Norther Brings Frigid Weather And Rosy Noses

A norther rode into Mills County on Tuesday of this week and by Wednesday morning anybody could get an argument anywhere on the issue of how far down the temperature went. It was dusty when the norther arrived on Tuesday but Wednesday dawned clear and cold—so cold that some water pipes froze and numerous persons had trouble getting their automobiles to start. While the wind had abated somewhat by Wednesday there still was enough of it to make it seem colder than it really was. How cold was it? Harry Allen said that at his home the thermometer registered four degrees above zero. Vice President Warren P. Duren of the Trent State Bank, who lives on the "mountain," said it was two degrees above zero on Wednesday morning—but he hastened to explain that he was using a T. M. Glass thermometer. Brian Smith said it was too cold to look at the thermometer.

Dumble Hamilton, Trent State Bank Cashier, said his thermometer registered eight degrees above zero on Wednesday morning and County Attorney A. M. Pribble, with the conservatism of a lawyer, said the temperature ranged between zero and ten above. At his house out Star way, the Eagle's Roy Lee Hill built two fires in the same room but never did get the temperature above 40 in time for breakfast. On Fisher Street, Harvey Ekins forced a ride to school by automobile by insisting that his bicycle had frozen up!

As of the time the Eagle went to press this week, the unfortunate part of the weather news was that there has been no moisture for eleven weeks now and stockmen, quite understandably, were fussing because they were buying or would have to buy feed for their animals.

Clementine Will Settle For Hanna On Street Signs

Mrs. Clementine Wilmet Hester, the Eagle's valued Ebony correspondent, wants the City of Goldthwaite to spell "Hanna Valley Road" correctly on its street signs but she is willing to wait until the present signs wear out. The present signs spell it "Hannah."

Wherever You May Be Just Look! You'll See Tree On Court House

There was no mistaking the approach of the Christmas season during the past week as Goldthwaite took on a festive air, what with strings of varicolored lights strung in the Square, gayly decorated store windows, a tree on top of the Court House and a Post Office that looks like Christmas morning itself.

The Post Office started it all right after Thanksgiving with a prettily decorated lobby and a colorful box in which letters for Santa Claus may be deposited. While the finishing touches still were being put on the Post Office decorations, City Utilities Manager W. C. Barnett turned to and strung the colored lights around the Square with the enthusiastic assistance of Jimmy Huffman, T. J. Henderson and Fred Laughlin. The colored lights are a result of a cooperative effort between the City of Goldthwaite and the merchants.

The biggest excitement of the week came about as Precinct 1 Commissioner Jess Y. Tullios bossed the job of erecting a large Christmas tree on the roof of the Court House. For the benefit of former Mills County folk who live away from here, please look in the direction of Goldthwaite before you go to bed tonight and, wherever you are, you will be able to see the star shining from the top of the tree on the roof of the Court House. Commissioner Tullios said that he and Mrs. Tullios plan to spend Christmas in Dallas so that they may see how the tree looks from there.

To make the tree on top of the Court House possible, there was a cooperative effort among Mills County, the Goldthwaite Junior Chamber of Commerce, the Goldthwaite Lions Club and the Harry F. Edmondson Post number 289, the American Legion.

Getting the tree to the top of the Court House was quite a chore. It involved much waving of his arms by Commissioner Tullios. Clifford Hammond, as the hoisting contractor, turned up with a crew to do the job. A city truck—and a derrick, manned by Fred Laughlin, put the tree, on the Court House lawn, and then Commissioner Tullios called for volunteers to reinforce Mr. Hammond's crew.

"Well, County Judge Lewis B. Porter pulled a little bit with his left hand," Commissioner Tullios replied.

"Why did the Judge pull with his left hand?" was the next question.

Eagles Now Are In District 23-A In New Football Lineup For Texas

Reclassification of teams for football competition in 1951 has resulted in placing Goldthwaite in District 23, Conference "A", it was announced this week by Superintendent of Schools H. E. Patton.

