Eagles Out To Crack Armadillos At Big Home-Coming Game Friday

Football for 1950 ends tonight, Friday, in the District 22-A Conference and so far as Goldthwaite is concerned, it will be a big night at Eagle Field with the Eagles taking on the San Saba Armadillos and with every prospect of cracking them—but good.

Last Friday night, also at Eagle Field, the Eagles lost 20 to 0 to the Llano Yellow Jackets, but the Eagles gave the Yellow Jackets their toughest game of the season and no Eagle fan had any apology to offer for the performance of the local team.

Tonight, it will be the homecoming game. Turn to page three of this week's Eagle and you will find the pictures of Wanda Kelly, who will be crowned Band Sweetheart, and Jo Ann Duren, who will be crowned Football Sweetheart, at halftime. The forecast is that Miss Duren will receive an Eagle victory over the Armadillos and it is known that Miss Kelly will receive a new Goldthwaite School song that has been written especially for the school by R. E. Clements. The song will be played by the Goldthwaite Band under the direction of Howard E. Gill.

Before game time, which will be eight o'clock, the San Saba

and Goldthwaite Bands will deploy on the field and then, together, they will play the National Anthem.

Coach Carl Knox, proud of the performance by the Eagles against Llano last week, showed a quiet confidence as the time to crack the Armadillos approached. Last week, the Eagles were handicapped because Charles Miles, a brilliant, dependable tackle was out of the game because of illness. Miles was expected to be back in there fighting tonight along with Alvidoye Roberts, Dizzy Clifton, Wayne Wicker, Bobby Letbetter, Ted Dennard, John Stark, John Gilliam, Vernon Whitley, Curtis Laswon, James Kemp and Jimmy Hays, who gave such a fine account of themselves in the contest against the Yellow Jackets.

For the game against Llano, Vernon Whitley and Alvidoye Roberts were the Goldthwaite Co-captains. With Miles unable to play, Donald Poer showed that he is no mean tackle, himself.

In the first quarter, Llano Back Bill Ross ran 25 yards for a touchdown and he kicked to chalk up the extra point for the Yellow Jackets. Again, in the second quarter, Ross carried the ball over the line for the Llano

Field Tour At Dr. Graves' Ranch Shows Vividly What Can Be Done

Ben Day Tells Of Machinery Used In Seed Harvest

Editor's Note: In the following article, Ben R. Day of the Goldthwaite Work Unit of the U. S. Soil Conservation Service describes the methods and machinery that were used in Mills County this autumn to harvest native grass seed that in considerable quantity has been seeded on local pastures.

New skills and new machinery had to be used this fall in harvesting the grass seeds from 18 cooperating farms in the Goldthwaite Work Unit area of the

The results and the further promises of seven years of hard and intelligent work that have been devoted to scientific soil conservation, brush eradication and pasture improvement were displayed last Thursday at the ranch of Dr. T. C. Graves, 13 miles northeast of Goldthwaite and three miles east of Caradon.

With Dr. Graves as hospitable host at a barbecue that was attended by approximately 75 ranchers, businessmen and government scientists, there was offered a priceless opportunity to see and hear about not only the results of soil and pasture improvement efforts, but the guests saw a demonstration of the newest methods that have been devised for the harvesting of native grasses so that, without injuring standing crops, the seed may be sowed to local pastures.

The guests of Dr. Graves rode or tramped over many of his 1,500 acres and they participated in a whole series of seminars that were conducted under the general guidance of Ben R. Day of the Goldthwaite Work Unit of the United States Soil Conservation Service, Department of Agriculture.

There were speeches by Dr. Graves, Mr. Day, L. F. Bain, Secretary of the Goldthwaite office of the Production-Marketing Administration; Carey Owens, a progressive Mills County rancher; County Agent George Reese of the extension service of the Texas A. & M. College; W. P. "Proc" McCullough, "father of patterns to go by;" C. M. Caraway, Sr., of DeLeon, who represented the Texas State Board for Soil Conservation; Henry Turney, Range Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service; and John Stough of the Brownwood Work Unit of the Soil Conservation Service. Mr. Stough formerly had Mr. Day's job in Goldthwaite.

