## Stubblefield Tops Sheriff Ballot; Hancock Out Of Precinct 3 Race

The Mills County Democratic Committee met at the Court House last Monday morning to prepare for the July 22 Democratic Primary Election and to conduct the draw for positions that the candidates will have on the ballot.

County Chairman Joe Palmer announced that on the Primary Election ballots, candidates for nomination for the office of Sheriff - Tax Assessor - Collector will appear in the following order:

C. F. "Stub" Stubblefield, O. H. "Oma" Shaw, W. W. "Bill" Fox, and E. B. "Gene" Turbiville.

Candidates for nomination as County Commissioner, Precinct No. 3, will appear on the ballot in the following order:

Albert Schuman, Eli Edmondson, R. T. Ratliff, K. B. Henry (seeking re-election), and Melvin Bessent.

The number of candidates for nomination as County Commissioner in Precinct No. 3 was reduced to five when Grady Hancock did not apply for a position on the ballot. Last Saturday was the deadline for applying to the County Democratic Committee for a position on the ballot, Mr. Palmer said, and since an application was not received from Mr. Hancock, he was not qualified as a candidate for nomination as County Commissioner in Precinct No. 3.

In Precinct No. 4, where J. Frank Davis is standing for re-nomination with Horace Brooks as his opponent, Mr. Davis won the first place on the ballot over Mr. Brooks, whose name will appear in second position.

There are no other contests in Mills County for nomination in the July 22 Democratic Primary Election. Local candidates whose names will appear on the ballot but who are unopposed for nomination, which is tantamount to election, are as follows:

Arthur E. Gromatzky, for State Representative, 104th District; Lewis B. Porter, for County Judge and County School Superintendent, ex-officio; Earl Summy, for County Clerk and District Clerk; Mrs. Bertha Weathers, for County Treasurer; A. M. Pribble for County Attorney; Jess Y. Tullos, for County Commissioner, Precinct No. 1; Fred V. Wall, for County Commissioner, Precinct No. 2.

The ballot also will carry the names of numerous candidates who will seek nomination in the July 22 Democratic Primary for States offices.

## Jamboree Scouts Depart Tomorrow For Valley Forge

Dr. T. C. Graves and the Goldthwaite Boy Scouts who will participate in the National Jamboree at Valley Forge, Pennsylvania, from June 27 through July 6 will leave Brownwood at two o'clock tomorrow morning, Saturday, on a Santa Fe special train.

With Dr. Graves will be Ray Campbell Hudson, James Gilliam, Lathon Jernigan and Penn Barnett. The local delegation will be part of the Comanche Trail group, which will have more than 70 members. The special train on which they will travel also will carry large Jamboree delegations from Lubbock and San Angelo. More than 600 Scouts from Texas, and their leaders, will participate in the Jamboree.

The Goldthwaite Scouts, complete with personal gear and Jamboree equipment, which already is ready for loading, will leave for Brownwood on the first leg of their long trip late today, Friday.

Dr. Graves, who is a sectional leader, will serve at the Health Lodge at the Jamboree. He will serve, also, as assistant trainmaster on the Jamboree Special.

Many activities have been planned for the Scouts while they travel. Lee Tesson of Richland Springs, a veteran Scouter, will rehearse the Scouts in the telling of Tall Texas Tales, so that non-Texans at the Jamboree will be exposed to the wonderful Texas legends with a vengeance. Songs of Scouting also will be rehearsed on the train.

On the way to the Valley Forge Jamboree, the Scouts will tour Washington, D. C. At Valley Forge, they will set up an Indian Village, which many persons from Goldthwaite viewed at Lake Brownwood last weekend.

All of the Comanche Trail Scouts, including those from Goldthwaite, are going to the Jamboree as Comanche Indians. For the most part, they made their own costumes, which are topped by twin-tailed war bonnets. For the past several weeks, the homes of the Goldthwaite Jamboree Scouts have been filled with feathers, paint and assorted equipment. Ray Campbell Hudson turned out to be a maker of fine moccasins, while James Gilliam learned the hard way to wrap feathers. Penn Barnett is reported to have made his family wish there never had been any Indians.

Last Tuesday night the Goldthwaite Jamboree Scouts, in their Indian costumes, were guests of the Lions Club, which has been largely responsible for making it possible for the boys to make the Valley Forge trip, which also will include visits to Philadelphia, New York City and Niagara Falls.

