As we are reminded and reminding others that this month is the time for folks to take care of the little matter of paying their Poll Tax one hears from time to time that this is an off year.

Maybe this is an off year and maybe it isn't.

From the standpoint of a major election possibly it can be considered an off year, yet, when one thinks about the responsibility of the individual with regard to voting and taking part in all elections it should never be considered as an off year.

Actually when it comes right down to facts there is no off year, as far as the individual's responsibility toward electing officials is concerned. In some years there is more activity in connection with election campaigns and those to be elected and on the part of voters, but, that doesn't mean that an election during a major campaign is more important to the voter. All elections are, or should be, important to the voters.

Therefore it is important to pay your Poll Tax so that you will be qualified to vote when the next election rolls around.

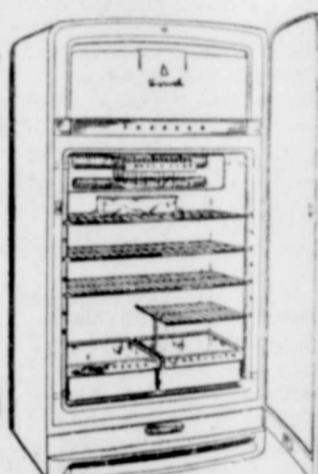

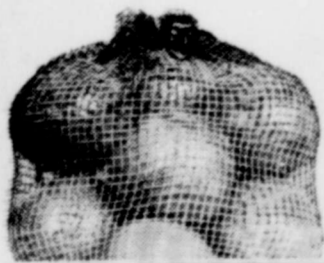

Mills County School Superintendents and Advisory Conference In Austin

Mills County school superintendents attended the Advisory Conference in Austin and returned after the session Friday night, Jan. 17. T. M. Cash, of Priddy, Newhouse, of Mullin accompanied J. T. Jones, of Goldthwaite to the conference while

LeRoy Beard of Star and John Patterson, Ex-Officio school superintendent of the county were unable to attend the conference.

The conference met in Austin for a three day session and was attended by most of the superintendents of Texas schools and many of the principals and several school board members of the various schools of the state. The overall purpose was to plan for the proper advancement of public schools of the state. The conference was divided into as many as 27 work groups, and after due consideration and discussion, made recommendations to the Texas Education Agency as to what they thought best for an adequate program at a minimum cost to the State and local districts.

Nine problems demanding the major part of the consideration of the conference were: (1) School Accreditation, (2) Internal Audits, (3) Certification of Teachers, (4) Teacher education courses in colleges, (5) Written Rules and Regulations on policies of school boards, (6) Economic Index, (7) School Bus Transportation, (8) Proposed Legislative program, and (9) Problems of the smaller schools. As a whole the conference adopted the proposals that have been worked up over a period of the last two years by lay citizens, Texas State Teachers Association, school superintendents, principals and class room teachers.

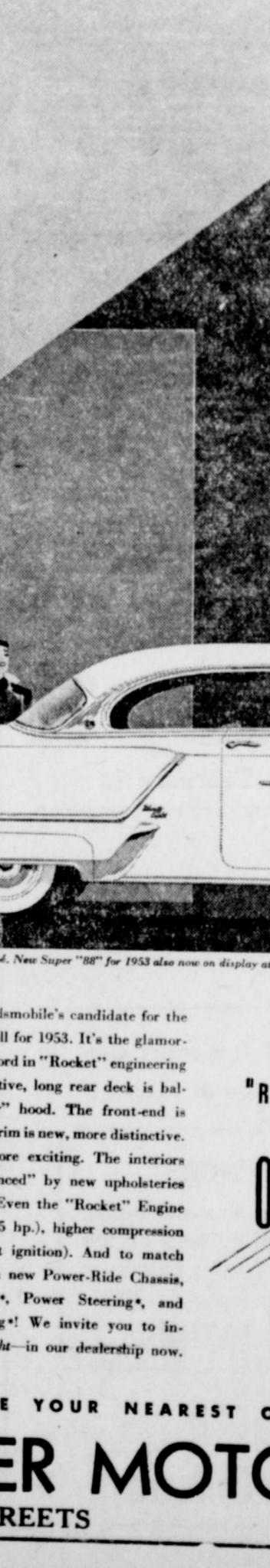
