## Captain Johnson Ordered To Duty Effective July 8

Grievous loss was faced by the youth of the Goldthwaite Independent School District this week when Y. B. Johnson, Jr., teacher of vocational agriculture at the Goldthwaite High School and advisor to the Eagles Chapter of the Future Farmers of America,

was ordered to return to active military duty.

With the vivacious and attractive Mrs. Johnson, "Y. B.," an infantry captain in the Army's Organized Reserve Corps, will leave Goldthwaite on July 5 to report on July 8 to the famous 101st Airborne Division at Camp Breckenridge, Kentucky. The 101st Airborne Division won undying fame at Bastogne during the World War II Battle of the Bulge for the fight it made and for General Tony McAuliff's reply of "nuts" to a German surrender demand.

Captain Johnson, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Y. B. Johnson, Sr., of Coleman, has been a member of the faculty of the Goldthwaite High School for the past four years. He will return to the armed services exactly five years to the day since he was discharged on July 8, 1946.

"Y. B." entered the Army in December of 1942. He was commissioned a Second Lieutenant on May 4, 1944, but he was discharged with the rank of Captain.

## Races Saturday To Be Followed By Arena Show

When the ponies run at the Hangar airstrip three miles south of Goldthwaite at two o'clock tomorrow afternoon, Saturday, the judges for the races will be Mrs. Maxie Michaelis of Eagle Pass, Sam P. Rahl and Sig Jernigan, it was announced this week by John A. Jackson and Jack Locklear, local entrepreneurs of the turf.

With Mr. Michaelis, Mrs. Michaelis, who was one of the founders of the American Quarterhorse Association, will fly in for Saturday's races from Eagle Pass. Mr. and Mrs. Michaelis will be weekend guests in Goldthwaite of Mr. and Mrs. S. D. Jernigan.

Everett Holland will be starter for the races and his major equipment will be the eight-horse starting gate that has been rented from the Brady July Jubilee Association.

Contestants in the three open races to be run Saturday afternoon will come from Fort Worth, Brady, Lometa, Rockdale, San Marcos and "many other places," Mr. Locklear said this week. In addition, as announced previously, there will be local talent in cowgirl and cowboy races, as well as a contest for youngsters on ponies.

All in all, Saturday will be quite a day because, after the races at the Hangar airstrip and starting at 8:00 o'clock Saturday night, there will be big doings at the Jernigan Rodeo Arena, including a cutting horse contest, jackpot roping, a ladies' barrel race and a men's arena relay. If you don't know what is a men's arena relay, then go to the Rodeo Arena on Saturday night and see, according to Mr. Locklear, how they did it in the by-gone days of the pony express.

Promoters Jackson and Locklear hoped that among the guests at the races Saturday afternoon would be State Senator Carlos Ashley of Llano.

## Hail In Strange Shapes Gives Us Change From Rain

Rain this week takes a back seat to hail stones, some of which allegedly were wedge-shaped and therefore newsworthy.

There was some rain late last Thursday night and early Friday morning. It was measured at .25 of an inch by Harry Allen for the United States Weather Bureau. At his place 3 1/2 miles southwest of Star Roy Lee Hill measured it for himself at 2 of an inch.

The hail was last Saturday afternoon. Mrs. C. S. "Dutch" Smith of San Saba Peak said that the hailstones, which did not fall on Goldthwaite, were as large as hen's eggs.

"It was slow and with no wind with it, it did very little damage," Mrs. Smith reported.

It was Mrs. P. L. Hancock who saw wedge-shaped hail stones at her place south of Goldthwaite. There were very few of them, Mrs. Hancock said. That, doubtless, was all to the good.

Mrs. Elam Kelly, who is one of Mrs. Hancock's neighbors, said that last Saturday she also saw hail as large as baseballs. In support of Mrs. Hancock, Mrs. Kelly bore witness that others were flat or shaped like wedges.

Some of the strange-looking hail stones were brought into Goldthwaite where they promptly melted. Goldthwaite had a few splashes of rain drops Saturday afternoon—probably from melting hail.