## County Veterans Have Top Record In Paying Loans

This week marked the sixth anniversary of the so-called GI bills of rights for World War II veterans. Figures compiled for Mills County through last May 25 by the Veterans Administration Center at Waco show that so far in the County, only one GI loan had been defaulted to the extent that the Veterans Administration had to pay off the guaranteed or insured portion of it.

In all, 20 GI loans were approved for Mills County through May 25. They included four for homes, two for businesses and 14 for farm and equipment. Their appraised value at the time of their approval totaled \$129,336.00.

Under the GI bill of rights, veterans of World War II were qualified for education and training with public funds, they were qualified for public-guaranteed and insured loans for homes, farms and businesses, and there also was instituted a readjustment allowance to help veterans during periods of unemployment.

## Oil drilling Set At W. J. Weatherbys

The newest drilling operations for oil in Mills County are in progress on the W. J. Weatherby farm northwest of Goldthwaite, where A. Gutowsky, Inc., will drill a 3,000 foot cable tool wildcat.

The Weatherby farm, known as the old Cunningham place, attracted attention recently with the arrival of a rig. The hole is to be drilled on a lease that is described as 990 feet from the south and west lines of the M. L. Garner survey, No. 30. It will be known as No. 1 W. J. Weatherby. Further reference to this operation will be found this week in the report from the Eagle's Chappell Hill correspondent, Miss Pearl Crawford.

## Field Tourists Visit 15 Farms To View Clover

Tours conducted this week by the Goldthwaite Farm and Ranch Group are taking visitors through the Priddy and Caradan communities to see 350 acres of Madrid clover planted on 15 farms.

The tours began yesterday, Thursday, and will continue Friday and Saturday afternoons. The field tours were planned by the Farm and Ranch Group and by the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District. The tours begin today, Friday, and tomorrow, Saturday, at 1:30 p. m., with the participants assembling at the Agricultural Building in Goldthwaite.

A special feature of the tour will be the equipment that has been obtained by the District Supervisors to plant and harvest the sweetclovers. The District-owned drill will be on display showing the clover attachment that can be added to any drill. The District has obtained a special windrow attachment for a farm tractor that will harvest the Sweetclover. Other conservation measures will be pointed out along the route.

## Cooperative Telephone Services Will Extend Into Nine Counties

With prospects for success far exceeding original expectations, the Central Texas Telephone Cooperative, that will provide rural service with Goldthwaite as the hub, will operate in nine counties. It was announced this week by President Willis A. Hill and Secretary Ernest Wilson.

Mr. Wilson said that as a result of organizational and survey work that has been packed into a period of only two months, the Central Texas Telephone Cooperative will have almost solid coverage in Mills County and San Saba County.

In addition, its lines will extend into Brown, McCullough, Lampasas, Coryell, Hamilton, Comanche and Llano Counties, Mr. Wilson said.

The organizers, he added, have instructions to continue signing

applicants for service from the telephone cooperative with the idea that an additional appropriation from the telephone division of the Rural Electrification Administration will make it possible to serve more subscribers than was at first believed possible. However, Mr. Wilson said, applicants who sign now or in the immediate future may not have service to them inaugurated as quickly as those who filed up to June 1. The original applications have been processed and so the "charter members," as it were, will be the first to receive service.

In the statement this week, Mr. Wilson said: "Final tabulation has not been made, but between 1,000 and 1,200 signed applications have been forwarded to Washington.

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LET'S ATTRACT PEOPLE AND PURSES

Goldthwaite's reason for existence is to be a trade, service and transportation center for the ranching and farming territory that surrounds this city. For Goldthwaite to prosper, there must be a flourishing trade here and there must be people coming here to avail themselves of the services that are provided.

We believe that the merchants of Goldthwaite and those who provide services can do just as well by the buying public as their counterparts in any neighboring business center. We believe that the businessmen here are just as anxious to carry saleable goods on their shelves or provide efficient services to customers as anyone else.

At least two different news stories in this week's Eagle tell of our people going to Lampasas—because of Hancock Park, with its swimming pool and golfing and other recreational facilities. While they were in Lampasas they spent money—in Lampasas business houses. We have been in Brownwood, where we were definitely NOT shopping.

There is nothing new about the idea of having business centers provide attractions that will bring spenders to them. During the past few months some of our individual merchants have conducted "Open Houses," at which there were door prizes, entertainment, such as a hill-billy band; contests and giveaways.

