## First Jail Break Here In 15 Years Discovered Early Thursday Morning

First jail break from the Mills County jail was discovered about 6 a. m. Thursday when Allan Ross came down to open his grocery store across the street from the jail and noticed a hole in the wall and strips torn from a mattress hanging down the side of the jail.

Boris G. Petroff of Miami, Fla., who was extradited and brought back from Los Angeles, Calif., by train by Mills County Sheriff Wiley L. Mahan and placed in jail here last Wednesday night, was discovered gone from his cell. Abernathy Construction Co., which is building REA high lines with headquarters here, reported a 1948 Dodge one and one-half ton truck stolen from in front of their headquarters building on Front Street. Petroff worked for the company for a few days before being indicted here for forgery and before he left for Los Angeles.

Petroff, who left a wife in Los Angeles when brought back here by the sheriff, pleaded guilty in District Court here last Friday on the forgery charges and was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary. Sheriff Mahan was ready to take him to the pen.

A statewide police broadcast pickup order for the truck and man was sent out early yesterday morning by Sheriff Mahan. Petroff is a tall, slim man, about 31 years of age. He hacked out a small hole just large enough to slip through, by digging around the rocks in the two-foot wall by the side of a window with the leg of a wood stove, the iron part of a small shovel, and a broken broom handle. He tore up strips from

the cover of the jail mattress, tied them together and to a pipe running through his solitary cell, slipped through the hole and slid down to the street below, without waking the jailer, O. D. Williford, and family, who were sleeping on the floor below. Mr. Williford figures Petroff started working on the hole Tuesday night, he having asked for a broom to clean his room Tuesday afternoon. He had originally been put in the run-around but Tuesday was locked in a cell for safer keeping. Thursday morning a hole in the wall of the run-around was discovered where he had started digging out while there.

Wednesday afternoon Jailer Williford went in the cell, sat down on the bed and talked with Petroff for 15 or 20 minutes. He noticed that Petroff was very nervous and saw a quilt hanging over the place where the hole had been dug. Petroff had been doing some washing in a basin before the window and the jailer thought he had hung the quilt there to cut out the sun.

Thursday morning he discovered why Petroff was so nervous. The hole stood gaping, three large rocks that had been dug out were found behind the bed, and the small wood stove was filled to the top with small rocks as they were dug out. A blanket had been hung over the cell door.

The truck was found Wednesday morning about 8 o'clock at Brownwood by the police there. It was abandoned undamaged between 4 and 6 a. m. in front of Pucket's Cafe. An intensive hunt for Petroff was underway around Brownwood yesterday.

## Final Plans Being Made For Fourth Annual G'waite Rodeo May 27-28

Performances will also be staged on Saturday afternoon at 2:30 and again Saturday night at 8.

Plans for the parade through the streets of Goldthwaite are being finished. The parade will start at five o'clock Friday afternoon and wind through the business district and on to Jerri-nigan Arena two miles east on the Waco Highway for the first rodeo performance.

The Rodeo has been advertised far and near by window cards, car bumper cards and posters, and in Mills and adjoining counties by The Eagle. Next week, coming out just before the Rodeo, The Eagle will publish its annual Rodeo Edition, with ads from Goldthwaite merchants and information and

Lion T. C. Graves, master of ceremonies, expressed thanks to the merchants of Goldthwaite and citizens of Star for helping get the four cups that were presented, and to the fathers of the boys and girls who were present. He said we put as many ribbons on the board this year as last, which was thought an impossibility.

Lion George Reese introduced the speaker of the evening, District Eight Extension Agent R. G. Burnwell of Stephenville, who gave the young men and women some good advice. He said he was proud of the Mills County winners and their fathers, who had again produced the goods. He said 4-H stood for Hands, Head, Heart and Health, and advised them to put the same kind of grooming on themselves as they did their calves to make a winner.

