DRILLING RESUMED ON ELLENBERGER TEST SOUTHEAST

O. C. Proffitt of San Angelo, driller of the oil test on the Segilquist Ranch about ten milles southeast of Goldthwaite, said yesterday that drilling was resumed Wednesday at 1,680

Considerable delay had been encountered when machinery broke down and had to be replaced. Water was cut off at 1,650 feet when the 8 1-4 inch casing was set.

Mr. Proffitt said the test was going down about 80 feet every 24 hours. The well will be drilled to 3,500 feet, or 250 feet into the Ellenberger, should it be struck first. Geologists think the Ellenberger there will be reached around 2,400 feet.

This is the first oil test to be drilled in this section of the county, and Mr. Proffitt thinks it looks good for a producer.



FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

During the next twenty-four hours, the chances are that fire will take 30 lives-and destroy \$2,000,000 worth of property. And that will happen during every ensuing day and night, if fire waste continues at the present rate.

That is why public officials and civic groups in some 10,000 communities are now organizing in preparation for the 1949 Fire prevention Week observance, which will take place from October 9 to 15.

Fire Prevention Week has been an annual event since 1920, when President Wilson issued the first days visit with her parents, Mr. Presidential proclamation authorizing it. It has only one purpose-to show us the simple precautions that will prevent most fires. To achieve that goal, thousands of experts contribute freely of their knowledge, time and energy. Nothing is left undone that might serve the cause. Practically every American, unless he be a hermit in the hills, has the chance to gain knowledge that may save his life, his home, his job.

However, this fine work is of small value without public cooperation. The experts are ready to teach us, but they cannot make us learn unless we wish to. They are offering an opportunity—and it is up to us to take it.

The point is plain and simple. Listen, read, and learn during the week-and put into constant practice what you learn. If we do that, fire's horrible and unnecessary harvest of death and destruction will be sharply reduced.

WHEN THE FORESTS BURN

One match, one smouldering cigarette butt, one spark from a camp fire, can be the cause of the destruction of thousands of acres of timber that it took Nature centuries to create. And when the forests burn, the cruelest of deaths comes to the wildlife that of Belton, left Wednesday after Sunday live in their shelter.

Annually they cause direct losses running into many millions of dollars and equally serious indirect losses in the destruction of our dwindling forest reserv-

The human factor, in fact, is responsible for almost all fires, whether they take place in a forest, in a home, or in a factory. Carelessness, ignorance, indifference to redimentary precautions—there are fire's friends. When we replace them with care and watchfulness, fire will be beaten.

DEVOTIONAL READING: Hosea 14

What is a Call of God?

Lesson for October 2, 1949

IF YOU knew exactly what God wanted you to do, would you do it? Of course you would. The trouble is: How does any one know what God's will is? For example, a

young man thinking about his would do what they were sure God called to do, but what is a call?



The story of Isaiah throws some light on this problem. (We are beginning this week a three months' study of the great prophets Isaiah and Jeremiah.) True, he lived some 2700 years ago, and half way to the other side of the world; but human nature has not changed in 2700 years.

From Man about Town To Man of God

ISAIAH was a young man about town, in the small but wealthy city of Jerusalem, about 700 years before Christ. He was a personal friend of all the important people, a man of good education, with wide horizons of interest, of independent means, eloquent, polished, the sort of man who makes a good career diplomat.

He tells in some detail the story of how he came to be a prophet. The story is in Isaiah Perhaps if we had been there with a camera and a wire recorder we might have been able to photograph the seraphim and take down their cries, just as Isaiah saw and

What we do know is that that experience changed Isaiah's life. Up to that time (on his own showing) he had been a "man of unclean lips;" from that time on he began to be a spokesman for the Lord. Let us try to say what the story of that life-changing vision, that call, means in terms of our own experience.

The Flame of God

FIRST there was the overwhelming sense of God's reality and power and holy majesty. No one can ever experience a call who does not take God seriously.

A God "afar off," a God who is only a problem, an idea. a hypothesis, never called any one. God alone can make himself real to man; and only a living God is going to hear his

Next came Isaiah's realization man who feels equal to a great task is probably not equal to it. "Them as knows nawthin' fears nawthin'," as the Irish say. A man who feels good enough to enough. A man without a sense of sin is too full of it.

Then comes the burning coal from the altar; Isaiah feels that his guilt is gone. No one can fully do God's will with an unforgiven heart. Isaiah was not sinless at one stroke, of course, yet it is possible to turn from all known sin; it is possible to devote one's loyalty to God; and this Isaiah did.

It was only then that he heard the call: Whom shall I send? In modern and less picturesque language, Isaiah was conscious of a need he had not felt before-that is, of God's need, of his people's need.

What those needs were will come out in later studies. The point is that young Isaiah, who hitherto had lived only for himself, now saw the need of the city and the people among whom he lived.

"Here Am I; Send Me."

THEN comes the last stage— Isaiah's willing offer of himself. His great talent was the ability to use language. He could make words march and sing as few men of any race have done. But up to that time, it seems, his gift of eloquence had been used chiefly telling dirty stories.

Now he has repented, and been forgiven, and he says to God: Use me. His voice, his knowledge, his eloquence, which he had been 'using against God (or at best, only for Isaiah) he was now to use for God and man

So there is a call: A sense of God, near and commanding and holy; repentance; forgiveness; of need; willingness to devote all one's gifts to fill that need.



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

Veterans Administrator Carl R. Gray, Jr., disclosed in Wash-World War II veterans on their National Life insurance will be \$528. Dividends will start going out in January. He released the formula to be used in distributing the \$2.800,000,000 dividend among some 16,000,000 veterans and their dependents and heirs.

The dividend, to be paid before next June 30, is not subject to income tax. Veterans must apply for it, and about three-fourths of them have already done so.

The formula, Gray said, is calculated on the basis of a dividend of 55 cents for each \$1,000 Billy Harrell Anderson, Treasof insurance, for each month the policy was in force before its anniversary date in 1948, for all policy-holders who were near future. aged 40 or younger at the time the policy was issued.
