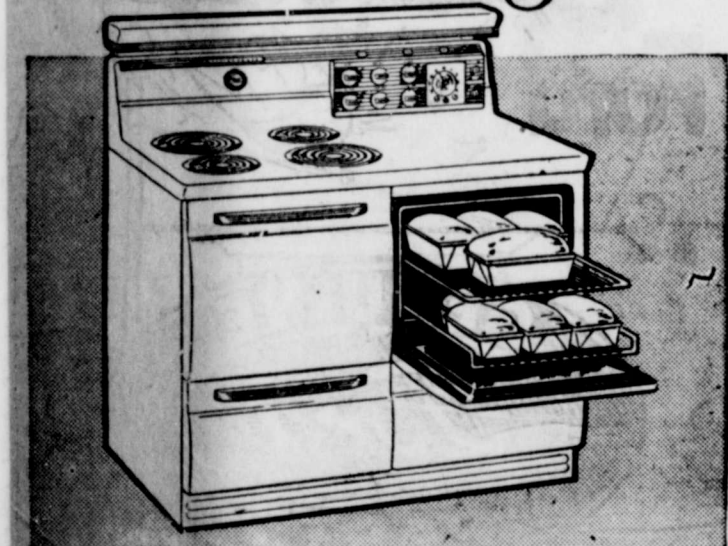

**SAFETY CHECK YOUR AUTOMOBILE**

"In line with the traffic safety drive of the National Safety Council being conducted this spring, motorists should give their automobiles a thorough safety checkup," E. L. Harrig, director of service for the Chevrolet Motor Division, said recently.

"A thorough examination of Brakes, tires, wheel alignment, steering, glass and lights can easily mean the difference between life and death on the highway," said Harrig. "A preliminary examination of these potential danger points on the car can be made by the motorist himself. Chevrolet dealers are well equipped to make a more detailed inspection of those items on the car that the owner may think need attention."

Harrig listed the various points of the car that have a bearing on its safety, and told how to ascertain whether they are functioning properly:

**Brakes**—If you can push the brake pedal to within one inch of the floor, it should be inspected. If the brakes pull the car to either side when stopping they should be inspected and brought up to standard. If, under customary driving conditions, it takes you longer to stop than previously, this also is a danger signal. Have the brakes inspected.

**Tires** — If they are worn smooth they will skid more eas-

ily. If irregular wear spots show on some tires, it is an indication of improper wheel alignment. It is well in any case to have wheel alignment inspected in a regular service department.

**Steering**—If there is more than an inch or so of play in the steering wheel, or if the front wheels are slow to react to a turn of the steering wheel, this feature should be inspected and brought to standard.

**Glass**—Check windshield and all windows for discoloration which sometimes is found in old cars. If your vision in any direction is restricted by faulty glass it should be replaced for protection of passengers and other cars. Never drive with a dirty windshield.

**Lights** — Make certain that both headlights burn on both upper and lower beams, and that tail and stop lights are working. Stand in front of the car with headlights on the lower beam and be certain that they do not blind approaching motorists. Keep headlight and tail light lenses clean at all times.

**SUMMER DYSENTERY**

The summer season always brings an increase in the incidence of dysentery, diarrhea and enteritis, all of which are major menaces to the lives of small children, annually causing the deaths of hundreds of Texas youngsters.

The State Health Officer, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, declares that the chief cause of these intestinal diseases are contaminated milk, water or food; allowing the child to get overheated or exhausted; excessive sugar in the infant's formula, and foods that have been improperly refrigerated.

"All foods should be clean and fresh, and all left-overs should be refrigerated so as to avoid spoilage. The utmost care should be used in preparing the infant's formula, which should, of course, be prescribed by a physician, and his recommendations as to sanitation precautions and correct refrigeration should be implicitly followed."