We know that efforts have been made in the past to provide a recreational center, such as a swimming pool, park, camping grounds. Apparently the difficulties were discouraging, because nothing happened. We have found that Goldthwaite has an ideal location for a recreational area that would put Hancock Park in Lampasas to shame.

It may be that a recreation center is not the answer. There might be a far better answer. But the point is that Goldthwaite needs attractions that can be advertised and promoted in order to bring people here—people who will spend here and thus contribute to prosperity by making for more flourishing trade and by creating more jobs.

We would like to hear, promptly, from anybody who is willing to do a job in behalf of all of our citizens and that would at the same time contribute to the greater material well-being of those who are in business here, whether they sell goods or services.

If definite action is not taken to attract people to Goldthwaite, then a lot of persons here will be sorry for having missed the boat. In these days of swift, easy and cheap transportation, it is a simple matter for people who spend to go where there are attractions for them.

What must be done can be done, and the time to start doing is now. How many are ready and willing to help Goldthwaite realize its potentialities now?

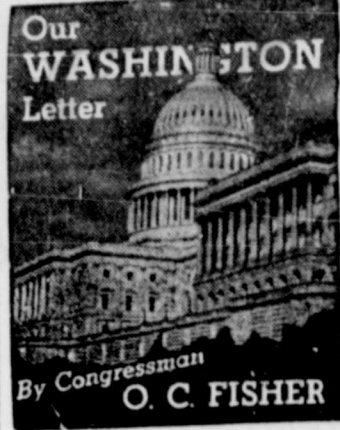

For two weeks now the House has mostly marked time passed a few bills and watched the Senate for signs of activity that would point to an early adjournment.

Right now, the best guess is that the session will end about August 1st, but that will depend on the Senate, which always lags behind the House on legislation. There is no debate limit in the other chamber and some of the Senators are prone to be long-winded at times.

The Senate leadership has promised another attempt to bring up the FEPC and how much time they'll kill on that is anybody's guess.

It's a funny thing. With some Democrats and some Republicans eyeing the November election and the negro and CIO votes, they spend hours blaming each other for not passing an FEPC bill, while very few if any of them sincerely believe in the soundness of this vote-getting scheme. The proposal is kicked around and extolled as a panacea, and the crocodile tears that are shed by its sponsors would turn a small desert into a verdant forest and almost float the battleship Missouri.

The House last week passed another rent control bill, continuing controls over rentals for 7 months. I voted against this measure. The war has been over for five years and I cannot justify arbitrary controls over what one segment of business enterprise can make while not doing the same to others. Why discriminate? If it's a good thing to control what a duplex owner can make on his investment, then why isn't it a good thing to control what a wage-earner can make, what a farmer or a sheep or cattle raiser can make? In other words, why pick on one group of our citizens who must, in operating their business, pay more for wages, more for the food they eat, more for repairs, paint, taxes upkeep and so forth?

Besides, individual States have authority to pass state laws controlling rents if they feel they are needed. Texas voted to abandon rent controls a year ago and is getting along very well without Uncle Sam imposing federal controls down there.

This being a political year, and Washington being the center of politics, trends are being closely watched and activities of political groups scrutinized these days.

Last week Phil Murray, boss of the CIO, called his 300 political leaders to Washington to whip them into a frenzy and launch a million dollar drive for his political war chest.

The CIO leader told his Political Action Committee (PAC) the money is needed to elect a pro-labor Congress this Fall and to defeat those who favor the Taft-Hartley Act. The latter, you will recall, makes labor unions subject to the same labor laws as employers.

Thus far this year the PAC has had a low batting score in primary campaigns, and they are obviously smarting from these set-backs. Money-raising attempts have been very disappointing to them. Their success in November will have a strong bearing on their 'welfare state' program and the question of whether we are moving toward a labor government in this country. Walter Reuther, a promising CIO leader, favors an outright Labor Party, but others frown on the idea at this time.

It is unfortunate, but true, that much of our history is recorded only in the memories of pioneers. Every month, some of our pioneers pass away and with their passing we lose much valuable and important historical data that never was recorded or preserved.