Other teams in District 23 and against which the Goldthwaite Eagles will play conference games are Burnet, Llano, Marble Falls and Mason. Previously, Goldthwaite had been in District 22 of Conference "A".

Under the reclassification arrangement as announced officially to Mr. Patton in a letter from Dr. R. H. Williams of the University of Texas, the Temporary Chairman of District 23 is C. E. Brown, Superintendent of Schools at Llano.

Mr. Patton, Coach Carl Knox and High School Principal Jack Locklear, who also is Assistant Football Coach, said they are well pleased by the reclassification, which was recommended by the Legislative Advisory Council to the State Executive Committee of the University Interscholastic League. In sending his notification to Mr. Patton, Dr. Williams, who is the State Athletic Director, said:

"In making the assignments, the State Executive Committee was guided by three factors—enrollment in the last four high school grades, the geographical location of the schools, and the desire to arrange schools in such a manner as to have 32 districts in the State, thus assuring an orderly State championship playoff for Conference "A" members."

In commenting on the new assignment of Goldthwaite to District 23 in Conference "A" along with Burnet, Llano, Marble Falls and Mason, Coach Knox said that in all probability Goldthwaite will continue to have non-Conference football games with such teams as San Saba and that other non-Conference schools.

Coach Locklear said that the probable starting lineup for the girls' senior or "A" team will be Wanda Kelly, Rachel Elder and Allie Davenport, forwards; and Mae Del Long, Daisy Whitley and Corene Kerby, guards.

In advance of the Conference games here against Llano next Tuesday night, both teams will have some warm-up competition against Lometa at Lometa tonight, Friday.

Strong support for the Goldthwaite High School's basketball teams by the public is hoped for. Admission to home games will be 20 cents for children and 35 cents for adults.

Coaches Knox and Locklear said this week that in opening the Conference basketball season against Llano, the Goldthwaite players will take on competition of unknown quality. It is too early in the season to know what Llano has to offer by way of basketball competition among either boys or girls, the Coaches said.

The first game against Llano Tuesday night will be between the girls' teams of the respective schools, with the game between the boys' teams to follow.

Stubblefield Plans Retention Of Cockrum, Summy; Recalls Patterson

C. F. "Stub" Stubblefield, who will assume office as Mills County Sheriff-Tax Assessor-Collector on January 1, announced this week that he will recommend to the Commissioners Court the retention of the present staff in the Sheriff's office with the addition of John L. Patterson.

Mr. Stubblefield's announcement means that he hopes the Commissioners Court will reappoint Clyde Cockrum as Field Deputy Sheriff, Mr. Patterson as Office Deputy Sheriff and the retention of W. B. Summy, who also would serve as an Office Deputy Sheriff.

"Mr. Summy has been so kind as to indicate that he will be willing to continue his valuable service in the Sheriff's office during the transition period that will follow my assumption of office on January 1," Mr. Stubblefield said.

Mr. Patterson, who has had long experience in the Sheriff's office in the past, moved to Lampasas several months ago but, with Mrs. Patterson, he is expected to resume residence in Goldthwaite soon.

Mr. Cockrum has served as Deputy to Sheriff Wiley L. Mahan during most of 1950 and Sheriff-elect Stubblefield said this week that he is happy over the prospect of retaining Mr. Cockrum's services.

Mr. Summy, a former County and District Clerk, also has had considerable experience in the Sheriff's office and Mr. Stubblefield said that Mr. Summy's knowledge of the operations of the office will mean a great deal to him.

Mr. Stubblefield, who was elected Mills County Sheriff-Tax Assessor-Collector last November 7, following his nomination on the Democratic ticket in the run-off primary last August 26, has been busy preparing to take his oath of office. Last month, he spent two weeks in Austin where, at the Texas Department of Public Safety, he studied the most modern methods of law enforcement as well as methods involved in tax assessments and collections.

In Austin last month Mr. Stubblefield heard lectures by representatives of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the Texas Department of Public Safety, the United States Treasury Department and numerous other officials who are concerned with law enforcement and the taxation structure.

