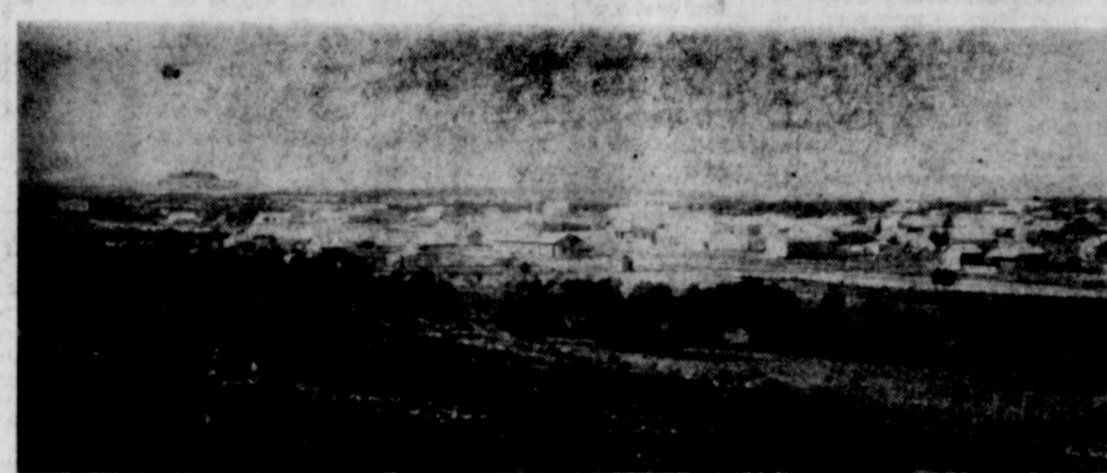

## A Picture Of City Of Goldthwaite As It Appeared 61 Years Ago In 1888

This picture was made from the Clements hill looking southwest. The depot was on the east side of the railroad track, just southeast of where the freight depot now stands. The two story building east of the depot is the old Pat Rahl Hotel where Grandma Rahl fed the railroad men, serving the best meals to be found in Goldthwaite. The small residence south of the Rahl Hotel was the home of Hec. McLeod, who had a dray wagon and would make a trip anywhere in town for 15c. The large building on the corner west of the depot where

Robert Littlepage is now located was The Bayless Hotel. South of the hotel was a saloon, and just south of the saloon, across a vacant lot was The Nairn Hotel. Looking directly over the Nairn Hotel, you will see the jail which had just been completed in April, 1888, at a cost of \$8,850.00. The jail was the only county building at that time, but soon there was to be a county seat election. Mullin, Peg Town, and Goldthwaite were contesting for the county seat.

The county officials were: J. B. Head, County Judge; Phil. H. Clements, County Clerk;

C. D. Hammond, Deputy County Clerk; James Ewing, County Treasurer; Uvalde Burns, County Attorney; G. W. Cunningham, County Sheriff; Whit Smith, Deputy County Sheriff; J. A. Mohler, County Tax Assessor; W. Livingston, County Surveyor; G. H. Dalton, D. S. Kelly, A. V. Patterson, S. M. Moore, County Commissioners; C. Rawls, District Clerk.

On May 15, 1888, the following citizens donated land to Goldthwaite upon the condition that Goldthwaite would be selected the county seat. J. M. Forehand, 4 lots; J. D. Cole, 2 lots; J. A. ## Willie Clark Visits Goldthwaite For First Time In 62 Years

Last Sunday, Mr. and Mrs. W. B. (Willie) Clark and son of 600 West Division Street, Jennings, Louisiana, visited Goldthwaite for a short time. This was Mr. Clark's first visit in 62 years. He moved from Goldthwaite to Louisiana in 1887.

Willie Clark moved here from Lampasas before Goldthwaite was created, with his mother, Mrs. India Clark and sisters, Bertie and Eula. Mrs. India Clark was a worker in the Methodist Church here in the middle 80's, and the family lived on South Parker Street.

Willie Clark married soon after moving to Louisiana. He and Mrs. Clark have reared a fine family of ten children, all living except one daughter. Mr. Clark stopped on the square and contacted Clyde Featherston, who brought him to the writer. Mr. Clark inquired about the Simpsons, Clements, Fairmans, Bulls, Marshalls, Roberts, Murrans, Rahls, Forehands and Woodys, and many other pioneer families that were here in 1887.