A sound knowledge of history is especially important, because history in the large is the sum total of local histories. It is tradition that gives stability and continuity to social organizations and institutions—in fact, to society as a whole. It would be a matter of grave regret, to put it both mildly and frankly, if we have to come to realization some day that we have allowed all too many persons to take with them to their graves their rich but unrecorded knowledge of our history and tradition. Culture is a certification of civilization in the finest sense of the word and the editor believes that we are remiss in not having a Mills County Historical Society that would gather and

### News Of The Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District



C. L. Evans, Democrat farm-  
er and rancher, believes in  
holding the rainwater on his  
land where it falls. He has a  
hunch that when he improves  
the condition of his soil it will  
absorb most of the rains. What  
he wants is organic matter and  
more organic matter in his  
soil.  
Mr. Evans is happy now that  
he has 45 acres of Hubam and  
Madrid sweetclover on his land.  
He is depending on the deep  
rooted clovers to open up the  
soil and allow the water that  
falls on his cultivated land to  
soak in. On his pasture land, Mr.  
Evans is depending on good  
grasses to hold the soil and  
water.  
While he is waiting for the  
clover to do the deep plowing  
for him, Mr. Evans is using the  
Hoeme plow to loosen the soil  
deep, but the plow leaves the  
"trash" or crop residues on top  
of the soil for protection. He  
smooths the land with a disc  
harrow. Another thing that

helps Mr. Evans hold the rain-  
drops where they fall is that he  
"spikes" his land and plants his  
row crops on the contour.  
With 12 acres of Madrid  
Clover in full bloom, Mr. Evans  
is expecting to get plenty of  
seed to sell and to sow over his  
entire cultivated land. He also  
has about 5 acres of Hubam  
sweetclover that he will harvest  
for seed. While most of his grain  
suffered from the heavy hail,  
his clover seed prospects are  
good.

Mr. Evans is not exactly  
against terracing a piece of  
land, but he cannot see any  
reason for building terraces if  
there is no runoff. He has  
bought a farm in the Priddy  
community which he will ter-  
race because of the slope of the  
land. In making his conserva-  
tion plan with the Brown-Mills  
Soil Conservation District, Mr.  
Evans recognized that differ-  
ent soils require different  
treatments, but an increasing  
amount of organic matter in  
the soil is most important.

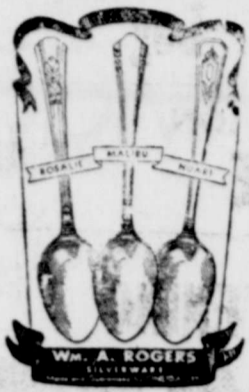

### Carl Knox And Jack Locklear To Bone Up At Coaches School

Coach Carl Knox and Assistant Coach Jack Locklear, who also will be Principal of the Goldthwaite High School, will become pupils themselves on July 31 when they enroll at the 18th annual Texas Coaching School at Austin.

The school is sponsored by the Texas High School Coaches Association, of which Knox and Locklear are members. It is the largest coaching school in the world, and Knox and Locklear will bring back to Goldthwaite athletics some pointers from renowned authorities on various sports.

At Austin in August, Knox and Locklear will brush up on their football under Biggie Munn of Michigan State, Bud Wilkinson of Oklahoma, Gomer Jones of Oklahoma and Hugh Daugherty of Michigan State.

Adolph Rupp of Kentucky and H. P. Iba of Oklahoma A. & M. will teach basketball, while the track staff will be headed by Clyde Littlefield of Texas. Marty Karow of Texas A. & M. will teach baseball, and the course on training will be under the direction of Eddie Wojecki of Rice Institute.

In addition to studying and hearing outstanding lectures, Knox and Locklear also will

play in athletic contests while they are in attendance at the Coaches School. On August 3, there will be a basketball game, and because of the performance records of the pupil-coaches, it will be an all-star game. On August 4 there will be an all-star football game.

Superintendent of Schools E. E. Patton and members of the School Board of the Goldthwaite Independent School District are on record as saying that because of the high qualifications of Coaches Knox and Locklear and because of their ability to make the best possible use of local material, it is reasonable to expect that next fall Goldthwaite will develop some athletes and teams of a top order. The very latest dope on team play and organization will be brought back to Goldthwaite by Coaches Knox and Locklear, who will attend the Texas Coaching School with the full cooperation of the local School Board and School Administration.

The Texas Coaching School at Austin now is in its 18th year and it has been credited with having been largely responsible for the development of so many nationally known athletes in this State.

