The new plates are on hand in the Mills County Court House and will go on sale Monday, which is one day late, since February 1st, which is the customary starting day for tag sales, falls on Sunday.

Stubblefield announced that auto owners have until March 31st, to set their new tags and have them on their cars. Plates will be issued without inspection stickers, he stated.

## School District Tax Payers To Vote On Raising Legal Limits For Taxes In Special Election Next Saturday

Taxpaying voters of Goldthwaite Independent School District will go to the polls on Saturday, January 31, to vote on the question of whether or not to raise the legal limit of taxation from \$1.00 to \$1.50 per \$100.00 valuation. The special election was called by the Board of Trustees after being petitioned by 83 qualified taxpaying voters of the district to bring the question to the voters.

Polling booth will be in the Commissioners' Court room at the Mills County Courthouse. All Qualified voters can cast their ballot anytime between the hours of 8:00 a. m. and 7:00 p. m.

**WHO CAN VOTE**  
None but resident qualified property taxpaying voters of said School District who own taxable property in said School District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be allowed to vote at said election.

Poll Tax must have been paid by February 1st, next preceding 1952 Election or before February 1st, 1952.

**ABSENTEE VOTING**  
Qualified voters may cast an absentee ballot by seeing the Secretary of the School Board or any party designated by him to receive such ballot.

The petition was presented to the board as a result of desperate need for more funds for school maintenance, which has been running at a deficit for the past several years. School officials have pointed out that much needed school building repairs have been left undone of necessity because of lack of funds which has proved detrimental to the district.

If the proposition is approved by the voters then the Board of Trustees will be in position to levy up to \$1.50 per \$100.00 valuation of rendered taxable property. This does not mean that the tax rate will be \$1.50 each and every year. It merely approves an increase in the legal limits of tax rate for the school district.

Our readers are invited to read the Order For Tax Election which appears on another page of this issue and states the Proposition to be voted on, also we would invite our readers to read on another page of this issue a statement from school officials on "How Goldthwaite Schools Are Financed." This statement gives concrete information on where school funds come from and what they are being spent for and where the district is not getting sufficient funds to properly maintain the school system.

THE SPECIAL SCHOOL ELECTION

Next Saturday folks of Goldthwaite Independent School District will go to the poll and vote on a very important question.

A Question that may vitally effect the local school program in the future from the standpoint of how good a program that can be provided.

Taxpaying voters will decide whether to raise the legal limit from \$1.00 to \$1.50 per \$100.00 valuation in the district.

If the proposition is approved the school Trustees will have the power to assess taxes up to the amount of \$1.50 — but it doesn't mean that the tax will be that amount everytime. In the event the school district Board of Trustees and school officials feel that the job can be done on less than the legal limit, they will set the tax levy accordingly.

We are told by many local citizens, who are in position to know, that the maintenance fund if the district is insufficient to properly take care of the school system. If that is the case, and from what we have observed in visiting the buildings it seems to be just that, then the district must have more funds in order to operate from day to day, not to think about planning for the future.

We are also told that maintenance funds have been too small the past several years in order to try even in a small way to keep up the physical plant of the district. That isn't hard to see when one takes a look around the property, so it would indicate that there is little chance to keep up the school property let alone try to make improvements, unless more funds are made available.

So it appears that folks are faced with a problem of making available more tax funds in order to properly care for and provide educational facilities for children of the community. There is no such thing as a school system or program standing still. It will either go forward or it will go backward.

Let's keep it going forward.

IT WAS A BIG SHOW

There is no question but what Mills County had a big show in the Livestock Exposition that was held in Goldthwaite last week, Monday and Tuesday.

Members of the 4-H and F. F. A. along with Breeders and officials of the Association who pooled their efforts in putting on the show are to be congratulated for a job well done.

Yet, from observation at the fat calf showing, it appears that officials will have to start giving some thought right soon on making more improvements and expanding more. We hope they are already working along that line. A bigger show calls for bigger facilities and there is no reason why we can't have a bigger show with more entries next year and also more space to care for them.