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THE ATOM BOMB FOR DEFENSE

After war broke out in Korea last June, this editorial column called for all-out mobilization for war by the United States and for use by the United States of the atom bomb to prevent further Red aggression. During the five months that have passed since then, we have done nothing about mobilizing for the war into which we were plunged by Red World Imperialism. That is why we are suffering ignominious defeat in Korea. Our failure to mobilize can be described only as national criminal negligence. After five months, during which we could have used the atom bomb to prevent the disaster that now is upon us, we must realize that it will have to be used—not as a preventive measure, but for defense and retaliation.

The United States of America is the victim of timid men. The appeasement that has guided our leadership has enabled the enemy to inflict military defeat upon us. Our helplessness now is not the result of what the enemy has done; it is the result of our own failure to prepare for the attack that was bound to come so long as we insisted upon remaining weak when we could have been so strong that attack upon us would not have been dared.

Any idea that further appeasement at this stage might lead to salvation is nonsense. The enemy is evil, but he is not stupid. He most certainly is not going to sit back and give us the time that is necessary to arm for warfare in Europe, in Asia—or at home where, until now, America never has been struck by a modern invader; never has been shattered by bombs falling from the sky.

It has been within the past 15 years that we have seen weak, timid, frightened men on their knees to men named Hitler, Tojo and Mussolini. With memories so fresh, it is degrading now to see timorous men again on their knees to men named Stalin, Mao and Kim. The sick and fearful atmosphere in which the sure challenge of the past five months has been received is responsible for the plight in which we find ourselves. The strength that we might have had in trained men and weapons, both in sufficient quantity, was not provided, and we find ourselves now with only one recourse. It is the use of the atom bomb to destroy the enemy's war potential. Unless we destroy the enemy's ability to make war, to supply his puppets, and to use his puppets to fight against us, we ourselves shall be destroyed.

Who among us is willing to have our children—those who may survive—grow up in a world in which they will be slaves if the enemy wins? It is heart-breaking enough to think of children already grown to manhood falling to all-too-early deaths before the brutality of wicked men who have no regard either for human life or for the dignity of the individual, human soul. But the nausea that comes from any look into the future that holds for children not yet matured only the prospect of trying to live without the birthright of freedom that was given to us to pass on to them is such that it ought to make us rise with one mighty voice to demand that once and for all there be an end to the timidity, to the appeasement to the attempt to gamble against the certainty of the enemy's foul intent—and to cry aloud that we shall not be guilty of the final failure, which would be refusal or delay in using against the terror that has been let loose on the world the one weapon that still is ours to use in the defense not only of the living, but of generations yet unborn.

If there has been any reason whatsoever to excuse the awful blunders and errors of the past five years on the grounds that the motive for peace and repugnance to more war came first, there no longer is any basis for doubt that the enemy does not abhor destruction, either of life or of somebody else's treasure. In the minds and hearts of those of us who have known him and the evil that he has plotted and wrought, there never was any excuse for failure to face up to him and to fight him. There was a time in which we could have prevented the spreading of his crimes against humanity. Now that such a time has passed, we must defend ourselves. We can do that, if at once we take up and use the one weapon in our arsenal that can reach the enemy's means of making war. We can be too late in resorting to use of the atom bomb, just as we have been too late in mobilizing to repel the attack that we knew would be made upon us. If again we are too late, we shall not be given another chance to survive.

Certain as we cannot help but be of our own deep desire to live at peace with all nations, our first responsibility these days is to ourselves.

GUEST CORNER

(Editor's Note: In view of the attempts by some politicians in this country to make a "goat" or "whipping boy" of General Douglas MacArthur, we believe that the following pithy editorial from the Houston Chronicle of December 2 is well worthy of consideration by all thoughtful Americans.)

In this country and in other parts of the world the jackals are beginning to snap at the heels of Gen. Douglas MacArthur, commander in chief of the United Nations forces in Korea. The debate in the British parliament, the discussion in the French press, comment in other European capitals are critical of the American military figure.