### Mr. Briggs Says It's Okay Girls To Get Married

Travis Briggs, the Federal Security Agency representative who comes to Goldthwaite every month to discuss social security benefits with residents of Mills County, said on his last visit that women who work do not lose their social security protection when they marry.

A report published by a magazine that marriage cancelled rights to benefits earned by women was all wrong," Mr. Briggs said. Then he added this:

"Approximately a million women are now receiving insurance benefits under the social security program each month. An additional three million women are permanently insured for life, regardless of whether they ever do any more work in covered employment. Another fourteen million have an insured status that will enable payment of benefits to survivors in the event of their death. And more than twelve million of these are at the present time fully insured for benefits when they attain age 65. Marriage has made, and can make no change in the rights of all these women to benefits on their own earnings under social security as long as they maintain their present insured status."

Mr. Briggs pointed out that because of his monthly visits to Goldthwaite, Mills County citizens receive the same social security service that they would have if they lived in a large city. He will be available again for interviewers at the Mills County Court House at 4:00 p. m., on July 12.

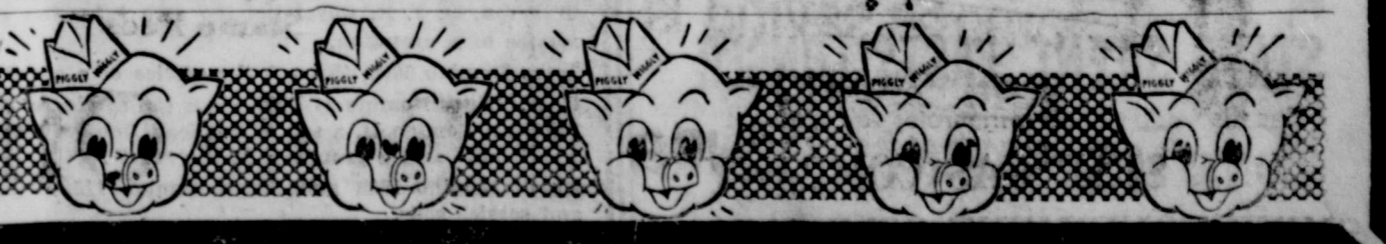

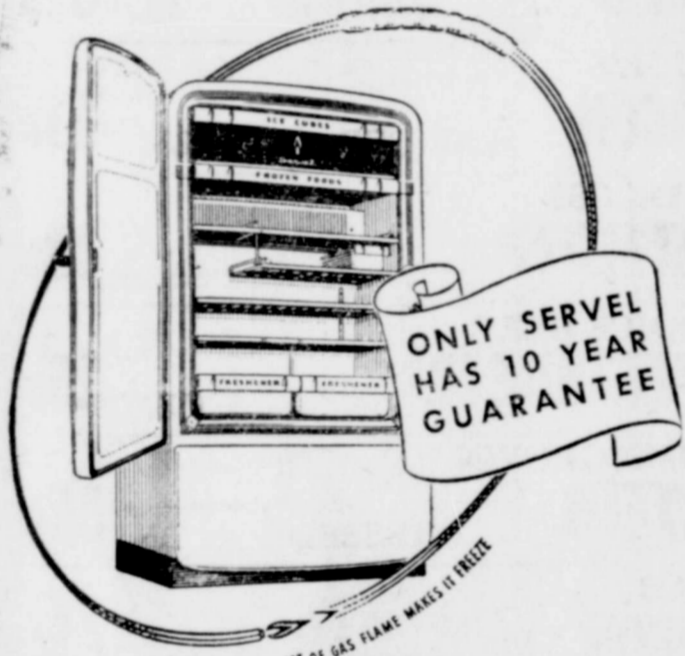

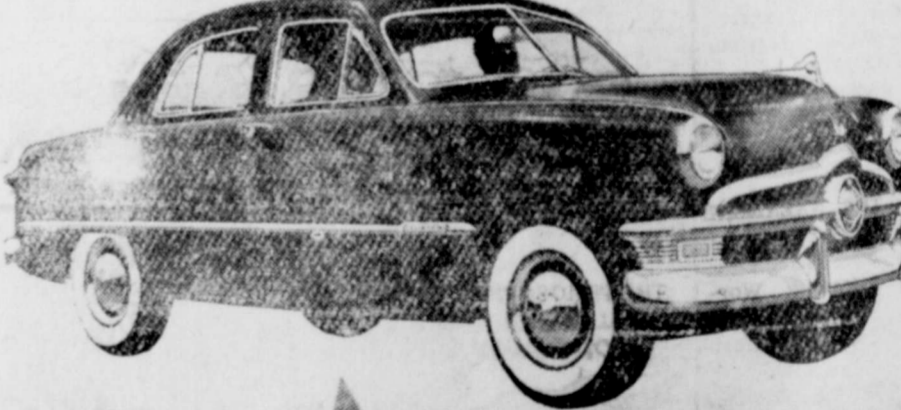

Only know that in at least one instance (that of Texas and the tid-lands) it has already nullified an explicit written agreement between the United States and an independent Republic.

Governor Shivers confessed he was so angry when he thought of "what the Federal Government has done to my State that I cannot control my language." He called upon his fellow-Governors to join him in making every effort to preserve the integrity of property rights, both State and personal.

It does not take any reading between the lines to know that Governor Shivers, for one, understands that up North, in the Mid-west, and in the far West, there is nothing so anti-Southern or so against State Rights as the Truman Administration and the National Democratic Party. They plunk for the so-called Fair Employment Practices Commission on tide-lands, they ran out on a solemn treaty agreement with Texas. They are trying to move into Texas to take over the Brazos river, which rises and flows only in Texas. The entire principle of States Rights is anathema to both President Truman and the Democratic Party, of which he is both the titular and actual leader. So, it is a legitimate question to be put to any politician, such as Joe Palmer of Mills County—how do you reconcile your work for the "Party" with the fact that its control is completely anti-Southern and so opposed to States Rights that it works day and night to entrench a powerful, centralized bureaucracy that derides and sneers at every principle for which Thomas Jefferson stood and which made him great?

