

Amidst increasing signs of weariness and restlessness, the House devoted most of last week to debating and passing a new wage and hour bill. The one finally written was the result of a coalition of Republicans and Southern Democrats. It was probably about as good a product as could be obtained under the circumstances.

The new version lifts the present minimum from 40 cents per hour to 75 cents, but clarifies and limits the coverage. The latter change is particularly desirable because of the chaotic conditions resulting from tortuous interpretations of the present law which has placed many people under the Act who are in no wise engaged in interstate commerce.

The Federal Government has no constitutional authority to regulate wages and hours in industries that are purely local and intra-state in character. Yet, by interpretation of what is included in and connected with interstate commerce, hundreds of small businesses and service establishments have been drawn under Federal control, contrary to the intent of Congress when the wage and hour aw was passed back in 1938.

For example, by interpretation, window cleaners working on independent contracts for factories which make goods shipped in interstate commerce have been held to come under the Act. So have elevator operators in office buildings, who serve passengers who engage in interstate commerce business.

Not long ago, workers on a local irrigation canal were held to be covered because the water was applied to sugar cane, which in turn was refined and shipped in interstate commerce. 



sun and stars; Psalm 65:9-13 sees nature as a farmer sees it, in terms of sun, rain and crops; Psalm 104. one of the noblest poems in existence, celebrates God's glory in all things great and small.

Mystery

THESE inspired Psalmists saw high truth: Nature is for man's use, in part, but it has also a value, a beauty and a splendor all its own; and it is one of the ways by which we can know Goo. What is true of nature is true, 1ar more, of the God who created all things. One of the thoughts suggested to their minds was the mystery of nature.

Even today, with all that science has discovered, there is mystery in the most elemenal facts of existence. What is light? What is life? What is energy? Where did it come from and what is the destiny of it

A common grass blade performs miracles that chemistry has not yet initated. The mystery of nature suggests the deeper mystery of nature's God.

Power

WE ARE beginning now to realize, even better than the Psalmists could, how much energy there is in nature. We have seen tragic evidence of the atom's power. Now we have also found that while energy cannot be destroyed, it cannot be created by us. though it constantly changes form.

As the water in a power station which has run through a turbine will not climb back up to turn the turbine again, so the whole universe (they tell us) is in the process of running

Beauty

THE writer of Psalm 104 was well aware that some parts of nature are useless to man; but he rejoiced in them none the less. Few of his neighbors had any use for whales, for example, but he takes delight in the whale (he calls him Leviathan) just playing in the ocean. St. Augustine, in the same mood, says somewhere about things like wasps and spiders that if we could forget that they bite, we would be greatly awed by their beauty and the perfection of their mechanism. Indeed, St. Augustine in one of his prayers, calls God God is The Truth and The Good, so he is The Beautiful.

THE writers of these nature-Psalms (especially 19 and 65) impressed by another fact about nature: its regularity, You can count on the sunrise, you always know which order the sea sons will follow. Even things like earthquakes and tornadoes, which seem pretty unpredicable, follow laws of their own. Science has now shown this to be true on a cosmic scale. The stuff of which the farthest stars are made is just the same (only a lot hotter!) as the stuff in the rocks under your feet at this

The laws that govern the fall of a leaf or the shape of a raindrop are the same laws that can be seen in the whirling of star-dust fifty million light years away.

1. Wait until Aug. 29 before doing anything.

2. Secure a dividend application form from one of the acreage planted to vetch in the Tuesday night, August 16, and following sources: Office of the county should be materially local county service officer, a larger than last year. 3. Read the instructions and decide whether the procedure is understood. If not, get a service officer to help fill out the form correctly.

4. Be as neat as possible in spelling your name and listing your address. Give an address at which mail can be received for the six months following date of application.

5. If you don't remember your policy number, which is requested on the blank, don't worry. It will help speed service, but is not essential.

6. Once the application is in the mail, don't worry about how soon payment will be made, and don't use the anticipated amount as a promissory note for personal debts. Some 17,-000,000 veterans' records will have to be checked by the VA.

#### FERTILIZER AND VETCH PRODUCTION

College Station - L. R. Boyd, who farms near Teague, recent\* ly told Freestone county agent . H. Pritchard that he had learned something about growing vetch for seed, especially, on the production per acre.

Boyd, this year, harvested 400 pounds of vetch seed per acre Also, if the person who has for seed. The county average reports Pritchard, ran from 100 to 400 pounds per acre with the late harvestings showing the lowest yields. This was largely iue to shattering.

Boyd applied 250 pounds of 20 percent superphosphate and 200 pounds of 5-10-5 commercial fertilizer per acre to seven acres, and on another plot he used only the phosphate. From the latter he harvested only 200 pounds of seed per acre, so he says he got a pound of vetch for every pound of 5-10-5 that he applied. He believes the additional application of a balanced fertilizer is a good prac-

Robert Gregory, Streetman community, harvested about 300 pounds of vetch seed per acre from his 20 acre block. He reported to Pritchard that he applied 200 pounds of 20 percent the vetch did not produce enough seed to harvest,

Pritchard says the farmers who have surplus vetch seed will sell them to other farmers in Freestone county and the