The lessons of the day were so absorbing and Dr. Graves' food and hot coffee were so good that despite a chill wind, the guests and experts spent some six hours hearing about and pondering visible proof that those who produce from the land in Mills County and other Texas areas similar to our own

Brown - Mills Soil Conservation District. Since the grass seeds mature about the same time and then shatter readily, it was evident that each landowner would have to plan how he would harvest his own grass seed. Technicians of the Soil Conservation Service assisted the landowners with the "know how" of harvesting grass seed, but the farmers surprised everyone with their ingenuity in getting the job done.

A regular combine was used to harvest grass seeds on four farms. Since most grass seeds

Draft Board Has Reminder To All Men Who Are 18

Charles Frizzelle, who is the Mills County representative on Selective Service Board number 84, issued reminder this week that all men who are 18 years of age and older and who were born after August 30, 1922, must register.

In this area, registrations may be filed with Mr. Frizzelle. In adjacent areas, opportunity for registration is provided at Lometa, San Saba, Burnet and Lampasas.

On Wednesday night of last week Mr. Frizzelle met with Selective Service Board number 84, which maintains its headquarters at Lampasas. Upon his return Mr. Frizzelle said there would be no additional calls this month to Mills County men to report for physical examinations with a view toward possible induction into the armed services. It was expected, however, that the story will be different next month and during following months because of the expansion program of the American military establishment.

Mr. Frizzelle also pointed out that men eligible for military service and who were married after August 1, 1950, automatically are being classified 1-A in the records of the Selective Service system.

Since the last meeting of Selective Service Board number 84, it was announced in Washington that the January draft call would be for 40,000 men and that even higher quotas were to be expected in the later months of 1951.

Commissioners Court Certifies Elections

The Mills County Commissioners Court, with all of its members present, met last Monday at the Court for a regular session that devoted itself chiefly to routine business.

With County Judge Lewis B. Porter presiding, the Precinct Commissioners canvassed the results of the elections in Mills County on November 7 and then certified them to Secretary of State Ben Sheppard in Austin.

The Commissioners also made their periodic apportionment of motor car registration proceeds among the various precincts of Mills County.

All other business that was transacted by the Commissioners Court was of a routine nature.

Winter Asphalt Soon Goes Down On County Roads

Paving of the newly extended Hannah Valley and Bozar farm-to-market roads, highways number 572 and 1018, respectively, awaits only formal authorization to change contract specifications to winter asphalt, County Judge Lewis B. Porter said this week following a conference at the Mills County Court House with Thomas Smith, Senior Resident Engineer of the Texas Highway Department.

Mr. Smith, who called on Judge Porter last Wednesday, said that the original contract specifications for the surfaces on the widened and extended farm-to-market roads had not anticipated paving this late in the year. Accordingly, it has been necessary to obtain authorization for the contractor to switch to winter asphalt and such authorization was expected promptly.

Machinery and equipment for the paving job on the Hannah Valley and Bozar roads is standing-by and there was every indication that once the formality of altering contract specifications had been completed the task would go on to a speedy completion.

It was expected also that winter asphalt will be used on North Reynolds Street and Trent Street in Goldthwaite, where several hundred feet of roadway are being paved at the expense of the property owners concerned and with the cooperation of Tip Heatherly and County Commissioner (Continued on Back Page.)

A. L. Reese Writes An Open Letter About Sewage Plant And Pollution

In an open letter, A. L. Reese, who lives south of Goldthwaite on the San Saba highway, this week urged the citizens of Mills County generally and of Goldthwaite particularly to inspect the City of Goldthwaite's sewage disposal plant and to see for themselves the pollution of "stink creek" as it flows along the edge of the cemetery, under the highway and thence through private property.

Mr. Reese expressed the opinion that the health menace created by the condition of the sewage disposal plant and the pollution of the stream ought to be a matter of concern to all citizens and not merely to him as one of the property owners through whose land the pollution flows.

Calling his letter "A Special Invitation to Every Citizen of Mills County," Mr. Reese wrote as follows:

"Just get in your car and

come out on highway number 16, the San Saba road, a distance of about one mile from the Mills County Court House to what is known as Stink Creek. Just get out, go up or down the creek, and look. You will find out what all that stink is about that has been discussed for such a long time.

"If you do not have a way to get to Stink Creek, just telephone Goldthwaite 59 and I will come to get you. We have something right here that Goldthwaite people need to know more about. It has been going on for about six years to my knowledge. I understand that the condition has existed for much longer than six years. It is getting mighty bad.