The State Health Officer warned parents especially of the danger of disease transmission by flies. Children in any home that is not free from flies, are in danger of contracting dysentery or other intestinal diseases

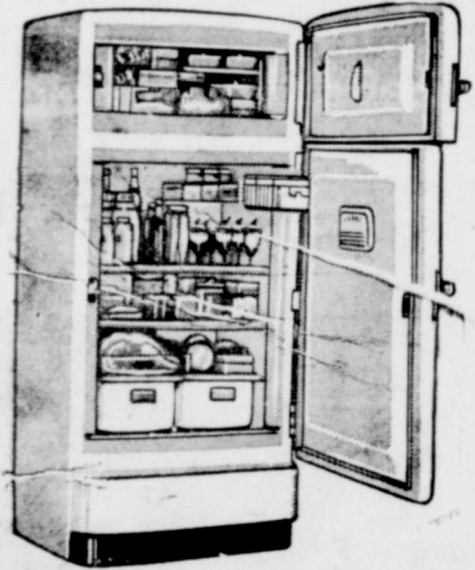
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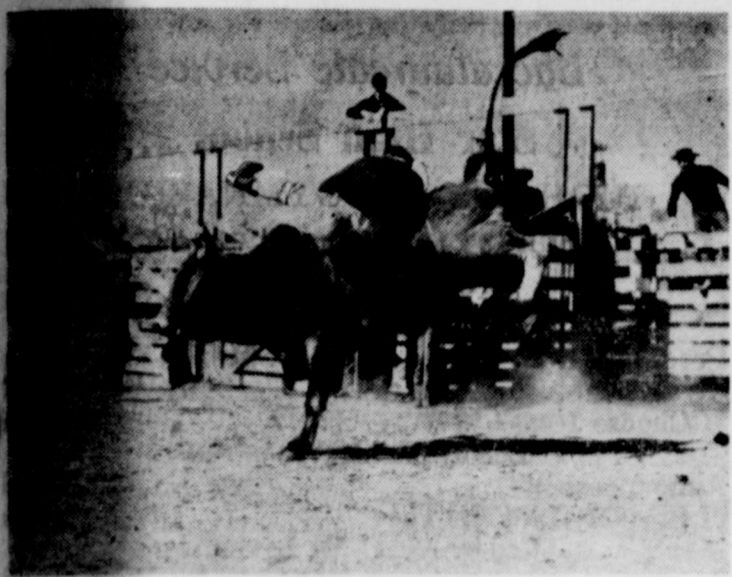

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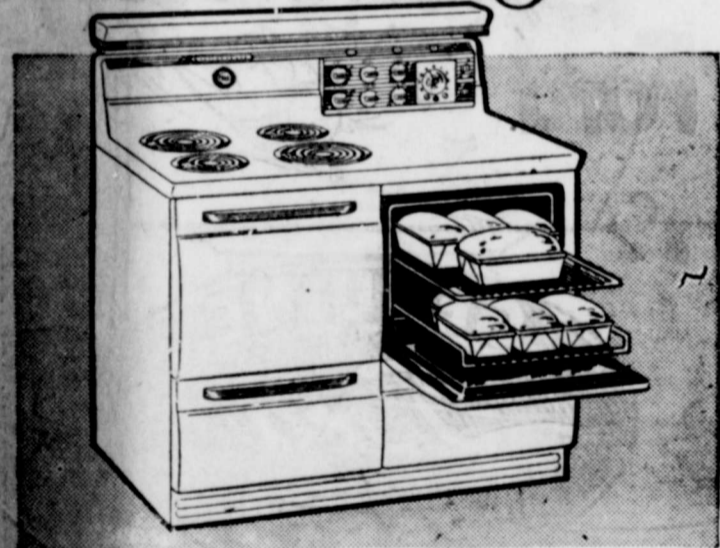

The State Health Officer warned parents especially of the danger of disease transmission by flies. Children in any home that is not free from flies, are in danger of contracting dysentery or other intestinal diseases

which may be fatal.

"If dysentery or diarrhea symptoms appear in your child, call your doctor immediately," Dr. Cox advises. "His treatment of the disease is your best insurance against fatal results since such diseases are really a very serious threat to the child's life. Don't depend on home remedies for diarrhea or dysentery; consult a competent physician and let him institute the safest and best treatment which medical science has available, for combating these

wasting diseases."