Leroy Beard of Star awarded cups to the Star winners, Miss Floy Woodard and Allan Poe, complimenting Mr. Reese and Mr. Johnson for ribbons put on the board this year, and also the fathers and others who had helped the boys. No other county in the United States can display a similar or better board.

Johnson presented a cup to Robert Henry Johnson, Mills County, FFA, for showing the Grand Champion steer at Brownwood and Fort Worth, and said he felt he was losing his ace in the hole this year with Johnson's graduation. On Tuesday night of next week, to begin at 8, the Goldthwaite Red Sox will engage with the Waco American Legion baseball team at Municipal Park here.

League play, and winning six out of seven starts to date, defeated the Brownwood Browns here Wednesday night, 5 to 3. This makes two straight against the Browns, Goldthwaite having taken the big end of a 12 to 1 score at Brownwood last week. The Browns beat the Red Sox here at the first practice game of the season.

## Fort Worth Booster Delegation To Be In Goldthwaite Next Thursday

The Honorable Loy Long, Mayor of Goldthwaite, announced this week that he had been notified by William Holden, Executive Vice-President of the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce, that Goldthwaite will be one of the cities visited on the third day of a 4-day tour which a delegation of 60-odd Fort Worth business men will be making through the area lying south and west of Fort Worth.

The Fort Worthians, according to Mr. Holden, will be traveling in chartered busses and are due to arrive in Goldthwaite at 9:50 a. m. next Thursday, May 26. In the delegation will be top representatives of the banking, livestock, grain, manufacturing, wholesale, jobbing, newspapers and other interests of the City of Fort Worth. The tour is the first on which Fort Worth business men have gone by bus since the war and the first organized trip into this immediate area since 1938, Mr. Holden said.

While in Goldthwaite, the Fort Worth visitors will call upon local business men in their respective establishments. Many will be renewing old acquaintances, but in many instances, among both groups, the meetings will be for the first time.

"Better highways and better transportation facilities lend easily to new interests created by radio and television," Mr. Holden said. "These factors, backed up by the great natural wealth of the area, including recreations and scenic advantages, make imperative our meeting together with business and social interests of Goldthwaite and adjoining cities so that we may the more readily recognize not only our mutual interests, but our responsibilities in trying to

measure up to expectations of new-comers as well as the vast board of tourists who annually visit our State."

"All of us are eagerly looking forward to our visit in Goldthwaite and will appreciate your passing the word around to local business men that we are going to call upon them, and that although we will appreciate anything they do towards making the delegation welcome in Goldthwaite, it is our intention to call on as many of them as possible right in their own places of business," said Mr. Holden.

Following the visit with local business men, the Fort Worthians will board their busses at 10:20 a. m. Additional stops following their visit here will be at San Saba, Llano, Burnet, Lampasas, Killeen, Belton, Temple, Marlin, Waco, Hillsboro, Cleburne and back to Fort Worth Friday, May 27th.

## Red Cross Now Assisting Texas Tornado And Flood Victims

A tornado struck the Veterans Community in Amarillo at about 8:45 p. m. Sunday. A report from Manager Davis of the Amarillo Red Cross Chapter shows six dead and seventy-nine injured, including sixty-three in hospitals as of Monday estimates are that 75 homes have been destroyed and 350 damaged in a 12-block area on or near 36th Street between Polk and Van Buren Avenues.

Red Cross headquarters have been set up in the Alice Landrum School in south Amarillo. Red Cross Midwestern headquarters in St. Louis, Mo., sent 8 full-time disaster workers to Amarillo, most went by air. The first two to reach Amarillo arrived about 3 a. m. Monday. The 8 workers include Henry Elchman, Assistant Director Disaster Work, Dr. Raymond F. Barnes, Medical Director, and his assistant, Dr. John M. Whitney, and Miss Helen Flannegan, Red Cross Disaster Nurse.

\$50,000 was allocated for the emergency relief and 50 pints of whole blood was flown from the

Red Cross Blood Center at Wichita, Kansas.