## Sheriff Uses Jail For Four Culprits

Sheriff C. F. Stubblefield had close to a full house at the Mills County jail this week when W. C. Evans of Hamilton was lodged on a worthless check charge and when Charles McNamee, 24, Leland Limbaugh, 27, and LeRoy Reynolds, 23, all of Brownwood, were detained on charges of burglarizing the home of Lee Jones of Mullin on Wednesday night of last week.

Evans pleaded guilty before County Judge Lewis B. Porter and was fined \$5.00 on the worthless check charge. Justice of the Peace E. A. Obenhaus set bonds for the Brownwood trio at \$500.00 each, pending Grand Jury action. Sheriff Stubblefield and Deputy Sheriff Clyde Cokrum arrested the Brownwood men in Brownwood on car license information furnished by Mr. Jones, who said that a radio and violin had been stolen from his home.

Evans was picked up in Belton by Sheriff Stubblefield.

## Gross Appraisal Is Completed For Camp Bowie Land

Between 80,000 and 90,000 acres in the western end of Mills County—roughly between Mullin and the Brown County line—will be taken out of agricultural production if and when Camp Bowie is reactivated and its maneuver area is expanded, it became apparent this week.

(Indication that the Department of National Defense will reactivate and expand Camp Bowie came on Wednesday of this week when a Brownwood publisher was notified that Congress will be asked for an appropriation of \$3,382,000 for the purpose. Senators Tom Connally and Lyndon B. Johnson and Representative O. C. Fisher have been informed of the appropriation request but there has been no official announcement by the Department of National Defense—which must await action by the Congress before taking further steps.)

Further indication that decision to reactivate Camp Bowie and expand its maneuver area is close at hand came last week with a return to the archives in County Clerk Earl Summy's office of a representative of the Corps of Army Engineers.

While official announcement of definite plans for the future of Camp Bowie must come from the Department of National Defense in Washington or through members of the Texas delegation to the Congress, it was learned that a gross appraisal of land that will be required for expanding the Camp Bowie maneuver area has been completed. Land also will be

## Soil Service Studies Effects Of June Rainfall On Terraced Lands

Whether or not terraces alone will protect cropland from erosion, has been the basis for many a discussion by farmers and agriculturists alike. You can find the answer to this question by observing terraced fields after the recent heavy rains. Small gullies have formed between terraces to carry silt deposits into terrace channels. Some terraces are broken because of these deposits of silt, allowing the water to gain more volume and causing damage to terraces below. Where fields were planted to row crops and the soil was clean tilled, severe movement of soil is noted. Inter-terrace erosion is a problem on most all soils and crop residue, properly managed, seems to be the only

## Air Force Plans For Goldthwaite Still In Works

Goldthwaite still was in the running this week as the site for an adjunct of the James Connally Air Force Base at Waco following further conferences among Mayor Loy Long and Air Force officials.

On Thursday of last week Mayor Long conferred in Goldthwaite with Lieutenant Colonel David L. Altgelt and other Air Force officials regarding proposals to establish branch facilities of the Waco base here.

"We continue to be in the consideration stage," Mayor Long said after his conversation with Col. Altgelt, who is a Wing Executive Officer at the James Connally Air Force Base.

Mayor Long was able to give the Air Force officials assurance that Goldthwaite will be able to provide the personnel and facilities which will be required for the project.

As was reported in "The Eagle's Eye" on this page last week, the plans being considered by the Air Force would result in bringing a number of Air Force personnel, some with their families, to Goldthwaite if the project materializes.

Mayor Long was unable to indicate this week how soon a decision may be reached but he was hopeful that the attitude and offers by the Goldthwaite City Fathers would meet with Air Force approval.

## Otto Schoen Fined \$100 After Change Of Plea To Guilty

Through his attorney, William G. Yarbrough, Otto "Pinto" Schoen last Friday entered a plea of guilty to a charge of the unlawful sale of intoxicating beverages in the Court of County Judge Lewis B. Porter. He was fined \$100.00 and Court costs and "was placed in the hands of the Sheriff of Mills County until the fines and costs are paid." Schoen previously had pleaded not guilty to a complaint filed against him by Agent R. C. Fessler of the Texas Liquor Control Board. Whiskey was alleged to have been sold by Schoen to Fessler late last April.