"I have lately taken a few persons to see both the sewage disposal plant and the pollution of Stink Creek after having told them how bad the situation was. I asked if I had described it ac-

Ben R. Day Tells Junior Garden Club About Plant And Soil Care

Ben R. Day of the Goldthwaite Work Unit of the United States Soil Conservation Service addressed the Junior Garden Club on Wednesday of last week.

Betsy Smith, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. O. O. Smith, reported on Mr. Day's speech as follows: "In his talk to our Club Mr. Day showed that the green plant is the source of all of our food. He also brought out the requirements needed by the plant in carrying out its methods of photosynthesis (the process of converting natural elements into food in the cells of plants). He showed us that Mother Nature furnishes 95 per cent of the things needed by the plant in its process of food-

making, while only five per cent is left for man."

Miss Betsy reported that several days before he delivered his speech, Mr. Day sent a collection of pictures for the members of the Junior Garden Club to study. The first group of photographs, Miss Betsy said, showed that soil erosion means poor people, poor health and abandoned land. The second group of pictures showed what great changes could be wrought when man used scientific methods of caring for the soil.

Miss Smith not only thanked Mr. Day for his interest in the Junior Garden Club but she expressed the considered opinion that the Club had been most fortunate in having him for a speaker.

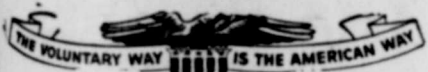

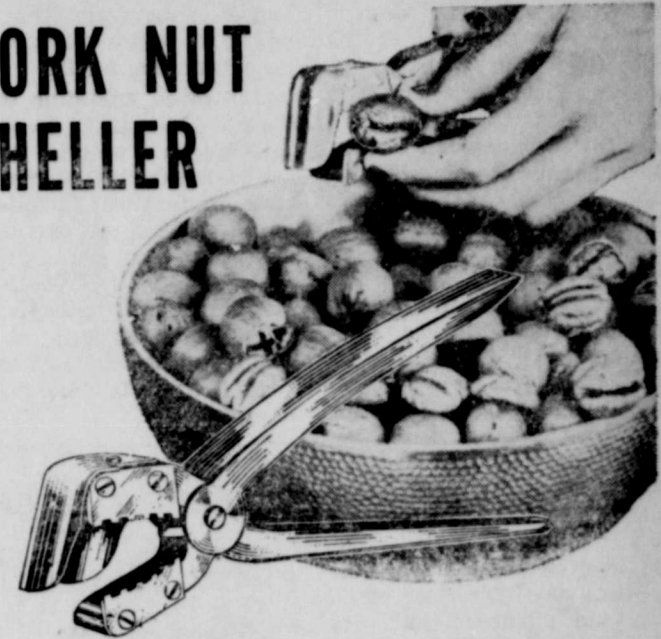

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Central Texas Telephone Co-op. Expects Loan Approval Shortly

Indication that the Central Texas Telephone Cooperative, which has been in the process of organization in a rapidly expanding area for several months, soon will receive a green light from the telephone division of the Rural Electrification Administration in Washington was given this week by its Secretary, Ernest E. Wilson.

Mr. Wilson said that recently the Board of Directors of the Cooperative met with E. G. Ammons, Field Representative of the R. E. A. Applications and Loans Division; Weldon Groves, Manager of the Hamilton County R. E. A.; and C. C. Sanders, System Engineer of the Hamilton County R. E. A.

At the meeting, over which President Willis A. Hill of the Central Texas Telephone Cooperative presided, Mr. Ammons went through the plans, organizational data, feasibility and necessity statements of the Co-op. He praised the Directors and many volunteer workers highly for their preliminary work.

"Mr. Ammons stated that everything seemed to be in order and that the Directors could notify the members that they will get a modern, dial type telephone system," Mr. Wilson said.

"Mr. Ammons told us that the machinery for processing loans was being expanded rapidly and that the application from the Central Texas Telephone Cooperative should be processed at an early date. He said that he would do everything possible to speed up the processing and approval of our loan, so that as soon as possible, the citizens of Central Texas may have first class telephone service."

It was pointed out by Mr. Wilson that Mr. Ammons is well known to the Directors of the Central Texas Telephone Cooperative, with whom he became acquainted during the organi-

zation and establishment of the Mills County Vocational School. The R. E. A. department by which he is employed now passes on and makes loans to applicants for cooperative telephone service.