In Texas, where elections are conducted on the basis of personalities rather than issues, what are the voters to do about expressing themselves on the issues? Do they intend to holler about their rights between elections, and then, at the polls, simply continue to certify their participation in a machine that is controlled by leaders whose whole program is directed toward saddling on the citizens an all-powerful centralized Government that makes a mockery of the very name "Statehood"?

I ask these questions with an honest curiosity. As a relative newcomer, I hear and read about men who bear the label of Democrats but who still yet, and all talk like Republicans—and that makes me wonder why, if they are sincere, they suppress and persist in suppressing the two-party system that was brought into being as the very basis for freedom in the Republic of the United States of America.

I realize that none of my questions is going to be answered in the July 22nd Democratic Primary. It will provide only which nice guy, out of a number of nice guys, will be nominated, or have a chance in a run-off. It will be a matter of personalities, and not of issues. The citizens will NOT be having a voice in their government except to record their belief that so-and-so is a good chap and everybody loves him. But I think the day will come when the voters will not be satisfied just to choose among personalities.

If they have any regard for the precious heritage of Free Men, they will want to have a say about how machine politicians use the power of taxation to destroy, about how labor politicians in the North have used the Democratic Party to establish for themselves a monopoly that would be illegal if practiced by anyone else, about how States such as Texas are to be told by the Economic Planners what use is to be made of their natural resources—wholly within their own boundaries—and about how the Democratic machine politicians up north are going to shove an F.E.P.C. down southern throats.

Yes, Mr. Palmer, when you sat at my desk and told me about last Monday's meeting of the Mills County Democratic Executive Committee, I was wondering all the time if you realized that the Democratic National Committee, of which you are an appendage—no matter how small—is just as anti-Southern, just as anti-Texas, as it possibly can be. Somebody is going to have to answer a lot of questions some day because they cannot be ducked. The issues are so burning that it will not be possible to go on indefinitely just making a nice, comfortable choice from among some swell personalities. It may be that one of these days Youth will ask the question: "Do we have to be either Democrats or Nothing?"

### County Prepares For Dedication As Dew Library Nears Completion

The Jennie Trent Dew Memorial Library is so near completion that at the next meeting of the Goldthwaite Municipal Council in July, the finishing touches will be put on plans for its operation as a City-County facility.

Contractor M. F. Horton will be ready soon to turn the completed structure over to the Library Committee. Final jurisdiction over the Library rests with the Municipal Council, which holds title to it, and so it will appoint, in July, a seven member committee to actively conduct its affairs.