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SHAME ON YOU, MR. TRUMAN

In a speech last week before the Highway Safety Congress in Washington, President Truman departed from his prepared manuscript to make another of his increasingly more frequent cracks against American newspapers. The President, speaking "off the cuff"—the sort of adventure that so often gets him into trouble—talked about "the sabotage press" and he referred to "the congressional demagogues."

What you mean, Mr. President, when you speak of "the sabotage press" are those newspapers that disagree with you. When you speak of "the congressional demagogues," you refer to those members of the Congress who disagree with you.

Members of the Congress, Mr. President, are the elected representatives of the American people. They are sent to Washington to represent their constituents and not to jump at the crack of the White House whip; they are not sent to Washington to be the tools of the Democratic National Committee—which has no resemblance to the Democratic Party in many sections of the United States and especially in the South.

American newspapers, Mr. President, would not be described by you as "the sabotage press" if they followed your line. But that is not their function. Their function is to speak their minds and their function is to print the news—even if the news does have to deal with government by Missouri cronies, with deep freezers, mink coats, five per centers, bewilderment in foreign policy, socialism under other names, unlimited bureaucracy, spend and spend and spend, destruction of the American system of free enterprise, and all else that originates in the minds of Fair Dealers but which still remains very definitely the business of the free American people.

The American press would be a "sabotage press" if it supinely submitted to swallowing your theories, policies and even your politics, without pausing to consider whether they might be good or bad for the American people.

Members of the Congress would be "congressional demagogues," if they betrayed the voters and simply sneezed every time your nose tickled.

But that is not the way it is in this country. While so many millions in other lands live in slavery and the misery that goes with it, the American people are more and more determined that they will not sacrifice their precious heritage of freedom to unlimited government—whether labeled Democrat, Republican, or what. It will become the Chief Executive of a free people to jump either members of Congress or American newspapers just because they displease you or refuse to do your bidding.

We not only read the press reports on your "off the cuff" references to "the sabotage press" and to "the congressional demagogues," but we also heard your own voice speak the words. Shame upon you, Mr. President!

If ever the time comes that a President in the White House has any hope of controlling either the American press or of having all members of the Congress do his bidding, then we shall have lost our freedom. That time has not yet come, Mr. Truman, and there are millions of American men and women who will fight with everything they have to keep it from coming. Our heritage of freedom was hard won—at the cost of blood. It has been defended and preserved the hard way—at the cost of blood. You, Mr. President, can lose your temper as much as you please. You have a perfect right to criticize the American press and to lambast Congressmen who refuse to vote your way. But the newspapers and the elected representatives of the American people also have a perfect right to talk back. That is the American way.

Throw away your brass collar, Mr. President. It does not fit comfortably on American necks.

GUEST EDITORIAL

(Editor's Note: An editorial in Life magazine says that now is the time for Dean Acheson to resign as Secretary of State. Life's editorial is temperate but firm and searching in its spotlighting of Mr. Acheson's errors. It is well worth reading. Accordingly, it follows in full:

Not long ago a Democrat, Senator Paul Douglas of Illinois, addressed himself to Republican critics of Secretary of State Dean Acheson. "For goodness sake," he said, "let up (on your criticism of Dean Acheson) so that he can resign with honor."

If this is what Dean Acheson really wants—to resign with honor—now is his chance and it may never come again. Last week before the Senate investigating committee the Secretary of State presented his case. The immense research facilities of the State Department had never been more effectively marshaled to brief one man. It was a masterful brief and it was masterfully presented by one of the world's ablest lawyers, Mr. Justice Brandeis. Mr. Justice Brandeis would have been proud of his old law clerk. In all fairness—and disclaiming all cynicism—no better case can ever be made now or in the future by Dean Acheson for Dean Acheson.