Edward R. Neil, Chapter Chairman at Fort Worth, reports the second worst flood in Fort Worth's history, with nine known dead and about 13,000 homeless.

Midwestern Red Cross has allocated \$50,000 for emergency relief at Fort Worth.

National Red Cross will allocate the funds necessary to take care of the Rehabilitation work at both Amarillo and Fort Worth. This will aid families who need help in rebuilding and repairing their homes and replacing of household goods and help those who need long time medical care.

Every one that contributed to the Mills County Red Cross drive last March now has a part in the work being done by the Red Cross at Amarillo and Fort Worth. 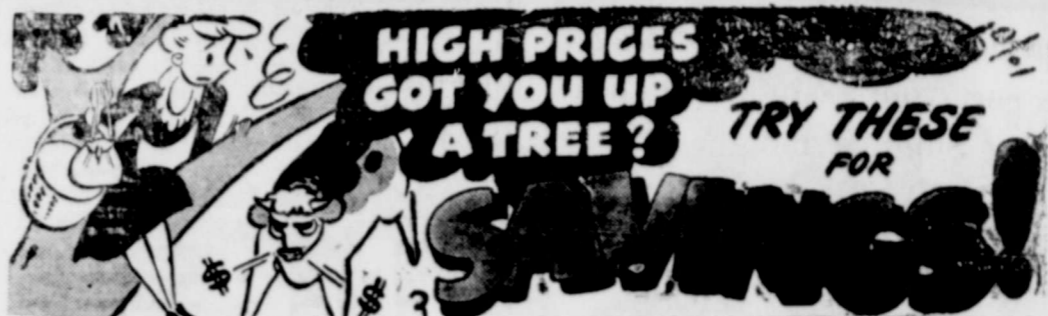

#### Fruit Icebox Slices

1 1/2 cups canned fruit cocktail,\* well drained  
11 soft marshmallows, cut in small pieces  
1 1/2 tablespoons lemon juice  
few grains salt  
1/2 cup vanilla wafer crumbs\*\*  
1/2 cup ice cold cut in small pieces Pet Milk

Mix fruit cocktail, marshmallows, lemon juice and salt. Chill 1 hour, stirring now and then. Rub bottom and sides of refrigerator tray with butter or margarine. Pretty soon it will be hay baling time. One of the most important things about this business is to cut the hay at the time it will turn into the most palatable feed for stock. The experts tell us that if you don't feed silage you will need about two tons of hay per cow of the smaller breeds and three tons for cows of the larger breeds. Along with the palatability, which means how it tastes, digestibility and nutritive value are just as important. The more crude fiber any feed has in it, the lower its digestibility. The more mature a plant is, the higher it is in crude fiber. Johnson grass should be cut between the time it starts to head and bloom in order to have Johnson grass hay of the best quality. On the other hand, sorghum cane should be cut during the bloom stage. Prairie grass and bermuda should be cut in the bloom stage. Alfalfa and clover should be cut as it starts to bloom and not wait until it is in full bloom. The grass in that spot where your garden was planted can be cut any time. Don't wait until it's in the bloom stage. Fellow writes and wants to know how to get rid of wild onions in his pasture. Continuous mowing is the only thing we know to do. Of course, he could let the cows mow them off, but we think that's what he's trying to avoid. Texas has enough milk problems already. Get out the aspirin tablets. It looks like that annual headache, where to put the wheat crop, is back again. Last year's grain is still in the bins and a bumper crop is expected. It promises to be especially bad in areas where both grain sorghums and small grain are major cash crops. The grain trade is both frantic and prayerful. This statement was made today by Karl Hobbittzelle, of Dallas, state campaign chairman for the American Cancer Society, when announcing the extension of the Society's April membership drive into May. "We are still far short of our \$450,000 goal," Hobbittzelle said, "and, unless our campaign workers are allowed more time to seek contributions, cancer control work in Texas will be sharply curtailed." "Our carefully-budgeted program indicates that \$450,000 is the minimum needed to advance the Texas fight against the nation's No. 2 killer, which this year probably will claim the lives of more than 7,000 Texans."