We took Mr. Clark to see Will Marshall, and Mr. Clark was very sorry to learn of Mrs. Marshall's illness. Soon he and Mr. Marshall were both talking at the same time, and they rehearsed some of the town's early history. They recalled some of the good dances that were held here in the 80's, and the celebration that was held at the lot sale. Willie Clark and the late George W. Simpson butchered the beaves for the bar-b-que at a large spring on the Simpson ranch. Mr. Clark remembered that W. S. Marshall (Will's father) was the first Postmaster here. The elder Mr. Marshall ran a grocery store about where Marsh Johnson's service station is now located. All the mail came to Williams Ranch. Some one would go to the Ranch and get the mail and bring it to Mr. Marshall's store. Mr. Marshall would spread the mail out on the counter, and every one would come in and look through the mail. Marble Falls Mustangs come to Goldthwaite Eagle field to take on the Goldthwaite Eagles in District 22-A Conference game tonight, starting time 8 o'clock.

This is expected to be one of the hardest-fought games in District 22-A play. Marble Falls Mustangs have lost one, won one, and tied one in Conference play. Eagles have played three, lost two and won one. Mustang starting lineup tonight will average 149 1/2 pounds per man, while the Eagles average 155. It's anybody's game tonight up to the last minute of play.

The Mustangs outrate the Eagles in performances so far in football this season. They have played five games, won three, lost one and tied one, as follows: Non-conference games—Marble Falls 30, Johnson City 0; Marble Falls 28, Thrall 18. Conference games: Llano 27, Marble Falls 0; Marble Falls 25, Mason 13; Fredericksburg 7, Marble Falls 7.

Singing of gospel songs is the main event. Next Sunday Bill Huggins and a quartet from Brownwood is expected to be present. You are invited.

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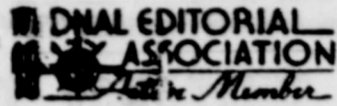

Three out of every four pedestrians killed by a motor vehicle are either violating a traffic law or taking unnecessary chances. Crossing against the lights or in the middle of the block causes a high proportion of pedestrian deaths in cities. In the country, walking on the wrong side of the road and wearing dark clothes at night or in the early hours of the evening result in many unnecessary deaths.

Three out of five fatal motor vehicle accidents occur at night. Heavy traffic, poor visibility and slippery road conditions cause a sharp increase in evening accidents during fall and winter months.

Every minute of every day a motor vehicle accident results in death or injury to someone. Excessive speed is involved in one out of every three fatal autoed in one out of every three fatal automobile accidents.

More fatal automobile accidents occur in rural areas than in all other places. On the average, nearly 7,000 farm residents are killed in automobile accidents each year. Excessive speed, poor road conditions and careless driving habits cause many of these accidents.

During one year, 1948, more than a million people were injured or killed in automobile accidents in the U. S. The death rate per 100 millions of vehicle miles traveled, dropped from 9.8 in 1946 to 8.1 in 1948 — the lowest on record. A large share of the credit for this remarkable achievement is undoubtedly due to the strong support of the "Stop Accidents" Campaign by newspapers all over America.

SHOOTING WARS and cold wars were going on. A great whirlpool of international intrigue was roaring around and around, and Judah was in the midst of everything. The star of the once-great empire of Egypt was setting, and the star of the new and powerful nation of Assyria was rising. Judah was a only one of 20 or more little countries between those giants.

Some of the little nations were trying to take advantage of the disturbed situation by getting up little empires of their own. All of them were scheming and scrambling for a place in the sun. Some were betting on Assyria, some on Egypt; no one knew just what to expect, but every one was afraid.

**Cowardly King, Bold Prophet**

INTO ISAAH'S little country of Judah an invading army was marching, and the hearts of king and people trembled "like leaves in the wind." Little Judah was being invaded by a combination of two ambitious powers, Syria and Israel, either one larger and stronger than Judah. Isaiah had to go out and try to calm the mind of the King. It was of no use; it was clear that King Ahaz did not believe the prophet. But Isaiah was right nevertheless.

The foreign army that looked so big would not win the war. The alliance that looked so frightening did not last. It could not last, because God was against it. Military men and others too find such things hard to believe.

Is not God "on the side of the largest battalions"? Is not "Githar fustest with the mostest men" the one and only recipe for victory? Nevertheless, the prophet was right. In fact, whenever a prophet raised a banner inscribed, **Trust in God**, it was not likely to be at a time when things were going smoothly in the world. That banner most often appeared in times of trouble, of darkness and dismay, of wars and invasions.

**Leagues Don't Always Last**

The situation had a different angle, later on. The Syria-Israel invasion collapsed, just as Isaiah said it would. But still the little nations jockeyed and maneuvered. It looked like a death-grapple between Assyria and Egypt, and every nation wanted to be on the winning side. So it was a great time of treaty-makings, of pacts and agreements and alliances.

Isaiah changed the form of his message to suit the changing times, but the core of it was still the same. To King Ahaz he had said: Don't be afraid of hostile alliances; trust in God. To King Hezekiah and others he said, in effect: Don't put all your hope in alliances; trust in God. Egypt will fail you, any alliance you form will melt away in time.

But God will not melt away. You can depend on him. Now in our time the situation is strikingly like what it was in Isaiah's day. People today are tempted to put their trust in what is big and imposing. Big nations, big armaments, big armies, big alliances.