The Secretary met his critics with patient affability that was not shaken even by the provocation of indignant criticism. Against the very proper demeanor of a very proper man and his impressive array of data and documents his critics definitely appeared to disadvantage and much of their questioning failed to go to the heart of the controversy. Mr. Acheson explained everything. The unfortunate remark about waiting "until the dust settled" in China was not, he now says, a policy statement at all. It was a phrase "used to describe my own inability to see very far in this situation." Mr. Roosevelt's apologists used to defend Yalta on the grounds that only by concessions to the Russians could he civilize them. Mr. Acheson had a new explanation: only by conceding what was conceded could the Russians be prevented from taking by major force what they did in the end take anyway.

Mr. Acheson admitted nothing—neither past mistakes nor significant changes in foreign policy. Dean Rusk's speech on China (Life, May 28) promising aid, succor and hope to those fighting Red tyranny in China, he said, was merely a rephrasing of ideas long held by the State Department. However, Mr. Acheson did, in fact, indicate a certain welcome and important recognition of the hard facts of international life. In all his thousands of words of testimony he never once mentioned "peaceful coexistence" with the Soviet Union. He discreetly omitted all references to the now dead doctrine of "containment." There was no word or phrase that could be later used to rebuke the man or the Truman Administration with an accusation of Communism—now. The real enemy was identified beyond any shadow of a doubt.

Thus Americans are now generally agreed, in principle at least, on foreign policy.

There is no space here nor is there any reason to explore the long and tortuous path by which this agreement was reached. The conduct of a nation's foreign affairs is a complex and difficult business in which it is not easy to see the way clearly or forthrightly at any moment to lay down aims and objectives. Even Mr. Acheson's most severe and continuing critics will concede that there were many extenuating circumstances—as he himself (Continued on Page 11.)

The Eagle's Aery

"I disagree with those who say leadership by women would bring an end to war. Women are basically bellicose, there is truth, more than humor, in the old symbol of the noised rolling pin. Ninety-five per cent of all spite fences have been built by women, or because of women, and spite fences are, in one form or another, the cause of most wars. In my opinion, however, women would do better at governing the world than men. So would cocker spaniels, or tree shrews, or armadillos, or katydids."

The paragraph above was written for the Ladies Home Journal by one of the editor's good personal friends—H. Allen Smith, author of the most humorous books now extant in America such as "People Named Smith," "Larks In The Popcorn," "We Went Thataway," "Lost In The Horse Latitudes," and so on, almost ad infinitum.

The editor pondered H. Allen Smith's arresting expression of opinion in the light of the visit to Texas by General Douglas MacArthur, who pointed so clearly and so succinctly to those among us who are living by fear and who are so admittedly fearful of the international Communist forces that they seek our destruction. H. Allen Smith and General MacArthur both have a very low opinion of those to whom we have delegated our responsibility for so long, but while Mr. Smith would turn matters over to women, cocker spaniels, tree shrews, armadillos or katydids, General MacArthur offered in his speeches in Texas a policy for the conduct of our foreign affairs that is based on the basic principles of Americanism under which this nation of ours became great.

At no time during his visit to Texas did General MacArthur pull his punches. He accused the Truman Administration of "battlefield appeasement." While he was in Texas, General MacArthur bluntly told the Administration that it is afraid to win the war in Korea and he accused it of "timidity and fear." But also, he expressed faith with these words:

"This great nation of ours was never more powerful—never more prepared to extend a dynamic and courageous leadership to guide the world... As it is yet unconquered, so it is unconquerable. Our finest hours are yet to come."

While expressing his faith, General MacArthur's accusations were strong. In Austin he said: "What is our policy for Korea? On this issue rests not only the lives of countless American boys and their Allies committed to fight in that distant land, but, as well, the future security of our own country and the advance of our national leadership in the affairs of the world. Our national policy tends to depart from the traditional courage, vision and fortrightness which have animated and guided our great leaders in the past. National policy now is largely influenced, if not indeed in some instances dictated, by fear of what others may think or other things we fear before we have weared national policy to timidity and fear. Yet, in Korea today... we pay tribute in the blood of our sons to the doubtful belief that the hand of a blustering potential enemy

may in some way stayed.

"Munich taught us the lesson of appeasement. Yet, oblivious to the lessons, we now practice of appeasement—appeasement on the battlefield. We soften our blows, our power, our surreptitious advantages, in the hope that in some way by so doing an enemy will be coerced from attacking us."