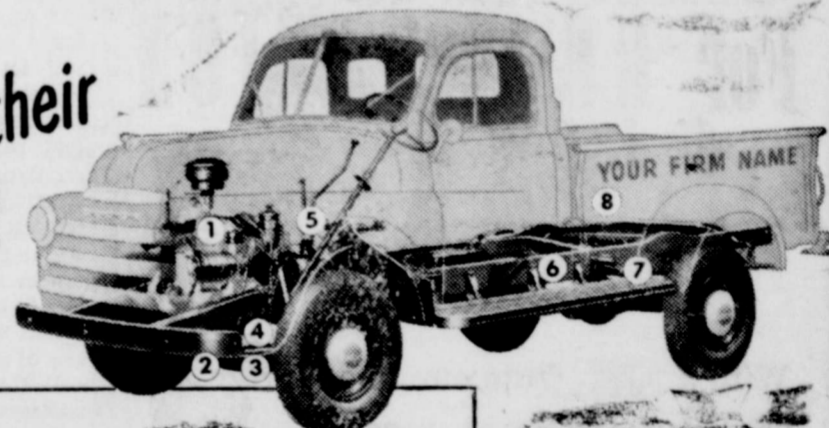

## A Short History Of Goldthwaite And Mills County, Texas

(As Taken From The Goldthwaite Eagle Files.)

The town of Goldthwaite, Texas, 10 miles from the exact geographical center of Texas, was born at a town lot sale on Sept. 3, 1885, a day that saw rain all day. The Santa Fe Railroad laid their tracks here that year. Goldthwaite was named after George Goldthwaite, an official of the Santa Fe at the time. Eaton Kenneth Goldthwaite, whose father was a second cousin of George Goldthwaite, in "A History of Goldthwaite," published in the Old Man 100 column on Dec. 6, 1946, said: The word Goldthwaite comes from Old Yorkshire English, and the names then originated from the occupation of the people. "Gold" means they were gold workers, and "thwaite" means clearing of land—gold workers in a clearing.

Judge George Goldthwaite, from which the town here got its name, donated some lots to the townsite. He was a well-known figure of the Old West, a Captain in the Confederate Army, a lawyer, and a judge, who followed the ever-widening frontier. He was born in Montgomery, Ala., on Aug. 21, 1836, and died suddenly, Oct. 31, 1892.

The present population of Goldthwaite is estimated at 2,050, and has fine churches and schools.

Mills County was created in 1887 from parts of Brown, Comanche, Hamilton and Lampasas

Counties, and organized the same year. It was named for John Q. Mills, a district Judge during the Texas Republic. Its main resources come from farming and livestock raising. Area, 734 square miles; population estimated at 9,000. Average annual rainfall, 29.55 inches. Altitude, 1200 to 1750 feet.

Since 1903, treasure hunters have from time to time dug at "Dry Pond," two miles northeast of Goldthwaite, for a fabulously rich treasure believed by old-timers to have been buried there by Spaniards nearly 300 years ago just before they were massacred by Indians. Spaniards had tunneled in several directions under "Dry Pond," and are believed to have buried gold and silver from the famous Bowie Mine there.

### Health Notes

During the first seventeen weeks of 1948 there were only 55 cases of poliomyelitis reported to the State Health Department, while in this same period for 1949, there have been 142 cases reported from different sections of the State, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. Seven cases were reported in the past week, with three from one county.

"Poliomyelitis is one of the most dreaded of all diseases", Dr. Cox said, "and justly so. It is more often a crippler than a killer, but in either case it

takes a heavy toll among young Texas citizens, and is a health menace against which our children should be carefully guarded."