**GILMER-AIKEN  
SCHOOL LAW  
IS EXPLAINED**

The Gilmer-Aiken Bill No. 116 in Article VII sets out what must be done with Dormant School districts of each County (districts that have not had school for the past two years) and is as follows:

Districts Eligible: All school districts in Texas, subject to the provisions of this act, shall receive from the Foundation School Fund sufficient funds with which to maintain a min-

imum foundation school program, as provided for herein.

Provided that the County Board of School Trustees shall add the territory of any dormant school district to another district or districts. The term "dormant" as used herein shall mean any school district that fails for any two successive years since 1946-47 school year, to operate a school in the district. The above law will be in force by Sept. 1, 1949.

School Districts wanting to take advantage of selecting the school to which it will be annexed should make petition to the County Board of their counties for annexation before the above named date.

SECOND ANNUAL SHEEP AND GOAT SALE AT GATESVILLE

Gatesville, May 12—Spl.—The second Annual Show and Sale of the Texas Purebred Sheep Breeders Association will be held at Gatesville, Texas, on May 18th and 19th, assisted by the Gatesville Chamber of Commerce.

There will be eight breeds of sheep entered in the show, and all will be sold through the auction ring. These animals will be from some of the best herds of Texas, and would give a purchaser an opportunity to select herd studs or foundation stock. In addition to the eight breeds of Columbia, Corriedale, Delaine, Hampshire, Rambouillet, Shropshire, Southdown, and Suffolk, there will be 5 Cheviot rams for sale from the herd of F. E. Gifford of Port Arthur, Texas. The Cheviot is a little known breed for this section of the State.

The judging will be open May 18th with winners receiving cash prizes furnished by the Gatesville Chamber of Commerce and ribbons from the Purebred Sheep Breeders Association. On the morning of May 19th will be judging of the sheep by FFA and 4-H members, and the sale to start promptly at 1:00 p. m. At the first sale held during May of 1948, there were 162

There is a power on earth that is greater we know than any material power—yes, even greater than the power of an atomic fission—and that is the power of God whose meaning is interpreted for us of the Christian faith through the teachings of Christ. It is Christ's teachings given to us in the New Testament of the Bible, which over the past nineteen and a half centuries have become the essence of our moral standards—that have determined for our family, our nation, and the family of nations our ideas of what is right and what is wrong.

**COST OF WAR**

Although the total cost of World War II will never be known, yet figures compiled by Secretary of State George C. Marshall for "Ten Eventful Years," a four-volume set recently published by Encyclopedia Britannica, have a breath-taking impact.

Fifty-seven nations fought in the war on the Allied or Axis sides. The total military personnel killed and missing exceeded fifteen million men. The Allies lost 10,650,000 fighting men, the Axis, approximately 4,650,000. And the total number of civilians dead will never be accurately estimated.

Victory cost the United States 295,904 lives, or one for every five hundred of the nation's population. By way of comparison, we find that Russia lost 7,500,000 men, or one for every twenty-two of that country's population.

Secretary Marshall declares that the direct military cost to the United States for the mobilization of 12,000,000 men and the supplying of necessary materiel to the Allies between 1939 and 1946 was \$350,000,000,000. In addition to this, the nation suffered economic losses in the form of irreplaceable natural resources, such as timber, minerals, and oil.

Staggering as these costs are, they are as nothing compared with physical torture, the heart agony, the spiritual disillusionment, and the moral chaos that came with this global conflict. The permanently disabled men, the stunted children, the widows and orphans, the ten million displaced persons who may never return to their homes—these are a part of the staggering price of the struggle that can never be written in dollars and cents.

The titanic costs of World War II might not seem so appalling if, out of the sacrifice of blood, tears, and wealth, we might behold a world secure in permanent peace.