Let those who share even in the slightest degree in this yapping remember the chain of events which brought the situation in Korea to its present unpleasant state. The decisions which sent General MacArthur and United Nations ground forces into Korea were made in Washington and Lake Success. One searches in vain through the files of that period for any sign of opposition to that action. It was, as a matter of fact, urged upon President Truman.

Everything that has happened in Korea since is a logical consequence of the first landing of the 24th Division in Korea. General MacArthur's tactics have been daring and brilliant. A few short weeks ago he was the master strategist. He has been forced in recent days to fight with one hand tied behind his back.

What did these critics think was going on when Chinese "volunteers" by the hundreds of thousands were sent to the Yalu River and armed hordes each day crossed into Korea?

The howling comes with poor grace from all those quarters where American aid is rearming peoples who lack the will to erect their own defenses to the extent necessary. The notion that General MacArthur is somehow responsible for antagonizing inhabitants of the Far East comes in especially bad taste from the French, whose conduct in Indo-China has been a fester in all of the Orient.

We prefer to believe that the real voice of our allies as regards General MacArthur was expressed by Ernest Bevin when he said that "the objectives of General MacArthur are no more and no less than the objectives of the United Nations."

Those who now rail at the United Nations commander in chief are either craven advocates of appeasement or deliberately playing the Communists' game. No mud that they can throw will tarnish the luster of General MacArthur's record as a soldier and a statesman.

(On another phase of the crisis in which the people of the United States find themselves, we reprint the following editorial from the Dallas Morning News of last Monday. It was entitled: "Meeting Crisis With Conferences".)

Two Associated Press dispatches dominated the front page Sunday morning. One from Tokyo stated that "overwhelming Chinese Communist armies threaten the entire United Nations forces in Korea." One from Washington reported the government "cautiously held off any drastic new steps to deal with the Korean crisis," and also that "the delay in policy decisions appeared to result... from Attlee's impending visit."

The possibility of an all-out Chinese Communist attack in Korea has been obvious. Why wasn't some policy and plan of strategy worked out to meet such a contingency? The situation is complicated by the fact that our soldiers are fighting under the U. N. flag, but that is an added reason why a tacit agreement should have been reached by the United States and its Allies.

Throughout this increasing crisis in Asia our national administration has had its back to the wall, confronted, not so much by the situation itself, as by the dire necessity of making up its mind on what it would do. It wavered while the Chinese Communists were driving south against the Nationalist forces. It has flopped three times on the question of what to do about Formosa. When war broke in Korea, President Truman attended a conference one evening and decided not to defend Korea. Next morning he attended a conference and decided to fight. A continuation of this sort of indecision can lead only to tragedy.

There was a third big headline on the front page Sunday morning, telling of the President's trip to the Army-Navy game, "accompanied by Cabinet members, government officials and high-ranking officers of the armed forces." He did not cancel the trip because he "feared it would create undue alarm." Mr. President, national alarm over the situation in Korea is not undue, it's overdue.

News Of The Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District

K. B. Henry, commissioner of Precinct 3, moved three pieces of heavy county machinery into the Washboard community and constructed 17.5 miles of large channel type terraces in less than 10 working days. Conditions were favorable for terracing since the soil was rather dry and no crops were in the way. Soil Conservation Service technicians, Roger Powell,

Carl Casbeer, and Charles Haensch staked out the terrace lines and supervised the construction. The farmers secured their prior approvals from the local PMA office and received payments for the large channel type terrace.

Fritz Hopper had 5.5 miles of terraces built to complete the terraces on his farm. Commissioner Henry moved across the road and constructed 2.0 miles for Albert Hopper. Across the fence Ernest Hopper terraced an entire 105 acre field with 4.0 miles of terraces.

On Charlie Swindle's farm, Commissioner Henry and his crew constructed 3 miles of terraces to complete his terrace system. Alfred Hohertz was ready with 3 miles of terraces to be built on his place. The three terracing machines finished construction in one and a half days and Mr. Hohertz had his entire cultivated land protected with terraces.

Before moving into the Washboard group, Mr. Henry built 2.5 miles of terraces for George Tieman, 3 miles for J. W. King and 2 miles for Edwin Druockhammer.