Immaculate cleanliness of person and homes is urged as a precautionary measure against polio, and community hygiene assumes a place of major importance when the disease makes its appearance. Clean communities, clean homes, and strict personal hygiene all play a part in helping to prevent the spread of diseases, and Dr. Cox advises close inspection of home screens for keeping out flies, and unremitting efforts in rodent control, and the extermination of roaches.

### TODAY'S HOME BUILDS TOMORROW'S WORLD

College Station.—The theme of national home demonstration week, May 1-7, will be "Today's Home Builds Tomorrow's World" and the forty thousand members of nearly two thousand clubs in Texas will give recognition to leaders and achievements in their own communities. Maurine Hearn, state home demonstration agent, and vice-director for women for the Texas A. & M. College Extension Service has announced that the Texas Home Demonstration Association and the Extension staff will join in the observance this year.

Through special events, new stories and radio the home demonstration club women will tell their friends and neighbors of the objectives and activities of home demonstration work. They will let families tell of their achievements and have group discussions of problems that affect rural families today. The relationship of the home demonstration work to the entire extension program will be clarified, and recognition give to volunteer local leaders whose services in the communities have resulted in the better understanding of public problems on a local, state, national and international scale.

Miss Hearn says that clubs are planning special skits to be presented at meetings where leaders will be honored. Regular radio programs by the agents and club members will tell the story of home demonstration achievements, and special broadcasts will dramatize these developments.

In a special message to home demonstration club women, she says, "In observing this week in various ways as each community demands, I hope that you, as well as others who are not members of home demonstration clubs, may realize the scope and flexibility of your organization. You are probably the largest organization of rural women in America. Besides mastering the many phases of home living that are available to you, you work as an organized group for many things that are beneficial to your communities, such as scholarship funds, libraries, health, safety, exchange programs with other countries.

"Your responsibility to your communities, to your nation, and to other nations, is to help those who are not acquainted with the demonstration club to benefit personally through it, and that you may benefit by the growth of your organization."

## Co. Commissioners Have First Say On State \$30 Million R. R. Fund

Austin—Success or failure of the \$30,000,000 rural road program voted by the legislature depends to a degree on county commissioners. Representative Preston E. Smith of Lubbock said this week.

It is the commissioners' responsibility to survey their own area and determine where each county's allocation should be spent for farm-to-market roads, Smith pointed out.

He added that when their study was completed, the commissioners should present their findings to the district highway engineer so that he can make recommendations to the state highway department.

"The quicker this work is done, the better," Smith said. "We all know that the funds are going to run out before all the meritorious roads are built. The counties who first present their facts will be the ones to get the roads."

Farm-to-market roads will be placed on the basis of merit with respect to population and vehicle miles travelled, Smith said he had been informed by highway department authorities.

It has been estimated that 25,000 miles of farm-to-market roads will be completed under the program, Smith said, "and when you divide that by the number of counties in Texas, it's not much mileage for each county."

The Lubbock representative called on county commissioners to carry out their part of the program - including the provision of right-of-way—to insure efficient and economical use of the money provided by the legislature.

"I have always been interested in the rural road program," Smith declared, "and I have worked for it ever since I have been in the legislature."

He said that while the appropriation of \$30,000,000 for farm roads—the first of its kind—was inadequate to complete the de-

sired rural network, "at least it is a start, and perhaps in the future more funds can be provided for this purpose."

Smith called for conscientious work on the part of all concerned in getting rural road construction under way.

"If we can make a good start in Texas," he argued, "and if we can show that the money is being spent to the best advantage in providing roads for those who need them most, then I am confident that there will be no great difficulty in continuing the program and in expanding it from year to year."

College Station.—It takes mowing, watering and fertilizing to keep a yard looking its best.

That's the word from Sadie Hatfield, extension landscape gardening specialist of Texas A. & M. College. Regular mowing with a sharp, properly adjusted mower keeps your lawn looking neat and helps the grass grow and spread.