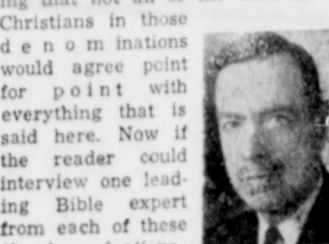

**Judgment Day**

Lesson for May 15, 1949

FORTY DIFFERENT Christian denominations sponsor this column, although it goes without saying that not all of the millions of Christians in those denominations would agree point for point with everything that is said here. Now if the reader could interview one leading Bible expert from each of these 40 denominations, and ask each one the same question: "In your personal opinion, exactly what is the meaning of Mark 13?" you might not get 40 different answers, but you certainly would get more than one.



There is no chapter in the Bible that has been the subject of more arguments than this one, and no arguments have ever been more useless than these.

Leaving extreme views aside, let us try to discover some meanings which all 40 denominations would find in this chapter, some truths on which all reasonable Christians can agree.

**A Certain Fact**

IN JESUS' view one thing is certain: God's judgment on this world and on all persons in it. Christian churches have different ideas about what happens after death. We have different ideas about how the judgment is to be carried out, or where it will be held, or when. But that every man will have to give account of himself before God is something Christians believe.

Your true unbeliever is not the person who goes around saying there is no God. A more subtle and dangerous form of unbelief is in the person who takes the Christian creed upon his lips but lives as if the creed were a lie.

He repeats the Apostles' Creed: "From thence he shall come to judge the quick and the dead." If those words are sincerely spoken, the believer will honestly try to please God above all others. But the unbeliever, whatever his words may say, shows that he does not believe by the fact that he tries to please, first of all, either himself or his family or his neighbors, and not God above all.

**An Uncertain Time**

IT IS ONLY children who think that if something doesn't happen Now, it will never happen. Now and Never are not the only times on God's clock. When will the judgment be? The disciples wanted to know, but Jesus did not tell them. He did not claim to know, himself, when it would be (Mark 13:32). What he did say was, Watch! There is a sense in which God's judgments are going on all the time. The end of your world will come in your own lifetime, whoever you are; for there is not much difference whether the world folds up and leaves you or whether you fold up and leave the world.

Death is the end of the world for every one who dies. Further, whenever a person suffers by and because of his own wrong-doing, here in this life and on this earth, God is judging him by the eternal moral laws which are the very warp and filling of the fabric of life.

There is also a sense in which God judges societies and nations. We have recently seen how terrible a judgment Germany drew down on its head. The nation that takes the sword shall perish by the sword. The nation that sets out to enslave others by force will come under the same death-sentence that cut down Assyria and Rome and Japan and Germany. But not all God's judgments are on this earth. "God does not settle all his accounts in October." There is a final accounting, and no man, in this life or any other, can escape that solemn meeting with God.

TWO THINGS are sure. One is that the only true judge of any man is God. The man himself is partial, his friends are partial, his enemies are prejudiced against him. Further, no one knows all the facts but God. Only God knows what a man's motives are; only God can trace to their final end all the consequences that flow from a man's act.

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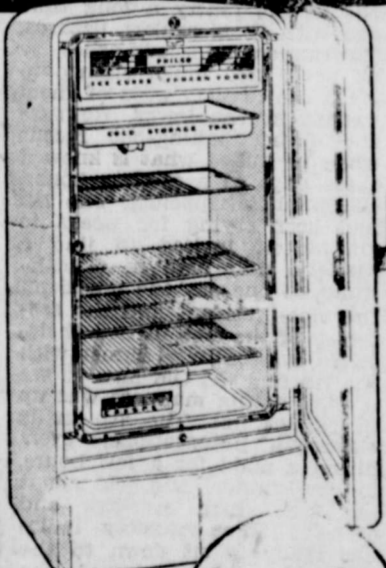

## Rules Listed For Sears-Roebuck Foundation 4-H Hog Prog. Essays

For the second year, Mills County 4-H Club members will enter essays in the hog program contest that is being sponsored by Sears-Roebuck Foundation, according to County Agent George Reese.

Following are the rules for the essay contest this year, with all essays in the hands of county agents by May 21:

1. An essay contest is to be conducted in Mills County, Coleman store area.

2. The contest is to be directed by a general committee, composed of the county agricultural agent, assistant agent, district agent, Swine Specialist, 4-H Club Leader, Officials of the Sears-Roebuck Foundation and managers of the Sears-Roebuck & Company stores.