Dr. T. C. Graves built 2 miles of terraces for Roy Weidner and 5 miles for Johnnie Schlee. Dr. Graves has built 3 miles of terraces on his own ranch to complete his planned terrace system.

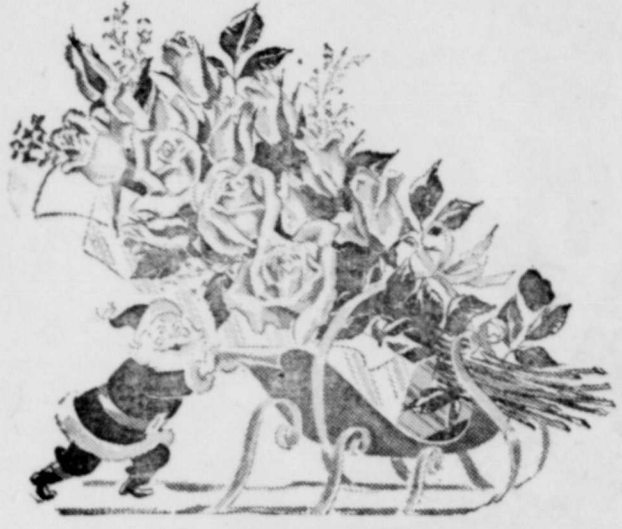

The meeting at which Mr. Morris will speak will be a union gathering that has been endorsed by the Rev. Ed H. Lovelace, Pastor of the First Methodist Church; the Rev. J. T. Ayers, Pastor of the First Baptist Church; and the Rev. Edgar I. Hanna, Pastor of the Church of the Nazarene. All Churches have been invited to participate.

A former Baptist Minister, Mr. Morris is widely known because of his broadcasts as "The Voice of Temperance." His lectures are sponsored by the Women's Christian Temperance Union. A native of Cottle County, Texas, Mr. Morris, who is 50, was educated at Wesley College at Greenville and at Brown

University. At one time he was Pastor of the First Baptist Church at Stamford.

Both "wet" and "dry" agree that Mr. Morris is one of America's leading foes of the liquor traffic.

Mr. Morris, who makes his home in San Antonio, is reputed to have spoken against liquor to more people in person and by radio than any one else in the history of the temperance movement.

Graves, Mrs. John Calloway, Mrs. George M. Fletcher, Mrs. Robert L. Steen, Mrs. W. B. Wooster, Mrs. E. B. Adams, Mrs. Tom Collier, Miss Elna Fouse, Mrs. E. T. Fairman, Mrs. L. E. Nix and an unidentified donor who simply placed Mr. Smith's name on her cake.

After serving refreshments to 62 patients and guests it was found that there was enough left over to be sent to another ward in which the Mills County delegation did not entertain. Cartons of cigarettes were provided for the veterans by D. D. Tate and Leonard Archer. Candy and chewing gum, as well as punch to go with the cake, also were distributed by the Mills County delegation among the men in Ward 93 at the Veterans Administration Hospital at Waco. Similar delegations have

On Tuesday of this week, Mr. Smith received a letter from Miss Laura Schewe, who is Red Cross Field Director at the Veterans Hospital in Waco. Miss Schewe wrote in part as follows:

There were sufficient cakes to provide some for all of the men in that particular building who could not come to the open house, and this was certainly a pleasant surprise to them. The four cakes which I took from your car were kept until Monday and we sent three of them to the tuberculosis ward. It was a special treat for those patients, since they are confined to the ward, of course, and do not get out to the parties—so they do not have home-made cakes very often. The large white cake with the Christmas tree decoration on it has been sent over to the Infirmary for a special treat. You will recall there was one carton of cigarettes and a little of the hard candies left over from the open house. The recreation worker who has a program with the post-lobotomy patients was delighted to have these extra refreshments for this particular group and the patients thoroughly enjoyed them."

In her letter, Miss Schewe sent special thanks to Miss Haggood and to Dr. Sadler for their musical selections of last Sunday.
