Lions Hear Game Warden; Cong. Fisher To Be Guest Speaker Nov. 15

Goldthwaite Lions Club, in regular first Tuesday night meeting at The Hangar heard John Woods of Brownwood, District Game Warden for Mills, Brown, Comanche and Coleman Counties, explain the new game laws and show two reels of motion pictures about wild life in South Texas and two reels showing the latest in fishing methods from pictures made by Bill Moore of Brownwood.

Congressman O. Clark Fisher of San Angelo has accepted the Lions Club's invitation to be guest speaker before the club at its next regular meeting, Tuesday night, Nov. 15, at The Hangar. To honor the Congressman, the Lions Club will have a special Ladies and Guest Night for the occasion.

Game Warden Woods was introduced by Program Chairman Jesse Moreland, and made a short talk explaining new game laws and new strict trespass laws passed by the last Texas Legislature. Heavy fines are carried in the new law, and on third conviction for hunting and fishing on another man's property without permission, jail sentences are provided. To hunt deer outside his home county, a man must have a big game hunting license costing \$2.15, which gives him two tags to tag two deer, and the tags are to be placed on the deer immediately after it is killed, Mr. Woods explained. No license is required for fishing in a man's home county unless

artificial bait is used. For outside county fishing, a license costing \$1.65 must be bought and carried by purchaser. Mr. Woods' talk and also the motion pictures were greatly enjoyed by the 21 Lions and one guest present.

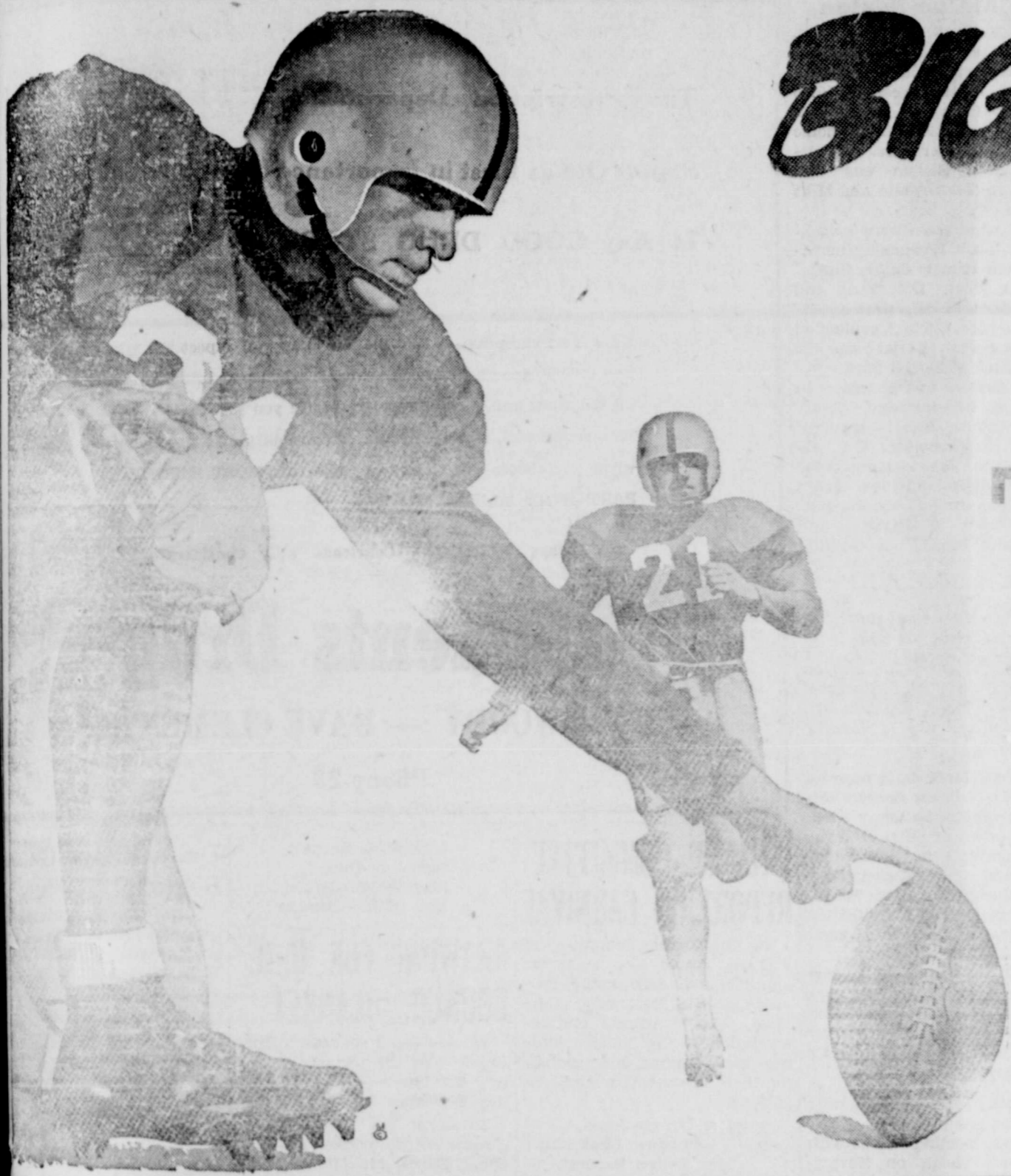

This is the program that made such an outstanding record in the Texas Farm and Home egg-laying contest ending July 31.