The fact that it pays dividends to be just plain civil or decent to people was again clearly demonstrated a few days ago when a truckload of colored folks from Crockett had a mishap near our city and needed care and help—and Goldthwaite folks gave them help and encouragement.

Their truck turned over north of town in the early morning hours when it struck ice, scattering the nineteen members of the three family cotton picking party for yards around. Included in the group were seven children ranging in age from 1 and one-half months to 12 years. One of the members related the accident in this way: "We seemed to hit the ice, then we hit the bridge, then we did a number, then we did another number (turnover), and then we landed in the roadside. An' you know as heavy as I am it threw me into the air, ah bet, thirty feet."

Sheriff Stubblefield, Roy Wilkins and others went to their rescue when the call came and a good many were taken to Children's clinic where they were given attention — then later three who apparently were injured more severely were taken to their home by ambulance.

They spent the day and night after the accident in the living quarters of the county jail which was made available by the Sheriff, while Brian Smith of the Red Cross Office looked after arrangements for their care with the local Salvation Army fund providing necessary nourishment for them. Other individuals also contributed food for them and C. L. Williams furnished his truck to bring their belongings to town while Royce Brownrigg of the Coffee Shop provided them with a gallon of hot coffee as they started their trek for home.

After the accident Stubblefield asked one of the fellows in the party where they were headin' and he told the sheriff: "We're headin' back to Texas." Probably not realizing too much the fact that they had been driving for two days and a night in the state on their way home from being out in

Baker Memorial Tuberculosis Sanatorium at Mission, Texas, as follows: "It was a very happy Christmas at Weaver Paker Sanatorium because you and your group were so thoughtful of our patients. The trees and decorations were lovely, and everyone had a gift. May I extend, for the patients, their heartfelt thanks for your kindness and interest and wish you all a happy and peaceful New Year. Sincerely, D. L. Coffman, M. D., Superintendent." The Art and Civic Club sent the hospital a box of holiday cheer during the Christmas season which was a club project during the past year.

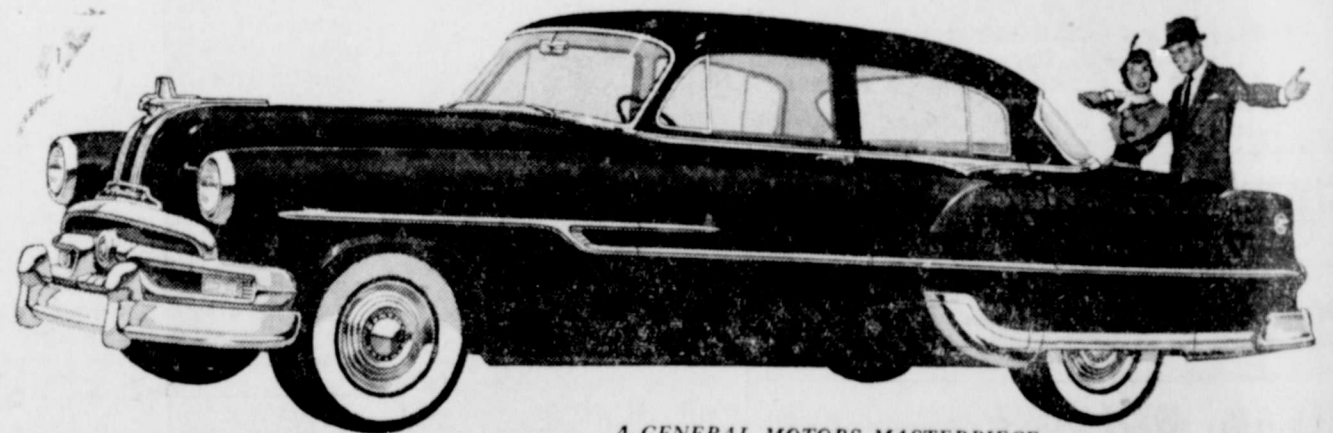

## Governor Shivers Issues Proclamation for Public Schools Week March 1-7

**MEETINGS:**  
One of the great and basic institutions upon which we rely for the furtherance of our American ideals is our public school system. It is the birthright of every American to attend our public schools and to acquire the essentials for an honorable living, as well as an understanding of the reciprocal privileges and responsibilities of American citizenship, the advantages of our life, and the place of our country in the world. We in Texas are proud of the school system that has been developed in our State. We like to believe that the opportunities afforded our children for sound education are not excelled anywhere. If we are justified in this conclusion it is only because the people of our State have shown a personal interest in education and because public spirited men and women have been willing to devote their lives to the teaching of youth. Our school system can meet the objectives expected of it when there is widespread public understanding of our schools and the type of education they provide. This kind of understanding can best be developed by the intimate knowledge that comes from inspecting the schoolhouses, knowing the teachers and seeing the work of the pupils.