How high the grass is mowed depends on what grass you have. Bermuda, St. Augustine or centipede grass can be mowed closely if the yard is well fertilized. The fescues and bluegrass should be mowed at one and a half inches or higher, Miss Hatfield says.

Now about watering the lawn. If you have the water supply to do this during the hot, dry weather, it's best to soak the ground thoroughly now and then—just soak long enough to keep the plants alive.

Here's a point to remember, too. Light sprinkling every day just to cool things off encourages shallow root system and helps crabgrass more than it does the better lawn grasses.

Further information on lawn grasses and fertilizing the yard can be obtained from the local county agent.

The 1948 edition of "Accident Facts," statistical yearbook of the National Safety Council, shows that one out of every five drivers involved in fatal motor vehicle accidents in 1947 had been drinking.

Special studies indicate that drivers who indulge in only a few drinks are three or four times more likely to have an accident than those who refrain from drinking if they drive. And drivers who are heavy drinkers are 55 times more likely to have an accident.

The yearbook also points out that one out of every four adult pedestrians killed in traffic accidents last year had been drinking.

The Lord's Supper

Lesson for May 22, 1949

LET US CLEAR UP some very common misunderstandings of what the Christian religion is. Some (both enemies and friends) think it consists in turning one's back on the world, living in a sort of happy wonderland where the evil of the world is altogether shut out and forgotten. Another notion is that Christianity presents an angry God (or one who can very easily be made angry) laying down the law to mankind. Another is that Christianity is a purely individual affair. And still another is that the Christian religion consists of the teachings of Jesus and that is all it is. Every one of these misunderstandings vanishes in the light that shines around the Lord's Supper.

Betrayal
PEOPLE SOMETIMES think that religion shuts men's eyes to the ugly realities of life. Some religions try to do so; but not the religion of Christ. He knew the kind of world this is; he never let his disciples forget it. On that last night, dark forces were abroad. Jesus' enemies were closing in on him. One of his own circle would betray him. Yet it was in that sort of atmosphere, heavy with betrayal and hatred, that Jesus began this sacrament of faith, hope and love. The true Christian does not live in a fool's paradise, he does not imagine that everything is lovely in the nicest of possible worlds. The sacrament which is the heart of his worship is itself a reminder of the ugliness of the world which man's sin creates.

Blessing
"AND HE BLESSED the bread..." If Christianity consisted mainly of condemning wickedness and denouncing sinners, then at the center of our worship we would have some symbol of dread and awe, like fire and brimstone, a consuming flame.

But no — at the heart of our worship is a thing as simple, plain and friendly as a loaf of bread, bread on which the blessing of God has been asked. Blessing, not cursing; invitation, not threatening, is at the heart of our religion.

Whenever you see some one whose chief idea of being a "good Christian" is going around proclaiming the meanness of the world, cawing at everybody and everything.

Breaking
"AND BROKE IT, and gave..." Artists have tried in a single picture to express the meaning of Christianity. Some of the pictures are beautiful, but many of them miss an important truth. What shall it be? A picture of a shipwrecked woman clinging to a rock? Of a saint praying in a long solitary vigil? These leave out something vital. For Christianity is a fellowship. No Christian is complete by himself.

At the heart of our religion is a Communion. Few if any Protestant churches allow any one even a minister, to give the Holy Communion to himself, by himself.

The true Christian never finds himself, his true self, alone; only in fellowship. A Christian belongs with other Christians as much as one coal in a bed of coals belongs with all the rest.

Blood
JESUS TEACHINGS are so important, so full of wisdom and of living power, that often some one will say that Jesus was a teacher and only a teacher, and that following his teachings is all that Christianity is. Jesus did not think of it in this way.

True, his teaching is of the utmost importance; but that was not and is not all. As Middleton Murry said years ago, Jesus was the only teacher who has died for his teaching. But he did more than that; he died for those he taught.

The cup at the Holy Communion reminds every one who partakes of it that Christ was not only a teacher, he was a sacrifice.