Mr. Sanders, Mr. Wilson said, has tendered his services to the Central Texas Telephone Cooperative for the making of maps and drawings of the proposed exchanges and the plotting of locations of members who will receive service.

Mr. Groves, according to Mr. Wilson, has assisted wholeheartedly and well in helping to form the Central Texas Telephone Cooperative. In Hamilton County he manages one of the largest and best operated power cooperatives in the South and his knowledge of procedure and requirements has been of material assistance to the Directors of the Central Texas Telephone Cooperative.

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Washington Letter

Sweden is spending around twenty per cent of her budget on defense and preparedness. She maintains a small but efficient navy, air force and army. Her Bofors gun factory is one of the best in the world, and provided the best anti-aircraft weapons used on our battleships during the recent war. We are getting guns from Sweden today.

Her air force, while small, is modern and getting stronger. At the invitation of the Swedish Minister of Defense, I was privileged to inspect her jet plane factory located 150 miles from Stockholm, as well as other installations. Much of this is underground, with vast, spacious factories carved out of granite formations far below the earth's surface, thus making them invulnerable to bombing attacks.

All in all, it can be said that Sweden is very conscious of her strategic position and vulnerability in event of war. She is stepping up her preparedness and is an exponent of the policy of preventing aggression by making it too costly to the enemy to justify an attack.

Fortunately, Sweden has maintained a high tempo of preparedness for five years — and the Russians know it.

Field Tour

can cope with and solve problems that have turned gray the hair of many a farmer and rancher down through the years. The field tour and the informal speeches, however, faced up to the realities that always will confront those who work the land hereabouts — harsh facts such as limited rainfall, depleted soil, brush growth and insect pests.

At Dr. Graves' ranch, Thursday of last week began as the guests, the host and the experts assembled in a field that had been planted to Madrid clover, Johnson grass and oats. The demonstration there was part of the effort to find the answers to questions of soil improvement, what sort of crops would result from such improvement, and what winter grazing the experiment might offer. Previously there had been an inspection of what had happened when a mixture of Oklahoma grasses had been planted in brush — but there will be more of that later in this story.

In one field of King Ranch bluestem, the members of the field tour saw an actual demonstration of seed harvesting by machinery built by Dr. Graves in cooperation with the Soil Conservation Service technicians. Without damaging the crop of standing grass the machinery, described elsewhere in this week's Eagle in an article by Mr. Day, harvests 60 per cent of the seed. Mr. Day, in one of his many impromptu speeches of the day, explained that enough seed could be harvested from one acre to plant five acres. He said that one man, in one day, could harvest enough seed for 40 acres.

The tour proceeded to a field divided by a road. On one side of the road, which previously had been planted to vetch, there was a fine growth of clover, oats, Johnsongrass and volunteer vetch. On the other side of the road, where there had been no previous planting of vetch but where oats and clover had been seeded, there was practically no clover to be found, although Paul Koski got down on his hands and knees to search for it; the oats were spindly, and what growth there was of Johnsongrass looked mighty poor.

Then the cavalcade of automobiles and pickups moved on to one of Dr. Graves' proudest experiments — brush land in which Harding grass had been seeded, where it was growing and where it was providing not only good winter forage for livestock but challenging competition to regrowth of brush.

Actually, the field tour provided a condensed university course. Descriptions of the accomplishments that were visible to those present could not be packed into a news story. But some of the points that were driven home as the guests sat or stood in a circle after lunch were these:

Mr. Caraway said, in part: "We shall never raise our livestock any better than we improve our pastures. . . . Without cover, we cannot maintain the fertility of the soil."

Mr. Turney said, in part: "The secret of brush control is letting one plant compete with another so that the plants we want will make war on the plants we do not want. We must seed and encourage the plants we do want to help us to keep the brush down."

Mr. Turney, in the form of large clumps of sod, displayed examples of brush roots and grass roots fighting out the battle for survival and growth. He pointed to the peculiar moisture conditions that exist in so much of Texas and said: "Moisture is the biggest factor in fighting out the battle in which we are engaged to get good pastures. So far, right here, the fight has been to a draw. . . . Another factor is grazing pressure. If, by proper grazing, we can keep the leaves off the brush, the brush will die. The problem includes that of persuading goats to eat the leaves we want them to eat. . . . Another force in the struggle for pasture is the mechanical destruction of brush — by bulldozers, drags and so on. . . . Any one force or pressure will not get the job done. We must keep brush pushing on a low percentage of land so that after