WHEREFORE, I, as Governor of the State of Texas, do hereby designate the week of March 1-7, 1953, as

**PUBLIC SCHOOLS WEEK** in Texas, and I urge every citizen to visit at least one public school during this period and to become personally acquainted

with the programs and accomplishments of our educational system.

## Gas Company Delivers Record Output During Cold Wave First Of Month

Lone Star Gas Company delivered its first billion cubic feet of gas in a 24-hour period, as of 7 o'clock Saturday morning, January 17, to more than 620,000 customers in 387 cities and towns in Texas and Oklahoma, according to reports from the firm's Dallas headquarters.

The record breaking consumption resulted from Friday, January 16's cold weather combined with growth of the company's operating territory, the report stated. It followed on the heels of another record set this winter

which witnessed a period of 54-straight days when temperatures averaged below 65 degrees and required constant heat.

The stretch of heating weather started in mid-November and continued through December and into January over most of the Lone Star system.

The total send-out through Saturday morning, January 17, was 1,060,400,000 (billion) cubic feet of gas. On Wednesday, the day before the cold wave struck, total consumption was about one-half of Friday's peak. The previous high for a 24-hour period was 926,700,000 (million) cubic feet recorded at 7 a. m. on January 30, 1951.

During early stages of the cold siege the company ordered minimum curtailment in gas consumption by a few large industrial plants. This was done to protect the gas supply for homes and was in line with regular contractual agreements.

The company's ability and delivery capacity to meet these record requirements, officials said, is represented by a continuing construction and enlargement program which, since 1945, has called for more than \$100 million in new capital and hundreds of new employees.

Interment was in Oakview Cemetery in Mullin and funeral arrangements were by Johnson's Funeral Home of San Angelo.

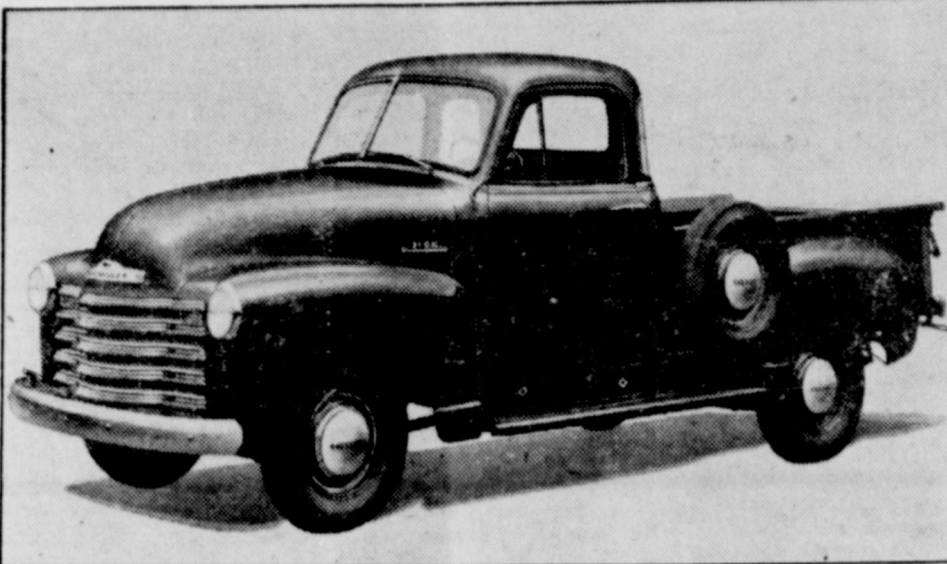