THE RECORD

Laying flocks carried through the contest on this program finished:

- First
- Second
- Third
- Fourth
- Fifth
- Sixth
- Seventh
- Eighth
- Eleventh
- Fifteenth

1. Keep RED CHAIN Laying Mash before the flock in open hoppers and feed a fresh supply daily.

All of the money is to be used in Texas.

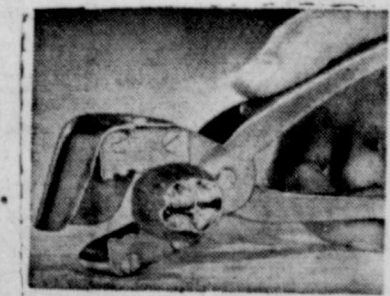

Penrose B. Metcalfe Discusses Constitutional Amendment Effects

On November 8th the people of Texas are to vote on a number of highly important changes in our constitution as well as elect 21 members of the State Board of Education. It is highly important that as many people as possible vote on the issues and candidates before

are always important and this year the one which appears on the ballot has many far-reaching possibilities that should merit the most careful study by Texas voters. It is the one which increases the pay of legislators five hundred percent and, tied inseparably to this, provides for a regular legislative session each year.

Presumably the principal object of this proposal is to secure a better and more representative membership in both houses of the legislature. The argument is advanced that the heavy pay increase would accomplish this result.

My years of service in both legislative houses and close observation of other legislatures cause me seriously to doubt that more pay would bring better members. I believe the first legislature on which I was a member had a larger proportion of able and unselfish members than any subsequent one in which I served. At that time the members were paid only one-half what they now receive and the regular session was one-half as long.

Then the constitution was amended doubling the pay of the members and also the length of the regular session. This was brought about by the argument it would get better members. But practically no change resulted in the normal turnover in membership. And the procedure is far inferior.

A careful check of membership rosters, for the years preceding and subsequent to the last pay increase, reveals that no particular change in turnover resulted. This is shown in the following table:

This gives an average turnover in the House of 80 and in the Senate of 9. The increase in turnover the first year after the salary change was only one-half of one percent above the average for twelve years.

In addition to the tremendous increase in cost to the taxpayer—over a million dollars

biennially in members' pay alone, to say nothing of operational costs which increase correspondingly—one of the most objectionable features of this amendment is that it contains no provision to encourage legislators to wind up their business and adjourn. Under our present set-up the pay of the members is cut in half at the end of the first 120 days of the regular session, and special sessions are limited to a maximum of 30 days.

Under the proposed plan there would be no change in pay of members regardless of session length and it is conceivable that they might remain in session continuously.

Annual regular sessions would mean new laws each year and the people would be agitated all the time and would never know what to expect next. Under our present constitution, if any real emergency arises the governor can call a special session. No governor that I know of has ever failed to call the legislature when a critical situation actually arose.

I do not believe Texas voters will overlook the fact that this double-barreled, far-reaching change in our State's financial operations has been submitted by the present legislature which met this year with a SURPLUS in the General Fund of some hundred million dollars (brought about largely by economies effected by previous

legislatures). They wiped out this surplus entirely and then set the stage either for DEFICIT spending or a material TAX INCREASE next year. Such handling of finances by this legislature gives little appeal to the voter to increase the pay of the legislators or to change our long-established fiscal set-up on its recommendation.

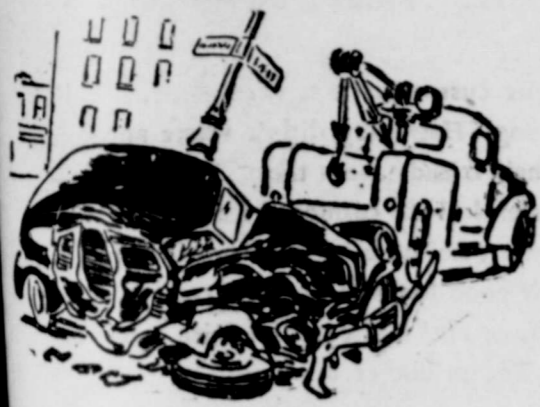
