Conference. His family was the decendents of the three Bowles brothers who setled in the Massachusets colony, ne of whom migrated to the rirginia Colony during that eriod. This southern branch of he family has had a place in he réligious history of the Virinias, having given ten ministers to the Methodist Church in hat section of the country, beinning with his great grandather, Dr. Mason Bowles, a pioneer doctor and local preacher besides teachers, college professors, doctors, lawyers have taken their places in the nation's work from this branch of the Bowles brothers. The present governor-elect of Connecticut is nom the New England branch J. S. Bowles grew up the hard way during the Reconstruction Period after the war between the States. He taught school to educate himself, as he felt the call to the ministry early in life. At the age of 24 he preached his first sermon in Bowles Chapel on Parchment Creek, West Virginia, built by his grandfather for the community in 1884. He entered the ministry in 1886 and retired in 1923. Bro. Bowles often laughingly said he had lived through four stages of transportation in his service to mankind: walked his first circuit; rode horseback with Bible and belongings in saddle bags; a station pastor, driving a pair of matched horses to buggy; then he served his last pastorates by automobile.

Bro. Bowles belonged to the ld school of southern gentlemen: while his material possesons were not great, he was rich in experiences with God and nankind; he was deeply intersted in the betterment of mannd and many a poor boy or girl found his or her way to an education through the influence illness, he taught the Men's message to each of his children;