3. 5 purebred registered gilts and one boar will be given to this county and will represent one of the major breeds of hogs.

4. In order to qualify for one of these pigs, the 4-H boys will write and submit an essay entitled, "The Value of Producing Hogs as a source of Cash Income on our Farm." The essay to have not more than 500 words.

5. The contest is open to all 4-H Club boys in this county.

6. All essays must be in the hands of the county agents by May 21, and must be written on notebook paper, typed or in ink and must contain the name of boy, address, and name of club. The essay must be judged by a committee in the county, appointed by the county agent or assistant county agent.

7. Pigs will be awarded as prizes on the basis of 40% for best essay showing knowledge and information the contestant has on the subject, and 60% upon his facilities and ability to successfully complete the demonstration. Judges reserve the right to talk to the contestants, to inspect the farms, and to talk to the parents and others in making their decisions.

8. Each essay must be accompanied by an agreement blank signed by the contestant and his father or guardian. In the agreement the boys agree to feed, care for, and breed the sow pigs under the direction and supervision of the county agent. They further agree to return either \$15.00 or the choicest gilt, with certificate of registration, from their first litter to the county agent for distribution to other boys in the county the following year. The county agent will select the top gilt from the first litter or he may choose to take the \$15.00 in lieu of a sow pig. If the sow pig is selected, it is to be delivered on or after it is ten weeks of age.

9. All pigs will be delivered into the hands of the winners of essays on a date to be set and announced later.

10. The pigs which have been distributed to the contestants will be returned to a show in the fall to be judged for best development as breeding stock and not as fat hogs. The Sears-Roebuck Foundation will at that time award prizes in each county, as shown in a schedule now in the hands of the county agent.

11. In 1950 prizes will be awarded for the best pen of 3 market hogs. These pens of 3 will be exhibited at the county and store area gilt shows in the fall of 1950. All prizes are to be in the form of materials and equipment for improving the hog demonstration.

Prizes will be given for the heaviest litters at 56 days of age in each store area. Prizes will also be given to the boys in each store area who do the best job with their boar pigs.

12. The first prize gilt and the boar from this county will be brought to a store area show for competitive exhibit and appropriate prizes will be awarded. In 1950 the first prize pen of three market hogs from each county will be exhibited at the store area or district show. Appropriate awards will be made for the pen of 3 market hogs.

13. The county agent will maintain an up-to-date breeding record on all animals including foundation stock and all off-spring thereafter. They will make such reports as are

requested by the Extension Service.

14. Boys who receive boars will not be required to return a pig to the county agent, but instead will be required to give free service to the other Sears-Roebuck Foundation gilts in the county for first litters. This will make it possible in each of the counties to carry on an endless pig club chain year after year. Agreement blanks will be furnished at the time the contest is entered.

**Mills County To Get Nine More Miles Farm-To-Market Highways**

Commissioners Court met in a Called Session May 5, with District Engineer Leo Ehlinger or the purpose of securing some additional Farm-To-Market roads under Senate Bill No. 387, which gives the counties some additional Farm-To-Market roads. Mills County will get at this time about nine miles.

age to each of the four Commissioners' Precincts. To Precinct Nos. 1 and 2 an extension of the Farm-To-Market Highway No. 572, the Goldthwaite-Moline road about 3 1/2 miles, or to the Pleasant Grove road at the Old Jeffery Store. To Precinct No. 4, a continuation on Farm-To-Market No. 574 or the Hanna Valley Road, from

the Ratler Road to the Regency road, about 2 miles. To Precinct No. 3, about 3 miles connecting Highway 16, (the Goldthwaite road), near Priddy to the Hamilton County line to connect with Hamilton's Farm-To-Market Highway.

This is in addition to the regular Farm-To-Market road program and, according to Mr. Ehlinger, in a period of 15 years, should be completed. There are quite a few other roads that are now available for construction, most of which would require more money than this present

project could take care of; however, according to Mr. Ehlinger, most of the communities will be served as soon as possible.