Men once put their trust in the League of Nations, and it died (of cowardice and dishonesty, among other things). Millions put their trust in the Axis, and for awhile it looked as if the Axis powers would overpread the earth. But the Axis vanished under the blows of the Allies.

**Are All Alliances Bad?**

THIS does not mean that no alliance is good, or that no treaty can be relied on, or that the United Nations (for instance) is bound to collapse. What Isaiah is driving at is this: God has a Purpose to work out in this world, and the name of it is Justice, Righteousness, Peace, Love.

Any nation or combination of nations, any pact or agreement or program, that goes against God's purpose is going against the grain of things and is bound to fall. Pure "power politics" always looks impressive; but the question is: What is the power going to be used for?

If it is really for the benefit of mankind, God will bless it; but if it is selfish and unjust and against the peace of the world, it will fail, because the God of Justice has set his face against it.

It was the longest trial in American history, taking more than nine months. Former Attorney General Clark estimated the cost to the Government at \$1,000,000. Five million words of testimony, covering 21,000 pages, make up the official record of the trial. The Commies claim they spent \$250,000 in presenting the defense.

The case will, of course, be appealed to the highest courts. Associate Justice Tom Clark will be disqualified to act as a judge, the prosecution having been started while he was attorney general. Perhaps two or three years will elapse before the final verdict is written.

Heretofore the Communist members have claimed they were good Americans, and they and their fellow travelers and apologists ridiculed the idea that they are not loyal citizens. But one of the first lessons that is taught a young Commie is to lie about being one and to pretend loyalty.

Attorney General Clark last year said there are 75,000 card-carrying Members in the United States, and J. Edgar Hoover has warned that for every card carrier there are ten who do the Party bidding and follow the Party line. The latter group, he has pointed out, are often even more dangerous than the former. They belittle the danger of Communism and either wittingly or unwittingly do what they can to lull the people into a state of apathy toward the real existence and danger of this foreign political party devoted, as the New York trial showed, to the overthrow of our form of Government.

Now that the real brand has been judicially applied to what the Commies really are and what they are up to in this country, even the fellow travelers will likely be less willing to

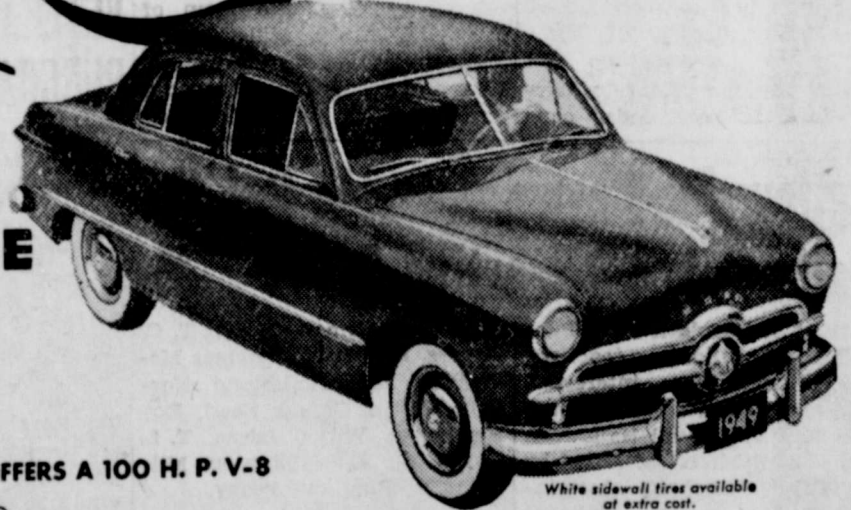

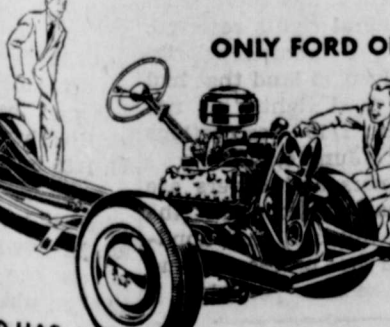

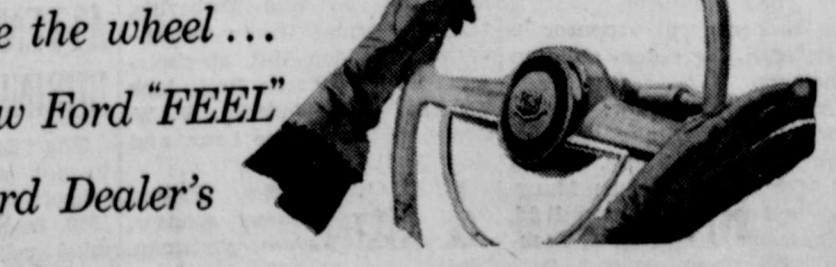