General MacArthur's content himself with criticism. He said that we can do. He said that we have vision and are the eyes of the day; that our estimates must dictate that what we do must be on the spiritual level, and not on what we see and not on what we feel. General MacArthur said that what success the government has had in World War II has been the moral weakness of the world.

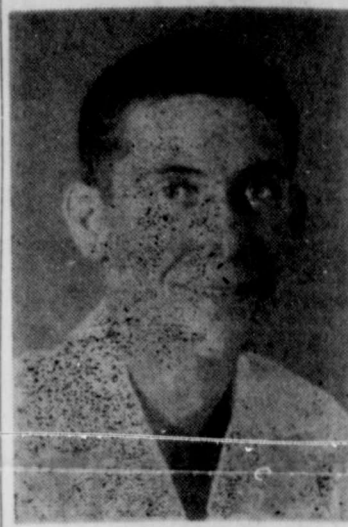

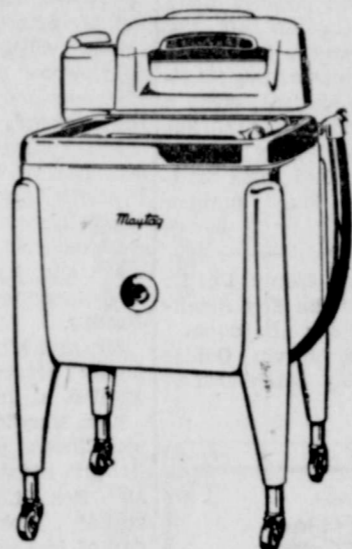

## "Ab" Reid Writes To Truman But Gets Reply From General Vaughan

Through his military aide, Major General Harry H. Vaughan, President Truman this week sent two of his speeches to A. A. "Ab" Reid of Rt. 3, Mullin. That was the White House reply to Mr. Reid's questions regarding Administration policy in Korea. He had posed the same questions to Senators Tom Connally and Lyndon B. Johnson and to Representative O. C. Fisher. Their replies already have been published in the Eagle.

Mr. Reid, whose son Sealy is back in Navy duty off Formosa after having survived the sinking of his ship off Korea, asked President Truman, among other things, why the Administration talks of preventing a war when already we are fighting a war. So General Vaughan sent to Mr. Reid President Truman's speech of last April 11 entitled, "Preventing A New World War." It was printed by the Department of State at public expense.

While he was at it, General Vaughan sent along the President's May 15 speech entitled, "It Is Up To You." It was printed and distributed by the Democratic National Commit-

tee. In asking for Mr. Reid's understanding that "the President can only read a small portion of the mail that is directed to him and can only answer a small portion of what he reads," General Vaughan added that "he appreciates your viewpoint and your feeling in the matter and has directed me to answer your letter." Then General Vaughan added this:

"There have been, as you can well imagine, a lot of misrepresentations and misstatements regarding our Foreign Policy and our action in Korea. Some people are prejudiced against everything this Administration does and possibly I am somewhat prejudiced on the other side. However, I do think that the address of the President of April 11, 1951, gives a fair statement of our Far Eastern Foreign Policy."

Mr. Evans of the Democrat Neighbor Group has changed his tillage operation in the last three years to leave his crop residue as close to the surface of the soil as possible, with good results. This residue not only prevents soil movement but allows deeper penetration of water with less evaporation.

J. H. Priddy has changed from a disc plow to a one-way plow and tandem to increase the soil residue. Emil Schuster likes the Hoerne plow for this operation. Charlie Swindle of the Washboard Neighbor Group said he could drink all of the water that has run out of his Madrid clover field in the last four years. Madrid clover's deep root system allows free penetration of water with little or no run off. Some farmers have sacrificed grazing and seed crops of legumes so they might be added to the soil as green manure.

Maintaining and replenishing the organic content of the soil is a continual process and is one of the most important soil and water conservation practice in use today.

With a good sound knowledge of soil, along with improved techniques in applying organic material to the soil, farmers are "licking" this problem of soil movement between terraces.