The Committee will be composed of Mayor Loy Long, County Judge Lewis B. Porter, the County Demonstration Agent and selected members from the Goldthwaite Garden Club, the Self Culture Club, the Art and Civic Club and the Tuesday Study Club.

It will be the responsibility of this Committee to oversee the operation of the Library and to report at approximate intervals to the Municipal Council. It is the purpose of the city administration to make every effort to see to it that responsibility for supervision and operation of the Library will be spread over a large and truly representative group.

Now that Mr. Horton has nearly completed the construction work, first plans of those responsible for their Library will include arrangements for a formal ceremony of dedication.

After the completion of construction work, there will be the installation of equipment and books.

Of red brick veneer, the Jennie Trent Dew Memorial Library has been built in the tradition of the Williamsburg, Virginia, colonial style. It will be more than merely a Goldthwaite City Library. Rather, it will be a facility to serve the entire Mills County as the result of a decision by the Commissioners Court to grant public support, thereby enabling it to qualify as a free public library under State Law. Already, the facilities of the former Goldthwaite Public Library have been transferred to it. As a free public library, the Jennie Trent Dew Memorial Library will have a working relationship with the Texas State Library at Austin.

Proposals that will require immediate consideration by the Library Committee include hope that a trained librarian may be made available. Consideration also will be given to the organization of a mobile unit so that books from the Jennie Trent Dew Memorial Library may be sent to various points in the County—such as the schools at Priddy, Star and Mullin.

For Eagle readers who live outside Mills County, this newspaper soon will publish a photograph of the Jennie Trent Dew Memorial Library, of which Mills County is justly proud. The structure is located on the northwest corner opposite the First Methodist Church in Goldthwaite.

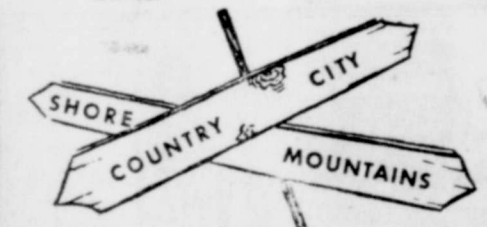

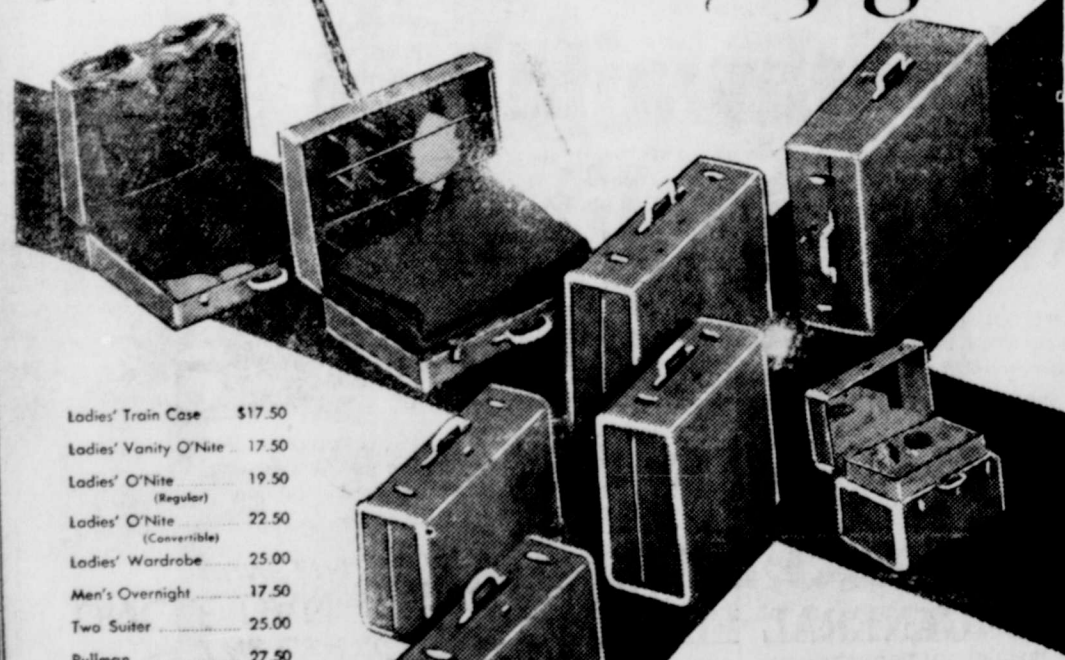
